

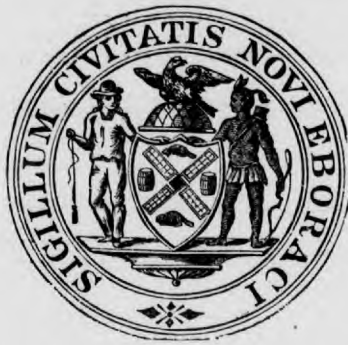

### STATEMENT OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, FOR THE YEAR ENDING AUGUST 1, 1893.

In compliance with section 126 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller of the City of New York herewith publishes the following "full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the corporation" during the year ending on the first day of August, 1893, and the "cash balance or surplus" in the City Treasury at that date; also "the different sources of City revenue and the amount received from each source," together with "the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of money expended under each"; and also "the money borrowed on the credit of the corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained."

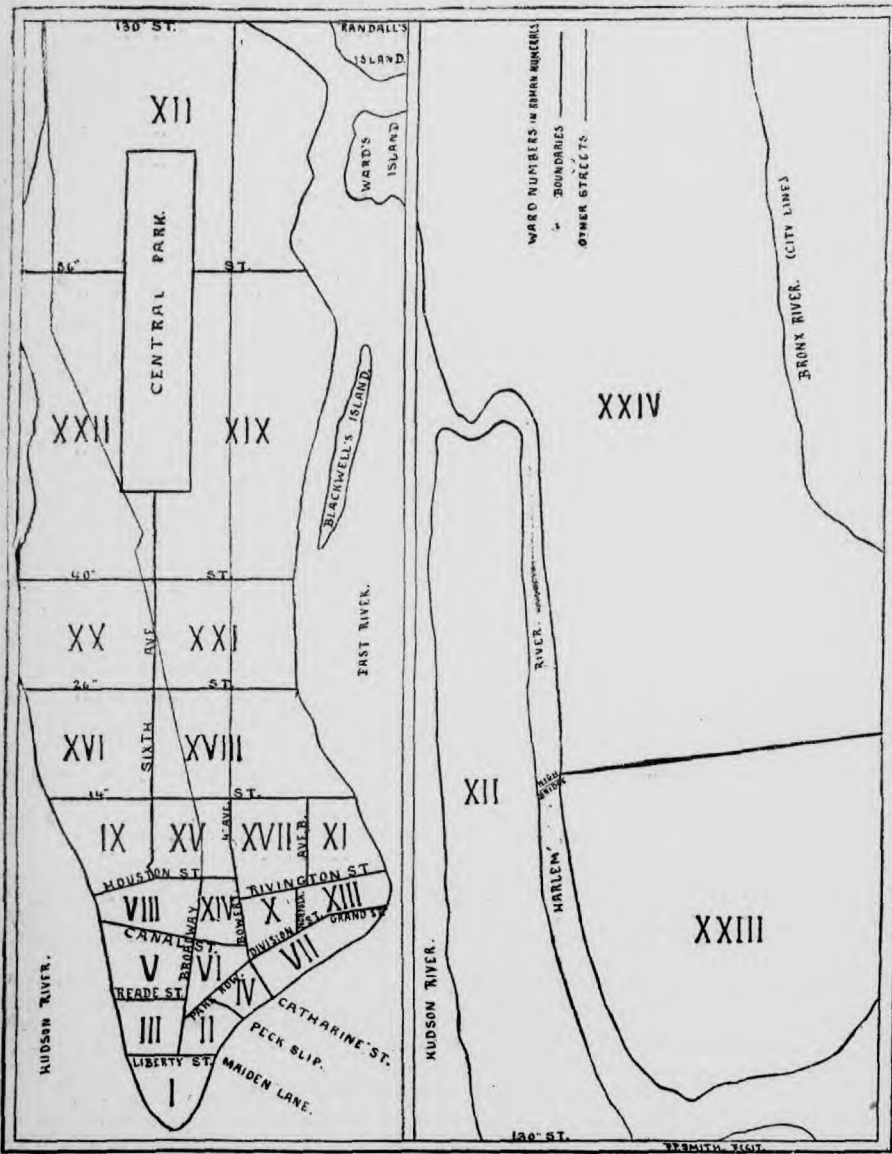

The 805 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.10, against 24.35 for the previous week and 22.42 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked falling off, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 95, 111, 37, 29, 0 and 0 against 109, 138, 40, 35, 1 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 272 against 326. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Sixth, Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, the decrease being most marked in the Tenth, Eleventh, Sixteenth and Nineteenth Wards. There was a noticeable increase of measles in the First, Eleventh and Twenty-second Wards, the decrease being chiefly in the Seventh, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth, Sixteenth and Twentieth Wards. Scarlet fever decreased pretty generally, the decrease being most pronounced in the Seventeenth Ward. Nine of the 29 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 6 of the remaining 20 were below Fourteenth street, 11 of the 14 cases reported between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets being on the east side. There were no cases of typhus fever or small-pox.

For particulars as to the quantity and kind of Stationery and Printing required, reference must be made to the specifications, blank forms of which may be obtained at the office of the Chief Clerk in the Central Department.

Bidders will state a price for the work and material furnished in accordance with the specifications. The price must be written in the bid and stated in figures. Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the head of said Department to reject any or all bids which may be deemed prejudicial to the public interests.

No estimates will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The entire quantity of Stationery and Printing is to be put up in boxes and delivered at such times and places, and in such quantities in each place, as shall be directed by the Chief of the Bureau of Elections.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract in the manner prescribed by law, in the sum of TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

Each estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; and the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract and herein stated, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law.
