

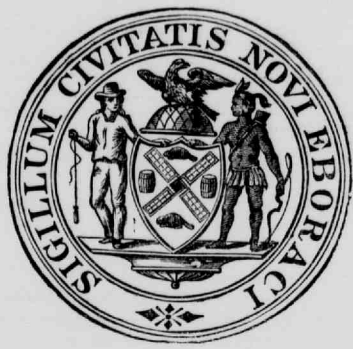

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending December 25, 1880.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. A. M. Dooley to erect a bay-window on Eightieth street, projecting four feet beyond the street-line, and a circular bay-window on the corner, projecting eighteen inches beyond the street-line on Fifth avenue, and eighteen inches beyond the street-line on Eightieth street; both of said bay-windows to run to top of second story of house about to be erected on the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Eightieth street, as shown on the annexed diagram, the work done at her own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Committee of the Hebrew Fair to suspend a net-work banner across the street in front of the Metropolitan Hall Building, corner of Broadway and Forty-first street, the work done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only until Tuesday, December 22, 1880.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to David H. Gould to place a storm-door within the stoop-line in front of his premises, No. 61 Cedar street, in the City of New York, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to take the necessary measures to have the sidewalk in front of Nos. 281, 282, and 283 South street to be properly flagged and put in good order forthwith.

Croft's own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
FRIDAY, December 24, 1880—3 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the City of New York; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller of the City of New York; John J. Morris, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Henry E. Howland, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held December 23, 1880, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

CITY OF NEW YORK,
FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
December 24, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At the meeting of the Board on the 23d inst., there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation of December 21, 1880, requesting the transfer of \$3,200 from the appropriation for "Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, and Messengers, Office of Counsel to the Corporation," for 1880, which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation for "Contingencies—Office of Counsel to the Corporation," 1880, which is insufficient.

I recommend that the transfer be made as requested, and herewith present a resolution for that purpose.

Resolved, That the sum of three thousand two hundred dollars be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Law Department for the year 1880, entitled "Salaries—Law Department (Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, and Messengers, Office of Counsel to the Corporation)," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1880, entitled "Contingencies—Law Department," which is insufficient.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, December 24, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At the time of the appointment of Inspectors of Election in 1879, when the mandamus proceedings were pending before Justice Westbrook, I consulted with Mr. Nelson J. Waterbury with reference to my rights and duties as a Police Commissioner in relation to the appointments. Acting in my behalf, Mr. Waterbury obtained a modification of Justice Westbrook's order, and afterward, as I am advised, assisted materially in the preparation of the return to the writ.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Messrs. Townsend Cox, Thomas S. Brennan, and Jacob Hess, Commissioners of the Department of Public Charities and Correction, appeared before the Board and made statements relating to the said Department, and presented the following detailed estimate of expenses.

Estimate of Expenses of the Department of Public Charities and Correction for the Year Commencing January 1, 1881.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION,
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 30, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—As required by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, amended by section 20 of chapter 757 Laws of said year, the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction herewith submit the estimate of expenses of the Department for the year commencing January 1st, 1881.

Supplies.

The estimate for supplies is an increase of \$90,816.66 over that appropriated for 1880. It is based upon the expenses of the year 1880. The increased cost of supplies is evident to every one. The item of coal will probably cost \$30,000 more than in 1880, and if meats should advance one cent per pound, it will cost about \$25,000 more. It would be unsafe for the Department to have less than the amount asked for.

Salaries.

The amount asked for salaries is in accordance with the law that requires the reduction from the amount appropriated for 1880.

Additions, Alterations, and Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus.

This amount (\$35,000) is necessary for the working of the Department.

Out-door Poor.

We ask for \$5,000 more than for 1880, as coal is very much higher.

Poor Adult Blind.

This amount of \$20,000 is mandatory by statute.

Contingencies.

We ask for \$30,000 for contingencies. It is important that an amount should be granted that could be used in cases of emergency under the supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Improvements.

An additional amount is asked for the following improvements, viz.:

Additions and extra story to engine-house, kitchen and laundry at lunatic asylum, B. I.	\$5,000 00
Quarantine pavilion on Randall's Island	14,000 00
Alteration and addition to Retreat, B. I.	30,000 00
Two hospital pavilions at almshouse	18,000 00
One pavilion on Hart's Island	8,000 00

The amounts appropriated for 1880 being insufficient, the additional amount is asked for, based upon the estimates of the architect.

We ask for appropriations for the following necessary improvements, viz.:

East wing to insane asylum, W. I.	\$100,000 00
New morgue at Bellevue hospital	25,000 00
Fire engine house at Blackwell's Island	15,000 00
Laundry building on Hart's Island	15,000 00
Boiler for laundry at Charity hospital	3,000 00
Two boilers and steam fitting at penitentiary	30,000 00
Two boilers and steam-fitting at Tombs	30,000 00

We also ask for \$15,000 for a machine for making ice.

We place these estimates before your Board and most respectfully request that the amounts asked for be granted.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the Comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
