The company is the owner in fee of the property No. 400 East Forty-fourth street, and is the lessee of the property No. 399 East Forty-fourth street.

The plans, submitted herewith, show that a covered bridge, ten feet six inches in width, is proposed to be erected twenty-three feet above the level of the sidewalk and seventy-five feet east of the building line on the easterly side of First avenue.

The company desires to erect and maintain this covered bridge in order to provide a convenient and sanitary means of carrying its beef, by overhead trolleys, from the slaughtering floor of the building on the south side of Forty-fourth street to the cold storage floor of its building on the north side of Forty-fourth street to the cold storage floor of its building on the north side of the street.

Sir-On September 12, 1907, the United Dressed Beef Company petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct and maintain a bridge 10 feet 6 inches wide across East Forty-fourth street, between First avenue and the East river, the bridge to be twenty-four feet above the roadway.

The object of this bridge is to provide sanitary means for carrying beef carcasses by overhead trolley from the slaughter house on the south side of the street to the cold storage on the north side. The President of the Borough and the Fire Commissioner have been consulted, and they see no objection to the proposed construction, provided the bridge be of fireproof material, and that fireproof doors be placed at both ends. This condition has been incorporated in the proposed form of consent. A modification of the original plan has been made, resulting in less obstruction to light and air in the street.

The compensation for this privilege has been estimated in accordance with the established practice of the Board, and it is recommended that the right to erect this bridge be granted for a period of ten years, the annual compensation for the first five years being \$230 and for the second five years \$242. Form of resolution, together with the report from the Division of Franchises, is herewith submitted.

SIR—The United Dressed Beef Company of New York has presented a petition, dated September 12, 1907, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct and maintain a covered bridge, 10 feet 6 inches wide, outside dimension, and about 24 feet above the roadway, over and across East Forty-fourth street, between First avenue and the East river, Borough of Manhattan, to connect the buildings of the company on opposite sides of said street, as shown on the plan accompanying

the application.

The petition recites that the company is the owner in fee of the property on the southerly side of East Forty-fourth street and the lessee of the property on the northerly side, and that the bridge is desired in order to provide a convenient and sanitary means of carrying beef by overhead trolleys from the slaughtering floor of the building on the south side of East Forty-fourth street to the cold storage floor of the build-

ing on the northerly side of said street.

Communications were addressed to the President of the Borough of Manhattan and to the Fire Commissioner, inclosing copies of the petition and accompanying plan, and requesting that an examination be made by the various bureaus having jurisdiction, with a view to ascertaining if there were any objections to the project or any special conditions which should be incorporated in the form of consent heretofore used for

similar privileges.

Replies were received from these officials, stating that there were no objections to the proposed bridge, but the Fire Department required that the bridge be built of fire-proof material and that fireproof doors be placed at each end thereof. These conditions have been incorporated in the form of resolution granting consent, herewith sub-

mitted for adoption.

The proposed bridge as shown on the original plan accompanying the petition was designed to be about 25 feet in height, and a bridge of this size crossing a sixty-foot street would, in my opinion, have presented an ungainly appearance, and in addition, would have been a considerable obstruction to light and air. An examination of the plan convinced me that a bridge of this height was unnecessary for the purposes for which it was desired, and the petitioner was informed of this objection. In consequence, new plans were submitted by the applicant, showing a design of the proposed bridge about 15 feet in height. This new design removed my objection to the project and there now seems to be no good reason why the requested permission should not be granted, and I would recommend that consent be given during the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but in no case to extend beyond ten years from the date of approval by the Mayor, provided, however, that in case the lease of the the date of approval by the Mayor, provided, however, that in case the lease of the property on the northerly side of said East Forty-fourth street, which expires on January 1, 1913, be not renewed, the consent shall cease by limitation on the date of expiration of the present lease, and revocable upon sixty days' notice in writing, and that it be made a condition of the consent that a security deposit in the sum of \$1,000 be required, said deposit to be in the form of either money or securities, to be approved by and deposited with the Comptroller, for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the consent. conditions of the consent.

The total area of the proposed bridge between building lines is 630 square feet, and the average assessed valuation of the two properties to be connected by the bridge is \$4.58 per square foot. On the basis of compensation heretofore adopted by the Board in similar cases, viz.: 8 per cent. of the assessed valuation of the plan area of the structure per annum for the first term of five years, with a 5 per cent. increase for the next succeeding term of five years, the annual charges would be as follows:

The consent hereby given is for the exclusive use of the grantee, and shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of said grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, without the consent in writing of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

The said grantee shall pay the entire cost of-

(a) The construction and maintenance of the bridge;

(b) The protection of all surface and subsurface construction in East Forty-fourth street which may be disturbed by the construction of the bridge;

(c) The replacing or restoring of the pavement in said street which may be disturbed during the construction of said bridge;

(d) Each and every item of the increased cost of any future structure caused by the presence of said bridge under this consent;

(e) The inspection of all work during the construction or removal of the bridge which may be required by any department of The City of New York having jurisdiction over such construction or re-

6. It is made a particular condition of this consent that the said bridge shall be constructed of fireproof material throughout and that fireproof doors shall be provided at each end of the said bridge.

Before the construction shall be begun the grantee shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and the said grantee shall perform all the duties which may be imposed as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this consent. The grantee shall submit to said official working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said bridge and the mode of protection or changes in all structures required by the construction of said bridge.

The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall allow to The City of New York a right-of-way under, over or through any part of the bridge constructed under the consent hereby granted for any and all structures which are now or may be hereafter placed by The City of New York in that portion of the above-named street occupied by said bridge.

8. Said bridge shall be constructed, maintained and used subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York, and said bridge shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the authorities who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

9. Said bridge shall be used by the said grantee as a passageway and to convey beef between the aforementioned buildings, and for no other purpose whatsoever, and no material of any kind, character or description shall be allowed to remain standing thereon, and no electric wires or pipes shall be placed upon or attached to the said bridge.

10. The grant of this privilege is given subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of the abutting property or any other person or persons may have in and to the street where the bridge is to be constructed, and the said grantee shall be liable for all damage to persons or property, including the street, by reason of the construction or maintenance of said bridge, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

11. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly com-

12. The said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said bridge under this consent and complete the same on or before April 1, 1908; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceeding, either at law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding three months beyond the date specified.

13. This consent is upon the expres its approval by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, the said grantee shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge.

In case of default in the payment of the annual charge The City of New York shall collect the same, with interest, from such fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the said grantee.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund the said grantee shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and in default of the payment thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled, at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City, No action or proceedings or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

14. Said grantee shall give notice to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, in writing, of its intention to begin construction of the work hereby authorized at least forty-eight (48) hours before such construction commences. The grantee shall

also give to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment notice in writing of the date on which the work was commenced, and also the date on which the same was completed, not later than ten (10) days after such dates.

15. This consent shall not become operative until said grantee shall duly execute an instrument in writing wherein said grantee shall promise, covenant and agree on its part to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York within thirty (30) days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

This conveyor is to be carried in a steel trough supported from the inside bottom of the conduit so as to permit of access for adjustment and repairs.

The conduit is to be installed by means of an open trench which shall be so made as to cause the minimum interference to street traffic, and when completely installed, the street and sidewalk pavement shall be restored to as good condition and of the same materials as before starting the said excavation.

Sir.—Under date of August 31, 1907, Julius Kayser & Co. petitioned the Board for the right to construct and maintain a pipe tunnel under Taaffe place, between Willoughby and DeKalb avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The proposed tunnel is to be four feet in diameter and six feet below the street surface, and is to be used for conveying coal from their storage bins to the boiler room, which are on opposite sides of the street. The President of the Borough and the Commissioner of Water Supply have been consulted and have raised no objection to the granting of this privilege. The compensation has been estimated in accordance with the regulations adopted by the Board, such compensation ranging from \$100 annually for the first five years to \$122 annually for the fifth five-year period.

It is recommended that the permission be granted, a resolution to this effect, together with the report of the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises, being herewith submitted.

SIR—Julius Kayser & Co., a domestic corporation, engaged in the manufacture of silk gloves, has presented a petition, dated August 31, 1907, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct and maintain a pipe tunnel under and across Taaffe place, between Willoughby avenue and DeKalb avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to connect the buildings of the company on opposite sides of said Taaffe place. The tunnel is to be four feet in diameter, and approximately six feet below the surface of the roadway, and is designed to be used as a conduit for a screw coal conveyor to deliver coal from a storage bin in the building of the company now in process of erection on the easterly side of Taaffe place to the boiler room in the building on the westerly side of the same street.

The present coal storage capacity of the company is but about sixty tons, and it is desired to provide storage space for about five hundred tons in the new building, in order to assure continuous operation of the mills during any period when it may be unable to obtain a supply of coal.

I can see no reason why the requested permission should not be granted, and would recommend that consent be given during the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but in no case to extend beyond twenty-five years from the date of approval by the Mayor, and revocable upon sixty days' notice in writing, and that it should be made a condition of this consent that a security deposit in the sum of \$500 be required, said deposit to be in the form of either money or securities, to be approved by and deposited with the Comptroller for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the consent.

The plan area of the proposed tunnel between building lines is 200 square feet, and the average assessed valuation of the properties to be connected is 49 cents per square foot. On the basis used in similar cases, viz., 8 per cent. of the

Upon the removal of the said grantee from either one or both of the buildings to be connected by the tunnel, or upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall, at its own cost, cause the tunnel to be removed and all that portion of Taaffe place affected by this permission to be restored to its proper and original condition, if required so to do by The City of New York or its duly authorized representatives. If the tunnel to be constructed by the said grantee under this consent shall not be required to be removed, it is agreed that the said tunnel shall become the property of The City of New York.

4. The consent hereby given is for the exclusive use of the grantee, and shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person, firm or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, without the consent in writing of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority.

5. The said grantee shall pay the entire cost of-

(a) The construction and the maintenance of the tunnel,

- (b) The protection of all surface and subsurface structures which shall in any way be disturbed by the construction of the tunnel.
- (c) All changes in sewers or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction of the tunnel, including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures. (d) The replacing or restoring of the pavement in said street which may
- be disturbed during the construction of said tunnel, (e) Each and every item of the increased cost of any future substruc-
- ture caused by the presence of said tunnel under this consent. (f) The inspection of all work during the construction or removal of the tunnel, as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water
- Supply, Gas and Electricity. 6. Before the construction shall be begun the grantee shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The grantee shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon the grantee by these officials as conditions of such per-

mits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this consent. The grantee shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of such tunnel and the mode of protection or changes in all subsurface structures required by the construction of the tunnel.

- The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall allow to The City of New York a right-of-way through, under or above any part of the tunnel constructed under the consent hereby granted for any and all subsurface structures which are now or may be hereafter placed by The City of New York in that portion of Taaffe place occupied by said tunnel.
- 8. The said tunnel and any fixtures laid therein shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York. The said tunnel shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the authorities who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

9. This consent is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to Taaffe place.

10. Said grantee shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street and subsurface structures therein, by reason of the construction and operation or maintenance of said tunnel, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of

- 11. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with
- 12. Said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said tunnel under this consent and complete the same within three months from the date of the approval of this consent by the Mayor; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith, and without any proceeding, either at law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding one month.
- 13. This consent is upon the express condition that the said grantee, within thirty days after its approval by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge and the repairs of the street pavement. In case of default in the performance by said grantee of any of such terms and conditions The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for making the necessary changes or repairs, after ten days' notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or in case of default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from such fund, after ten days' notice in writing to the said grantee.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund the said grantee shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York 2 sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default of the payment thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled, at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceedings or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

- 14. Said grantee shall give notice to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in writing, of its intention to begin construction of the work hereby authorized at least forty-eight hours before such construction commences. The grantee shall also give to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment notice, in writing, of the date on which the work is commenced, and also the date on which the same is completed, not later than ten (10) days after such dates.

We have worked in perfect good faith in the matter, but as the time has now gone by in which the necessary preparations could be made for the coming summer season, we would respectfully petition that your

Honorable Board may grant our company a further extension of time until May 1, 1908, as we have devoted considerable time and money to the furtherance of our plans thus far.

In this connection we may state that our efforts to secure capital have been somewhat embarrassed by the fact that capitalists whom we have hoped to enlist in this enterprise have naturally made inquiries as to the working and prospects of similar pipe lines in this neighborhood, and their investigations lead them to the belief that the matter of refrigeration by means of pipe lines is so comparatively new that they do not feel justified in putting capital into it, in view, also of the shortness of the Coney Island season, unless it is possible to secure some modifications in the terms of our franchise.
