

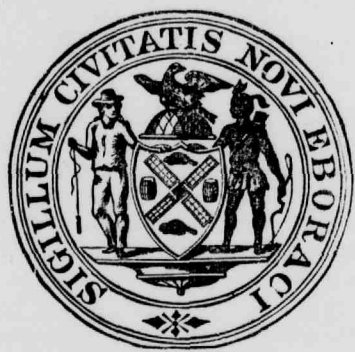

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
New York, August 30, 1879.

The Comptroller of the City of New York herewith publishes a statement of the financial business of the Corporation during the year ending on the first day of August, 1879, in pursuance of the provisions of law contained in section 108 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as follows, to wit:

"Section 108. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to publish in the CITY RECORD, two months before the election of Charter officers, a full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Corporation during the year ending on the first day of the month in which such publication is made, and the cash balance or surplus; and in every such statement the different sources of city revenue, and the amount received from each; the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of moneys expended under each; the moneys borrowed on the credit of the Corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained, shall be clearly and particularly specified."

Below is a summary of the operations of the City Treasury and of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," and "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," showing the total Receipts from all sources, and Disbursements on all accounts, during the year ending August 1, 1879, and the cash balances at the beginning and end of the year. Appended is "A full and detailed statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Corporation," for the same period, together with Schedules "A," "B," and "C," containing particulars relative to the finances of the city, required by the foregoing statute.

CITY DEBT.

The following tabular statement exhibits the amount of the bonded debt of the city, of all descriptions, as it stood on August 1, 1879, and also on August 1, 1878. The amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt at the same dates is also stated. The bonds of the corporation are classified in this table numerically, according to the provisions of the laws for their payment under the authority of which they were severally issued. Revenue Bonds form a distinct class of short-time obligations, which are issued from time to time in anticipation of the collection of taxes, to provide for current expenses and carry on the business of the city. They are constantly fluctuating in amount, and the means of payment are secured by the annual taxes.

NOTE.—The Bonded Debt of the annexed territory, including \$6,500 in dispute as to its legality, amounted to \$1,036,614.08 on August 1, 1879.

The above table shows a decrease in the Bonded Debt and an increase in the Sinking Fund during the year ending August 1, 1879. The increase and decrease in each class of bonds is also shown by a comparison of the respective amounts outstanding on August 1, 1878, and August 1, 1879.

DECREASE IN THE BONDED DEBT.

The decrease in the net amount of the Bonded Debt, exclusive of Revenue Bonds, in the year ending August 1, 1879, is \$4,132,344.90.

Schedule I., annexed, exhibits the amount of the Bonded Debt of all classes, and of the Sinking Fund, at the close of each year, from 1870 to 1878, inclusive.

REFUNDING THE BONDED DEBT.

Under the provisions of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, for refunding the Bonded Debt, Assessment Bonds amounting to \$6,900,000 were refunded last October in "Consolidated Stock of the City of New York," five per cent. bonds, the whole amount being taken in one lot at a premium of 5.28. This issue of bonds is shown in Class No. 4 of the above Bonded Debt statement on August 1, 1879, making a corresponding reduction in the amount of Class No. 5, or Assessment Bonds, a part of which class was paid from collections of assessments and canceled.

BONDS PAYABLE FROM TAXATION.

Bonds payable from taxation, embraced in Class No. 1 of the above Bonded Debt statement, falling due and payable in 1879, amounted to \$4,443,774.48. The laws authorizing their issue required the whole amount to be raised by taxation this year, but under the act of 1878 the sum of \$1,000,000, only, was included on this account in the final estimate for 1879, the remainder being paid from the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund, making a decrease of \$3,443,774.48 in the amount of taxes which would otherwise have to be raised in 1879. A portion of the bonds payable from taxation in 1879, the payment of which has been thus provided for, became due and payable on May 1, 1879, and a portion will be due on November 1, 1879. It will be observed that the amount of this class of bonds was \$3,596,074.48 less on August 1, 1879, than it was on August 1, 1878, in the above table.

REVENUE BONDS.

As taxes are not levied until the latter part of the year, the Annual Appropriations are provided for and the business of the city government is carried on by the issue of Revenue Bonds, for short periods, in anticipation of taxes. When collections are made of taxes against which the Revenue Bonds are issued they are paid off. All Revenue Bonds issued prior to 1877, in anticipation of the annual taxes, have been paid off and canceled.

It will be seen by reference to the above table of the Bonded Debt, that payments of Revenue Bonds of 1877 outstanding on August 1, 1878, have since been made amounting to \$1,740,000; that payments of Revenue Bonds of 1878, issued prior to August 1 of that year, have been made amounting to \$13,198,775; and that the amount of Revenue Bonds of 1879, issued prior to August 1, 1879, was \$16,252,300.

SINKING FUND INVESTMENTS.

The investments of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt consist of Stocks and Bonds of the City and County of New York, the Commissioners being required, by section 7 of the Ordinance of the Common Council creating the Sinking Fund, "to give preference to the purchase of City Stock, if the same can be procured at a reasonable rate," no other purchase being permitted, except stocks of the State of New York and the United States.

The amount of City Stocks and Bonds held by the Commissioners at the close of business on the 31st day of July, 1879, was \$32,021,240.03, which, with the cash balance in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, \$114,290.55, makes the total amount standing to its credit in the statement of the Bonded Debt on that date, to wit, \$32,135,530.58.

A list of Stocks and Bonds held as Investments in the Sinking Fund is given in Schedule IV.

BRIDGE BONDS.

In conformity with the decision of the Court of Appeals, made in March last, confirming the order of mandamus of the Supreme Court directing the Comptroller to meet the requisitions for \$1,000,000, made upon the Mayor and Comptroller by the Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have since authorized the issue of Bridge Bonds for \$600,000, which amount has been paid to the Trustees.

The act of 1875 appropriated \$8,000,000 for the "completion of the bridge," to be paid "in the proportion of two third parts by the City of Brooklyn, and one third part by the City of New York." It provides also that "all interest on the bonds issued by them under this act, and the sums required to pay such interest," shall be withheld by the Comptrollers of both cities from the payments made to the Trustees.

Bonds have been issued under this act by the City of New York, amounting, as above stated, to \$2,100,000, leaving a balance of \$566,666.66, from which sum interest on the bonds issued is to be paid until the completion of the bridge, as provided by the act of 1875.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1879.

The appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for State taxes, for payment of principal and interest of the city debt, and for the expenses of the city government for the year 1879, amount in all to \$30,007,097.20, shown in detail in Schedule VII., annexed, against \$30,104,077.12 for the year 1878. Reference is made to Schedule VII. for a comparative statement of appropriations for each year from 1876 to 1879, inclusive, together with the amounts deducted from the appropriations for revenues of the General Fund to reduce taxation, and the amounts added to supply deficiencies in the actual product of taxes levied. In addition to the appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, embraced in the final estimate for 1879, adopted December 31, 1878, there will be required to be added by the Board of Supervisors a sum amounting, as estimated, to about \$240,000, for appropriations made under special acts passed at the last session of the Legislature, for the purpose of enlarging and extending the supply of pure water to the city, and especially in the new wards, and for other purposes.

VALUATIONS.

The aggregate assessed valuations of property subject to taxation in the City and County of New York for the year 1879, as returned to the Board of Supervisors by the Commissioners of Taxes, is \$1,094,069,335. The valuation of real estate is \$918,134,380, and of personal estate \$175,934,955, a total net decrease of \$4,318,440 on the valuations for the year 1878.

A comparative statement of valuations of real estate in each ward in the city, and of the personal estate of residents and non-residents and shareholders of banks as assessed for the years 1878 and 1879, is contained in Schedule "VI.," annexed, showing the increase and decrease in each ward, and in personal property of each class, and the total net decrease.

The assessed valuations of real and personal estate, the rate of tax, and the amount of taxes in each year from 1870 to 1879, inclusive, is shown in Schedule V., annexed, estimated for 1879.

TAXES.

The tax levy for 1879 is not confirmed by the Board of Supervisors at the date of this statement, and the amount of taxes that will be imposed and levied cannot be exactly determined. It will, however, slightly exceed the total amount of taxes in 1878, on account of the additional appropriations made by the Legislature. The rate of tax will also be a small fraction more than in 1878, for the same reason, as well as because the net amount of the assessed valuations of property is \$4,318,440 less than the valuations in 1878. The rate of tax for 1879 is estimated at 2.58 per cent., against 2.55 per cent. in 1878.

ARREARS OF TAXES ON REAL ESTATE AND OF CROTON-WATER RENTS.

The Taxes on Real Estate for 1878, and all previous years, and Croton-water Rents for 1877, and all previous years, remaining unpaid on August 1, 1879, amounted in the aggregate to \$9,644,128.90—the Arrears of Taxes being \$9,514,102.41, and of Croton-water Rents, \$130,026.49.

The amount of Arrears of Taxes and of Croton-water Rents for each year, from 1869, inclusive, and prior to that year, is shown in Schedule IX., annexed.

Taxes on Real Estate and Croton-water Rents are liens on the property.

ARREARS OF PERSONAL TAXES.

Personal Taxes remaining unpaid, and carried on the Books of the Department since 1852, aggregate a large amount. Only a very small fraction of these taxes that were imposed and levied within a few years past, and none of former years, can ever be collected. They are, in fact, an actual loss to the City Treasury, a loss aggravated by the fact that while the City really loses Personal Taxes in arrears, the State gains the amount of State Tax paid upon the valuations of personal property, on which such taxes were levied. The total amount of Personal Taxes remaining unpaid and accumulated from 1852, on August 1, 1879, was \$11,631,027.91.

The amount of arrears of Personal Taxes for each year is stated in Schedule X., annexed.

UNPAID ASSESSMENTS.

The balance of Assessments for local improvements remaining uncollected in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, on August 1, 1879, was \$1,208,211.79, and the amount of Arrears of Assessments in the Bureau of Arrears was \$9,419,325.78, making a total of unpaid Assessments on that date of \$10,627,537.57.

No Tax Sales have been made since 1874, nor sales for Arrears of Assessments since 1875, on account of acts of the Legislature extending the time of payments of arrears.

SALES OF CITY PROPERTY.

During the last year, sales of real estate belonging to the city, and not used or needed for public purposes, have been made under the authority of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. A part of the property consisted of vacant and unimproved lots in the upper part of the city, and a part of improved business locations in the lower part of the city. The prices obtained were considered very satisfactory for the public interests, and favorable to the policy of selling the real estate belonging to the city not required for public purposes. The sales amounted in all to the sum of \$301,800, of which the cash received and paid into the City Treasury, to the credit of the Sinking Fund, was \$190,537.50; mortgages were given for \$80,205, and amount not closed on August 1, 1879, was \$31,057.50.

MORTGAGES.

Mortgages held by the Corporation on property sold by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amounted on August 1, 1879, to \$537,477. The interest on mortgages, when collected, is paid into "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt;" and when the mortgages are paid off the proceeds are paid into "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," the same as the amount paid on account of the purchase of city property, and until this is done the amount due to the city on mortgages does not appear to the credit of the Sinking Fund.

CONTENTS OF SCHEDULES.

The annexed Schedules marked "A," "B," and "C," together with the following Statement, contain full and detailed accounts of the receipts and expenditures of the corporation during the year ending on the first day of August, 1879, and all other details of its financial affairs required by section 108 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

Schedules marked numerically I. to X. contain statements of important statistics relating to the finances of the city, considered valuable for reference and of general public interest.

Schedule A exhibits "the moneys borrowed on the credit of the corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained," for the year ending August 1, 1879.

Schedule B exhibits "the several appropriations made (for 1879, and previous years as on August 1, 1878), the objects for which the same were made, the amount of moneys expended under each," as required by section 108 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the expenditures being for five months in 1878 and for seven months in 1879, comprising the year ending August 1, 1879.

Schedule C exhibits Payments from the City Treasury on account of State Taxes, and for each department and branch of the City Government, the Board of Education, Charitable Institutions, and all other objects and purposes, during the year ending August 1, 1879, under the several heads of Taxes, Proceeds of Stocks and Bonds, and Special and Trust Accounts, from which the moneys were paid.

Schedule I. exhibits the amount of each class of the Bonded Debt outstanding on December 31 of each year from 1870 to 1878, inclusive.

Schedule II. exhibits the amount of the Funded Debt August 1, 1879, and the amount due in each year payable from the Sinking Fund and from Taxation; and also the amount of Assessment Bonds outstanding at the same date, and the amount payable in each year.

Schedule III. exhibits the City Debt at the close of business on July 31, 1879, with the titles of stocks and bonds, the amounts of every kind outstanding on December 31, 1878, the dates when they fall due, the amounts redeemed and the amounts issued since that date.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 23, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,712, as follows, viz: 856 tenement-houses, 111 private dwellings, 67 other buildings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 20 stores and warehouses, 57 stables, 1 market, 24 slaughter-houses, 1 tripe boiling establishment, 1 public sewer, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 13 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 lime kiln, 46 sunken lots, 1 roadway, 57 yards, courts and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 92 waste-pipes and drains, 170 privies and water-closets, 48 street gutters, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 chimneys, 4 cesspools, 17 other nuisances, together with 60 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The total of reports made thereon by the Sanitary Inspectors was 971.

During the past week 209 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 146 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

171 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 48 premises where contagious disease were found, and have disinfected and fumigated houses, 45 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,582 privy-sinks, 227 yards, 222 cellars, 337 garbage boxes, and 72 miles of street gutters. 2 persons sick with contagious disease were removed to Hospital.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 464 births, 36 still-births, 114 marriages, and 483 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 23, 1879. This shows a decrease of 120 births, 5 still-births, 4 marriages, and 20 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 117 births, 6 still-births, and 36 deaths, and an increase of 12 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; diphtheria, 4; whooping-cough, 5; erysipelas, 4; typhoid fever, 7; malarial fevers, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 13; inanition, 3; cancer, 5; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 4; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; while the deaths from croup increased 5; puerperal diseases 3; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; drowning, 1. The deaths from scarlatina, rheumatism and gout, and pneumonia were the same as those reported for the previous week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 81 were in institutions, 273 in tenement houses, 119 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 89 on the first, 128 on the second, 88 on the third, 67 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 478 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents. 42 were stated to be single, 108 married, 33 widowed, and the condition of 300 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 483; still-births, 36; bodies in transit, 24. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 51 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 464 births, 114 marriages, 36 still-births, 483 deaths, 24 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 45 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 23, 1879, was 71.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.765, the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1025, and the total amount of rain-fall was 4.59 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 462 deaths and still-births, or 89.02 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 210; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 55; Greenwood (undenominational), 25; Lutheran, (undenominational), 74; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 36; Woodlawn (undenominational), 11; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 0; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 16, 1879, was 493; this is 48 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 135.8 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.32 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,099,370.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 16, 1879, was 493, which is 135.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.32 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,099,370.
