



Resolved, That the duties of the Supervising Surgeon to the Park and Ninety-ninth street Reception Hospitals, Dr. William F. Fluhrer, until more definitely defined, be daily visits to the Park Hospital and three times each week to the Ninety-ninth street Hospital, and to carefully supervise the treatment of all patients of surgery; also, during leave of absence of Dr. Early, to perform all capital

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE,
Thursday, July 9, 1874, 11 o'clock, A. M.

The Board met pursuant to recess.

Present—All the members, viz.:

William F. Havemeyer, the Mayor of the City of New York; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Samuel B. H. Vance, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held June 27 were read and approved.

The minutes of the meeting held June 29 were read.

The Comptroller moved to lay them over.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman) and the Comptroller of the City of New York—2.

Negative—The President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman put the question on the adoption of the minutes of June 29, and they were approved by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The minutes of the meeting held June 30, 1874, were read.

The Comptroller moved to lay them over.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York and the Comptroller of the City of New York—2.

Negative—The President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman put the question on the approval of the said minutes.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The minutes of the meeting held July 8, 1874, were read and approved.

A communication from the Department of Public Parks was read by the Mayor, upon which no action was taken.

A communication was read from the New York Bridge Co., calling for additional bonds.

Which was laid over.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by provisions of chapter 642 of the Laws of 1874, the salaries of the Commissioners of Excise in the City of New York are hereby fixed at the rate of five thousand dollars each (\$5,000) per annum, and that the sum of thirty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$32,500) is fixed as the amount necessary for hire of employees, rent, and other necessary expenses of said Board of Commissioners.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered resolutions relating to the issue of bonds to the Department of Docks, the Department of Public Works, and the Department of Public Parks.

Objection was made by the President of the Board of Aldermen to their reception, on the ground of non-compliance with the rules of the Board as contained in resolution adopted by the Board at the meeting of June 22, 1874, as follows:

Resolved, That hereafter all meetings of this Board shall be convened upon notice of not less than forty-eight hours, served personally upon each member of the Board; and that such notice shall specify the business for the consideration of which the meeting is convened; and if for authority to issue bonds, that a copy of the requisition of the Department making application for such issue, and a reference to the laws or ordinance which authorize the issue, accompany the same.

The Comptroller gave notice that he had several resolutions to offer in relation to the issue of Judgments and other bonds.

The President of the Board of Aldermen insisted on the compliance of the resolution of the Board adopted at the meeting of June 23, above referred to.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Opening Ninety-fourth street, from Eighth avenue to New Road, and from Twelfth avenue to the Hudson River.
