SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Bridges has heretofore requested the purchase of premises located within the area of the plaza for the Williamsburg Bridge, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Mrs. Emma Shellas, the owner of No. 258 South Fifth street, has offered to sell to the City the premises owned by her, being 20 feet in width, front and rear, with a depth of 72 feet, on each side, for the sum of \$6,750. There is erected on this property a three-story and basement brick house about 20 by 30 feet.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a recent meeting, adopted a resolution vesting title in the City of all of the property unpurchased in the area of the Williamsburg plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge, said title to vest on August 20. This is one of the parcels of land to which title will vest on August 20.

Stone and others, is offered by Mr. Stone to the City for \$35,000. The assessed valuation for the year 1903 is \$18,250.

By the acquisition of this site and the closing of Nott and Court streets, the property will have a frontage of 620 feet, including streets, on Thompson avenue, and about 445 feet to the rear line. It is triangular in shape.

An offer has been made to the City to sell this property at \$35,000. Appraisals which have been made upon the property by the Real Estate Bureau approximately places the value at \$32,000.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to a bond issue in the additional sum of \$100,000 for a Municipal Building in the Borough of Richmond:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
July 30, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—On April 11, 1902, I reported to you on the advisability of erecting a Municipal Building in the Borough of Richmond, and recommended that such a building be constructed.

A calculation which I made at the time showed that the immediate requirements would be for a building to contain not less than 24,000 square feet of office space, which could be found in a three story and basement building, about one hundred feet square, which I estimated would cost \$200,000.

On May 23, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized a bond issue in such a sum, and I am informed that the same is now available.

President George Cromwell, in a communication dated July 28, 1903, states that after a careful study of the requirements, he is of the opinion that a borough building constructed now should provide for the natural growth of the borough, and that in point of fact the requirements even now are much greater than was anticipated a little over a year ago, when my report was made.

He proposes a much larger building, to contain about 43,000 square feet of office space, and to be a four-story building instead of three, and the estimated cost of the architects is slightly in excess of \$400,000.

He therefore asks that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall authorize a further bond issue of \$200,000.

I am of the opinion that the Borough of Richmond should have a borough or municipal building which will be a credit to the City, especially as a commanding site for the same overlooking the bay has recently been purchased.

It is very possible that since my former report the requirements as to office space of the respective departments have been increased, and it is certain that the cost of building has materially advanced, and in consequence my figures should be revised.

It would seem to me advisable, however, that a building be planned which will admit of enlargement by the addition of a wing when required, rather than constructing at the present time a building to provide for the distant future.

I am informed by President Cromwell that the architects' plans could be so amended, and that a structure could be erected which would provide ample accommodations for the present and immediate future for \$300,000.

An additional sum to that already appropriated seems to me necessary, and I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize a bond issue in the additional sum of \$100,000 for this purpose.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

SIR—After the most careful study of the requirements of the several Departments and offices of the City which should be housed in the proposed new Richmond Borough Hall, and after personal consultation with the heads of these Departments as to the space required by them, I find that a considerably larger building than was at first contemplated is absolutely necessary.

Mr. McLean, the Comptroller's Engineer, in making his report upon the requirements of a borough building, states that a "building containing office space of at least 24,000 square feet must be provided." He also states that "any building to be erected by the City for the municipal offices of this borough should, in my opinion, be of fireproof construction, with ample vaults on all floors, and should contain a total floor space, including halls and toilets, of not less than 36,000 square feet on three floors and basement, exclusive of the cellar."

While I think Mr. McLean's allowance of 12,000 square feet for hall space, toilets, etc., is sufficient for the building he had in mind, I do not think his allowance of 24,000 square feet for office space anywhere nearly adequate.

The space actually occupied at present by the offices for which he makes provision in the new building is 29,630 square feet. In addition to this there must be provided space of not less than 2,000 square feet for the Fire Alarm Telegraph System, 2,000 square feet for a greatly needed library asked for by the Judges of the Supreme Court and greatly needed for the keeping of books of reference for the various bureaus connected with my office; 500 square feet for the District Attorney, who advises me that he desires to be housed in the building, and at least 2,500 additional square feet to provide space which in my opinion will before long be needed in this borough for the Fire Department, the Tenement House Department, the Dock Department, the Commissioner of Jurors, the Police, making in all a minimum of 35,630 square feet of actual office space.

In addition to this, provision should certainly be made for an enlargement of the space required by almost all the departments and offices housed in the building. The increased space which I have already been asked to provide for by the heads of the various departments and offices amounts to about 20,000 square feet, which, if allowed, would necessitate a building containing over 55,000 square feet of office space alone, which, with only the hall space and toilet room of 12,000 square feet allowed for by Mr. McLean, would require a building containing between 67,000 and 70,000 total floor space. The subject has, however, been taken up very carefully by the architects, Messrs. Carrere & Hastings, and they have been so successful in the disposition and arrangement of the various offices that I believe a building of four stories and basement, exclusive of cellar, will be sufficient. The additional story is, however, absolutely necessary. Such a building has accordingly been planned, and (exclusive of the cellar, but including the necessary hall space, toilets, etc.), contains about 53,000 to 55,000 square feet of floor space. This building, which is to be placed upon a commanding site overlooking the bay, will contain about 1,067,000 cubic feet, and its total estimated cost complete is a little in excess of \$400,000. Of this sum \$200,000 has already been provided for, and I accordingly ask for an additional issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$200,000 to enable me to proceed with the construction of the building.

The Secretary presented the following report from the Engineer of the Department of Finance and communications from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, relative to a contract to be entered into by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity with the Queens County Water Company for a supply of water in the Borough of Queens:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
July 31, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. Robert G. Monroe, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, July 27, 1903, transmits three copies of the proposed agreement between The City of New York and the Queens County Water Company for a supply of water in the Borough of Brooklyn at \$30 per 1,000,000 gallons. Contract to continue for two years.

The Commissioner states that the contract is in many respects quite favorable to the City, the rate at which the water is to be paid for is much cheaper than the City has been able to agree upon with other private companies, and the provisions fixing the quantity and quality of water seem to safeguard the City's interests fully.

The contract, approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, is drawn with great care and minuteness, and may be summarized as follows for convenience of reference:

First—The company will sink a well at a point not less than 150 feet and no more than 300 feet distant from the company's deep well located near Lynbrook, Long Island, and will sink additional wells and will test same in such manner as the Commissioner and the company shall agree upon from time to time.

Second—The company will, at its own expense, lay and maintain a conduit of 20-inch cast iron pipe (to be furnished by the City), connecting the City's aqueduct now supplying the Borough of Brooklyn with said company's pumping station near Fenhurst. Said connection to be made at a point east of the City's Valley Stream pumping station to be selected by the Commissioner.

Third—As soon as the said conduit shall have been laid and the necessary connections made the company shall supply to the City at the point of connection of said conduit with the said aqueduct water of the quality hereinafter specified. The amount of water supplied shall amount to 3,000,000 gallons per day during the entire year, and such additional quantity as shall be required by the Commissioner. No payment shall be made to the company for any deliveries exceeding 30,000,000 gallons for the consecutive period of ten days unless expressly ordered by the Commissioner. If the quantity delivered falls below 30,000,000 gallons for any period of ten days, except in case of accident, the Commissioner shall have the right to reduce the price from \$30 to \$25 per 1,000,000 gallons while the average supply for any period of ten days, except as aforesaid, shall be between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 gallons per day; and the Commissioner shall also have the right to reduce the price from \$30 to \$20 per 1,000,000 gallons during the time while the average supply for any period of ten days shall be between 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 gallons per day. No payment shall be made for the supply of 10,000,000 gallons during any period of ten days. The water shall be practically odorless, tasteless, clear and colorless, must be reasonably free from organic matter and show no indications of sewerage pollution.

Fourth—The City agrees to accept from the company the water, and to pay therefor at the rate of \$30 per 1,000,000 gallons, except the company shall fail to supply 30,000,000 during any period of ten days, when the rate shall be as specified before.

Fifth—On the first day of January, April, July and October of each year during the continuance of this agreement the company shall furnish to the Commissioner sufficient proof that it has fully performed and fulfilled this agreement, whereupon the Commissioner shall certify the fact and shall annex thereto a requisition upon the Comptroller of the City to pay the company the sum to which it is entitled, less such deductions.

Sixth—The company, upon receipt of notice of the execution of this agreement and the designation of the points of connection by the Commissioner, will at once proceed to lay the said conduit.

Seventh—The quantity of water supplied by the company shall be measured and ascertained by meter measurement, checked, as may be required, by weir measurement.

Eighth—This agreement shall continue for a period of two years from the date of the completion of the test specified in clause one.

Ninth—Upon the expiration of the two-year period provided for in this agreement, this agreement shall continue from year to year without further act on the part of either of the parties to the agreement, unless and until either party here-to notifies the other, at least 30 days before the termination of this agreement, that it elects to discontinue the same at the end of the year within which said notice is given.

Tenth—The company will execute and deliver to the City its bond, with sureties to be approved by the Comptroller, in the penal sum of \$20,000, conditioned to save and hold the City harmless from all suits and actions of every description and from all damages of any kind.

Eleventh—Nothing in this agreement shall be so construed as to give the company any exclusive right or privilege to lay mains and pipes in the Borough of Queens, or to supply water to the City or the inhabitants thereof, or to limit the right of the City to establish and maintain its own water-supply system or any other apparatus within the Borough of Queens or the Borough of Brooklyn.

Twelfth—This agreement shall not be binding or of any force unless the Comptroller of the City shall endorse hereon his certificate that there remains unexpended and unapplied a balance of the appropriation applicable thereto sufficient to pay the estimated expense of executing this agreement.

Thirteenth—That this agreement shall have been approved by the Board of

Estimate and Apportionment and receive the written consents and approvals of both the Mayor and Comptroller of the City.

I consider the prices fixed in this agreement reasonable and just, and in my opinion the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly approve the agreement proposed, and the Mayor and Comptroller may properly give their written consent and approval of the same in all its details, as required by section 471 of the Greater New York Charter.

DEAR SIR—I transmit to you herewith three copies of proposed agreement between The City of New York and the Queens County Water Company for a supply of water to the Borough of Brooklyn at \$30 per 1,000,000 gallons, the contract to continue for two years.

The contract, among other things, provides, as you will observe, for the testing by the company in such manner as shall be agreed upon of the sources of supply of the company by means of deep wells, and also provides that the company shall lay a conduit to connect with the City's aqueduct, the City to furnish the necessary pipe. The tests provided for will be of considerable value to the City in determining whether a material increase of supply can be obtained by deep wells passing through clay stratum which underlies the water-bearing sand from which the City now derives much of its supply for the Borough of Brooklyn. These tests will be especially valuable in connection with similar ones now in progress at the New Lots Pumping Station, and as the wells will be driven not far from the City's proposed new pumping station at Watts Pond, may possibly give some indication of the value of the deep wells at that station.

The contract is in many respects quite favorable to the City. The rate at which the water is to be paid for is much cheaper than the City has been able to agree upon with other private water companies, and the provisions fixing the quantity and quality of water seem to safeguard the City's interests fully.

I respectfully request that your Board will approve the inclosed copies and that the same will receive the separate written consents of the Mayor and of the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 471 of the Greater New York Charter, and preliminary to the execution of a contract to be entered into by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for and in behalf and in the name of The City of New York, with the Queens County Water Company for a supply of water in the Borough of Brooklyn, a copy of which contract has been submitted to this Board and is hereby annexed, does hereby assent to the execution of such proposed contract in all its details, as submitted, and hereby approves of such contract and agreement.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Agreement made this day of 1903, by and between The City of New York, hereinafter called "the City," a municipal corporation, acting by and through the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, hereinafter called "the Commissioner," duly authorized so to do by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and with the consent and approval in writing of both the Mayor and Comptroller of said City, party of the first part, and the Queens County Water Company, hereinafter called "the Company," a domestic corporation, having its principal place of business in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, party of the second part.

Witnesseth, That the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree as follows:

First—The Company will sink a well at a point not less than 150 feet nor more than 300 feet distant from the Company's deep well located near Lynbrook, Long Island, the location of which is shown on the accompanying map, and will sink additional wells and will test the same in such manner as the Commissioner and the Company shall agree upon from time to time. The additional wells shall be driven approximately to the same depth as the existing well, so that they will tap the same water stratum from which the existing well now derives its supply, and specimens of the soil through which all new wells are driven shall be furnished to the Commissioner, with a statement of the depth from which said samples have been obtained. Unless otherwise ordered by the Commissioner, all water pumped from said wells during the test shall be delivered by the Company into the City's aqueduct through a conduit to be laid and maintained by the Company, and shall be paid for at the rate and in the manner hereinafter specified.

Second—The Company will, at its own expense, lay and maintain a conduit of 20-inch cast-iron pipe (to be furnished by the City) connecting the City's aqueduct now supplying the Borough of Brooklyn with said Company's pumping station near Fenhurst, said connection to be made at a point east of the City's Valley Stream Pumping Station, to be selected by the Commissioner. The plans and specifications for the said conduit shall be submitted to the Commissioner and approved by him. The Company agrees to lay this conduit and connect it with the aqueduct within thirty (30) working days after the return of the above mentioned plans and specifications approved by the Commissioner and the delivery of the pipe or such further time as shall be allowed by the Commissioner. The pipe so laid shall be and remain the property of the City subject to the rights of the Company to use the same for the purposes of this contract, and upon the termination of this contract the City shall have the right within three months to remove the said pipe and to enter upon the property of the Company for that purpose, but the removal shall be made in such a manner as not to cause unnecessary injury or inconvenience to the Company.

Third—As soon as the said conduit shall have been laid and the necessary connections made, the Company shall supply to the City at the point of connection of said conduit with the said aqueduct so much water of the quality hereinafter specified as with the water from time to time delivered from the wells provided for in the first clause of this contract shall amount to 3,000,000 gallons per day during the entire year and such additional quantity as shall be required by the Commissioner and can be furnished by the Company after providing for consumers on its own mains. The Company shall give notice to the Commissioner in writing that it is prepared to deliver water as aforesaid, but no claim shall be made for water delivered by the Company prior to the receipt of notice from the Commissioner to commence delivering water. No payment shall be made to the Company for any deliveries exceeding 30,000,000 gallons for a consecutive period of ten days unless expressly ordered by the Commissioner. If the quantity delivered falls below 30,000,000 gallons for any period of ten days, except in case of accident not due to any fault or neglect of the Company, its agents, servants or employees, the Commissioner shall have the right to reduce the price from thirty dollars (\$30) to twenty-five dollars (\$25), while the average supply for any period of ten days except as aforesaid shall be between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 gallons, and the Commissioner shall also have the right to reduce the price from thirty dollars (\$30) to twenty dollars (\$20) during the time while the average supply for any period of ten days shall be between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 gallons. No payment shall be made for a supply of less than 10,000,000 gallons during any period of ten days, unless the quantity supplied shall be reduced by order of the Commissioner. The Commissioner (except in case of accident not due to any fault or neglect of the Company, its agents, servants or employees) shall have the right to abrogate this contract if the supply falls to an average of less than 1,000,000 gallons per day for a consecutive period of ten days, without waiving thereby any further claim for damages as provided under section tenth. If, in consequence of accident, it should be necessary to suspend the use of the aqueduct, the Commissioner shall have

the right to order a reduction or discontinuance of the supply for a time reasonably sufficient to make the repairs.

The water shall be practically odorless, tasteless, clear and colorless, must be reasonably free from organic matter and show no indications of sewage pollution. The amount of chlorine shall average not more than twenty-five (25) parts per million and shall at no time exceed one hundred (100) parts per million, and unless this provision shall be waived by the Commissioner the amount of iron shall average not more than three (3) parts per million and shall at no time exceed five (5) parts per million as a maximum. Samples shall be taken by the Commissioner at or near the point of delivery into the conduit at such times as he may direct, and the taking and testing of the samples shall be entirely under his control and direction.

Fourth—The City agrees to accept from the Company the water in this agreement provided for to be supplied to the City by the Company, and to pay therefor at the rate of thirty dollars (\$30) per 1,000,000 gallons, except the Company shall fail to supply 30,000,000 gallons during any period of ten days, when the rate shall be as specified in the preceding clause.

Fifth—On and after the first days of January, April, July and October of each year, during the continuance of this agreement, the Company shall furnish to the Commissioner sufficient proof that it has fully performed and fulfilled this agreement in all its particulars and conditions up to the said first day of January, April, July and October, as the case may be, and particularly that it has furnished water of the quality and in the quantity in this agreement specified; that the water so supplied and furnished has been supplied and furnished in the manner and under the conditions required by this contract; whereupon the Commissioner shall certify the fact, and in his certificate state the amount to which the said Company shall be entitled, less any deductions allowed by the terms of this agreement, and shall annex thereto a requisition upon the Comptroller of the City to pay the Company the sum to which it shall be entitled, less such deductions; and without such certificate and requisition the Company shall not be or become entitled to any payment under and in respect to the terms of this agreement. On the requisition above provided for being presented to said Comptroller, he shall within thirty days thereafter pay to the Company the amount thereof in lawful money.

Sixth—The Company, upon receipt of notice of the execution of this agreement and the designation of the points of connection by the Commissioner and the receipt of the necessary pipe, will at once proceed to lay the said conduit and to complete the same within the time provided in Clause Second of this agreement and to make the test specified in Clause First of this agreement, and will allow the Commissioner every reasonable opportunity to observe and record the operation of the pumps used in said test and the effect of the pumping upon the wells.

Seventh—The quantity of water supplied by the Company shall be measured and ascertained by meter measurements, checked, as may be required, by weir measurements. The meters shall be furnished, set and kept in good order and condition by the Company, and the weirs at the aqueduct shall be furnished and erected by the City, but the Company shall make the necessary pipe connections between the conduits and these weirs. All meters used shall be tested by the Company to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, who shall have a representative present at such test to supervise the same and ascertain results. At the expiration of every three months from the commencement of the contract, and oftener if so determined by the Commissioner, the meters shall be tested by the weir, and if an error be shown equal to or greater than five (5) per cent., a correction equivalent to the full amount of error shown at the time of the test shall be made for one-half of the water delivered during the interval between such test and the preceding test as shown by meter readings. No correction shall be made, however, for any water delivered if the error shown be less than five (5) per cent.

Eighth—This agreement shall continue for the period of two (2) years from the date of the completion of the test specified in Clause First.

Ninth—Upon the expiration of the two year period provided for in this agreement, this agreement shall be continued from year to year without further act on the part of either of the parties to the agreement unless and until either party hereto notifies the other at least thirty (30) days before the termination of this agreement that it elects to discontinue the same at the end of the year within which such notice is given, and the Commissioner shall have the right to terminate this agreement at any time in case of any breach by the Company of any of the covenants and provisions of this agreement, or in case the City shall take possession of the franchises, plant and other property of the Company or any part thereof pending condemnation proceedings.

Tenth—The Company will execute and deliver to the City its bond, with sureties to be approved by the Comptroller of the City, in the penal sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), conditioned to save and hold the City, its officers, agents and employees, harmless from all suits and action of every description and from all damages and costs by reason of injury to person or property, including streets, roads, highways and pavements, on account of or arising out of the acts or omissions of the Company or its officers, agents, or employees, or by reason of breaks or failures in the pumps, pipes or other apparatus of the Company, provided, however, that in the event of suit being brought, immediate notice thereof shall be given to the Company, which shall have the right to employ counsel at its own expense to defend the same, and that it will pay each and every judgment recovered in the said suit. Said bond shall be further condition for the faithful performance by the Company of each and every condition, covenant and obligation imposed upon the Company by this agreement.

Eleventh—Nothing in this agreement shall be so construed as to give to the Company any exclusive right or privilege to lay mains and pipes and to erect hydrants and to maintain the same, or any other apparatus, in the Borough of Queens, or to supply water to the City or the inhabitants thereof, or to limit the right of the City to establish and maintain its own water supply system and apparatus within the Borough of Queens or the Borough of Brooklyn. This agreement shall not bar or in any manner affect the right of the City to acquire the franchises, assets and property of the Company, or any part thereof, by condemnation proceedings or otherwise, at any time, and shall not be taken to enhance the value of or add to the Company's stock, franchises, assets and property, but, on the contrary, the stock, assets, franchises and property of the Company shall be valued in any proceedings to condemn the same without enhancement by reason of any provision of this contract being considered or allowed.

Twelfth—This agreement shall not be binding or of any force unless the Comptroller of the City shall endorse hereon his certificate that there remains unexpended and unapplied, as provided in the Greater New York Charter, a balance of appropriation or fund applicable thereto sufficient to pay the estimated expense of executing this agreement, as certified by the officers making the same.

Thirteenth—This agreement, preliminary to its execution, has been submitted in all its details to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and after such submission the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been given to the execution of this agreement as submitted, by resolution passed on the day of 1903, and this agreement has also received the separate written consents and approvals of both the Mayor and Comptroller of The City of New York.

Fourteenth—This agreement shall respectively bind and run in favor of the respective parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

It witness whereof, the Commissioner, for and in behalf of the City, has hereunto set his hand and seal, and the Company has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and these presents to be subscribed in its name and by its president, and attested by its secretary, the day and year first above written, and in triplicate.

(1) *Porches and Summer Houses, \$2,000.*

This item is for the purpose of giving patients the benefit of the outer air when recovering from sickness. At present there is only one pavilion which has porches used for that purpose. In all the other buildings patients when they leave the wards have to go on the ground, which is frequently damp. The amount, \$2,000, is less than required to erect porches for two of the frame pavilions now used for tubercular cases.

(2) *Plumbing and General Repairs, \$10,000.*

There is considerable plumbing which is old and defective, having been in use a long time. This item is to cover much replumbing in Pavilion No. 1, office and laundry building, kitchen building and doctor's house; for gutters, leaders and drains to carry off roof waters from frame pavilions. At present roof water is discharged on the ground adjoining the building, causing unnecessary dampness. This item also covers the completion of the painting begun last year, replastering Pavilion Nos. 8, 9 and 10, new roof for Pavilion No. 10, repairs to brick work of kitchen building and a number of general repairs.

(3) *Stable Building and Solarium, \$15,000.*

Plans and specifications were prepared last year for the alteration of the stable building so as to provide a dormitory for help on the second floor, in order to dis-

continue the use of an old unplastered portable house which at present houses some of the help.

The solarium proposed is in connection with the large brick pavilion. Plans for this were made last year, but owing to lack of appropriation this work and alteration of stable building could not be done. The solarium is to be constructed at the ends of the pavilion and embraces a new porch on the southern end. The present porch is defective, is two stories high and is of wooden construction. New construction is to be largely of iron and also embraces a two-story porch at the north end, together with facilities for taking patients from the ambulances to the buildings under a porte cochere in order to avoid as far as possible exposure in this open location. The solarium will also provide facilities for the removal of cases of mixed infection from the wards direct and will also provide direct means of escape in case of fire.

(4) *Roadways and Sea Wall, \$20,000.*

A large portion of the island is protected by a sea wall, to which no repairs have been made since its construction. Some portions of it are liable to collapse unless repaired. The wall on the southeasterly side is about sixteen inches lower than the northerly and westerly walls. This part needs to be raised to prevent the tides from washing over it. The wall being lower causes the water to collect back of it and freeze in the winter time, thereby making the wall deteriorate more rapidly. It is also desirable to extend this wall.

The roadways on the island have a surface of ashes, which dries quickly. Dust therefrom is frequently blown into the ward's and also carried in by persons going in to the buildings, causing a condition detrimental to the patients.

WILLARD PARKER AND RECEPTION HOSPITALS.

(5) *Canopies and Fences, Reception Hospital, \$7,000.*

This is for the purpose of providing protection to patients taken from ambulances into the building and also to protect them while being removed to the boat; also to shut off the building from the street. At present the front wards open on the sidewalk with no protection.

(6) *Steam Plant Changes, \$6,000.*

This is for partial changes in the steam plant, which are rendered necessary owing to the construction of new buildings.

(7) *Office Building, Fifty-fifth Street and Sixth Avenue, \$2,000.*

This is for the enlargement and addition of the Bacteriological Laboratory.

KINGSTON AVENUE HOSPITAL.

(8) *Frame Pavilion Repairs, \$20,000.*

Nearly all the patients cared for at this hospital have to be treated in frame pavilions which are in bad sanitary condition. They have no enclosed foundations, causing plumbing pipes to be exposed and out of repair. The plumbing is old and much worn. The buildings are not plastered on the inside, and it is difficult to properly heat and ventilate them. These buildings need painting and general extensive overhauling to place them in a satisfactory condition.

(9) *Stable Extension, \$10,000.*

The present stable facilities are inadequate; horses, ambulances, wagons, etc., cannot be properly housed or cared for.

(10) *Changes in Steam Plant, \$5,000.*

The improvement in steam plant and to cover changes rendered necessary by new buildings.

(11) *Fences, Grading and Roadways, \$25,000.*

The grounds of the hospital comprise now about fifteen acres, half of which has been recently added. The new part is not fenced. The old part has an old worn-out fence which is partly removed and will have to be entirely removed, owing to the fact that it is located on highway property. The streets adjoining this hospital are now being graded. This leaves about one-half of the hospital property on an average about six feet below the grade, which cannot be drained except by filling in. It is very important to have this property properly fenced and graded.

(12) *Borough of Queens, \$1,000.*

For housing disinfection machine.

(13) *Borough of Richmond, \$2,000.*

For grading, fences and cleaning a part of the property at the Disinfecting Station recently erected.

The amount of the appropriation asked for in February last was \$150,000, which was later reduced to \$125,000 at the request of the members of the Board of Aldermen. The various amounts are conservative estimates of the several needs. Since the request was made the Architects have reported that the estimates given for general repairs are too low. Exact figures cannot be given until bids are received for the several kinds of work required. It is desirable to have the appropriation granted so that any item may be increased or reduced as may be found necessary when plans and specifications are fully completed.

Hon. JAMES J. DEVLIN:

SIR—In our efforts during the past year to better the condition of the dependent ones in our charge, which I am pleased to see have proved in many ways successful, I discovered that the inmates of our almshouses were sadly in need of something to occupy their time and thoughts. Of course those able to work are employed, and I am not referring to them. But with few exceptions our inmates are not able-bodied or fit to work. The vagrants do not reach us. They wind up in the Workhouse, so that our population consists of feeble or sickly people. While many of them have led reckless or dissipated lives, there are not a few whom circumstances, through no fault of their own, have rendered penniless and homeless. As officials in the Department of Charities it behooves us to keep in sight and be guided by the meaning of the word charity. In short, "Do unto others as we would wish others to do unto us." Prompted by that feeling, I secured from Brother Leontine last summer the Protective Band for Saturday afternoon concerts. I wish you could have seen the effect of that music upon those poor people. For the time being they were completely metamorphosed and forgot their surroundings. The music proved a bright spot in their existence and furnished them pleasant anticipations as well as recollections.

It seems to me, then, that in the arrangement that is annually made for furnishing open air concerts in the different parks of the City in the summer time our Department could be appropriately included, and I urgently request you to aid in bringing this result about, for I firmly believe that no concerts gave greater pleasure than did those we had last summer at Blackwell's Island.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, 13TH AUGUST, 1903.

There were present—John H. Starin, Vice-President, presiding; Acting Mayor Charles V. Fornes, Deputy Comptroller J. W. Stevenson and Commissioner Woodbury Langdon.

George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, was also present.

DEAR SIR—Your letter of the 24th instant addressed to Mr. McDonald calling his attention to the manholes in front of certain electrical sub-stations now under construction has been referred to me, as, by the terms of the assignment from Mr. McDonald to this company, this company is engaged in the construction and installation of the electrical equipment, including electrical sub-stations.

I have also been favored with a copy of your Chief Engineer's report to your Board, under date of June 30, on this subject. I am quite content in this matter to abide by the opinion expressed by the Corporation Counsel, which Mr. Parsons quotes in his report to you, namely: That so far as the conduits in Simpson street necessary to carry the wires from the company's sub-station to its structure are concerned no question can be raised by anybody, but that in so far as the general man-hole or vault space is concerned, which is not necessary to carry the cables from the building to the duct line, but which is to be used for other purposes, that the usual payment for a vault privilege should be made. As Mr. Parsons points out, about two-thirds of the vault space in front of the Simpson street station (sub-station No. 8) is used for the electrical cables, and I entirely agree with his opinion that this part of the vault space is as much a portion of the duct line as the duct line itself in the street.

For the remainder of the space, which is utilized for other purposes, we are quite willing to make the usual vault privilege payment, and, if this meets with your approval, I will cause an application to be made to the President of the Borough of The Bronx without delay.

The understanding is that after the sale (subject to the easements), which it is contemplated shall take place between January 1 and March 1, 1904, the price of the easements is to be ascertained and is to be the amount by which the price that you realize is less than \$1,181,001.23, together with interest thereon at 5 per cent. per annum from June 18, 1903. Upon such price you are to credit the \$354,300.39 now paid with interest thereon at 5 per cent. per annum from July 1, 1903, the date of payment thereof. To the Honorable the Supreme Court of the State of New York in and for the First Department:

We, Edward W. Sheldon, John J. Pulleyn and John H. Knoeppel, Commissioners of Appraisal in the above entitled proceeding, do respectfully make and present to the court our report as follows:

1. By an order of this court made at Special Term, Part III, thereof, bearing date the 5th day of December, 1902, we, the undersigned, were appointed Commissioners of Appraisal to ascertain and appraise the compensation to be made to the owners and all persons interested in the real property laid down on the map approved and adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners on the 13th day of June, 1901, and filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York on the 15th day of November, 1901, for a permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way for the construction, operation and maintenance in perpetuity of a rapid transit railroad in accordance with the routes and general plan prescribed by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, by resolutions adopted on the 14th day of January, 1897, and the 4th day of February, 1897, and approved by the Common Council of The City of New York on the 23d day of March, 1897, and consented to by an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial Department, made on or about the 6th day of April, 1898, as amended by a further order of the said Appellate Division, made on or about the 13th day of November, 1899, and by a further order made by the said Appellate Division on or about the 16th day of February, 1900, which railroad was further described in the contract for the construction and operation thereof made between The City of New York, acting by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and John B. McDonald, the said contract being dated the 21st day of February, 1900, and having been modified and amended by a further agreement between the said City and the said John B. McDonald bearing the same date, the subway or subways for such railroad to be constructed substantially as shown upon the plan, marked "Rapid Transit Commission, Chief Engineer's Office, Drawing No. 397, dated June 13th, 1901." The top of the said subway (that is to say, the extreme top of the permanent structure of the same) to be not less than twenty-six and one-fourth feet below the present established grade of Broadway in front of such parcel of property, and the bases of the rails of the said railroad to be not less than forty-seven and one-fourth feet below the said present established grade of Broadway in front of said property, the said subway to be not more than thirty-three feet in width on the outside of the walls thereof, and to be constructed substantially as shown upon the plan and upon the said contract for construction and operation, such right and easements including the right to permanently and perpetually maintain and operate a railroad through the said subway so to be constructed in accordance with the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 and

its amendments and the provisions for the operation of said railroad lawfully made pursuant thereto in and under all that certain premises or parcel of land situate in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Broadway a distance of forty-nine feet nine and one-half inches north of the northerly line of West One Hundred and Third street, running thence northerly along the easterly line of Broadway a distance of fifty-two feet to the boundary between Lots No. 20 and No. 46½, as shown on above mentioned map; thence running easterly along the boundary line between said Lots No. 20 and No. 46½ and along the boundary line between Lots No. 22 and No. 46½ as shown on said map a distance of forty-four feet, and thence running in a south-westerly direction along a railroad curve of radius three hundred and twenty-five feet as shown upon said map, a distance of about sixty-four feet to the point of beginning, and which said rights and easements are to be used and enjoyed for the purposes aforesaid wholly under the said premises not less than twenty-six and one-fourth feet below the present established grade of Broadway in front of said parcel of property.

2. Before entering upon the performance of our said duties and on the 22d day of December, 1902, we severally took and subscribed an oath before an officer authorized to administer oaths to faithfully perform the trusts and duties required of us by said act of the Legislature, chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, which said oaths were duly filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York on the 22d day of December, 1902.

3. That on the 27th day of December, 1902, we viewed the lands and premises under which a perpetual easement is sought to be acquired in this proceeding, and on the 29th day of December, 1902, at two o'clock in the forenoon, the first meeting of the Commissioners was held at Room No. 401, on the fourth floor of the building No. 258 Broadway, in The City of New York, as directed by the order of appointment.

Thereafter on the 7th day of January, 1903, and from time to time subsequent thereto we held public meetings at the places above mentioned and took testimony and proof both as to the title and value of the property in which an easement was sought to be acquired presented by Mr. James A. Deering on behalf of the City Real Estate Company, and also testimony as to the value of said premises and easement offered by the Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York through the Corporation Counsel, and received and considered briefs submitted by the respective counsel.

That thereafter and on June 19, 1903, we again viewed the premises and carefully examined the rapid transit subway which is being constructed under said premises, and after said views and examinations, and after having heard and considered the proofs, allegations, testimony and exhibits presented to us, we make our report as follows:

To the City Real Estate Company we award the sum of nine thousand dollars as and for their loss and damage and the value of the permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way for the construction, operation and maintenance in perpetuity of a rapid transit railroad in accordance with the routes and general plan prescribed by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York by resolutions adopted on the 14th day of January, 1897, and the 4th day of February, 1897, and approved by the Common Council of The City of New York on the 23d day of March, 1897, and consented to by an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial Department, made on or about the 13th day of November, 1899, and by a further order made by the said Appellate Division on or about the 16th day of February, 1900, which railroad was further described in the contract for the construction and operation thereof made between The City of New York, acting by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and John B. McDonald, the said contract being dated the 21st day of February, 1900, and having been modified and amended by a further agreement between the said City and the said John B. McDonald, bearing the same date, the subway or subways for such railroad to be constructed substantially as shown upon the plan marked "Rapid Transit Commission, Chief Engineer's Office, Drawing No. 397, dated June 13, 1901." The top of the said subway (that is to say, the extreme top of the permanent structure of the same) to be not less than twenty-six and one-fourth feet below the present established grade of Broadway in front of such parcel of property, and the bases of the rails of the said railroad to be not less than forty-seven and one-fourth feet below the said present established grade of Broadway in front of said property; the said subway to be not more than thirty-three feet in width on the outside of the walls thereof, and to be constructed substantially as shown upon the said plan and upon the said contract for construction and operation, such right and easement including the right to permanently and perpetually maintain and operate a railroad through the said subway so to be constructed in accordance with the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 and its amendments, and the provisions for the operation of said railroad lawfully made pursuant thereto in and under all that certain premises or parcel of land situate in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Broadway a distance of forty-nine feet, nine and one-half inches north of the southerly line of West One Hundred and Third street, running thence northerly along the easterly line of Broadway a distance of fifty-two feet to the boundary between Lots No. 20 and No. 46½, as shown on above-mentioned map, a duplicate of which is annexed hereto; thence running easterly along the boundary line between said Lots No. 20 and No. 46½ and along the boundary line between Lots No. 22 and No. 46½, as shown on said map, a distance of forty-four feet, and thence running in a south-westerly direction along a railroad curve of radius three hundred and twenty-five feet, as shown upon said map, a distance of about sixty-four feet to the point of beginning, and which said right and easement are to be used and enjoyed for the purposes aforesaid wholly under the said premises not less than twenty-six and one-fourth feet below the present established grade of Broadway in front of said parcel of property.

The Secretary reported that the Counsel of the Board had given the following opinion as to method of making certain charges against the contractor:

July 30, 1903.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, City:

SIR—The Auditor, Mr. Hollman, has asked us our opinion whether the payments for easements made by the City upon the requirement of the Board should be charged as construction. We have advised him that they should be so charged, although upon this part of the cost of construction the contractor will not be liable to pay rent.

We assume that the question thus answered has been suggested by the Comptroller's office, and for the reason that the amount of debt incurred upon the rapid transit contract as entered in that office does not include the amount of these easement payments. The amount of those payments could not be known at the time the contract was made.

The Manhattan-Bronx contract (the "Lease," at page 164) provides that, in computing the cost of construction upon which the contractor is, by way of rental, to pay the stipulated percentage, bonds issued to pay interest on bonds shall be included, but not bonds issued to pay for easements or other real estate rights other than lands acquired in fee. This provision is taken from section 34 of the Rapid Transit Act. We have already pointed out to the Board that since the statute and contract thus distinguish between easements and rights in fee, relieving the contractor from rental where the right of way acquired is an easement, but imposing rental where the land is acquired in fee, it is the interest of the City wherever it properly can to acquire land in fee.

The Manhattan-Bronx contract allows as cost of construction the sum of \$500,000 for real estate "for stations and other purposes of the railroad except terminals and equipment," which real estate includes real estate, if any, acquired in fee for right of way

and all such real estate is to be acquired by and in the name of the City. The City assumes the liability to pay that amount, or so much of it as may be needed for real estate. Every such payment is treated as a payment to the contractor for construction, and upon it the contractor must pay rental. The contract further provides that, in case the total cost to the City of acquiring real estate shall be greater than the \$500,000, then the City shall pay, and as additional cost of construction, the excess of such cost above \$500,000 up to an outside limit of \$1,000,000, and that any excess beyond \$1,000,000 must be borne by the contractor (contract, page 48).

Our opinion that payments for easements for right of way must be included in construction payments so far as the provision of funds by the City is concerned, although not included in the lands upon which the contractor shall pay interest, is based upon the Rapid Transit Act. Section 37 provides that "for the purpose of providing the necessary means for such construction at the public expense of any such road or roads and the necessary means to pay for lands * * * and easements * * * which shall be acquired by the City for the purposes of the construction or the operation of such road or roads," the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall, upon the request of the Rapid Transit Board, direct the Comptroller to issue bonds at such rate of interest not exceeding 3½ per cent., as the Board of Estimate may prescribe. This of itself is clear; and it is corroborated by section 61, which provides that "the moneys necessary and sufficient to be paid for any property acquired in any manner under the provisions of this act * * * shall be raised and paid out of the proceeds of bonds issued and sold, as provided by section 37 of this act." This refers to bonds issued in usual form for construction.

The fact that the amount of the bonds issued for easements is to be deducted from the total payments by the City for construction in arriving at the amount upon which the contractor is to pay rental, does not make the payment to be any the less a payment for construction.

If, as we understand, the amount of bonds already authorized by the Board of Estimate for rapid transit construction do not include bonds for easements, then, upon the Comptroller so advising this Board, this Board should make a requisition upon the Board of Estimate to authorize the Comptroller to issue for rapid transit construction bonds in a sufficient amount to pay for the easements the acquisition of which is authorized by the Board.

Perhaps a copy of this letter might be sent the Comptroller for his consideration.

Mr. Robinson's letter would indicate that the power lies with your Commission to have them removed. The sooner the street is cleared up and resumes its normal aspect the better for all concerned.

DEAR SIR—I personally communicated with Mr. Thompson, Superintendent of Buildings, regarding the Park avenue houses. He said that while he would be only too delighted to do anything he could, the matter of removing the shoring from these properties is out of his hands. Having had an inspection made, he found that the foundations and walls were safe, excepting for a few minor matters which were probably attended to long ago. The matter is now in the hands of the Rapid Transit Commissioners, and the removing of the braces and supports depends upon them.

If there is anything more in the matter that I can do for you, please let me know.

DEAR SIR—I am directed to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 28th instant, inclosing one to you by Mr. Douglas Robinson, dated the 24th instant, as to shores remaining against the houses in Park avenue, between Thirty-third and Forty-second streets. The Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan wrote to President Orr on June 5 last, as to these buildings. As a result of a resolution of the Rapid Transit Board, Mr. Orr transmitted this letter to Mr. John B. McDonald, the contractor, with a statement that he (the contractor) was liable for all damage to abutting property in Park avenue. Mr. McDonald replied to this on the 8th instant, after which the counsel of the Board prepared a formal opinion on this matter which, by direction of the Board, was forwarded to Mr. McDonald on the 16th instant, and of which I have Mr. McDonald's acknowledgment of receipt, dated the 20th instant.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
