## BUREAU OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON AQUEDUCT.

For the first time in many years the natural flow of the Croton river for the past three months, covering the entire summer season, has been sufficient to constantly supply the Aqueduct to its fullest capacity, and no drafts have been made upon the storage reservoirs and lakes. This is due to the exceptional abundance of rainfall during the summer months. The rainfall for the past three months at the stations where rain-gauges are kept by the Department, was as follows:

Under the provisions of chapter 543 of the Laws of 1885, the State Board of Health adopted certain rules and regulations to prevent or remove nuisances which tend to pollute the water along and in the vicinity of the sources and streams from which cities and towns receive their water supply. In pursuance of this act, and of the regulations, the Department has served notices in 120 cases on property-owners or residents in the Croton water-shed, for the removal or abatement of nuisances. In 9 cases these notices have been fully complied with; in 18 cases the work of removal or abatement of the nuisances has been commenced, and upon the expiration of a reasonable time all cases in which the notices and regulations are not complied with will be reported to the State Board of Health for summary action, as provided in the law.

The Bronx River conduit has supplied an average of 15,700,000 gallons of water per day, and to keep up this supply without interruption, 330,000,000 gallons of water were drawn from the Rye Ponds Reservoir. The receiving and distributing reservoir at Williamsbridge is now in full use, although some of the exterior work is not yet completed.

On account of rainy weather and heavy freshets, the work for connecting the Byram River with the Kensico Reservoir and Bronx river conduit has progressed slowly.

The regular work of care, maintenance and repairs of the Aqueduct has received due attention. No serious leaks in the structure have occurred during the quarter. The excavations in the old Central Park Reservoir, to bring it to full and even depth, have been continued.

In extending the water service into new streets and districts, 6.61 miles of water-mains have been laid, and 71 stop-cocks and 85 fire-hydrants placed.

In consequence of the rapid increase of buildings and population in the districts which receive their water supply from the high service pumping works, the demands upon the service now exceed the capacity of the pumping engines. In September the two pumping engines at the Ninety-eighth street station broke down, and during the four days which were required to make repairs, many buildings in the high service district were without water supply. I have requested the Board of Aldermen to pass the resolution now before it, for an additional pumping engine, to provide against the recurrence of similar accidents.

During the quarter 375 additional water-meters were placed, making 19,461 meters now in use.

The work of replacing water-mains contiguous to the river-front, has been steadily continued in the section bounded by West, Greenwich, Chambers, and Canal streets.

#### BUREAU OF WATER PURVEYOR.

During the quarter 3 contracts for new pavements, payable by assessment on property fronting on the streets were finished, viz.:

On the repavement of streets, where the old pavements are worn out and unfit for the requirements of street traffic, work is rapidly progressing on five large contracts, and one contract has been completed.

Under the provisions of chapter 346, Laws of 1889, appropriating \$3,000,000 for the repavement of streets in this city, and limiting the expenditure to \$1,000,000 per year, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted August 19 and 29, respectively, authorized the following repavements:

#### With Asphalt on Concrete Foundation.

With Asphalt on Concrete Foundation, or Upon the Present Stone-block Pavement (in the Discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works).

Lexington avenue, between Twenty-first and Thirty-second streets, and between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-ninth streets.

As soon as these repavements were authorized, this Department proceeded to make the necessary surveys, plans and estimates, and to prepare the forms of contracts and specifications for advertising the several works for public letting. The bids for all the granite-block pavements were received and opened on the 3d instant, and the bids for the asphalt pavement on Park avenue were received and opened on the 14th instant. All the other repavements authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will be given out by public letting and put under contract as speedily as possible.

In the repairs of pavements an average force of 168 mechanics, 229 laborers, 68 carts and 4 double trucks has been employed during the quarter, and this repair force relaid 95,767 square yards of pavement. In addition to this, 49,174 square yards of pavements were relaid under contracts in 21 different streets enumerated in the Water Purveyor's report hereto annexed.

The operations of private corporations and individuals which involve excavations in the public streets are summarized as follows:

5,353 excavations made for repairing underground structures, and making and repairing house connections with sewers, water-mains, gas-mains, etc.

19.33 miles of gas-mains laid.

4.63 miles of electric subways laid.

1,218 lineal feet of steam-pipes laid.

2,154 notices issued by the Department to repair defective pavements.

1,950 defects in pavements repaired in compliance with notices.

#### OFFICE OF ENGINEER IN CHARGE OF SEWERS.

During the quarter 19 contracts for the construction of sewers and five contracts for the construction of receiving-basins were completed, covering 6,987 lineal feet of new sewers and 11

At the close of the quarter work was in progress on 29 contracts for new sewers and 6 contracts for repairs to sewers.

The sewerage system on Manhattan Island now includes 432.42 miles of sewers, with 5,190 receiving-basins. The following is a summary of the work done in repairing and cleaning sewers:

848 receiving-basins and culverts cleaned. 13,895 lineal feet of sewers cleaned.

45 lineal feet of sewers repaired or rebuilt.

40 lineal feet of box-sewer built.

184 lineal feet of culvert built.

32 lineal fest of culvert repaired or rebuilt.

123 lineal feet of spur-pipe laid.

17 receiving-basins repaired.

23 new basin-heads furnished and placed.

30 new basin-covers furnished and placed.

55 new manhole-heads furnished and placed.

106 new manhole-covers furnished and placed.

82 manhole-heads reset.

4 basin-heads reset.

2 manholes repaired.

I manhole rebuilt.

2,462 cubic yards of earth excavated and refilled.

2,430 cart-loads of sewer deposits removed.

## BUREAU OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

During the quarter 7 contracts for regulating and grading streets, 17 contracts for flagging sidewalks and I contract for fencing vacant lots were completed, and, at the close of the quarter, work was in progress on 22 contracts for regulating and grading streets and flagging sidewalks.

The following are the aggregate quantities of work done under the several contracts:

13,022 lineal feet of curb-stones set.

1,700 cubic yards retaining-walls built.

513 lineal feet picket sence built.

All the foregoing work is paid for by assessment on property benefited.

In the care and repairs of sidewalks in front of city property, provided for by annual appropriation, the following work was done:

676 lineal feet curb-stones set.

325 lineal feet curb-stones reset.

8,869 square feet flagging laid.

1,682 square feet flagging relaid.

## BUREAU OF STREETS AND ROADS.

The care and repairs of macadam roadways and unpaved streets under the charge of this Bureau have received due attention to the extent of the means appropriated for the purpose.

The following is a summary of the principal items of work done on the macadam roadways:

23 miles of roadways cleaned.

107,775 square yards of roadways repaired. 365 square feet bridge-stones reset.

7,153 square feet sidewalks repaired.

165 lineal feet curb-stones reset.

18 sewer connections repaired. 1,090 shade-trees cultivated.

3,664 cart-loads of dirt and stone removed.

On the unpaved streets the following work was done:

51/2 miles of roadways regraded.

40 lineal feet of stone drains built.

lineal feet curb-stones reset. 200

square yards of roadways surfaced with broken stone.

The frequent and heavy rains during the quarter have caused an unusual amount of damage to unpaved streets, calling for extra labor and expense for repairs.

#### BUREAU OF LAMPS AND GAS.

The following changes were made in the public lamps during the quarter:

412 new gas-lamps placed and lighted.

96 old gas-lamps relighted.

152 electric-lamps relighted.

626 gas-lamps discontinued.

At the close of the quarter, there were 23,603 gas-lamps, 1,340 electric-lamps, and 120 naphthalamps in use on the streets, parks, places, docks and bridges of the city.

Upon awards made by the Gas Commission, after public letting, contracts have been made with five electric-light companies for furnishing electric-lights, from August 1, 1889, to April 30, 1890, at prices ranging from 23 cents to 50 cents per night for each lamp.

#### BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

The report of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, Document K, hereto annexed, gives, in detail, the repairs and alterations made in the public buildings and offices under the charge of this Department, and I mention in this report the following principal items:

Introduction of steam into the New Court-house for heating the building and operating the passenger elevators, under a contract made with the New York Steam Company, and introduction into the building of the system of the Metropolitan Electric Service Company for the automatic regulation of heat; construction of two passenger elevators in place of the old cumbrous and slow elevator.

Completing the work under the contract for rebuilding the flank walls and resetting the bluestone steps of the plaza in front of the City Hall. The work under the contract for new marble steps and new tiling in the portico of the City Hall is nearly finished.

The Fifth District Civil Court Building in Clinton street is undergoing extensive alterations and improvements, and while these are in progress, temporary rooms for the Court have been provided and fitted up at No. 21 Suffolk street.

The roof of the County Jail has been thoroughly repaired.

A contract for extensive repairs and improvements on the Catherine Market buildings has been entered into and the work is now in progress.

#### Public Baths.

During the quarter 13 free floating baths have been in use along the water-front, and at the close of the quarter an additional bath was placed at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Harlem river. A second additional bath has been completed and will be brought into use at the beginning of the bathing season of next year. The total attendance at all the baths during the three months was 1,864,720 males, and 590,902 females.

#### BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

The operations of this Bureau for the three months are summarized as follows:

1,401 complaints of obstructions received and attended to.

1,077 seizures and removals of obstructions made.

2,176 permits issued to place building materials on streets.

16 permits issued to cut down shade-trees.

269 miscellaneous permits issued.

137 notices issued to repair defective sidewalks.

5 notices issued to repair defective vault covers. 1,144 cart-loads of stone and refuse material removed from streets.

151 dangerous shade-trees, stumps, etc., removed from sidewalks.

342 telegraph-poles removed.

#### BRONX RIVER SUPPLY.

The reports of the Commissioners to appraise damages on the Bronx river, between Bronxville and Woodlawn, have been approved by the Supreme Court. The Commissioners appointed to appraise damages on the Bronx river, in Westchester County, between Woodlawn and Williamsbridge, have held regular meetings.

The work on the Williamsbridge Reservoir is progressing slowly.

The conduit, reservoirs, roads, embankments, ditches, etc., have been kept in order, and the drains to control the change of drainage around the Williamsbridge Reservoir have been carried on as fast as propried by

as fast as practicable.

The conduit has uninterruptedly furnished during the quarter 1,445,000,000 gallons of water. 330,000,000 gallons have been drawn from Rye Ponds Reservoir. Kensico Reservoir is full.

The work on the Byram river connection has progressed slowly on account of the heavy freshets and bad weather.

The maintenance of the several Divisions has been continued as usual during the past quarter; care of surface of Aqueduct gate-houses, machinery and grounds, watching and attending leaks, cutting grass, building and repairing fences.

The particular work on each Division has been as follows:

First Division—Care of dam, gate-houses and grounds; patrolling vicinity of same; removing vegetable growth from lake; cleaning shore of same; cutting brush on islands in lake and along line of Aqueduct; replanking bridge at dam; repairing leaks.

Third Division—Rebuilding portion of retaining-wall on Kingsland's bank and on arch bank and part of stone wall at arch over Broadway; pointing joints at arch over Broadway; repairing gutters; building and repairing fences; attending Aspinwall leak; repainting woodwork on first floor of Keeper's house; the entire line has been cut, cleaned and cleared of grass, weeds, etc.

Fourth Division—Cutting grass; repairing and cleaning banks; repairing crosswalks; cleaning drains; attending leaks; building and repairing fences.

A resolution for authority to place additional pumps at Ninety-eighth street was introduced in the Board of Aldermen in January, 1889, but has not as yet been passed.

Until the completion of the New Aqueduct every means possible should be taken to stop waste.

SIR-Herein I submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the

quarter ending September 30, 1889.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amounts expended for gas to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for fitting-up, lighting and maintenance of the

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amounts expended for gas to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for fitting-up, lighting and maintenance of the public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas and Electric Lighting," showing an expenditure during the quarter of one hundred and fifty-eight thousand three hundred and two dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$158,302.38), with liabilities amounting to eighty-one thousand two hundred and eighty-eight dollars and ninety-three cents (\$81,288.93), leaving an available balance of one hundred and eighty-four thousand nine hundred and sixty-two dollars and forty-five cents (\$184,962.45).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas and Electric Lighting—Salaries," showing an expenditure during the quarter of thirteen hundred and seventy-four dollars and ninety-six cents (\$1,374.96), leaving an available balance of nineteen hundred and fifty-eight dollars and forty-seven cents (\$1,958.47).

Exhibit "D" is a summary of the "Lamp Account," showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric-light company during the quarter; a total of four hundred and twelve new gas-lamps having been fitted-up and lighted, ninety-six gas-lamps relighted, one hundred and fifty-two electric-lamps relighted, six hundred and twenty-six gas lamps discontinued and one electric-lamp di-continued. The net increase of public lamps during the quarter was thirty-three.

Exhibit "E" is a statement showing the lowest, highest and average illuminating power of the gases supplied to the City by the several gas companies within reach of our photometric stations.

## Document "K."

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS—BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES, SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE, No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, ROOM 15, NEW YORK, October 3, 1889.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR-In compliance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1889. Among the principal items of work done by the Bureau were the following:

A contract was made with the New York Steam Company to introduce steam from their street mains to the boiler-room of the above building and supply the necessary valves and return pipes. This work has been completed and connections made between the meter and the steam-heating apparatus and pumps, and the connections made in such a manner that should it be necessary the old boiler can be brought into use without delay.

A contract was made with the Metropolitan Electric Service Company to remodel the steam-heating apparatus and for the automatic regulation of the heat, and the introduction of an airmoistening device. This work is now nearly completed, and was ordered in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor February 26, 1889.

One of the four horizontal steam-engines in the basement was dismantled, cleaned, repaired and rebuilt, and is now in excellent condition.

The two passenger elevators, built to replace the old one, have been completed and furnished with electrical annunciators and are now running satisfactorily.

Supreme Court—The walls and ceilings in the General Term room and ante-room adjoining have been washed off, plastering repaired, ceilings calcimined, cornices and mouldings tinted, walls painted, hardwood cleaned and varnished, and a dado five feet high painted and grained around the court-room.

In the Special Term room the plastering has been repaired, ceiling calcimined.

In the Special Term room the plastering has been repaired, ceiling calcimined, cornices tinted, walls painted, hardwood cleaned and varnished, and the dado touched up and varnished.

Court of Common Pleas—In the Special Term room the plastering has been repaired and the walls touched up where the paint had been removed.

County Clerk's Office—A new record-room has been set apart for use of the office in the west end of the building and fitted up with the necessary shelving.

The Sheriff's Office—The partitions have been taken down and altered and some new partitions put up, the plumbing overhauled, new closets and wash-basins put in, and the waste-pipes properly ventilated. In the Order of Arrest Clerk's office the walls have been painted, ceiling calcimined, hardwood cleaned and varnished and radiator bronzed. In the main office the walls have been repaired and touched up, and the toilet-room has been painted and calcimined and a new window put in. window put in.

The ceiling of the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen has been repaired and the mouldings and ornaments painted and tinted to match the old work. In the Reporter's room the plastering has been repaired, ceiling calcumined, walls painted and radiators bronzed.

City Court—New curtains, lambrequins and window shades have been placed on the windows of the Judges' room, new carpet and linoleum laid, desk rugs and door mats furnished, oak desks and arm-chairs, rotary book racks and an oak office table furnished, and electric bells with battery connections and annunicators put in to connect the Judges' desks with the Clerk's office.

The contract for rebuilding the flank walls and setting the blue-stone steps of the plaza in the front of the City Hall has been completed and the iron railing for the same has been altered, repaired and reset.

paired and reset. The work of setting the marble steps and retiling the portico is nearly finished and new sills have been put in four of the vestibule doors and the tiling repaired.

A contract has been made for the repaying of the plaza with concrete blocks and the work is proceeding satisfactorily.

This will complete the improvements in front of the building, and will add to its fine

appearance.

## THE BROWN-STONE BUILDING.

The steam-pumps have been thoroughly overhauled and repaired and are now in good working order. The hot-air furnaces have been cleaned and repaired, new castings and smoke pipe furnished where needed, the chimney flues cleaned and two new galvanized iron tops put on the same, and the chimney flashed

and the chimneys flashed.

The skylights have been overhauled and new sash put in to replace those worn out.

General Sessions, in Part II.—The plastering has been repaired, ceiling calcimined, walls painted, grained work touched up, seats grained and varnished, and the hardwood work cleaned and varnished.

A new oak book rack, about 13 feet long, has been put on the second floor, and two book racks, each 9 feet long, have been placed under the desks on the same floor, and a new black-walnut top put on the table in the office, and some repairs made to the plumbing.

## NO. 31 CHAMBERS STREET.

The elevator has been overhauled, the guide springs adjusted, new governor brasses and haul and governor ropes put in and the shipper work renewed. A new iron wire railing with ash top rail and gate has been put up in the Water Register's office.

The Commissioners' room has been cleaned, walls papered, ceiling calcimined and decorated, a new grate and fender has been set, an enameled tile hearth laid, and a new chandelier put up. In the office of the Chief Clerk a new carpet has been laid and a desk rug furnished.

## STEWART BUILDING.

A new Herring safe has been furnished for use of the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue, and alterations made to the desks and partitions in the office of the Receiver of Taxes, and a telephone closet built in the office of the City Paymaster.

## STAATS ZEITUNG BUILDING.

Corporation Counsel's Office—A white-pine paneled glass partition has been put up in Room No. 5, third floor, and the same painted in parti-color, and the walls and ceilings in Rooms Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 have been repaired, painted and calcimined and touched up where necessary.

The pigeon-holes and cases have been removed from Room No. 3 and put up in Room No. 4, fourth floor. The bookcases and shelving in the Library have been taken down and put up in Room No. 3, and additional shelving furnished and put up, and about 200 pigeon-holes put up in the record-room.

## THE COURTS-POLICE AND CIVIL.

First District Police Court-A platform and desk with iron railing was put up in the Examina-

Court of Special Sessions—The tin roof over the Court-room has been repaired and painted.

Third District Police Court—The slate roof has been repaired, the gutters relined and painted and heavy wire basket-strainers put in the leader-pipes.

First District Civil Court—Repairs have been made to the roof and gutters, and the new work

painted with metallic paint.

Second District Civil Court—The glass paneled partition in the Judge's room has been extended; an electrical bell, with the necessary fixtures and connections, has been placed in office and connected with the Judge's Bench, window awnings put up and some furniture and law books

Fifth District Civil Court—Temporary quarters were provided for the use of the Court at No. 21 Suffolk street, and a platform desk and railing put up and the furniture and papers removed there from the old Court-house, while the work on the addition and alterations to the building were

in progress. When completed, this Court will be one of the best arranged in the city, and will fill a want long felt in the judicial district.

Seventh District Court-house—Repairs have been made to the tin roof, the flashings pointed with professional and the city and the city and will be completed.

with roofing cement, and the roof made weather-tight.

#### THE COUNTY JAIL.

The tin roof has been repaired and painted and the flashings and coping pointed up with roofing cement. The flues from the kitchen, reception and Warden's rooms have been cleaned; a galvanized iron top put on the kitchen flue, and the range repaired. The plastering on the first floor has been repaired, the ceilings calcimined, wall painted, the woodwork grained and varnished, hardwood cleaned and varnished and the front door painted.

On the second floor the corridors and cells have been cleaned and whitewashed with lump-lime.

#### THE MARKETS.

Washington Market—Repairs have been made to the roof over stands Nos. 120 and 319, and a galvanized iron sash put in skylight over stands Nos. 329 and 330, and some new leader-pipe put up, and old pipe repaired.

West Washington Market—The roofs over stands Nos. 28 and 29. Thirteenth avenue, No. 59
Thompson avenue, and Nos. 1, 2 and 3 West street have been repaired, and the leaders put in order.
Fulton Market—The iron awning on the corner of Fulton and Front streets has been repaired, and the skylights reglazed, and the entire awning painted. A new door, with a good lock, has been hung at the entrance to the roof, and new drain-pipes laid to connect the market with the new sewer now building in South street, and the plumbing put in good order.

Clinton Market—A new metallic skylight has been placed over stand No. 12 and the roof repaired over stands Nos. 35, 37, 135, 137, 139 and 140 and the new tin work painted with metallic paint. The flooring in front of stands Nos. 121 and 124 has been taken up and a new yellow-pine floor laid, and the market doors repaired where needed.

Catharine Market—Specifications were prepared and a contract made for the repairs required to the market. The work provided for includes the putting up of new siding on Catharine, Cherry and Front streets, with new doors and windows, iron wire-guards on all the windows and doors, repairs and painting of the fin roofs and leaders and the painting of the market buildings inside and outside. The work is now under way and is proceeding rapidly.

Farmers' Hotel (Gansevoort Market)—The old gravel roof has been taken off and a new fourply felt and gravel roof, with IX tin flashings laid, the coping reset and pointed up, and the chimneys repaired and a galvanized iron top placed on the kitchen flue.

Second Battery—The new company rooms have been finished in accordance with the plan and specifications for the same and give general satisfaction.

Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory—Two sets of grate-bars have been put in the boiler furnaces. Two white-pine paneled partitions have been put in the Adjutant's and Armorer's rooms and the rooms painted and calcimined. The window frames and sashes have been repaired and new stop beads, parting strips and cords put in where required. A case of pigeon-holes has been put up in the Quartermaster's room. The gun-rack, Company "F's" room, has been repaired, and the lockers in the room of Company "K" have been overhauled and furnished with new locks and master keys.

In addition to the foregoing, I desire to call your attention to the work done by the carpenters in the employ of the Bureau. During the last quarter they completed and put up several hundred feet of shelving and pigeon-holes in the County Clerk's office, besides attending to the numerous calls made for small repairs in the several buildings in care of the Department. These have been sufficient to keep them steadily employed.

The repairing of the furniture in the various offices requires constant attention, and forms a

considerable portion of the work of the Bureau.

The stoves in the various courts, offices and armories have been repaired, and are being put up

### FREE FLOATING BATHS.

During the past quarter 14 baths have been open to the public free of charge. The attendance has been large, and it is satisfactory to be able to report that no accident has caused an injury to any one of the bathers who have frequented the baths.

The order requiring men and boys over fifteen years of age to furnish themselves with suitable bathing dresses has been enforced without difficulty.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Comptroller's Office, at 2 o'clock P. M., on Friday, November 8, 1889.

Present-Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; and Richard Croker, Chamberlain.

Absent -Walton Storm, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen. The minutes of the meeting held October 21, 1889, were read and approved.

The Mayor stated that there was a matter of considerable importance which he wished to bring before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund-an application from the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company, addressed to him, as Mayor, to change their motor power. He said that while the law did not confer on the Sinking Fund Commissioners the authority to grant the privilege asked for by the railroad company, he had great confidence in their judgment, and thought that this was a matter that ought to be considered by the Board. Technically, perhaps,

this Board would have no business with it, but he would like to submit it for consideration. The communication was then read, as follows:

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, etc. :

NEW YORK, October 16, 1889.

DEAR SIR—The Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company is now prepared to undertake a change of motor power upon its line between South Ferry and Central Park, from horse power to cable, provided the public authorities charged by law with the duty of determining such questions choose that it shall be done.

The law as it stands upon the statute books seems to vest this authority in the Railroad Commissioners, but we understand that the City Government questions the validity of that law and takes the position that the local authorities of the city alone have jurisdiction of the subject.

We think that the proposed change will be a great public benefit and will be beneficial to us only because it will furnish better means of travel to the public. We wish to prosecute the work not in opposition to any duly constituted authority, but in harmony with the public interest, and we have no question of receiving the hearty assent and co-operation of all public officers charged with any duty in the premises whenever the subject is fairly presented to them.

Independently of any legal question, we wish in the first instance to obtain the assent and co-operation of the City Government, and we respectfully ask an opportunity to lay before you, or such local authority as you may designate, our plans for the proposed change in order that the consent of the local authorities may be obtained upon any reasonable modifications, restrictions or conditions that may be deemed necessary for the interest of the City.

that may be deemed necessary for the interest of the City.

I am authorized to make this application as counsel for the Broadway and Seventh Avenue

Railroad Company, the South Ferry Railroad Company, and the owner of the track and franchises formerly of the Broadway Surface Railroad Company.

Very respectfully, ELIHU ROOT.

The Mayor further stated that he would like the Board to give the railroad company the opportunity to appear before it for a public hearing, and suggested that Mr. Root, the counsel of the company, be notified to attend. These gentlemen have shown a disposition to be fair, and he thought the City authorities should show a similar disposition toward them.

It was ordered that the railroad company should have a hearing at the Mayor's office, on Monday, the 11th instant, at 11 o'clock A.M., and that the Counsel to the Corporation also be requested to attend. In the meantime, the Mayor hoped that the members of the Board would think of this matter seriously. The Secretary was directed to notify Mr. Root and the Counsel to the Corporation accordingly.

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, transmitting a report of Messrs. Thom, Wilson & Schaarschmidt, architects of the Criminal Court Building, relative to the driving of test piles to ascertain the nature of the ground at the site for the foundation, as follows:

ARCHITECTS' REPORT, CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

Office of Thom, Wilson & Schaarschmidt, Architects, No. 1267 Broadway, New York, November 4, 1889.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Commissioner of Public Works, City of New York:

DEAR SIR—In compliance with your request of October 31st ultimo, the undersigned would respectfully submit the following report as to the result of driving the five (5) test piles on the new Criminal Court building site, bounded by Centre, Elm, Franklin and White streets, under the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 30, 1889.

After a careful examination of the old maps and surveys in possession of the Finance Department we selected from them such places, within the lines of the building, as in our judgment would be the deepest and most dangerous. Said places were accurately surveyed and staked out on the building site by Mr. G. A. Wheeler, who was appointed by you for such purposes.

The subjoined map and outline of building show the correct location of the places selected, as well as the piles driven.

well as the piles driven.

Excavations about eight (8) feet square and ten (10) feet deep were made for each of the five Water was found at a depth of about eight (8) feet below the surface. The water was pumped

out of the excavations, and the earth removed to a depth of ten (10) feet.

We do not, however, believe that this was the natural level of the water, there being so much

open space that all rain and surface water naturally drained into the excavations.

The nature of the earth removed from the several excavations would indicate that the subsoil is of a sandy or gravelly nature, and not mud, as was expected.

By reference to the subjoined map, the piles will be found numbered 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. No 1 pile is forty (40) feet long and twelve (12) inches at the butt end, and was driven its full length. Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5 are each forty-three (43) feet long, and are driven to an average depth of twenty-five (25) feet, all the above depths being from the bottom of the excavations.

It is impossible to calculate the exact penetration of pile No. 1, as a follower had to be used, which somewhat diminished the force of the hammer.

The penetration of pile No. 2 was one upch on last blow of hammer falling twenty (20) feet.

The penetration of pile No. 2 was one inch on last blow of hammer falling twenty (20) feet; weight of hammer, 1,600 pounds.


The penetration of pile No. 3, was one and one-half inches on two last blows; fall of hammer twenty (20) feet.

The penetration of piles Nos. 4 and 5, being a more severe test than would be required, was less than one inch in the last five blows, the hammer falling twenty-five (25) feet.

From the results of the above tests, we do not hesitate to say that a perfectly safe foundation can be constructed for the proposed building.

Mr. Wilson, of the firm of Wilson, Thom & Schaarschmidt, architects, appeared before the Board. He stated in reply to a question asked by the Mayor, that he would have the plans of the Criminal Court-house Building completed and ready about the first week in December, or on the first of December. He said that his firm would be responsible for the foundation of the building, and that he was better satisfied with the bottom since the driving of the test piles than before. In answer to an inquiry of the Mayor, "Do you find the bottom as good as you expected?" he said it was "better."

The question was asked, "How long would it take to construct the building?" to which Mr.

Wilson replied, "About two years."

Provisions for ventilating the building and lighting it with electric lights were discussed, and

Provisions for ventilating the building and lighting it with electric lights were discussed, and arrangements for these objects referred to the architects. The forms of specifications and proposals for the construction of the building, whether under separate contracts for the different classes of work, or as a whole, were also considered, and the architect directed to draw the specifications, with reference to either method that might be adopted subsequently, the time for erecting and finishing the building to be fixed in the contract.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution to authorize the issue of bonds to pay for preliminary expenses of the Criminal Court Building already incurred and to be incurred:

Whereas, A resolution was adopted on March 30, 1889, authorizing the Committee thereby appointed to consider the matter of erecting a building for criminal courts and other purposes and advertise for plans and specifications for said building to be submitted by architects; and

Whereas, "Notices to Architects" were accordingly published in certain newspapers;

Sir—The fifteen free floating baths owned by the City are about to be placed in winter quarters, and after receiving proposals for their storage, I have come to the conclusion that the proposal of Mr. John Gilbertson to store the baths in Gowanus Bay at the foot of Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, South Brooklyn, for the price of seventy cents per day, for each bath, is the most advantageous, it being the lowest proposal received. A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paying, repaying or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaying or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaying or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN 1HAI in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed lune 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collect ing water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meter are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Burean against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, he returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laundries shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars ver annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

Photograph Galleries shall be charged an annual rate of trom five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Printing Offices, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Soda, Minnral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of the dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fitteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fitteen, the sum of seven dollars per annum is for each exceeding ten, and not over fitteen, the sum of seven dollars per fitteen the cromatic per annum of the dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meiers, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, terry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meier.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ET

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot ne permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. Al licenses or permit must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urmals must not be left running under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

N UMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and universalization to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through

Ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
