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BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

TWENTY-FIRST AND TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICTS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Minutes of fourth Meeting of Boards of Local Improvements of the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts of the Borough of The Bronx.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Board of Local Improvements of the Twenty-first District met at 2 P. M. February 17, 1898, at the office of the President of the Borough.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street Paving.

The Secretary read a communication from Messrs. Hurlbut Bros., requesting the paving of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues.

By Councilman Murray Resolved, That a hearing be given on March 3 next.

Adopted. The Secretary read the following communication from Chief Topographical Engineer and Engineer of Concourse, L. A. Risse:

By Councilman Murray— Resolved, That it is hereby recommended that the Municipal Assembly take such action as may be proper to compel the Manhattan Railway Company to carry out its obligations with the City, and that copies of the resolutions just adopted be forwarded to the Municipal Assembly. Minutes of Fifth Meeting of the Local Boards of the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts of the Borough of The Bronx.

The President announced that he would listen to arguments for and against recommending the Heine Monument to be erected in the Borough of The Bronx. The Secretary read communications from Dr. Ernst Richard, William Capelle and Raymond Krebs, urging the acceptance of the monument, and communications from P. Leckler and D. J. Quirk, M. D., opposing its acceptance. Mr. Richard Katzenmayer, Dr. Richard, Louis Schneider, Mr. Kernish, Mr. McCafferty, and Dr. Von Duering spoke in favor of accepting the monument. The Rev. Father Peter Farrell and Rev. Dr. G. W. F. Birch spoke against accepting it. Petitions containing several hundred signatures in favor of the acceptance of the monument were presented and filed. On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was Resolved, That the matter be disposed of at a special meeting, to be called by the President. Adjournment.

Manhattan Elevated Railway Company.

Councilman Hottenroth introduced the following : Whereas, For the past seven years, the Manhattan Railway Company, as the grantee and lessee of the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, has been in possession of valuable franchises for lines of railway over various streets, avenues and public places in The City of New York, north of the Harlem river, and

lines of railway over various streets, avenues and public places in The City of New York, north of the Harlem river, and Whereas, Said Manhattan Railway Company covenanted and agreed at its own proper cost and expense, to use, operate and maintain said lines of railway for the conveyance of persons and property in the manner in which its grantor and lessor was required to do, and Whereas, Said Manhattan Railway Company covenanted and agreed at its own proper cost and expense, to use, operate and maintain said lines of railway for the conveyance of persons and property in the manner in which its grantor and lessor was required to do, and Whereas, Said Manhattan Railway Company covenanted and agreed to complete the con-struction of said lines of railway granted and leased to it to the extent and in the manner required by law of its said grantor and lessor, the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, in its creation and organization or by-laws then or thereafter in force ; and Whereas, In the charter of the said Suburban Rapid Transit Company it is provided; among other things, that the time within which the railway or railways or portions of the same shall be constructed and ready for operation upon the routes fixed and determined by the Rapid Transit Commissioners, under the Act of 1875, on the 1 th day of May, 1880, was fixed as follows : That not less than five miles of the railway or railways upon all the routes so authorized should be con-structed and ready for operation before the first day of September, 1885; and that within five years thereafter the railway or railways upon all the routes authorized should be constructed and ready for operation ; said periods being subject to the proviso that the time, if any, unavoidably consumed by the pendency of legal proceedings or by the interference of the public authorities or their neglect to consent shall not be deemed a part of any period of time during which construction and completion of the railway or railways is required to be made; and Whereas, Said Manhattan Ra

College avenue, asphalting, from One Hundred and Forty-sixth to One Hundred and Forty-eighth streets—Petition from Isaac N. Hebberd and others considered, and no one appearing, it was laid over.

One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, asphalting, from Third to Vanderbilt avenues—Petition of Andrew Larsen and others considered, and no one appearing, it was laid over. Tremont avenue, sewer, from Grand Boulevard and Concourse to Anthony avenue—Petition of F. George Schwenk and others considered, and recommended to the Board of Public Improve-ments, and the Secretary directed to prepare resolution independently for Municipal Assembly.

Grade Crossings. Communication from Richard Alexander, dated February 17, was read, inclosing copy of petition to the Board of Aldermen in reference to grade crossings at Kingsbridge and vicinity, requesting the procurement of a hearing before the railroad commissioners upon the subject mentioned.

mentioned. By Alderman Geiger— Resolved, That this Board recommends that the Municipal Assembly be requested to take such action as may be warranted relative to the petition now before it relative to grade crossings at Kingsbridge and vicinity. Adopted.

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Final Maps.

Secretary read a communication from the North Side Board of Trade, inclosing preamble and resolutions objecting to changes of the Final Maps by the Legislature at Albany. On motion of Alderman Geiger, it was Resolved, by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, That the Municipal Assembly be and it hereby is requested to pass the following resolution : "Resolved, That we recommend that all changes of the street system of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as shown on the Final Maps adopted and filed, be initiated by the proper local authorities, and not by the State Legislature."

Adopted. Adopted. Lillian place widening. Communication from Deputy Commissioner Shannon, Department of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, was read. After discussion, Secretary was directed to com-municate with the Corporation Counsel relative to this matter. Drinking fountain on the southeast corner of Morris avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street. Councilman Murray, of Committee, reported in favor of the fountain, and expressed the opinion that the cost of water should be paid for by the City. Report adopted.

"Waldorf Place" to be designated "Ferncliff Place."

The Secretary read the following communication, dated February 18, 1898, from Henry B. Ely, Trustee :

"NEW YORK, February 18, 1898.

"New YORK, February 18, 1898. "Hon. LAWRENCE W. McGRATH, No. 458 Willis avenue, New York. "DEAR SIR—I have to request that you will be good enough to take such action as may be necessary providing for the changing of the name of 'Waldorf place' to 'Ferncliff place.' The reasons for my request are as follows, viz.: "The street in question is located entirely on land owned by the Trustees of Mr. John Jacob Astor. The land to the north of this is owned by Mr. William Waldorf Astor. It is, therefore, somewhat confusing to have the name 'Waldorf' given to the street (which is not yet opened) on property owned by Mr. John Jacob Astor, and gives the impression that the ownership is other than it is. It is also misleading to prospective tenants who may wish to lease all or a portion of the owners of the land. "Ferncliff,' as suggested, is the name of Mr. J. J. Astor's country seat, and is identified with him and would be an acceptable change from 'Waldorf. "I enclose a map showing the location of the street referred to. Street Cleaning.

Councilman Murray called attention to the muddy condition of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth streets, between Barretto and Fox streets, stating that it was very bad for children. He said that the new pavement of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street had never been cleaned off by the contractor. President Haffen remarked that all cross-walks should be kept clean, particularly in the vicinity of churches and schools.

By Councilman Murray— Resolved, That the Deputy Commissioner of Highways be notified of the condition of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth streets at the points in question, and that he be requested to have contractors clean off paving at the proper time and to notify the Street Cleaning Department so that the benefit of this Department might be had, and to see also, as far as it may be in his jurisdiction, that all crosswalks be kept clean. Alderman Geiger called attention to the condition of the tracks of the Union Railway on

Tremont avenue, from Ryer avenue to Boston road; and it was Resolved, to notify the Deputy Commissioner of Highways to request the Union Railway Company to fill the roadway between its tracks to proper grade, and in the event of the company failing to do so to have the work done by the Department of Highways and charge the cost to the rollway company. the railway company.
