



The Secretary reported that on May 29, he transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, copies of a resolution adopted by this Board on May 17, requesting him to take the necessary pro-

ceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to the lands required for the opening of Ninety-fourth street, between First and Second avenues; One Hundred and Twelfth street, between Tenth avenue and Boulevard; One Hundred and Nineteenth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues; One Hundred and Twenty-first street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues; One Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Eighth avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas, and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues; that on June 11, he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board on May 13, fixing and establishing the grades of five certain unnamed streets or roads in Spuyten Duyvil District as respectfully shown upon certain maps then before the Board and requesting the Department of Public Parks to furnish the Board with five copies of each of said maps, together with the maps referred to in the resolution for the use of the Park Department in preparing the maps, requested; that on June 14, pursuant to direction of the Board, he notified Mr. Fordham Morris of the meeting of the Board to be held on the 16th instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.; that on May 26, he received from the Department of Public Parks five copies "Plan and profiles showing Bremer avenue from Jerome avenue to Devoe street and Devoe street from Bremer avenue to Ogden avenue;" on June 3, five copies of "Plan of proposed approach to McCombs Dam Bridge;" on June 10, five copies "Plan and profiles showing certain streets and avenues, between Edgecombe and Kingsbridge roads and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets."

Which report was accepted.

The Secretary read a petition of property-owners for the opening of One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets, between Eighth and Ninth avenues; also a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, advising the opening of said streets.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board deem it for the public interest that One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, be legally opened, and that the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby respectfully requested to take the necessary proceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to the lands acquired for such opening of said streets.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Aye—The President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Secretary read a communication from S. F. Knapp, relative to the laying out upon the map of the City of an avenue between Eleventh avenue and Kingsbridge road, being a continuation of the present Audubon avenue.

Upon motion, consideration of this matter was laid over.

The matters of proposed approach to McCombs Dam bridge, the laying out of streets between Edgecombe and Kingsbridge roads and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, and fixing of grades of Bremer avenue and Devoe street, were, upon motion, laid over.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Board do now proceed to sign the petition to the Supreme Court for the opening of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Tenth avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas.

The President of the Department of Public Parks offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board do now proceed to sign the petition to the Supreme Court for the opening of Melrose avenue, from North Third avenue to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-third street.

Upon motion, the matters of Stebbins avenue and Brook avenue were laid over.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board deem it for the public interest that the map or plan of the City be altered, by laying out thereon a street as shown in pink color upon a certain map entitled "A map, plan and survey of the subdivision of a plot of ground belonging to Fordham Morris, Joseph H. Godwin, and Lewis G. Morris, etc.," dated February 19, 1886, and signed Henry Lett, C. E., City Surveyor, and that the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby respectfully requested to furnish this Board with five copies of said map, and also with technical description of said street.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Aye—President Department of Public Parks, President Board of Aldermen, Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That this Board deem it for the public interest that Lind avenue, from Wolf street to Devoe street, be legally opened and that the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby respectfully requested to take the necessary proceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to the land required for such opening of said street.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, June 16, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgeway, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of June 9, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of the monthly estimates of work done by the contractors during the month of May, amounting to the sum of \$360,861.67, and the certification of Vouchers 1768 to 1781 therefor to the Comptroller for payment; also of the bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1782 to 1793 now submitted, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd the said vouchers were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made no report.

The Comptroller, under date of June 12, gave notice of the issue of a warrant for a voucher not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for Westchester County, and amounting to \$4,673.46, which notice was ordered placed upon file, and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Chief Engineer made reports as follows:

1st, dated June 15. Upon cements used upon the New Aqueduct work.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the Secretary was directed to furnish to each of the Commissioners a copy of this report, and its consideration was deferred until the next meeting.

2d, dated June 14. With regard to the proposed changes in the line of the Aqueduct at Shaft Site No. 8, and recommending that the original straight line be adhered to.

The report was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, the report of the Committee on Construction of June 9 upon this subject was taken up, and the following resolution therein recommended was adopted unanimously:

Whereas, Messrs. Brown, Howard & Co., contractors, have proposed and requested that the line of the New Aqueduct at Shaft Site No. 8 be changed by the Aqueduct Commissioners in such manner that the Aqueduct may be constructed at that point principally in rock tunnel instead of an open cut; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners, after due consideration of the matter and full examination of the change of the said line as proposed, deem it inexpedient to make such change, and therefore decline to make the same, and that the Secretary furnish said Contractors with a copy of this resolution forthwith.

3d, dated June 15. Concerning inferior bricks delivered on Sections 4 and 5, and stating that all of the same had been culled out and rejected; and that the few inferior bricks which had been built into the work had now been taken out and replaced by brick of good quality.

The report was read and ordered placed on file.

4th, dated June 15. In relation to the lands upon the line of the Aqueduct, of which, in his opinion, the fee should now be acquired, and of those in which the easement now possessed is sufficient.

The report was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Barnes, was referred to the Committee on Construction for consideration and report.

5th, dated June 15. In relation to the surveys and the Engineer Corps upon the Jerome Park Reservoir and the Quaker Bridge Dam Reservoir, and giving the details of the area, capacity and proposed mode of constructing the former.

The report was read, and, as the Chief Engineer therein stated that the work upon the Jerome Park Reservoir surveys was now completed, and that Engineer Corps could be otherwise disposed of, Commissioner Dowd renewed his motion, made at the last meeting, that said Engineer Corps be disbanded.

The subject was discussed and the resolution amended, as follows:

Resolved, That the surveys and soundings for the proposed Jerome Park Reservoir having been completed, the persons in the Engineer Corps and the laborers heretofore engaged upon that work be and they are hereby suspended until required for other work and assigned thereto by the Chief Engineer and reported to this Board.

The resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of Commissioners Dowd, Baldwin, Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioner Fish. Commissioners Spencer, Barnes and Ridgway voting in the negative.

On motion of Commissioner Ridgway, that part of the aforesaid report relating to the Quaker Bridge Reservoir work and Engineer Corps was referred to the Committee on Construction.

Fordham Morris, Esq., of counsel for Joseph P. Disbrow, appeared and asked that the public hearing, closed upon the 9th inst., be reopened, so far as the same related to the property of his client in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this city.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, this request was granted, the public hearing reopened and both Mr. Morris and Mr. Disbrow were heard in opposition to the taking of Parcels 71, 72, and 73 in fee, and in relation to Mr. Disbrow's claims for compensation.

The matter was then referred to the Committee on Construction for further consideration, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the public hearing was finally closed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
