BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office on Tuesday, May 19, 1885, at 11.15 o'clock A. M.

The minutes of the meetings held February 12 and March 11, 1885 were read and approved. The following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors with communications dated April 8, 1885, were presented by the Comptroller, viz.:
