DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS, NEW YORK, July 6, 1897. The Honorable WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, etc.:

SIR—In accordance with the requirements of section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, we make the following report of the "operations and action" of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1897:

Though nominally for the last quarter, this report is actually a statement of the transactions of the Department and a summary of its work for the official year, which commences with the assessment of property by the Deputy Tax Commissioners on the first Monday in September, and terminates with the delivery of the assessment rolls to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as required by law.

The following statement shows the assessed valuation of real and personal estate in the City of New York for the year 1897, as compared with such valuations for the year 1896:

from \$37,600 to \$3,500. The capital of the Central National Bank has been reduced from \$2,000,000 to \$1,000,000. The capital of the Market and Fulton National Bank has been increased from \$750,000 to \$900,000. These changes have made a total decrease of \$1,534,100 in the nominal capital of the banks of this City, held subject to taxation.

In 1897 reductions upon the assessed value of real estate were made by the Commissioners, amounting to \$1,143,755; reductions upon the real estate of clergymen to the amount of \$60,000; on parsonages to the amount of \$188,200; on property purchased with pension money to the amount of \$14,500, making a total reduction of \$1,406,455 from the assessed valuation.

In addition to the above, property taken by the City for parks, schools, dock improvements, etc., was exempted to the amount of \$7,071,550, which had been heretofore assessed, making a total of reductions and exemptions during the year amounting to \$8,478,005.
