Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending ember 5, 1887 : Nov

November 5, 1887: There were 5,768 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 336 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 1365 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 35 permits. There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 2 permits. There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 44 permits.

The certificates of 757 births, 64 still-births, 354 marriages and 565 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 5, 1887. This shows an increase of 87 births, 15 still-births and 80 marriages and a decrease of 168 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 109 births and 30 marriages, and a decrease of 3 still-births and 115 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 4; diphtheria, 13; ercoup, 5; typhoid fever, 7; cereitor-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarthoeal diseases, 12; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 5; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 12; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; bornchites, 12; pneumonia, 15; heart diseases, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; all diseases of the brain and measles increased 2; malarial fever, 1; cancer, 12; phthisis, pulmonalis, 13; bronchites, 14; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 9; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 0; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; premature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough, erysipelas, apoplexy, and cyanosis atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks. opera... atelectas

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 115 were in institutions, 310 in tenement-houses, 125 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in holes and boarding-houses, 10 in ivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 147 on the second, 98 on the third, 60 on the fourth, 22 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 554 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 85 were stated to be single, 177 married, 62 widowed, and the condition of 241 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 565; still-births, 64; ibodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 70 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 757 births, 354 marriages, 64 still-births, 565 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 146 searches of her registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 13 of marriage, and 114 of death were issued during the week. The mean temperature for the week ending November 5, 1887, was 42.8 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 20,876; the mean humidity was 6a, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,688, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.45, inch depth of water, as reported by D. REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1888.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 29th day of October, 1887, of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the ensuing financial year, to wit: for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-eight (1888), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows:

THE MAYORALTY.

The sum of \$26,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that amount was deemed necessary and appropriated for the Mayoralty, including the salary of the Mayor, as fixed by law. The Bureau of Licenses is placed under the head of "Miscellaneous" appropriations.

THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The sum of \$74,700 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that amount was deemed necessary and appropriated for the Common Council, including \$50,000 salary of the Board of Aldermen and \$3,000 of salary of the President of the Board, as fixed by law.

THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$277,500 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$276,018 was advemed necessary and appropriated for that Department, including the salary of the Comp-troller, as fixed by law.

THE STATE TAXES. The sum of \$4,064,179.24, the amount to be raised by tax in the City and County of New York in the year 1888, was appropriated to pay the State taxes, including \$12,692.01 for salary and expenses of the Shore Inspector, as provided by law.

INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$6,999,512.81 required to pay the interest due and payable on the City Debt, in the year 1888, as reported by the Comptroller, was appropriated for that purpose, as provided by law, including interest on the indebtedness of the annexed territory of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and upon Revenue Bonds to be issued in 1888.

REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT. The sum of \$1,380,489.82 required for the redemption of the City Debt, due and payable in the year 1888, not otherwise provided for, and to be raised annually to pay the principal of the City Debt at maturity, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and section 11, article VIII. of the State Constitution, as reported by the Comptroller, was appropriated for those purposes, including the principal of the bonded debt of the territory annexed from West-chester County, due and payable in 1888, as provided by law.

ARMORIES AND DRILL-ROOMS-RENTS.

The sum of \$\$0,750 required to pay rents of armories of the State National Guard was appro-priated, as provided by law. RENTS.

The sum of \$130,672 required to pay rents of public offices, civil courts, etc., was appropriated, as provided by law.

JUDGMENTS. The sum of \$250,000, deemed to be necessary to meet judgments against the City payable in the year 1888, was appropriated for that purpose, purpose, and to law.

THE LAW DEPARTMENT. The sum of \$256,954 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$255,344 was appropriated as required by the Law Department, including the salaries of the Counsel to the Corporation, the Public Administrator, the Corporation Attorney and the Attorney for the Collection of Personal Taxes, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The sum of \$3,424,796 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$3,185,809 appropriated as required by the Department of Public Works, and deemed sufficient for the cts and purposes thereof in the year 1888, including the salary of the Commissioner of Public was as fixed by law. was appropriated as re-objects and purposes the Works, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The sum of \$1,216,710 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$1,017,0 was appropriated, that amount being deemed sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Depa ment of Public Parks in the year 1888, including the salary of the President, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION. The sum of \$2,721,152 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$2,645,039 was appropriated, that amount being deemed sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Depart-ment of Public Charities and Correction in the year 1888, including the salaries of the Commission-ers, and the amount required for the use of the Poor Adult Blind of the City of New York, as provided by law.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$399,887 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$382,952 was appropriated as sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Health Department in the year 1888, including the salaries of the President and other officers of the Department, as provided by law.

THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The source Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$4,650,567,46 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$4,650,525,66 was appropriated as sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Police Department in the year 1888, including the salaries of the Board of Police and officers of the Department and the uniformed Police force, as provided by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The sum of \$1,291,459 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$1,256,459 was appropriated as sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Street Cleaning Department in the year 1888, including the salary of the Street Commissioner, as fixed by law.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$2,180,927 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$1,974,492 was appropriated as sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Fire Department in the year 1888, including the salaries of the Commissioners and officers and firemen, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS

The sum of \$109,700 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was appropri-ated as required by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, including the salaries of the Com-missioners, as fixed by law.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION. The sum of \$5,360,865 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$4,303,167 was appropriated, that sum being deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Board of Education in the year 1888, reductions being made in various items of the Depart-mental Estimate as excessive, and in the amount asked for for new school buildings and sites, excepting for a new building in the Twenty-second Ward, corner of Seventy-seventh street and Tenth avenue, amounting to \$130,000, it being considered more advisable to provide for such expenditures from the proceeds of bonds to be issued under the authority of the Legislature than to raise the amount by taxation.

THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$150,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was appropri-ated, as provided by law.

ADVERTISING, PRINTING, STATIONERY AND BLANK BOOKS. The sum of \$247,720.46 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate for advertising, etc., including the publication of the CITY RECORD, the preparation and printing of the Registry of Voters, and arrearges, and the sum of \$241,500 was appropriated as sufficient for the objects and purposes required in the year 1888, as provided by law.

THE JUDICIARY.

The Police Courts.

The sum of \$153,300 was asked for by the Departmental Estimates of the Police Courts, and the sum of \$149,000 was appropriated for the salaries of the Police Justices, Clerks and Employees of the Courts, pursuant to the provisions of law.

The District Courts.

The sum of \$204,940 was asked for by the Departmental Estimates of the District Courts, and the sum of \$201,500 was appropriated for the salaries of the Justices, Clerks and Employees of the Courts, pursuant to the provisions of law.

The Supreme Court.

The sum of \$87,250 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$90,850 was appropriated, the sum of \$3,600 additional being for compensation of custodians in Searchers' Department, including the salary of County Clerk, as fixed by law. The further sum of \$18,100 was asked for for the preservation of the public records, and appro-priated as provided by law, which is included under the head of "Miscellaneous" appropriations.

The Superior Court. The sum of \$159,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that amount was appro-priated for the salaries of Judges, Clerks, etc., as provided by law.

The Court of Common Pleas.

The sum of \$155,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$151,750 was appropriated for salaries of Judges, Clerks, etc., as provided by law, the sum of \$3,250 being disallowed for law books and Crier.

The City Court.

The sum of \$111,600 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$110,600 as appropriated for salaries of Justices, Clerks, etc., as provided by law, the sum of \$1,000 being isallowed for books of library.

The Courts of General Sessions and Oyer and Terminer.

The sum of \$121,400 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was appro-priated for salaries of the Recorder, Judges, Clerks, etc., as provided by law.

The Court of Special Sessions.

The sum of \$23,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was allowed for salaries of Clerks, etc., as provided by law.

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The Surrogate's Office.

The sum of \$75,600 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was appropriated as necessary for the objects and purposes of the Surrogate's Office, including the salary of the Surro-gate, as fixed by law; and the further sum of \$8,400 was asked for and appropriated for the preservation of the public records, as provided by law, which is included under the head of "Mis-cellaneous" appropriations.

The District Attorney's Office.

The sum of \$113,790 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that sum was appro-priated for the salaries of himself and assistants and the stenographer to the Grand Jury, as fixed by law, and for salaries of Deputy Assistants, Clerks, and expenses necessary to conduct the business of the office of the District Attorney. The further sum of \$25,000 was asked for and appropriated for contingencies, including expenses in bribery cases, which is included under the head of "Miscel-laneous" appropriations. Ir

The Commissioner of Jurors.

The sum of \$21,400 was asked for in the Departmental Estimates, and the sum of \$20,700 was appropriated as required for salaries and expenses of the office, including the salary of the Commis-sioner of Jurors, as fixed by law, the sum of \$700 being disallowed.

THE CORONERS' OFFICE.

The sum of \$50,000 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and that amount, deemed essary, was appropriated for salaries and expenses of the Coroners' Office.

THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

THE SHERIF'S OFFICE. The sum of \$87,800 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$65,700 was appropriated, the sum of \$5,000 being deducted from the estimate for support of prisoners and other expenses in the county jails, and a reduction of \$17,100 being made in the amount asked for Sheriff's fees, in accordance with the rates fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1888, on October 29, 1887, under the provisions of chapter 207 of the Laws of 1884, which, in the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated October 27, 1887, empowers that Board "in making their Provisional and Final Estimates for the ensuing year, yearly, to determine the rates of payment to be paid for Sheriff's services, as in the judgment of the Board seem necessary and sufficient."

ELECTION EXPENSES.

ELECTION LEMENSES. The sum of \$231,100 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate of the Chief of the Bureau of Elections, including compensation of five Inspectors and two Poll Clerks for each poll district, and for the probable requirement of sixty additional Election Districts, as provided by law, and the sum of \$263,100 was appropriated, including the sum of \$30,000 for advertising and \$2,000 for compensation of Clerks of the Board of County Canvassers, which amounts were added to cover the necessary expenses to be incurred pursuant to the provisions of law. of E

PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC RECORDS.

PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC RECORDS. The sum of \$15,100 was asked for by the County Clerk for compensation of copying clerks and bookbinders and materials necessary for the preservation of the public records in his office, and that sum was appropriated as required for the purpose; the sum of \$8,400 was asked for by the Surrogate for the same purpose, and that sum was appropriated as required theretor; and the sum of \$35,000 was asked for by the Register for the same purpose, and the sum of \$25,000 was appropriated as sufficient for the year 1885, making a total of \$61,500 asked for in the several Departmental Estimates, and of \$51,500 appropriated, under the provisions of law applicable thereto, for the preservation of the public records in the offices of the County Clerk, the Surrogate and the Register of the City and County of New York.

THE REGISTER'S OFFICE

The sum of \$143,900 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate of the Register, and the sum of \$135,400 was appropriated as sufficient, in the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the compensation of Clerks, Searchers and other employees, and the expenses of the office, including the salary of the Register, as provided by law. The sum of \$35,000 was also asked for by the Register, and the sum of \$25,000 was appropriated for the preservation of the public records in the Register's Office, as stated under the head of Preservation of public Records.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE AND EXAMINING BOARDS. The sum of \$28,470 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$25,000 was appropriated as sufficient for the salaries of officers and employees and expenses of the Civil Service Boards in 1888, the sum of \$3,470 being deducted as unnecessary.

FUND FOR STREET AND PARK OPENINGS.

The sum of \$137,73.27 was asked for and that amount was appropriated to meet liabilities for awards and taxed costs on account of various street and park opening proceedings, pursuant to chap-ter 173 of the Laws of 1885, confirmed since the 1st day of January, 1887, exhibited in a statement presented by the Comproller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held October 26, 1887, and as certified by the Counsel to the Corporation.
