CHARGE—NEGLECT OF DUTY.

SPECIFICATION.

In this, to wit: On the 11th day of January instant, the Superintendent of Police ordered said

Captain Jacob Siebert to attend at a public meeting to be held at the Cooper Institute, on the evening of that day, and to detail of sufficient number of his men to attend under his command, and to keep the peace, preserve order, and protect the persons there assembled. That said Captain neglected to obey said order, and neglected to detail a sufficient number of men, and neglected to attend in person at the time and place until too late to carry the said order into effect.

Guilty of charge and specification: In this, that said Captain Jacob Siebert, of the Seventeenth Precinct, did not make the necessary and proper police arrangements for the meeting held on the evening of the 11th instant, and did not order a sufficient number of men to preserve order, and neglected to attend said meeting at the head of his command at the proper time.

Judgment—Fined fifteen days pay.

It would appear from the evidence in the case that the Superintendent confided too much in the judgment of Captain Siebert; the orders given were not of that explicit and concise character that the occasion required. On similar occasions the Superintendent is hereby directed in the future to give full and explicit orders in writing.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 23, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,121, as follows:

5 public buildings, 1,195 tenement houses, 162 private dwellings, 209 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 57 stables, 1 brewery, 40 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 3 head and tripe-boiling establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 6 sunken and vacant lots, 43 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 86 privies and water-closets, 5 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 6 cisterns and cesspools, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, and 105 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 475.

During the past week 41 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 93 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 89 houses, privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

50 Cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 4 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

29 Permits were granted to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

27 Permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 23, 1875: Typhus fever 2, typhoid fever 14, scarlet fever 55, measles 13, diphtheria 133, small-pox 84, and cerebro-spinal meningitis 6.

100 loads of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending January 23, 1875, viz.: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 7 carcasses; and hogs 11.
