WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 6,060, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police, for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 993 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 265 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 25 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds; and 35 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The deaths for the quarter were 11,140, being 672 more than for the corresponding quarter of 1890, and the death-rate being 26.41 against 25.57 for the previous year.

This increase of 672 deaths, as compared with 1890, was chiefly due to an increase of 171 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 231 from diarrheal diseases, of 76 from diseases of the heart, of 53 from pneumonia, of 58 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 89 from accidents (62 of these being due to the Park place disaster).

Notwithstanding this increase in the death-rate, it was less than the average for five years previous, viz: 26.41, as compared with 27.42.

Contagious and infectious diseases, as a whole, showed an increase as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1890, but a decrease, with the exception of scarlet fever, as compared with the average rate for the previous five years, the greatest decrease being in whooping-cough. The actual numbers, compared respectively with those of 1890, are as follows: Diphtheria, 277 against 224; typhoid fever, 150 against 144; measles, 100 against 128; scarlet fever, 224 against 53, and whooping-cough, 60 against 168, a total of 811 for 1891 against 717 for 1890.

The death-rate from diarrheeal diseases was 5.80 against the five year average of 6.48 of phthisis, 2.86 against 319; of heart diseases, 1.15 against 1.10; of pneumonia, 1.63 against 1.35, and by accident, 1.27 against .92.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 5,756 against 5,318 in 1890, and an average of 5,475 for five years previous; the death-rate, based upon the total estimated population, being 13.65 against the five year average of 14.18.

If we are to judge from the increased death-rate from heart diseases and pneumonia, it would seem that the effect of the epidemic of influenza had not yet entirely passed away, especially as there were seven deaths during the quarter, attributed directly to that disease, the last one having been reported during the week ending August 29.

The most remarkable feature of the vital statistics of the quarter has been the extraordinary increase in the number of births reported, owing to the energetic measures adopted to detect and punish delinquents. The total number sent in was 13,708, an increase of 3,995 over the corresponding quarter of 1890, giving a birth-rate of 32.51, which would indicate about 54,000 births a year—probably, not far from the real number.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending September 30, 1891, the number of notices issued by the Board was 7,425. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents, to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.

Alleys cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with street gutter and sewer.

Apartments cleaned, disinfected or ventilated.

The 969 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.63 against 27.20 for the previous week, and 24.06 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The increase of 80 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 11 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 17 from phthisis, of 9 from bronchitis, of 10 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 48 from influence; there was a decrease of 10 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 19 from heart diseases, and of 21 from pneumonia,

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Tenth, Twelfth, and Nineteenth Wards.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the southerly line of a certain unnamed street and the northerly line of Devoe street; easterly by the centre line of the block between Summit avenue, Lind avenue and Sedgwick avenue, and Devoe street and Anderson avenue; southerly by a line drawn perpendicular to the southern extremity of the most southerly line of the western boundary of the land to be acquired for the opening of Lind avenue; westerly by Sedgwick avenue and the centre line of the block between Lind avenue, Sedgwick avenue and a certain unnamed street; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and the laws amendatory thereof, or of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 19th day of February, 1892, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
