

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help to erect transparencies advertising their fair, on lamp-posts, northeast corner of Filty-ninth street and Third avenue, southeast corner of Sixty-first street and Third ave-nue, southeast corner Sixty-first street and Second avenue, and southeast corner Sixty-first street and First avenue; also, on lamp-posts in front of the church on Sixty-first street, between First and Second avenues. The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said of shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly. The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act : When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in front of or adjucent to said lot or lots, except one assess-ment for such paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjucent to said lot or lots, except one assess-ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter. No street or avenue within the limits of such grants

Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to thereafter. No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repayed or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repayed or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the payement, repayement or repairs.

A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water. 3th. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modity, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for worter shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shalt become a charge and lien whon the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, *lut no charge what-tever shall be mode against any building in which a* water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as pro-wided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be mode against one the space for works is hereig authorized to prescribe a penally not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any wildition of the reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the forcention of the waste of waster; such times shall be added to the regular twater rents." The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and tor each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged. METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. - WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sever connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urnal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sever shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
 WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.
 For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet no before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars
 For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aque-duct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawnat each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars. Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement). Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons. All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner Public Works

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *prevent all waste*

of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe per-mitted. No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. Al licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Tays at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Tountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, cating-salons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of hose, will not be allowed. The penalty for a vulation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, will be by order, and if not paid when imposed will be force a line on the preceding runsistomer of Public Works.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises.

out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that in all further applications for reduction of water for occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
