North Side Board of Trade of The City of New York,
520 Willis Avenue,
January 28, 1902.

This is to certify that at a meeting of the North Side Board of Trade of The City of New York held this day the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The railroad accident in the Park avenue tunnel in The City of New York on the 8th day of January, 1902, caused by the carelessness and criminal negligence of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, resulting in appalling loss of life and much suffering, and,

Whereas, Besides such loss of life and suffering, The City of New York and the neighboring communities in Westchester County have suffered and are still suffering incalculable injury to their commercial welfare and growth by reason of the present unhealthy and dangerous condition of the tunnel aforesaid, which conditions retard development and impair real estate values, now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the North Side Board of Trade, in regular meeting assembled, that we condemn the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company for maintaining the Park avenue tunnel in its present dangerous and unhealthy condition, which is a constant menace to life, health and comfort of the patrons of the railroads using said tunnel,

Resolved, That the North Side Board of Trade approves of the directions of the Board of State Railroad Commissioners, made as immediate and preliminary means for the lessening of dangerous conditions and securing safe operation of trains in said tunnel, and be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the use of electric traction power be substituted for steam power in said tunnel; that the floors of all passenger cars be constructed with longitudinal steel beams to prevent telescoping, and that the cars be constructed as nearly as possible of fire proof material; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board favors the establishment of a grand central station, located at some place in the Borough of The Bronx, easily accessible from surface, elevated and underground rapid transit systems; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, properly signed and attested, be transmitted to the Governor of the State of New York, to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to the Board of State Railroad Commissioners, to the District Attorney of the County of New York, to the local newspapers and other papers in the State, and be it further

Resolved, That the Railroad Committee of this Board be directed to communicate with the proper authorities from time to time for the purpose of effecting the improvements suggested herein.

New York Ophthalmic Hospital for Treatment of Eye, Ear and Throat,
Northeast Corner Twenty-third Street and Third Avenue,
New York, January 31, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The appropriation for the New York Ophthalmic Hospital from the city funds in the budget for 1902 is \$4,200.

This was satisfactory to us when it was arranged, but the number of our patients paid for by the city has greatly extended. In January, 1901, we received \$166.82. Since then the amounts have increased, so that for December, 1901, we treated patients for the city which entitle us to \$423.26. In view of this, and the probability that this ratio of increase will be maintained, we request that our appropriation for 1902 be increased to \$6,000.

It may be well to add that we expended for salaries during our last fiscal year only \$1,194.04.

ESTIMATE OF THE AMOUNT OF EXPENDITURE OF THE WEBSTER FREE LIBRARY FOR THE YEAR 1902.

The Webster Free Library is a library maintained for the welfare and free use of the public in The City of New York. It is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York, and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard.

The aggregate circulation, as certified by the Regents, for the year ending June 30, 1900, which is the term fixed by the Regents of the University for their annual examination, was 76,000. The amount granted in 1900 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the basis of this circulation for the year 1901 was five thousand three hundred dollars (\$5,300).

A certificate from the Board of Regents of the University is presented herewith, showing that in the judgment of the Regents said library has circulated for the free use of the public during the year ending June 30, 1901, 106,000 volumes of such a character as to merit a grant of public money.

The appropriation to which, under such certificate, the said library would be entitled is ten thousand six hundred dollars (\$10,600) for the expenses of the year 1902. Mindful, however, of the admonitions to economy contained in the circular of the Comptroller, dated July 3, 1901, the Managers of the library ask for a grant of public money to the amount of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) only.

The Managers annex hereto two tabulated statements, as requested by the Comptroller, showing the expenses of the Library during the year 1901, and also the expenses proposed to be incurred during the year 1902, with explanations showing the reason for the increase in amounts.

A separate comparative statement is also appended, showing in one column the amounts specified in the estimate for 1901, and the amounts proposed to be paid out by the Library during the ensuing year. Every item of expense not absolutely necessary for the business of conducting the Library has been excluded, and every item included in the estimate has been reduced to the lowest amount of expenditure consistent with efficient service. The Library is very glad to co-operate with the Board of Estimate in accomplishing these important objects.

In the management of the Library we have co-operated to the utmost extent possible with the principals and teachers of the public schools in our vicinity, so as to provide them and their pupils with books which shall be of use to them in their studies, and also with a small museum of illustrative objects to aid them in their studies.

The building and land occupied by the Library, and the books contained therein, represent an expenditure of about thirty-six thousand dollars, most of which has been raised by private subscription.

No part of the appropriation for 1901 will remain unexpended at the close of the year.

The grant of the public moneys has been of the greatest utility in extending the work of the Library, and we believe that by this combination of the intelligent and careful supervision of unpaid Managers and of capital contributed by private liberality, with the grant of public funds, results are obtained which are of great advantage to the citizens of New York and contribute to their permanent welfare.

Many of the changes and additions to the Library building mentioned in our budget for 1901 have been completed.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the raise of dust upon the streets and highways in the Borough of Manhattan in The City of New York.

Section 1. That it shall not be lawful for any street surface railway company operating cars upon the streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to raise or cause to be raised any dust or filth by reason of the operation of said street surface railway cars upon said thoroughfare.

Sec. 2. Any street surface railway company having a valid right to operate a street surface railway upon any street or highway in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, must so run its cars so as to prevent the rise of dust or filth upon the thoroughfare, by sprinkling water between the tracks of said company at least four times per day.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to enforce the provisions of this act, and to see that this act is complied with by the aforesaid street surface railway companies.

Sec. 4. Any violation of this act shall be subject to a penalty of one hundred dollars for the first offense, recoverable in a civil action by The City of New York, and for each successive offense a similar penalty recoverable by The City of New York.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Each and every individual person, houseowner, householder, landlord, lessee or tenant in each and every house in The City of New York shall have their garbage placed in the proper receptacle assigned for its use on each day of the week, excepting Sunday, no later than 8 o'clock A. M.

Sec. 3. Every failure to comply with the provision of this ordinance on the part of any of the persons above recited in section 2 shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of \$5, or, in default thereof, imprisonment in the City Prison for a period not exceeding five days.

Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

No. 128.

By Alderman Oatman—

AN ORDINANCE providing that tickets of admission to theatres or other places of entertainment shall have the price printed thereon, and fixing a penalty for failure so to do.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter, every person or persons, firm or corporation who shall issue any ticket or card or certificate of admission, where admission is by ticket, card or certificate, to any theatre or place of amusement or entertainment shall have printed on said ticket, card or certificate in plain figures the price thereof.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons, firm or corporation who shall sell or offer for sale any ticket, card or certificate of admission to any theatre or place of amusement or entertainment for a sum in excess of the price printed thereon, or who shall fail to comply with the above provision relative to such printing, as set forth in section 1 of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be arrested therefor, and upon conviction shall be fined twenty-five dollars (\$25) for every such offense or violation, and in default of payment, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 129.

By the same—

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

ARTICLE I.

Rules of the Road.

Section 1. Vehicles passing in opposite directions.—Vehicles meeting each other in any street of The City of New York shall each go to that side of the street on the right, so as to pass each other without interference or interruption.

Section 2. Vehicles passing in the same direction.—Any vehicle overtaking another shall pass on the left side of the overtaken vehicle. When required to do so, the driver or person having charge of any vehicle traveling on any street or highway of the city shall, as soon as practicable, turn to the right so as to allow any overtaking vehicle to pass on the left. Whenever practicable, any vehicle, upon passing another, when both are in motion, shall not go in front of the vehicle passed until they are fifteen feet apart.

Section 3. Vehicles going abreast.—Subject to the provisions of sections 1 and 2 of this article, no person shall ride or drive vehicles abreast in any street; provided, however, that not more than two bicycles or two horses may be so ridden.

Section 4. Turning, stopping and starting.—The driver or person having charge of any vehicle, before turning the corner of any street, or turning out or starting from or stopping at the curbline of any street, shall first see that there is sufficient space free from other vehicles, so that such turn, stop or start may be safely made; and shall then give a plainly visible or audible signal.

Section 5. Turning corners.—In turning corners to the right vehicles shall keep as close to the curb as possible. In turning to the left turn as wide as possible, passing to the right of the centre of intersection of the two streets.

Section 6. Stopping at the curb.—Unless in an emergency, no vehicle shall be stopped in any public street, except close to the curbline, and so as to occupy no more than one-third of the roadway and leave the roadway and crosswalks of intersecting streets unobstructed.

Section 7. Slowly moving vehicles.—Vehicles moving slowly shall keep as close as possible to the curbline on the right, so as to allow vehicles free passage on the left.

Section 8. Hitching animals.—In the absence of the driver or person having charge of any horse or other animal such horse or other animal shall not be left in the roadway of any street unless securely fastened. No horse shall be unbitted in any street unless secured by a halter.

ARTICLE II.

Regulations of Speed.

Section 1. Speed of Vehicles.—The following rates of speed through the streets of the City shall not be exceeded: That is, ten miles an hour by bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes, motor vehicles and street cars, however propelled; eight miles by passenger and pleasure vehicles drawn by horses or other animals, and five miles an hour by all other vehicles.

Section 2. Exceptions.—Nothing in this article shall apply to the apparatus and wagons of the Fire and Police Departments, the Fire Patrol, ambulances, emergency repair wagons of street railroads and vehicles carrying the United States mail.

ARTICLE III.

Use of Sidewalks.

Section 1. Driving on Sidewalks.—Except as provided in this article, no horse or vehicle shall be driven, backed, led or allowed to stand on any sidewalk which has been curbed.

Section 2. Leading Bicycles.—Riders of bicycles, when dismounted, may lead their bicycles along the sidewalk in single file, and bicycles may be allowed to stand on the sidewalk, provided they cause no obstruction.

Section 3. Riding on Sidewalks.—Bicycles may be ridden on the sidewalks of any street in the suburbs of the City, the roadway of which is not reasonably rideable for such vehicles.

Section 4. Driving Across Sidewalks.—Nothing contained in this article shall prevent the riding or driving of horses or vehicles from private property directly across the sidewalks of any street to the roadway.

ARTICLE IV.

Illegal Use of Streets.

Section 1. Coasting Forbidden to Bicyclists.—No bicycle shall be allowed to proceed in any street of the City by inertia or momentum, with the feet of the rider removed from the pedals; provided that the rider may use his foot or feet as a brake.

Section 2. Trick Riding Forbidden.—No rider of a bicycle shall remove both hands from the handle bars or practice any trick or fancy riding on any streets.

ARTICLE V.

Rights of Way.

Section 1. Right of Certain Vehicles.—The officers and men of the Fire Department and Fire Patrol, with their fire apparatus of all kinds, when going to, on duty at, or returning from a fire, and all ambulances, and the officers and men and vehicles of the Police Department, and all physicians who have a Police permit (as hereinafter provided) shall have the right of way in any street and through any procession, except over vehicles carrying the United States Mail. The Chief of Police is hereby empowered to issue, upon application therefor, a permit for such right of way to any duly registered physician, which permit shall not be transferable.

Section 2. Street Cars.—Subject to the preceding section of this article, cable, trolley and other motor cars, running on tracks laid in the streets especially for their use, shall have the right of way along such tracks, between cross streets, over all vehicles moving in the same direction at a less rate of speed than ten miles an hour.

Section 3. Stoppage of Cars Near Schools.—All street surface railroad cars shall be brought to a full stop before crossing the following named streets and intersections of streets:

In the Borough of Manhattan—Stone and Whitehall streets; Broadway and Cedar, Fulton, Chambers, White, Great Jones, Thirteenth, Eighteenth, Thirty-seventh and Fifty-eighth streets; Bowery and Broome and Great Jones streets; Second avenue and Thirteenth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-eighth, Fortieth, Fiftieth, Sixty-seventh, Eighty-fifth, Eighty-seventh, One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, Fourth and Madison avenues and Fiftieth, Fifty-seventh, Sixty-seventh, Seventy-fifth, Eighty-seventh and One Hundred and Fourth streets; Lexington avenue and Twenty-fifth, Twenty-eighth, Fortieth, Fiftieth, Fifty-first, Sixty-seventh, Eighty-fifth, Eighty-seventh, One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, West Broadway and Eighth avenue and Cedar, Fulton, Chambers, North Moore, Spring, West Tenth, Twentieth, Twenty-fifth, Thirty-seventh, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Fifty-eighth, Sixty-eighth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, Sixth and Lenox avenues and Spring, West Tenth, Forty-third, Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, Columbus and Amsterdam avenues and Fifty-fifth, Sixty-eighth, Eighty-third and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, Park row and Chambers and Pearl streets, Third avenue and Thirteenth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-eighth, Fortieth, Fiftieth, Fifty-first, Sixty-seventh, Seventy-fifth, Eighty-seventh, One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets; on the east and west sides of each street and avenue before crossing.

Section 5. Stoppage of Cars at Certain Crossings—All street surface railroad cars shall be brought to a full stop before crossing the following named streets and intersections of streets:

In the Borough of The Bronx—Fordham and Webster avenues, Pelham parkway and White Plains avenue, Jerome and Moshulu parkway, and Third avenue with Willis, Westchester and Boston avenues.

In the Borough of Brooklyn—Bedford avenue, Eastern parkway, Hancock street, St. Marks avenue, Schermerhorn street, State street, Dean street, Nevins street, Lincoln place, Berkeley place, First street, Third street, Clinton avenue, Bushwick avenue, Greene avenue, Lafayette avenue, Stuyvesant avenue, Union street, Second street, Sixtieth street, Ninety-second street, Sixth avenue, Eighteenth avenue, Throop avenue, Jefferson avenue, Heyward street, Grand street, Fifth street, Eighth street, Fourteenth street, Thirteenth avenue and Henry street, Grand street and Berry street, Metropolitan avenue and Berry street and at the junction of Fulton, Clinton and Liberty streets, with Bridge street, Albany avenue, New York avenue, Grand avenue, Lewis avenue and Thirteenth street.

In the Borough of Manhattan—Broadway and Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Thirty-fourth street, Sixth avenue and Fifty-third street, Fifty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, Sixty-fifth street, Ninth avenue, Seventy-second street, Tenth or Amsterdam avenue and Manhattan street, First avenue and Twenty-sixth street, Second avenue and Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street and Thirty-fourth street; Third avenue and Astor place, Ninth street, Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Lexington avenue and Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Sixteenth street and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Fourth avenue and Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street and Forty-second street, Madison avenue and Forty-second street, Fifty-ninth street, Eighty-sixth street, One Hundred and Sixteenth street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Fifth avenue and Eighth street, Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Thirty-fourth street, Forty-second street, Fifty-ninth street, One Hundred and Sixteenth street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Sixth or Lenox avenue and Eighth street, Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Twenty-eighth street, Twenty-ninth street, Forty-second street, Fifty-ninth street, One Hundred and Tenth street, St. Nicholas avenue, One Hundred and Sixteenth street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; Seventh avenue and Fourteenth street Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Thirty-fourth street, Fifty-third street, Fifty-ninth street, St. Nicholas avenue, One Hundred and Sixteenth street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Eighth avenue and Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Thirty-fourth street, Forty-second street, Fifty-third street, Seventy-second street, Eighty-sixth street, One Hundred and Fourth street, One Hundred and Tenth street, One Hundred and Sixteenth street, St. Nicholas avenue, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, Ninth or Columbus avenue and Fourteenth street, Twenty-third street, Twenty-sixth street, Thirty-fourth street, Forty-second street, Fifty-third street, Fifty-ninth street, Seventy-second street, One Hundred and Fourth street and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street; Tenth or Amsterdam avenue and Twenty-sixth street, One Hundred and Fourth street, One Hundred and Tenth street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Manhattan street, Lawrence street, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

Section 6. Asphalt Strips—All vehicles whose maximum rate of speed is fixed herein and hereby at ten miles an hour shall have the right of way over all other vehicles on any asphalt strip laid in any street and occupying not more than one-third of the width of such street. No vehicle stopping at the curb shall obstruct any such asphalt strips for a period exceeding ten minutes in any hour. No person shall place on any such asphalt strips any obstruction or rubbish.

ARTICLE SIX.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

Section 1. Lights—Every vehicle shall carry between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise a light or lights of such illuminating power as to be plainly visible two hundred feet ahead, and so placed as to be visible on both sides of the vehicle; provided that the rider of a bicycle, tricycle or similar vehicle whose light has become extinguished or who is necessarily absent from his or her home without a light, may ride without a light at a pace not exceeding six miles an hour, but in such case must give an audible alarm by bell, whistle or otherwise as often as thirty feet are passed over.

Section 2. Street Sprinkling—In sprinkling or watering any street, a strip at least six feet wide shall at all times be left dry along the center of such street; except that where car tracks are laid, a space of four feet in width outside of each outer rail shall be left dry; and asphalt strips of less width than one-third of the roadway shall not be sprinkled or wet; provided that nothing herein contained shall restrain or affect the cleaning or washing of the streets by the Street Cleaning Department; and provided that no street shall be sprinkled or wet in freezing weather.

Section 3. Ages of Drivers of Business Wagons—Drivers or persons in charge of vehicles used for business purposes shall not be less than sixteen years of age.

ARTICLE SEVEN.

Definitions.

Section 1. Definitions of Terms Used Herein—The following terms, whenever used herein, except as otherwise specifically indicated, shall be defined to have, and shall be held to include each of the meanings herein below respectively set forth; and any such term used in the singular number shall be held to include the plural.

Street—Every avenue, boulevard, highway, roadway, cartway, lane, alley, strip, path, square and place used by or laid out for the use of vehicles.

Roadway—That portion of any street which is included between the curbs, or curb lines thereof and is designed for the use of vehicles.

Vehicles—Every wagon, carriage, omnibus, sleigh, car, push-cart, bicycle, tricycle and other conveyance (except baby carriages), in whatever manner or by whatever force or power the same may be driven, ridden or propelled, which is, or may be used for or adapted to pleasure riding or the transportation of passengers, baggage, or merchandise; also every draft and riding animal, whether driven, ridden, or led, excepting that an animal or animals attached to any vehicle shall, with such vehicle, constitute one vehicle.

ARTICLE EIGHT.

General Rule Governing the Use of Streets.

Section 1. Collisions Forbidden—Nothing contained herein or omitted herefrom shall be construed or held to relieve any person using, or traveling, or being upon any street, for any purpose whatever, from exercising all reasonable care to avoid and prevent injury through collision with all other persons and vehicles.

ARTICLE NINE.

Penalties for Violations.

Section 1. Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar and not exceeding ten dollars, and, in default of payment of such fine, may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

ARTICLE TEN.

Section 1. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 2. These ordinances shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is given to the Subway Realty Company and its assigns to construct and maintain a vault under East Forty-first street, in the Borough of Manhattan, adjacent to the said Subway Realty Company's property, to be bounded on the north by the northerly curb line and on the south by the center of Forty-first street, and to extend from the

westerly curb line on Park avenue to the westerly line of the said Company's property; also a vault, situated beyond the curb line on Park avenue, adjacent to the Company's property, to be bounded on the west by the westerly curb line of Park avenue, as extended to the center of Forty-first street; on the south by the center line of Forty-first street, and on the east and north by the westerly retaining wall of the Rapid Transit tunnel, which is to be situated in Park avenue, as appears more fully by the accompanying diagram, on payment of such fee as shall be deemed an adequate compensation by the Sinking Fund Commission, the work to be done at the expense of the Subway Realty Company or its assigns, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Council, December 10, 1901, concurred in by the Board of Aldermen, December 10, 1901, and which was approved by his Honor the Mayor, December 11, 1901, permitting Charles White to place and keep a stand for the sale of newspapers and periodicals under the stairs of the elevated railroad at the northeast corner of Forty-second street and Sixth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby annulled, rescinded and repealed.

No. 133.

By Alderman John T. McCall—

Whereas, The lives and persons of individuals attending theaters in this city have been heretofore menaced by the blocking of the aisles and lobbies of places of amusement by people occupying what is known as standing room in direct conflict with the provisions of section 762 of the Greater New York Charter; and

Whereas, Hon. Thomas Sturgis, Commissioner of the Fire Department, has with proper and meritorious concern for the safety of the public seen fit to exercise his rightful duty in enforcing the provisions of said section 762; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, recognizing the fearless attitude of Commissioner Sturgis, hereby approves of his sturdy efforts to enforce the law, and pledges to him the fullest measure of support in his action.

No. 134.

By the same—

A GENERAL ORDINANCE to provide for the licensing and otherwise regulating the business of bootblacks and stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of the elevated railroad stations in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall have or use any bootblack stand outside of any building in The City of New York, and there shall be no booth or stand erected within stoop lines of any building or under the stairs of the Elevated Railroad stations in The City of New York, without first procuring a license therefor as hereinafter provided; and any person so doing shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction before any magistrate, upon confession or competent testimony, shall be fined by said magistrate not less than \$2 or more than \$10 for each offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed 10 days.

Sec. 2. All licenses for bootblacks and stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of the Elevated Railroad stations in The City of New York shall be granted by authority of the Mayor, and issued by the Bureau of Licenses for a term of one year from the date thereof, unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Mayor or the Chief of said Bureau, with the approval of the Mayor; and no person shall be licensed except a citizen of the United States or one who has regularly declared intention to become such citizen and the time to obtain such full citizenship has not yet elapsed.

Sec. 3. Stands within stoop lines may be permitted and licensed with the consent of the owner of the premises, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda-water and the blacking of boots, and no bootblack stand shall be provided with more than three chairs. All such stands shall be classified and the annual license fees therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following:

Temporary stands for the sale of newspapers or periodicals or both, in use ordinarily only at certain periods of the day.....	\$1 00
Permanent stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, in use ordinarily during the day time and evening.....	5 00
Permanent stands for the sale of fruits or soda-water or both.....	10 00
Permanent stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda-water.....	15 00
Bootblack stands, for each chair thereof.....	5 00

Sec. 4. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of six feet long by four feet wide, except that in the case of bootblack stands a space not more than three feet wide and four feet long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No rent or other compensation shall be directly or indirectly paid by the licensee to the owner or occupant of the premises where such stand is located and no such stand shall be kept open after 12 o'clock at night. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. Upon the written revocation by the owner of the consent previously given therefor, the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have power to transfer said permit or license to another location, with the consent of the owner of such premises, for the unexpired term of the permit or license.

Sec. 5. Any person desiring to erect a stand or booth underneath the stairs of any of the elevated railroad stations in The City of New York for the sale of newspapers and periodicals, shall file in the Bureau of Licenses an application in which the applicant shall specify the location desired for such stand, and no such stand or booth or any projection therefrom shall be erected which is wider than the width of the stairs under which it is placed or which extends along the sidewalk a greater distance than to a point where the under surface of the stairs is not over seven feet from the level of the sidewalk; and said stand shall be constructed, erected and maintained at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which such stand is located, upon plans to be approved by the chief engineer of the Elevated Railroad Company affected, so as to permit a ready removal of so much thereof as may be necessary to enable said company, its agents or employees, to get convenient access to any part of said stairways for the inspection, painting or repairing thereof, and shall be painted the same color as the stairs of the elevated railroad, and no advertisement shall be painted or displayed thereon.

Sec. 6. Every license granted pursuant to section 5 of this ordinance shall contain the following reservation: "It is expressly agreed and understood that this permit is given subject to the right of the elevated railroad company affected, its agents, employees, successors or assigns, or the owner of said stairway, at any time properly to inspect, paint, repair, renew, reconstruct or remove said stairway, or any portion thereof, and without claim on the part of said licensee as against said company, its agents, employees, successors or assigns, or the owner of said stairway, for damages to or interference with said booth or stand, or the business therein conducted, occasioned by such inspection, painting, repair, renewal, reconstruction or removal."

Sec. 7. The licensee shall pay for such a stand or booth underneath the stairs of the elevated railroad stations, the annual license fee of \$10.

Sec. 8. The official license for any stand or booth must be displayed thereon so as to be easily visible at all times.

Sec. 9. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have the power to hear and

determine complaints against any of the licensees hereunder, and impose a fine of not less than \$1 or more than \$5 for any violation of the regulations herein provided and, subject to the approval of the Mayor, shall have power to suspend the license pending payment of such fine. All such fines when collected shall be paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Sec. 10. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 135.

By Alderman Lundy—

Whereas, By section 11 of title 19 of chapter 583 of the Laws of 1888, being the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, it is provided that the Common Council of said city may at any time before any contract shall be made for any local improvement referred to therein, cancel such assessment, and any and all proceedings had relating thereto, or to the improvement for which the same was laid, and that in case of such cancellation all moneys paid for or on account of such assessment shall be refunded to the person or persons who shall have paid the same, or to the legal representatives of such person or persons; and

Whereas, By section 42 of the Charter of The City of New York, being chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, it is provided that all the powers and duties conferred or charged upon the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn shall be exercised and performed by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, subject, nevertheless, to the power of approval or disapproval by the Mayor of said City, as provided in said Charter; and

Whereas, The improvement known as the grading and paving of Cropsey avenue from Twenty-third avenue to Bay Thirty-fifth street with macadam pavement was such a local improvement as is referred to in the section of the Brooklyn Charter above cited; and

Whereas, By sections 7 and 8 of title 19 of said Brooklyn Charter, before any contract for such local improvement could be entered into, an assessment therefor must be laid and one-third of the amount thereof collected; and

For each day or part of a day that any such car, motor or vehicle is operated in violation of this ordinance the company owning or operating such car, motor or vehicle shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five dollars, together with costs of suit, the same to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction by the Law Department of The City of New York.

The action of the Board of Docks in setting aside the bulkhead south of Canal Street Pier North, No. 34, North river, for the dumping of snow and ice, was rescinded.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to enter into a stipulation with the owners of the property between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, North river, to place the Department in possession of the property, in accordance with his recommendation.

The application of C. O'D. Iselin, for the elimination of conditions contained in permit for erection of shed on Old Slip pier, East river, was filed and the applicant notified his request was inconsistent with opinion of Corporation Counsel.

The request of the Commander of the School Ship St. Mary's that this Department light the East Twenty-fourth Street Pier was denied and he was notified that the Commissioner will permit the lighting of said pier at the expense of the Board of Education.

The plans submitted by the Borough Construction Company for sewer at the foot of Sixty-fourth street, Brooklyn, were filed, and said company notified that this Department has no objection to the construction of the sewer.

The application of Nathan Straus for berths at which to sell coal to the poor was filed and he was notified that the request will be granted if application be made by Department of Public Charities.

The applications of the Vogemann Line for a lease of the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, No. 74, North river, and of the Wm. W. Brauer Steamship Company for a lease of Rutgers Slip Pier West, No. 33, East river, were filed and said applicants notified that the piers in question are being maintained as "shifting" piers.

Applications for the establishment of ferry franchises between the Boroughs of Queens and Bronx were received from E. Platt Stratton et al. to run between Eighth avenue, College Point, and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, East river; and from the New York and College Point Ferry Company to run from First street, College Point, stopping at North Beach, and thence to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, East river. After a hearing on both applications, the parties in interest were requested to submit briefs.

At request of Department of Street Cleaning for additional snow dumping facilities, said Department was notified that snow and ice may be dumped from the outer end of the West Eighteenth Street Pier, North river, and from any unoccupied bulkheads between Catharine street and Rutgers slip, on the East river.

The Department of Street Cleaning was notified that its application for dredging at the dumping board foot of East Eightieth street cannot be granted, as the river bottom consists of solid rock.

The plans submitted by the Department of Street Cleaning for the construction of a dumping board on the East Eighth Street Pier were filed, said Department notified that the pier is at present unsafe, and the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the Commissioner as to the condition of the legal proceedings for possession of the south-half of the pier.
