

Messrs. Townsend Cox, Thomas S. Brennan, and Jacob Hess, Commissioners of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, appeared before the Board and made statements relating to he said Department, and presented the following detailed estimate of expenses.

Estimate of Expenses of the Department of Public Charities and Correction for the Year Commencing Jonuary 1, 1881.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 30, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—As required by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, amended by section 20 shapter 757 Laws of said year, the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction herewith submit the estimate of expenses of the Department for the year commencing January 1st,

Supplies.

The estimate for supplies is an increase of \$90,816.66 over that appropriated for 1880. It is based upon the expenses of the year 1880. The increased cost of supplies is evident to every one. The item of coal will probably cost \$30,000 more than in 1880, and if meats should advance one cent per pound, it will cost about \$25,000 more. It would be unsafe for the Department to have less than the amount asked for than the amount asked for.

Salaries.

The amount asked for salaries is in accordance with the law that requires the reduction from the amount appropriated for 1880.

Additions, Alterations, and Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus.

This amount (\$35,000) is necessary for the working of the Department.

Out-door Poor.

We ask for \$5,000 more than for 1880, as coal is very much higher.

Poor Adult Blind.

This amount of \$20,000 is mandatory by statute.

Contingencies.

We ask for \$30,000 for contingencies. It is important that an amount should be granted that could be used in cases of emergency under the supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportion-

An additional amount is asked for the following improvements, viz. : Additions and extra story to engine-house, kitchen and laundry at lunatic asylum, B. I. \$5,000 00 Quarantine pavilion on Randall's Island 14,000 00 Alteration and addition to Retreat, B. I. 30,000 00 One pavilion on Hart's Island..... 8,000 00

The amounts appropriated for 1880 being insufficient, the additional amount is asked for, based upon the estimates of the architect.

We ask for appropriations for the following necessary improvements, viz.: East wing to insane asylum, W. I.....\$100,000 oo Rast wing to insane asylum, W. 1. \$100,000 oo New morgue at Bellevue hospital \$25,000 oo Fire engine house at Blackwell's Island \$15,000 oo Laundry building on Hart's Island \$15,000 oo Boiler for laundry at Charity hospital \$3,000 oo Two boilers and steam fitting at penitentiary \$30,000 oo Two boilers and steam-fitting at Tombs \$30,000 oo We also ask for \$15,000 for a machine for making ice.

We place these estimates before your Board and most respectfully request that the amounts asked for be granted.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT IN relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-sight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed tilly paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
