Whereas, There have appeared in recent issues of two of the daily press of this City certain specific and serious accusations against the efficiency and integrity of the officers in command of the Police force assigned to the First, Fourth, Sixth, Eighth, Fifteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Precincts, especially with respect to the protection alleged to be afforded by such officers to various parties engaged in said Precincts in the unlawful occupation of public gambling;

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be and he hereby is directed to cause a full and thorough investigation to be promptly made into the several matters alleged in the said journals; and the publishers or editors thereof are hereby called upon and requested to transmit and submit to the Superintendent, or to this Board, any and all evidence that may be in their possession, or within their reach, supporting, or in any wise tending to support, the truth of any or all the matters alleged in such cases as have been published, or that may relate to any other cases of dereliction of duty within their knowledge.

Resolved, That the Superintendent is hereby further directed, after having made such investigation and received the information above called for and requested, to immediately prefer charges against the offending officers, if, in his opinion, the evidence so obtained or received by him shall warrant, to the end that swift punishment may be meted out to those found deserving thereof; and in such case or cases as the evidence does not, in his opinion, warrant or justify the preferment of charges, he shall submit the evidence and information so in his possession to this Board for its consideration and such action as they may deem proper in the premises.
