At Fifth District Prison, painting and renovating kitchen, giving same one coat of paint; also steampipes given a coat of black varnish; finishing painting the eight top cells on male tier; material used: 200 pounds white lead, 5 gallons boiled oil, 5 gallons turpentine, one-half gallon liquid dryer and 2 gallons of asphaltum varnish.

At Seventh District Prison, painting the Matron's room and the counsel room; material used: 100 pounds white lead, 2 gallons turpentine, 1 gallon raw oil, one-half gallon boiled oil, and 5 pounds chrome green.
