

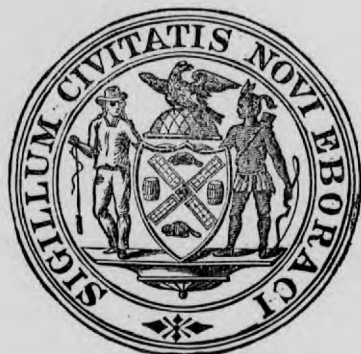

On motion, the reading of the minutes of previous meetings was dispensed with.

The President reported having issued a permit to the American Committee of the Statue of Liberty for a landing-place for boats plying between the Battery and Bedloe's Island at a location at the Battery designated by the Superintendent of Parks, they to be charged for the privilege at the rate of \$100 per annum.

On motion of Commissioner Borden, the action of the President was approved by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

The following communications were received :

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of the following ordinances :

1st. To regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue.

2d. To pave One Hundred and Forty-fifth street with trap-block pavement, from Third to St. Ann's avenue.

3d. To regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from Willis to St. Ann's avenue.

4th. To regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between the New York and Harlem Railroad and Webster avenue.

5th. To regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from Third avenue to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street. Referred to the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards.

From the Counsel to the Corporation :

1st. Advising the Department in relation to the proposal of Denis McGrath, for regulating and paving One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Third and Courtland avenues.

On motion of Commissioner Gallup, the action of the Board, of April 23, 1890, in awarding contract for paving, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-second street, to Denis McGrath was rescinded by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

On motion of Commissioner Gallup, all the bids received on 23d April, 1890, for regulating and paving One Hundred and Fifty-second street, were rejected, and the work was ordered readvertised by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

2d. Advising the Department in relation to a proposed modification of the contract for repairing the roof of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Filed, with directions for the modification of contract as advised.

3d. Advising the Department that the land within the lines of Beekman avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-first street and St. Mary's street, had been ceded to the city. Filed.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution providing funds to the amount of \$12,000 for reconstructing and improving Bridge No. 26 in Central Park. Filed.

From the Clerk of Street Openings, advising the Department of the confirmation of the proceedings for opening the following-named streets : East One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Third avenue, May 3, 1890. East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, from Third avenue to Willis avenue, and from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue, June 10, 1890. Jennings street, from Union avenue to Stebbins avenue, June 9, 1890. Eagle avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, June 9, 1890. Filed.

From the Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art :

1st. Forwarding a copy of the annual report of the Trustees of the Museum. Filed.

2d. Relative to the opening of the Museum on Tuesday and Saturday evenings, from 8 to 10 o'clock, beginning May 10, 1890. Filed.

From the Supervisor of New York Harbor, requesting permission to keep a small steam launch in the slip north of and adjoining the Barge Office at the Battery.

On motion of Commissioner Borden, permission was granted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

From J. C. Cady & Company, architects, submitting specifications and estimates for repairing, painting and varnishing cases on the ground floor of the American Museum of Natural History.

Commissioner Borden offered the following :

Resolved, That the specifications for repairing cases, etc., submitted by the architects, be approved and that a contract for doing the work be entered into with Longstaff & Hurd at an expense not to exceed \$1,910, they being the lowest bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

2d. Submitting specifications and estimates for furnishing 36 new wood cases for the exhibition of insects in the American Museum of Natural History.

Commissioner Borden offered the following :

Resolved, That the specifications for insect cases this day received be approved and that a contract be entered into with H. Mandeville & Son for doing the work at an expense not to exceed \$1,451.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

From P. Henry Dugro and Frederick Wagner, asking permission to erect projecting windows on a hotel building to be erected at the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street.

Commissioner Hutchins offered the following :

Resolved, That the consent of this Department be and the same is hereby given to the erection by P. Henry Dugro and Frederick Wagner, of projections on a hotel building to be erected by them at the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, said projections not to extend more than three feet eight inches beyond the building line, as shown on a plan submitted.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

From Calvin Tompkins, asking permission to erect a projecting window on the fourth story of the building No. 1 East Twenty-seventh street.

Commissioner Borden offered the following :

Resolved, That the consent of this Department be and hereby is given to the erection of a projecting window on the fourth story of the building of the Reform Club, No. 1 East Twenty-seventh street, the projection not to extend more than eighteen inches beyond the house line, as shown on a plan submitted.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

From A. L. Tuckerman, architect :

1st. Submitting additional estimates for several items of work required to be done at the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Commissioner Borden moved that orders be issued to the lowest bidders, as follows :

North American Iron Works, for lamp-posts, at a cost of \$900.

J. W. Fiske, for balustrade, at \$294.95.

J. W. Fiske, for iron walkway in attic, at \$775.

George Telfer, for studio window and floor, at \$532.

W. R. Fleming & Co., for lathe, at \$124.

United Edison Manufacturing Co., for waste-pipe for tank and motors, at \$477.50.

E. A. Boyd, for glass lights, at \$75.

J. L. Mott Iron Works, for iron standards, at \$140.

Charles McCloskey, for rolling shutters and lumber, at \$625.

James A. Seward, for shades, at \$79.60.

Which was carried by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

2d. Submitting a plan and specifications for a shed to be erected in the vicinity of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

On motion of Commissioner Hutchins the matter was referred to Commissioners Borden and Robb for report.

3d. Submitting plans and specifications for the north extension of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Laid over.

From the Landscape Architect, Engineer of Construction and Superintendent of Parks, submitting a plan, with an estimate of the cost, of erecting a retaining-wall on the westerly side of Riverside Park, from One Hundred and Nineteenth to One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following :

Resolved, That the plan this day received, for a retaining-wall to be erected on the westerly side of Riverside Park, between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One One Hundred and Twenty-eighth streets, be and hereby is approved, and that the same be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the approval of said Board, with the request that the Comptroller be authorized and directed to issue bonds to the amount of \$70,000, as provided by chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, for the purpose of carrying out the work as shown on said plan.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

From the Director of the Menagerie :

1st. Recommending that the surplus lambs of the Central Park flock be sold together with a lot of fleeces at public auction.

On motion, a sale was ordered as recommended.

2d. Recommending that the old male tiger in the Menagerie be exchanged for a younger one and that the difference in value, \$400, be paid therefor.

Commissioner Borden moved that the exchange, as recommended by the Director of the Menagerie, be authorized.

Which was carried by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Hutchins, Borden, Gallup—3.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following :

Resolved, That Alfred P. Boller be and he is hereby appointed Engineer to prepare plans, specifications and estimates, and to superintend the construction of the new bridge over Harlem river at Seventh avenue, provided that a satisfactory amount of his compensation can be agreed upon, and that the matter of compensation be referred to Commissioners Borden and Gallup to arrange the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

From Thomas N. Cuthbert, applying for permission for Christopher Keefe to pasture cows on Van Courtland Park. Denied.

From J. B. Jarvis, Jr., asking permission to excavate on Van Courtland Park on the site of an ancient Indian burial place discovered by him. Denied.

From John L. Baker, Chairman Memorial Day Committee, U. S. Grant Post, G. A. R., thanking the Board for facilities afforded at the tomb of General Grant on Decoration Day. Filed.

CLAIMS FOR EXEMPTION FROM JURY duty will be heard by me daily at my office, from 9 A. M. until 4 P. M.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, licensed pharmacists or druggists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible), and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK:

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
