

# BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, Friday, February 9, 1877—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of the following call:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

Several applications have been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for appropriations from the Excise Fund, by charitable societies.

Among them are a number of applications made by benevolent societies and missions connected

Among them are a number of applications and they particular churches.

However worthy this class of charities may be, and they bear every evidence of their just claims to be considered deserving of commendation, I am reluctantly compelled to report against making appropriations to them, on the sole gound that they do not come within the meaning and intent of the law which provides for the appropriation of the Excise moneys to "benevolent and charitable institutions which gratuitously aid, support, or assist the poor."

THE FREE DORMITORY FOR WOMEN.

From what I have learned of this charity, I do not think it proper to recommend any further

THE NEW YORK INFANT ASYLUM.

This institution is provided for under special laws from annual taxation, by a per capita allowance under the certificate of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, which is paid by the Finance Department, on monthly bills, for the support of women and children reported as its immates. The law which provides for the distribution of the Excise Fund is not applicable to it, and the application should, therefore, be refused.

THE HEBREW BENEVOLENT FUEL ASSOCIATION (13 ST. MARK'S PLACE). This society is devoted to a charity which seems worthy of support, and I recommend an appropriation to it of the sum of \$1,000.

WEST SIDE RELIEF ASSOCIATION.

An appropriation was made to this institution on September 29th last of \$1,875, and again on December 29th of the same amount, in all, \$3,750.

A report has been received from the officers of this institution, showing the application of the money for the relief of the poor, as required by the resolutions under which the appropriations were made, satisfactory in its character. I therefore recommend a further appropriation to this institution of the sum of \$1,500 from the Excise Fund.

5.—The St. John's Guild.

The following appropriations have been made to this institution for the present winter: September 30, 1876.

December 12, 1876.

January 8, 1877. 5,000 00

These appropriations were made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the condition that reports showing the particulars of the distribution of these funds should be made at as early a date as practicable after the moneys have been expended.

A report has been made of the expenditures under the two last appropriations, amounting to

\$14,973.92.

An urgent application has been made for a further appropriation from the Excise Fund to this society, to aid the suffering poor, and I recommend that the sum of \$5,000 be now appropriated.

In view of the numerous special charities applying for appropriations from the Excise moneys, I feel constrained to express some apprehension that the appropriation of this fund, as now provided for by law, may produed injurious effects, by encouraging the formation of benevolent societies, relying mainly for maintenance on this fund, which cannot be depended upon permanently.

Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller:

Sir.—In your letter to me of the 3d instant you state that the Institution of Mercy has presented bills to the Finance Department for the care and support of destitute children committed to their care by the Police Justices of this city, from July to December, 1876, amounting to the sum of \$3,553.14; that prior to January, 1876, this class of children was committed to the care of the Commission of Charities and Correction, and a number were transferred from Randall's Island to the Institution of Mercy January 1, 1876, for whose care and support the Commission of Charities and Correction now provide out of their funds; that the children for whose support these bills have been presented have been committed under the provisions of chapter 173 of the Laws of 1875, and you request my opinion upon the question whether the Commissioners of Charities and Correction are not properly chargeable with the cost of their care and support.

It was provided in section 1 of chapter 173 of the Laws of 1875, that on and after January 1, 1876, it should not be lawful for Police Justices to commit children over three and under sixteen years of age as vagrant, transt, and disorderly, to any County Poorhouse in this State, or for any County Superintendent or Overseer of the Poor or other officers to send any such child as a pauper to any such Poorhouse for support and care (with certain exceptions which it is unnecessary to refer to), but that such Justice, County Superintendent, Overseer of the Poor, or other officers, should commit or send such children to some Orphan Asylum or other Charitable or Reformatory Institution, as now provided by law. The second section of said act made it the duty of the County Superintendent of the Poor, or other proper officers charged with the support and relief of indigent persons of the several Counties of this State in which there are County Poorhouses, to cause the removal of all children between the age of three and sixten

Institutions.

The Commissioners of Charities and Correction acting upon the advice so given complied with the law and transferred certain children from Randall's Island to Charitable Institutions.

The same view appears to have been taken of the matter by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the appropriation for the Department of Public Charities and Correction for the year 1877, contains the following: "For all supplies for the Department of Public Charities and Correction, including \$50,000 for support of out-door poor and for maintenance of children transferred from Randall's Island Nursery to various institutions, \$800,000."

Provision has thus been made for those children who were once under the charge of the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, but have been so transferred by them to various charitable institutions.

With regard to those children, however, who have never been under the charge of said Commissioners, but who have been committed by the Police Justices directly to charitable institutions, the matter stands, legally, it not morally, in a different position, so far as concerns the providing of means for their support

for their support.

Chapter 173 of the Laws of 1873 does not impose upon the Commissioners of Charities and Correction the duty of supporting children who may have been committed by the Police Justices to charitable institutions, since January 1, 1876, nor does any other statute, so far as I am aware, impose that duty upon them; the general statutes defining their powers and duties contemplate that those children only who are immediately under their charge, and who are maintained in public institutions, shall be supported out of the moneys appropriated for that Department, I do not think therefore that it is the duty of the Commissioners, nor that they have the right to use any portion of the funds appropriated for that Department to the payment of the bills referred to in your letter.

As the children in question belong to a class, which, before the passage of the act, chapter 173 of the Laws of 1875, were supported in public institutions, at the public expense, it would seem that some further provision of law ought to be made for their support in the charitable institutions to which they have been, and will doubtless hereafter be, committed by the police justices.

It is doubtful whether, as the law now stands, it is in the power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make an appropriation for the support of the children committed by police justices to the "Institution of Mercy." The said chapter 173 of the Laws of 1875, provided that the Boards of Supervisors should take such action in the matter as may be necessary to curry out the provisions of that act: it is doubtful whether this particular provision has any application to the City of New York.

York.

This act was passed April 24, 1875, and on April 30, 1875, another act, being chapter 221 of the Laws of that year, was passed, which makes provision for the aid and support of the poor in this city. The first section authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the Supervisors, to annually raise such amounts as they may consider necessary in aid and support of the poor, and to appropriate such proportion thereof as they may deem necessary or proper to the various charitable or reformatory institutions in this county. The second section, however, provides that no appropriation or payment shall be made to any charitable institution by the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York, under the first section, except to institutions to which the Board of Supervisors were during the year 1874 authorized to appropriate and pay moneys in aid and support of the poor were during the year 1874 authorized to appropriate and pay moneys in aid and support of the poor

So far as I can ascertain the Institution of Mercy was not one of the institutions to which the Board of Supervisors were, during the year 1874, authorized to appropriate and pay moneys in aid and support of the poor cared for or supported therein. If such was the fact, it would seem, therefore, that it would not be in the power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, either to make an annual appropriation for the support of such children, nor to transfer any balances of unexpended appropriations for their support, without some further legislation.

I regret that I am torced to this conclusion, and my answer to your letter has been delayed for several days in the hope that a thorough consideration of the matter might lead to a different result. I see no escape however from such conclusion, and the only suggestion I am able to make is, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall, if it sees fit, appropriate a sufficient amount from the Excise moneys to provide for the payment of the bills referred to in your letter, and the further support of the children in question. I think that, under the authority conferred by section 4 of said chapter 221 of the Laws of 1875, and by chapter 488 of the Laws of 1875, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can lawfully make such an appropriation.

TERMS OF SALE.

Twenty per cent. on the yearly rent bid for each parcel, to be paid to the Collector of City Revenue at the time and place of sale; and the successful bidder will be required, at the same time, to have an obligation executed by two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, for carrying into effect the terms of sale.

Twenty per cent., when paid, will be credited on the first quarter's rent; or forfeited, if the lessee does not execute the lease and bond within fitteen days after the sale; and the Comptroller shall be authorized, at his option, to resell the premises bid off by those failing to comply with the terms as above; and the party so failing to comply to be liable for any deficiency that may result from such resale

resale.

No person will be received as lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from the Corporation. No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The leases will contain the usual covenants and conditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel the lease whenever the premises may be required by them for public purposes.

All repairs will be made at the expense of the lesses, and no deduction whatever will be allowed for damage by reason of any sickness or epidemic that may prevail in the city during the continuance of the lease.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarter-yearly, and the fulfillment on their part of the covenants of the lease; and that the Comptroller take whatever steps may be necessary to have the same appraised preparatory to the sale, and to proceed with the sale in the manner prescribed by law.

A communication was received from the Superintendent of Markets, in relation to cellars Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 Washington Market; whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following preamble and resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Cellars Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, as now leased, fronting on Vesey street, Washington Market, are only occupied in connection with stands upon the street contiguous, which are rented by the tenants to parties who expose for sale articles properly within the cognizance and control of the Superintendent of Markets; and

Whereas, The Superintendent of Markets has represented that it would be to the interests of the city that such cellars should not be leased; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Markets be authorized to take possession, on and after May 1, next, of cellars Nos. 1, 2, 3, and part of 4, in Washington Market, fronting on Vesey street; and that he be authorized to occupy the street contiguous to such cellars with stalls or stands, and to rent the same in his discretion.
