

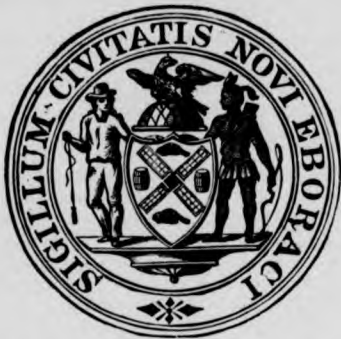

Opinions of Counsel to the Corporation.

SIR—In compliance with the request of your letter of the 1st instant, I have retained the Hon. Charles A. Peabody to attend to the matter of an application to the Legislature for authority to take lands under water, in front of the uplands owned by your Department on Ward's Island, and the marsh fronting on Randall's Island known as the Sunken Meadow.

Hon. WILLIAM LAIMBEER,

President of the Department of Public Charities and Correction:

SIR—I duly received your letter of the 17th instant, inclosing a communication from the Hon. Nelson K. Wheeler, Police Justice for the Sixth District. It appears by Judge Wheeler's letter that an application had been made by you to him to make inquiries, pursuant to statute, as to the facts and circumstances in reference to Louisa Smith, who was said to have been delivered of a bastard child, likely to become chargeable to the County of New York. Judge Wheeler states that he has not been able to find any law which gives jurisdiction, in cases of bastardy, to a Police Justice of this city, and asks you to refer him to the law or authority giving official power to a Police Justice to act in cases of bastardy or of lunacy.

There is no statute which expressly gives to the present Police Justices of the City of New York jurisdiction in matters relating to bastardy or lunacy, but an examination of the various laws in relation to bastards and lunatics, and the powers of Police Justices in relation thereto, in this city, leaves no doubt that they have full and complete jurisdiction in such matters.

The general provisions of law relating to the safe keeping and care of lunatics in this State are to be found in Title 3 of Chapter 20 of Part I of the Revised Statutes, I Edmonds' Laws, page

586. Sections 4 and 8 of that title, authorizes any two Justices of the Peace, upon their own motion, or upon the application of the Overseers of the Poor, to issue their warrant for the apprehension and confinement of lunatics.

The general provisions of law in reference to the support of bastards are to be found in Title 6 of the same chapter, I Edmonds' Laws, page 593. This title gives to Justices of the Peace the most ample power in reference to ascertaining who are the fathers of bastards, and making provision for their support.

As there can be no question, therefore, that Justices of the Peace have full jurisdiction in matters of bastardy and lunacy, the only other question is, whether Police Justices have the same powers as Justices of the Peace.

Prior to the Act of March 30, 1848, which established the office of "Police Justice," the administration of matters in Police Courts was intrusted to certain officers of the higher courts, and the Mayor, the Aldermen, and certain justices called Special Justices for preserving the peace in the City of New York. See sections 23 and 24 of chapter 86 of the Revised Laws of 1813, volume 2, page 350.

Section 41 of this act provides as follows: And be it further enacted, That the Special Justices for preserving the peace in the City of New York, and each of them, shall have and exercise the like powers in the said city as are now exercised by Justices of the Peace in the different counties of this State; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize said Justices to try causes for the recovery of debts. II Revised Laws, page 354.

Section 42 of said act also provides that the Special Justices, and each of them, shall have and exercise the like powers as may be lawfully exercised out of the Sessions by the Aldermen of said city in relation to all cases of bastardy.

It will also be observed that the general provisions of the Revised Statutes of 1813, in reference to lunatics and bastards, were substantially the same as those contained in the Revised Statutes of 1830. See I Revised Laws, pages 116 and 306-10.

In 1848 a new system was adopted in reference to Police Courts, by which the city was divided into six districts, in each of which was to be elected a Police Justice. See chapter 153 of the Laws of 1848, passed March 30, 1848. Valentine's Laws, page 581, section 7, of that act, provided that the said Police Justices should have all the powers, and perform all the duties of the Special Justices for preserving the peace in the City of New York; and the said offices of Special Justices were thereby abolished.

Between the years 1848 and 1873 various laws were passed in relation to the Police Courts in this city, some of which increased the number of courts and justices, and extended and defined the powers of those courts. None of these acts have taken away the jurisdiction in relation to bastards and lunatics, which the Justices had succeeded to as the successors of the old Special Justices of the Peace.

Under the Act of 1873, the Police Justices were to be appointed by the Mayor, and confirmed by the Board of Aldermen, and their powers were to be the same as those of their immediate predecessors in office; and I have no doubt that they have the same jurisdiction in relation to bastards and lunatics as was possessed by the former Police Justices and Special Justices of the Peace.

It is possible that, prior to 1860, it would have been necessary that proceedings of this character should have been taken before two Police Justices; but section 6 of the Act of April 17, 1860, provided as follows: Any proceedings now authorized to be taken before any two Police Justices in said city may hereafter be taken before any one of the said Justices, so that there can now be no question that jurisdiction in cases of bastardy and lunacy may be exercised by any one of the present Police Justices of this city.

Bigelow & Co., No. 91 Chambers street, who have agreed to enter into said contract, a copy of which is hereunto annexed for the consideration of the Board of Apportionment.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the building should be erected at once, in order that the labor of the prisoners should be turned to some advantage to the Treasury of the City.

The Chairman put the question on the approval of the said minutes.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The minutes of the meeting held July 8, 1874, were read and approved.

A communication from the Department of Public Parks was read by the Mayor, upon which no action was taken.

A communication was read from the New York Bridge Co., calling for additional bonds.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Objection was made by the President of the Board of Aldermen to their reception, on the ground of non-compliance with the rules of the Board as contained in resolution adopted by the Board at the meeting of June 22, 1874, as follows:

Resolved, That hereafter all meetings of this Board shall be convened upon notice of not less than forty-eight hours, served personally upon each member of the Board; and that such notice shall specify the business for the consideration of which the meeting is convened; and if for authority to issue bonds, that a copy of the requisition of the Department making application for such issue, and a reference to the laws or ordinance which authorize the issue, accompany the same.

The Comptroller gave notice that he had several resolutions to offer in relation to the issue of Judgment and other bonds.

The President of the Board of Aldermen insisted on the compliance of the resolution of the Board adopted at the meeting of June 23, above referred to.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
