### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

#### Report for Week Ending March 8, 1913.

#### NOTES ON THE PROJECTED “SPRING CLEAN-UP.”

It is a well-established fact that what may be called the general clean-up of any municipality, when conducted in a systematic manner and with a scope sufficient to accomplish its purpose thoroughly, has always resulted in a reduction in the mortality of the ensuing year. The experience of the Federal Government has shown that the rate of reduction has been in direct proportion to the amount of general sanitary work performed. These facts form the basis of the recent proposal for a general clean-up of New York City by the Department of Health. The problem, however, is of such magnitude that no one city department could hope to solve it single-handed, and for this reason the Commission of Health has requested the co-operation of other city departments and various civic societies. While the actual removal of refuse will be done by the city authorities, the moral support required to make a movement of this magnitude a success must come from the citizens themselves, for whose direct benefit the work is performed. It is pointed out to the various civic associations that, while we all wish that our city should be the cleanest and most sanitary in the world, a movement to successfully accomplish such a result must have the cordial co-operation of all individuals and societies interested in promoting public health.

The removal of all collections of waste material detrimental to health is a sanitary measure, the importance of which, up to the present time, has been greatly underestimated. It is, however, obvious that the removal of small amounts of waste material from a city the size of New York can have but a very slight influence upon the general public health, and it must be remembered that hundreds of tons of this class of material are habitually removed daily under the present system. The fact must not be lost sight of, however, that a certain percentage always escapes removal and the result is a gradually increasing amount of waste material, distributed throughout the city in houses, cellars and stables. These collections remain more or less indefinitely according to the indifference or cleanliness of the owner of the premises, and while collections of waste material and filth cannot be said to originate disease, they do unquestionably create conditions which are favorable for its production. It is on this account that the task of superintending a general clean-up of the city would seem to come directly under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, but, as before indicated, the individual citizen has duties and obligations in this matter which he cannot rightly ignore. Every right-minded individual in the community will admit that in addition to his duties in regard to the preservation of his own health and that of his family, his responsibility involves doing what he can to protect the health of his neighbors, and that in this connection he should not permit refuse or filth to collect in his home or in his place of business. In addition, the moral effect of collections of waste and filth upon the individual himself is bad, and where filth is allowed to accumulate other defects in sanitary methods are usually to be found.

The present movement inaugurated by the department has a triple motive. Not only does the department seek to remove all waste material which, by its very presence, may be detrimental to the general health, but it also endeavors to eliminate, as far as possible, breeding places of flies and other insects which harbor and transmit disease. In the third place, it is hoped that the results, attained this spring will prove so beneficial as to create a precedent and that the movement for a clean city may become an established custom.

#### HOW THE WORK WILL BE DONE.

In order to make a tentative study of the problem, sixteen inspectors, under a foreman, were detailed to the Department of Health from the Department of Street Cleaning, and an estimate of the amount of refuse to be removed from districts in different parts of the city is being made. The actual cost of removal is also being estimated. The figures obtained in this manner will give a fair idea of the magnitude of this work and its approximate cost. Men, horses and wagons will be obtained through the Department of Street Cleaning. The final disposition of the excessive quantity to be removed is a matter which has required consideration on account of the large number of barges which will be required for this purpose. Fortunately, these can be obtained at the present time, whereas later in the season it would probably be very difficult to supply sufficient means for the final transportation.

#### DISTRICT ORGANIZATION.

The clean-up process will take place from street to house to house, and in this work the department expects to be aided by district committees formed in each of the boroughs, which will be composed, as far as possible, of the various social, charitable, civic and religious societies, desirous of co-operating, and an absolute equal opportunity will be given each to lend its aid in accomplishing the thorough cleaning of every house in New York. The city will be divided into sections, and the work will be accomplished by means of a system in which the unit will be a given area.

#### CO-OPERATING DEPARTMENTS.

The official co-operation of the Street Cleaning Department, Tenement House Department, Police Department, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Department of Education, and the Bureau of Fire Prevention, has been requested. It may be mentioned that this work ought to prove to be of especial value to the Bureau of Fire Prevention, for, during the few days of tentative inspection, collections of material of an exceptionally inflammable character have been found in many localities, in some instances constituting a veritable firetrap. As the actual work of removal will be performed by the Street Cleaning Department, and, as Commissioner Edwards has recently pointed out, the Street Cleaning Department is daily engaged in a clean-up of its own and possesses only just so many horses and carts, it is evident that an enormously increased amount of work should not be forced upon it without due notice and a considerable increase in its force. Commissioner

Thompson, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in expressing his hearty co-operation has informed the Department of Health that all the water necessary for street flushings, etc., is fortunately available. The co-operation of the Department of Education will be of distinct value in the dissemination of information through the distribution of literature by school children, and in interesting the latter in the general movement. Lectures will be given by the inspectors of the Division of Child Hygiene of the Department of Health in the various schools of the city in order to familiarize the pupils and their parents with the necessity of a general spring clean-up.

## DENTAL CLINICS FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN.

The Department of Health announces the opening of six dental clinics for school children. These clinics are maintained in connection with those already established, which have for the past year provided medical and surgical treatment for trachoma and diseases of the nose and throat, and a service for estimating refraction in the case of children with defective vision.

The budget schedule for 1913 made provision for the employment of one supervising dentist and nine staff dentists. These dentists are now on duty, and six clinics have been established as follows: Two in the Borough of Manhattan, three in the Borough of Brooklyn, and one in the Borough of The Bronx.

Since the department inaugurated the physical examination of children in the public schools, it has been increasingly evident that dental defects are not only more prevalent than other physical defects, but that the facilities for free dental treatment are absolutely inadequate to provide any relief for the situation. Approximately sixty per cent. of all children examined have been found to have decayed teeth. In many instances the defects of the teeth have been so extensive and far advanced that corrective treatment, even if it could be obtained, would be of little value.

The present registration in the public schools is approximately 700,000. There are, therefore, at a conservative estimate, 420,000 public school children in this city in urgent need of dental treatment. The majority of these children are from families who are unable to pay for the needed care. The Division of Child Hygiene has made exhaustive efforts to obtain dental treatment for these children, but, owing to the lack of facilities, only a small percentage have received attention. In order, however, to carry out its policy of preventive hygiene, the school nurses of the Department of Health have for the past four years given instruction in dental hygiene to all children with dental defects and have successfully maintained a system of so-called "tooth-brush drills," with instruction in the care of the mouth and teeth for the younger children in the public schools.

Up to the beginning of this year there were but eighteen free dental clinics in this city. Of these only one was exclusively for the use of children. This one clinic was established by the efforts of Miss Marjorie Clark, a former nurse of the Division of Child Hygiene, and has been maintained by funds donated and collected by the Honorable Peter T. Barlow. Its facilities were placed at the disposal of the Department of Health and the work has been of definite value.

The present dental staff is not sufficiently large to permit of any widespread efforts to correct the existing evils, but it will afford an opportunity to demonstrate the value of such a service. Only children whose parents are absolutely unable to pay a private dentist will be treated at these clinics and the children to be treated will be selected by the medical inspectors and nurses of the Division of Child Hygiene from those whose condition most urgently demands relief and where treatment promises the best results for the welfare of the child.

Decayed teeth exercises a decidedly deleterious influence upon the health of children. Unclean mouths predispose to contagious disease and decayed teeth result in improper mastication of food, which is followed by anemia and the evidences of malnutrition. Loss of school time on account of toothache is a common occurrence.

It is hoped that the dental clinics for school children will demonstrate their value and that the city may feel justified in increasing their number as a result of the work accomplished during the year.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work or construction, the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all substructures, encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, it may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he may prescribe.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish news or other service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided.

(a) For ordinary news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) a month, or one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) a year.

(b) For general news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of twenty dollars (\$20) a month, or two hundred and forty dollars (\$240) a year.

(c) For financial news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of forty dollars (\$40) a month or four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480) a year.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and subject to the approval of the Board.

The Company agrees upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract, or

any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herein-after provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of twelve consecutive months, the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number and location of premises served by the Company in the City.

16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business in the City.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation in the City.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries in the City.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges, the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of this contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the pen-

alty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the portion of its system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract and located in the public streets and avenues shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company or, if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

Sec. 3. It is understood that this contract is made without prejudice to any rights which the Company may have heretofore acquired, if any, to operate a telephone, telegraph or ticker business. However, the Company shall not exercise any right or privilege other than that herein authorized and recognized, and in accordance with the terms of this contract, except after final judicial determination in an action to which the City is made a party.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained, unless and until, in an action brought or conducted as hereinbefore provided, the courts shall finally determine that the Company had heretofore acquired the right to carry on its business as now conducted without the necessity of obtaining this franchise or consent from the City. The Company further promises, covenants and agrees that in the event of a decision in its favor in any action brought, as provided in section 3, it will not claim or attempt to claim or demand any damage, penalty or recompense from the City of New York for any expense, expenditures, suits or other disadvantage incurred by it because of the entering into this contract with the City of New York, and hereby expressly waives and surrenders to the City any such claim or demand.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary demolition or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated by all tenants. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
