

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 24, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,716, as follows, viz.: 889 tenement houses, 96 private dwellings, 86 other dwellings, 21 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 fertilizing works, 1 public pound, 1 lard rendering establishment, 22 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 1 tannery, 64 yards, courts, and areas, 98 cellars and basements, 68 waste-pipes and drains, 187 privies and water-closets, 20 street gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 17 other nuisances, together with 64 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 851.

During the past week 93 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 77 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

100 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 86 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of contagious disease was removed to Hospital, and one dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 557 births, 52 still-births, 176 marriages, and 555 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 24, 1880. This shows an increase of 85 births, 7 still-births, 1 marriage, and 98 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 64 births 15 still-births, 48 marriages, and a decrease of 84 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 2; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 4; heartdiseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; convulsions, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 8; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 14; scarlatina, 7; croup, 7; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 8; diarrhœal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 42; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 3; aneurism, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; and suicide, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough, cirrhosis and hepatitis, premature preternatural births, and drowning, was the same in both weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 293 in tenement houses, 150 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 145 on the second, 116 on the third, 69 on the fourth, 11 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 553 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 52 were stated to be single, 149 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 294 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 555; still-births, 52 bedies in transitu, 24. IN THE CASE OF MRS. MARY MOORE, complainant, against Albert Kraemer, a licensed auctioneer, the counsel for the complainant says, in a brief which was filed in the Mayor's office on December 22, 1879; 'What is desired is that the Mayor revoke the license and thus disqualify this auctioneer from further defrauding the public and also inflict such further punishment as under the law may be imposed.'

The sale attended by the complainant was falsely advertised as a sale of household property of Colonel C. X. Bonner, whereas the articles sold were received by Kraemer from manufacturers or dealers and sold at a house occupied by him as his place of business. In consequence of this deceptive advertisement and of representations made at the sale, Mrs. Moore purchased goods which were not of the character or value which she was led to ascribe to them by the advertisement and representations. The transaction was characterized by deceit on the part of the auctioneer, which was perpetrated under cover of his license. He should therefore be no longer allowed to do bus.ness as a city licensee. The fact that the sale occurred just previous to the granting of Kraemer's present license is no valid defense. Had the facts in this case been known to me the license now outstanding would not have been granted. As they are now established, it should be revoked.

The power of the Mayor to commit for trial under chapter 138 of the laws of 1853 has been questioned by the defense, and the counsel for the prosecution concedes that it may have been modified by subsequent statutes. A question has also been raised as to the method of forfeiting auctioneer's bonds and as to who should benefit by such forfeiture. I do not consider it necessary to pass upon these questions in this case. There is a serious conflict of testimony as to the value of the articles purchased by the complainant and the ameunt of loss sustained by her through Kraemer's deception, and the business of the auctioneer has already been broken up through the publication of the evidence in this proceeding. The primary object of the Mayor's jurisdiction in auction cases is not to award damages to individuals but to prevent the carrying on of licensed business by persons who practice deceptions upon the public. If the complainant desires to take further proceedings against the auctioneer she can do so in the courts. In view of these facts I think it proper to limit my action to the revocation of the license of the auctioneer. In virtue of the authority vested in me by law, I, Edward Cooper, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby revoke and annul a certain license granted by me to Albert Kraemer on the fourteenth day of June, 1879, authorizing the said Kraemer to do business as an auctioneer in the fitteenth day of June, 1879.
