

Also, beginning at a point in the easterly line of the new avenue, known as Convent avenue, distant, as measured along the easterly line of said avenue, four hundred and sixty and twenty-three one-hundredths (460 23-100) feet from the southerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street ; thence easterly and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, and distant four hundred and fifty-nine and sixty-six one-hundredths (459 66-100) feet southerly therefrom, distance eight hundred and ten and ninety one-hundredths (810 90-100) feet, passing through the new avenue to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace to the westerly line of Avenue St. Nicholas ; thence southerly along said westerly line, distance forty and fifty-six one-hundredths (40 56-100) feet; thence westerly and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, distance four hundred and seventy-three and seventy-six one-hundredths (473 76-100) feet, to the easterly line of avenue to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace; thence southerly along said easterly line distance twenty (20) feet; thence westerly and across the said new avenue, and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, to the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Convent avenue, distance three hundred and sixty-two and fifty-seven one-hundredths (362 57-100) feet ; thence northerly along said easterly line and in a curved line, radius three hundred and seventy-five (375) feet, distance sixty-two and ninety-two one-hundredths (62 02-100) feet to the point or place of beginning. Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and that tull notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

The Commissioner of Public Works then offered the following preamble and resolutions : And Whereas, Said proposed action of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been duly laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York and full notice of the same has been published for ten days in the CITY RECORD, as appears by the report of the Secretary of this Board and the papers thereto attached ; now, therefore, be it Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out, and extending a new avenue to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace, extending from Academy Place, near One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Convent avenue, opposite One Hundred and For-tieth street ; and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Convent avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York ; does hereby alter the map or plan of the City of New York, so as to lay out, open and extend said street, and establish the grades thereof as afore-said, and does hereby lay out and extend the same and establish the grades thereof, as follows :

### ST. NICHOLAS TERRACE, BETWEEN ACADEMY PLACE AND CONVENT AVENUE, AT ONE HUNDRED AND FORTIETH STREET.

Also, beginning at a point in the easterly line of the new avenue, known as Convent avenue, distant, as measured along the easterly line of said avenue, four hundred and sixty and twenty-three one-hundredths (460 23-100) feet from the southerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street; thence easterly and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, and distant four hundred and fifty-nine and sixty-six one-hundredths (459 66-100) feet southerly therefrom, distance eight hundred and ten and ninety one-hundredth (810 90-100) feet, passing through the new avenue to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace to the westerly line of Avenue St. Nicholas; thence southerly along said westerly line, distance forty and fifty-six one-hundredths (40 56-100) feet; thence westerly and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, distance four hundred and seventy-three and seventy-six one-hundredths (473 76-100) feet, to the easterly line of avenue to be known as St. and seventy-six one-hundredths (473 76-100) feet, to the easterly line of avenue to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace ; thence southerly along said easterly line, distance twenty (20) feet ; thence westerly and across the said new avenue, and parallel with One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, to the

easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Convent avenue, distance three hundred and sixtytwo and fifty-seven one-hundredths (362 57-100) feet; thence northerly along said easterly line and in a curved line, radius three hundred and seventy-five (375) feet, distance sixty-two and ninety-two one-hundredths (62 92-100) feet to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York does now proceed to certify two similar maps, showing a new avenue, to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, as laid out as atoresaid, and that the Sec-retary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to file one of said maps so certified in the office of the Department of Public Works of the City of New York, and one in the office of the Counsel to the Correction

the Corporation. Which was adopted by the following vote : Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

the Board of Aldermen-4. Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby respectfully request the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands required for the opening and extension of a new avenue, to be known as St. Nicholas Terrace, extending from Academy place, near One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Convent avenue, opposite One Hundred and Fortieth street, and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Convent avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas, and hereby determine the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby. Which was adopted by the following vote : Affirmative--The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Board of Aldermen-4. On motion, the Board then adjourned.
