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### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

#### (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, on Friday, November 7, 1902, at 11 a. m.

After considering financial matters, the Board took up the consideration of public improvements.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan (Commissioner of Public Works Livingston), President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. Seth Low, presided.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACE AT ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-NINTH STREET AND GERARD AVENUE, BRONX.

The matter of the application for a reduction of the assessment for acquiring the public place bounded by East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Gerard avenue and Bergen avenue, Borough of The Bronx, was laid over.

#### WIDENING DELANCEY STREET.

The matter of the proposed widening of Delancey street was laid over pending the receipt of a report from the Art Commission.

MY DEAR MR. GROUT—Having grown somewhat curious to know what had become of the proposed approach to the New East River Bridge on the New York side, which was a subject of consideration before the Board of Public Improvements last year, I made inquiry yesterday and was informed that the whole matter was now pending before your present Board of Estimate. I had a very pleasant interview with Mr. Webster, who was good enough to explain the various changes which had been adopted and the reasons which had influenced them in the making.

I realize that it may be too late to have any reconsideration of what is already abandoned, and I also realize that a suggestion from an individual is not apt to carry much weight with a Board, but at the same time my interests as a property owner of the vicinity, as well as of a taxpayer on property there and elsewhere, are sufficiently material to warrant me, at least in my opinion, in asking your attention to a suggestion or two on the subject before the matter has been finally disposed of.

There are two propositions upon which I take it there will be no disagreement upon the part of any one concerned; the first is that the expense should be reduced to the lowest possible amount; and the second is, that in view of the fact that such an improvement must, at the best, involve a very material expenditure, the line should not be so closely drawn as to make the result of little practical value. I beg leave to suggest that an unnecessary cutting through of blocks and across blocks, paralleling streets which already provide in a large measure the facilities required, is objectionable on the ground that it makes the improvement an unnecessarily expensive one, and that, therefore, even though the widening of Delancey street on its southerly side and the widening of Broome street on its northerly side should present practically the same result in cost, by adopting the Broome street plan the cutting through of five blocks from the Bowery to Elm street would be made entirely unnecessary and that heavy expense entirely avoided.

I understand from Mr. Webster that the creation of the proposed plaza between Clinton street, Norfolk street, Broome street and Delancey street, has been entirely abandoned, and that the abandoning of the plaza is one of the reasons why the idea of widening Broome street has been rejected. I venture to suggest that the abandoning of the plaza will result in making the whole improvement utterly valueless and subject to the second of the objections that I have suggested, that after having been made it will be found not to have been worth what it will cost. It will certainly need no argument to convince you, in the light of your experience with the Brooklyn Bridge before the plaza and the Liberty street widening were created, that a large expanse of vacant territory at the end of this bridge, over which traffic may diffuse and spread itself without limitation, is absolutely necessary. I particularly recollect the horrible condition of congestion which prevailed there. Perhaps my attention was more particularly called to in view of my connection with the improvement which was finally made, and I submit that the existing conditions to-day at the debouche at the end of the New York Bridge on Chatham street furnishes the best possible proof, if any were needed, that an opening at the end of the bridge is absolutely necessary. Argument that traffic can be handled through a street which is as wide as the bridge over which the traffic comes is unanswerable in theory, but as a matter of fact it does not work out. On the Brooklyn Bridge proposition we had all the traffic from Brooklyn toward New York coming straight down Washington street, going straight across the upper part of the bridge, and all the traffic from New York to Brooklyn turning out through Sands street and into Fulton street, the area of Washington and Fulton streets being greater than the area of the traveled surface of the bridge, and the same argument having succeeded in convincing those in authority that those streets supplied all the room necessary. The fact remained, however, that they did not, and the condition which prevailed at the end of the bridge until the plaza was created did as much to injure the material interests and real estate values in Brooklyn as any other one cause. The same impossibility of handling traffic across this bridge is going to present itself anew, and it seems to me that it would be a terrible mistake to be made by any board, composed of gentlemen who have had that experience once, to shut their eyes to the lessons it has taught and to repeat with this approach the blunder that was made with the first one.

I beg leave to say that so far as the plaza is concerned, I do not own a foot of property there, and do not even have the acquaintance of anyone that does. I would much rather see the improvement abandoned altogether, and its cost saved to taxpayers, myself among the number, than to see it put through without the proposed plaza and the cost of the rest of the improvement absolutely wasted. I do not conceive it to be any particular public benefit that the City should buy from the owners the land necessary to widen Delancey street on the south or Broome street on the north, or to cut the avenue through from the Bowery to Elm street, and unless something other than the purchase of that property is to result from the improvement, I submit that it would be far better that the whole improvement should be abandoned.

The effect of widening Broome street on the north side so as to make it of the same width and on continuous lines both sides of the Bowery will accomplish the

result desired with the least possible work, with an expenditure very little, if any, greater than the widening of Delancey street on the south side, and will result in the entire abolition of the necessity for the cutting through of the street between the Bowery and Elm street and the saving of all that expense, and will give a straight line communication from the bridge plaza across town to the Watts street approach to the Desbrosses Ferry, and it will afford more space for the handling of traffic coming from and going to the bridge than the Delancey street widening, inasmuch as it will give all the room for access which Delancey street now presents, and the widened Broome street in addition, while the widening of Delancey street would only give the result of its widening, and Broome street would be practically cut off from the bridge. The deflection of traffic diagonally across the plaza will not only do no harm, but it will be absolutely beneficial in distributing the traffic. All of that headed toward Brooklyn would naturally seek the line of least resistance through Broome street to the bridge, keeping to the right, and having plenty of room on the plaza to be directed and handled in an unobstructed manner to the bridge entrance. That headed toward New York, on the contrary, would pass in a straight line through Delancey street, or in a deflected line through Broome street, but would not come in conflict with the counter stream in any way. A further advantage, which I can assure you is of considerable interest to owners of property situated in the vicinity of Elm street, is that it would put a period to the disturbed condition of that unfortunate territory. I do not refer only to the people on Elm street, whose property has been practically confiscated, but I now refer to my own selfish interests located on Broome street, between Elm and Broadway. I have felt the disastrous results of the continued upheaval of the past years very seriously, and I do not look forward with any degree of enthusiasm to a continuance of that disturbance in the neighborhood to result from the proposed cutting of the new street across from the Bowery to Elm street between Broome and Spring.

I can easily conceive that the Broome street plan is not a favorite one with the owners of property on the south side of Delancey or between Bowery and Elm street, who would lose the opportunity of having their property taken by the City. You and I have both seen enough of the result of taking property by municipalities in the exercise of its right of eminent domain, for public improvement, to be fully convinced that no man who has been subjected to this hardship ever gets much more than twice what his property could by any possibility have been sold for at private sale. We both know that the horror of such a proceeding which the property owner feels, is not that it may not be carried out, but that having been suggested as a most remote possibility that it may be abandoned. I make no pretense of being better than my neighbor, but in this case it happens that I have no property for sale, but I have got to help pay for whatever is done, and I therefore feel that I am entitled to urge upon yourself and upon the Board of Estimate the making of this improvement in a way that will cost least and at the same time be productive of the most good.

#### BRONX APPROACH TO THIRD AVENUE BRIDGE.

The proposed laying out of an approach to the Third Avenue Bridge, from the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, was laid over awaiting a plan from the Bridge Department.

#### OPENING AVENUE E, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented and the matter was referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 7th instant, stating that the Local Board of the Flatbush District adopted a resolution for the opening of Avenue E or Ditmas avenue, from Coney Island avenue to Gravesend avenue, and from Gravesend avenue to West street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, containing the following language: "Omitting the land lying between the lines of said street (meaning Gravesend avenue) belonging to the Prospect Park and Coney Island Railroad Company."

From your letter it appears that the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reported that the railroad company occupied a portion of Gravesend avenue; that the street had been opened many years ago to its full width, that the railroad company could not, in his judgment, claim ownership to a single foot of the street; that, therefore, it was a mistake to pass a resolution such as the Local Board forwarded; that thereupon the resolution was referred back to the Local Board; and that it comes again to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in a communication from the Borough President's office, inclosing a communication of Mr. Charles S. Taber, Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the Bureau of Street Openings in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, a copy of which you enclose.

You say that you do not know whether or not this communication was authorized by me, that the matter has been referred to you to ask my opinion as to the advisability of proceeding with the opening on the resolution of the Local Board, which not only omits the land in Gravesend avenue, occupied by the railroad company, but contains the admission above quoted that the land in the street is the property of the railroad company, and that the reference of this matter was made to you on your questioning the advisability of proceeding as Mr. Taber suggests.

In answering your communication, permit me to say that Mr. Taber's communication to the Borough President of Brooklyn expresses his personal and unofficial views, and that it was wholly unauthorized by me.

It would be a mistake to adopt a resolution of the Local Board containing the language you have quoted. Such language might be construed not only as admitting title in the railroad company but that the City had no interest in the land occupied by the railroad company which appears to have been opened years ago as a public street.

Village of Olean vs. Steyner, 135 N. Y., 341.

As to the advisability of proceeding with the opening of Avenue E or Ditmas avenue upon the resolution of the Local Board, which omits the land in Gravesend avenue occupied by the railroad company, I would say that that is a matter which is addressed to the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

A great number of proceedings have hitherto been authorized for the opening of streets across railroads both in the Borough of Brooklyn and in the Borough of Queens. In view of the importance of the subject to both these boroughs, I would be glad to confer with you, not only as to the policy to be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the future with reference to streets crossing railroads, but also as to what should be done with the proceedings already authorized in which the same condition of affairs exists.

#### APPROACH TO ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-EIGHTH STREET BRIDGE, BRONX.

DEAR SIR—In the matter of the proposed changes in the lines and grades of the approaches of the One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street Bridge over the Harlem river, I beg to report that the Board of Public Improvements on February 21, 1900, adopted a map or plan showing the approaches to the bridge over the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and the changes of the streets affected thereby in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and sent the same with the proper form of resolution to the Municipal Assembly for its concurrence.

No action being taken by the Municipal Assembly for nineteen months, the Chief Topographical Engineer on October 23, 1901, submitted this map again with the statement that this modification of the streets near One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and the Harlem river should be considered as required only for the approach to the bridge and would therefore need the approval of the Mayor alone.

The Board of Public Improvements took no action on this suggestion of the Chief Topographical Engineer, and I beg to submit herewith a map affecting the approaches to the Madison Avenue Bridge within the Borough of The Bronx for the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The submitted map is entitled "Map of proposed changes of approaches to Madison Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, prepared under authority of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901," and is a facsimile of that part of the map which is located in the Borough of The Bronx, and was adopted by the Board of Public Improvements, February 21, 1900, and again submitted October 23, 1901, as stated above.

SIR—The accompanying letter from President Haffen of the Borough of The Bronx relates to the proposed change of the lines and grades of the "approaches to the East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street Bridge over the Harlem river," and is accompanied by a report from the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx and a map showing the proposed changes. There is no resolution of the Local Board of the district within which the streets affected are located, there being, as I understand it, no assessment to be levied for the acquisition of additional property.

On February 21, 1900, this same change in the approaches to the bridge was approved by the Board of Public Improvements, and a resolution providing for it was transmitted to the Municipal Assembly. The change at that time was more comprehensive and covered also the Manhattan end of the East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street or Madison Avenue Bridge. The present communication refers only to the approaches located in the Borough of The Bronx. The Municipal Assembly failed to take any action, and on October 23 there was submitted another map identical with the former one, with the recommendation that as the changes involved only a bridge approach, the approval of the Mayor alone was needed, and it would not be necessary to submit the matter to the Municipal Assembly. No new action was taken by the Board of Public Improvements.

Whether or not the proposed changes, which consist of the widening of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Mott avenue and the pierhead and bulkhead line of the Harlem river, and the narrowing of Exterior street, from 100 feet to 80 feet, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Park avenue, can be properly considered as a bridge approach only, is a question which I cannot determine, but the Corporation Counsel has recently been asked an opinion in a similar case. The determination of this question, however, will affect only the subsequent proceedings and not the action of this Board.

The question of improved approaches to the East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street Bridge will involve both the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, but no action appears to have been taken by the Local Board having jurisdiction in the Borough of Manhattan, and were it not for the fact that proceedings are now under way and Commissioners have been appointed for the opening of Exterior street, I would recommend that no action be taken until a plan should have been submitted by the President of the Borough of Manhattan showing the changes on the southerly side of the Harlem river. The Corporation Counsel, however, has already called attention to the fact that the Commissioners for the opening of Exterior street have been unable to proceed with their work, owing to the pending change in the lines of the street, and I would therefore recommend that a public hearing be given in connection with the proposed changes now before the Board, and that the President of the Borough of Manhattan be requested to submit a plan showing the changes which would be required on the southerly side of the Harlem river.

Resolution for a public hearing is herewith submitted, together with technical description, which is taken from the minutes of the Board of Public Improvements of February 21, 1900.

DEAR SIR—In the matter of the request made by the Commissioner of Bridges for the approval of a map or plan showing additional lands required for the Westchester Avenue Bridge over the Bronx river, under the provisions of chapter 543 of the Laws of 1902, and also requesting that proceedings be instituted to acquire such additional land by amending the present proceedings, which matter was referred to me by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I beg to report that I have examined into the subject and find that it is proposed to extend the area to be acquired to the centre of the Bronx river, so that all the land covered by the bridge while in operation will be owned by the City.

I recommend that the request be granted.

SIR—I submit herewith a copy of a letter from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated October 2, which is accompanied by a map showing additional land to be acquired by The City of New York for the purposes of building a bridge over the Bronx river at Westchester avenue; also a letter from President Haffen of the Borough of The Bronx explanatory of the Commissioner's request, in which he states that the object of extending the area to be acquired is that it should extend to the centre of the Bronx river, so that all of the land covered by the bridge while in operation will be owned by the City, and concluding with the recommendation that the request for amendment of the map be granted.

This request of the Bridge Commissioner is made in accordance with the provisions of chapter 543 of the Laws of 1902, which provides that "The Commissioner of Bridges, with the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment first had and obtained, may, and he is hereby authorized to amend any plan heretofore duly adopted by any former Board of Estimate and Apportionment so as to show thereon such additional lands as he may deem necessary to be laid out and acquired for the purposes of this act, upon the filing by him in the several public offices in which the maps and plans of The City of New York are required to be filed, of the maps or plans showing such additional lands, selected, located and laid out as aforesaid, and the map or plan of The City of New York shall be deemed to be altered accordingly. Any proceeding heretofore taken by The City of New York to acquire title to the fee of lands required for the purposes of this act are hereby ratified and confirmed, and such proceedings may be amended in the manner provided by law so as to include the additional lands so laid out and required for the purpose of said bridge approaches."

It appears, therefore, that the Commissioner of Bridges has the right, with the consent of this Board, to amend the plans heretofore adopted so as to show the additional lands required, and that no further action is necessary except the filing of these amended plans in the several public offices in which maps and plans are required to be filed, namely, the office of the Corporation Counsel, of the Register of the County of New York and of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment consent to such an amendment, and I would further recommend that the Corporation Counsel be requested to amend the proceedings to acquire title in accordance with this amended plan.

For changing the lines and grades of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Tremont avenue, from Boston road to a point about 400 feet east of the Bronx river, as shown on map entitled "Map or plan showing the widening of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street from Boston road to the Bronx river, the change of lines of Tremont avenue from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof, and the discontinuing and closing of the present Tremont avenue from the Bronx river to said first street easterly thereof, also the grades of the above streets in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, prepared under authority of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, dated September 24, 1902," in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

SIR—I return herewith a joint resolution of the Local Boards of the Morrisania and Chester districts, Borough of The Bronx, for changing the lines and grades of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Tremont avenue, from the Boston road to a point about 400 feet east of the Bronx river, as shown on a map entitled "Map or plan showing the widening of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Boston road to the Bronx river, changing the lines of Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof, and the discontinuance and closing of the present Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to said first street east thereof, etc."



The resolution is accompanied by a report from the principal Topographical Engineer, approved by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, explaining the object of the change.

Tremont avenue is now laid out from the centre of the Bronx river eastwardly to the Eastern Boulevard and proceedings are under way to acquire title to same. There is no connection with Tremont avenue to the westward, so that the street would begin in the middle of the Bronx river with no way of reaching it. The proposed change widens East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street for several hundred feet, as it approaches the proposed new bridge over the Bronx river, to 150 feet, and establishes a connection between the West Farms road (which latter is the extension of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, east of the Bronx river) and Tremont avenue, as laid out and being opened, this connection being on the easterly side of the Bronx river, and that portion of Tremont avenue west of the new connection and extending to the centre of the Bronx river is stricken from the map as useless.

The proposed change will greatly improve present conditions and will furnish an approach of liberal dimensions to the bridge from each side of the river, although I do not think that it is laid out upon lines which are unnecessarily liberal. I would recommend, therefore, that the joint resolution of the Local Boards be approved, and that a public hearing be given in the matter, a resolution for such hearing, together with the technical description, being hereto attached.

2. Change of lines of Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof.

It is proposed to deflect Tremont avenue from the first street easterly of the Bronx river in a northerly direction to West Farms road and to widen West Farms road from 100 feet to 150 feet, from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof.

3. Discontinuance of Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof.

This discontinuance extends for a distance of about 150 feet from the centre of the Bronx river easterly, where it will meet the changed location of Tremont avenue.

4. The grades.

A. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Boston road to be 19 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

B. The grade at the bridge over the Bronx river to be at its westerly end 13.7 feet above mean high-water datum, and at its easterly end 15.2 feet above mean high-water datum.

C. The grade at the intersection of Tremont avenue and the first street easterly of the Bronx river to be 20 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

#### CHANGE OF GRADE OF RUTLAND ROAD, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was placed on file:

Hon. SETH Low, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I submit herewith a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on September 29, 1902, rescinding a resolution of the same Board of June 26, 1902, which initiated a change in the grade of Rutland road, between Bedford avenue and New York avenue.

The original resolution of June 26 was reported upon by me and considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 25. At that meeting there were several protests submitted against the change of grade and the matter was referred back to me to see if some plan could not be suggested which would meet the objections raised by the property owners. I have gone over the ground and have conferred with the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways of the Borough of Brooklyn, and we came to the conclusion that the objections raised by the property owners were in some respects well founded, and that they would be met by the discontinuance of all proceedings to change the grade on this street.

Changes have already been made in the grade of Rogers and Nostrand avenues, at Rutland road, and if no further action is taken the grade will run in a straight line from Bedford avenue to Rogers avenue, as already changed, thence to Nostrand avenue, as changed, thence to New York avenue and at its present legal grade. While this will result in the alteration of all the gradients on the three blocks, there will be sufficient surface drainage, and the introduction of summits provided in the resolution of June 26 will be avoided. No further action, therefore, seems to be necessary by this Board, and I would recommend that the papers in the matter be filed.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a copy of a resolution adopted on June 12, 1902, at a joint meeting of the Local Boards of the Flatbush and Bushwick districts of the Borough of Brooklyn, initiating proceedings to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public place the plot bounded by Eastern parkway extension, Pitkin avenue and Howard avenue.

The parcel proposed for a public park is located at the intersection of Eastern parkway and Eastern parkway extension, and is triangular in form, with a frontage of about 525 feet on the Eastern parkway extension, about 275 feet on Howard avenue and about 450 feet on Pitkin avenue. It includes a part of Degraw street and of the Hunter Fly road. The former is believed to have been acquired by the Park Department, and the latter is an old highway, neither parcel being subject to taxation. The land is almost wholly below the grade of the parkway extension and is partially occupied by half a dozen old buildings, no one of which is of great value.

The request for this improvement bears the signatures of eight petitioners, of whom one-half have the same last name as given on the tax books as that of the owners of the land which it is proposed to acquire. The adjoining section is open country and farm land, with very few buildings, and offers no basis on which it would appear fair to predict the need of a park here for other than a period in the far distant future. When this need does arise it is already provided for in Lincoln Terrace Park, only a block and a half away.

The land included within the limits named in the resolution has an assessed value of \$6,490. I can see no reason which would justify the laying out of a park at this time, if the cost is to be borne by the City at large, and cannot recommend favorable action upon the resolution unless the cost can be assessed locally and upon the district immediately adjoining. Herewith is transmitted a resolution to fix a date for a public hearing in this matter.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a copy of a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, of the Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on July 24, 1902, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the proceedings for opening Thirteenth avenue from Thirty-sixth to Seventy-third street by omitting therefrom the land lying within the lines of said street, belonging to the Long Island Railroad Company and the Sea Beach Railroad Company.

This resolution is intended to correct a defect in the original proceedings which were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on July 12, 1899, and which included a portion of Thirteenth avenue crossing the railroad tracks mentioned in the resolution and also the tracks on New Utrecht avenue. Owing to these defects no progress has yet been made with the opening, nor have Commissioners been appointed.

The resolution now offered is incomplete, as it contains no mention of the New Utrecht avenue crossing. Lacking evidence to show that the railroad law has been complied with in this instance, I assume that this should also be included in the amendment.

Taking this into consideration, together with the fact that there would be nothing left in the square but a lot of small triangles, it would seem to be a matter of economy to retain the public square on the map and take title to it in one proceeding.

SIR—I herewith submit a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, for changing the map or plan of The City of New York by making East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street 100 feet in width, from Webster avenue to the Bronx river; also a resolution of the Local Board of the Chester District, adopted on July 9, 1902, providing for changing the map or plan of the City by making East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street 100 feet in width, from the Bronx river eastward to Second street, and changing the width of the proposed Bronx boulevard so that it will be 100 feet wide at East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

The changes provided by these resolutions would result in the widening of the portion of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street which is west of the Bronx river, or in the Morrisania District, from 80 to 100 feet, and narrowing that portion east of the Bronx river, or in the Chester District, from 150 to 100 feet, with a similar narrowing of the proposed Bronx boulevard. Both resolutions also fix the grades for the portions of the streets covered by them so as to adapt them to the overhead crossing of the New York and Harlem railroad tracks and the bridge across the Bronx river.

I have on this date submitted a report in connection with the proposed elimination of the grade crossing at East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street and the New York and Harlem Railroad. This change in the lines and grades is an essential part of this improvement. The widening of that portion of the street west of the Bronx river is wise, as it will form the only approach to the Woodlawn Station, while the narrowing of the portion east of the Bronx river is also wise, doing away with an unnecessarily and extravagantly broad street.

There are, as before noted, two separate resolutions covering this change—one of the Local Board of the Morrisania District and one of the Local Board of the Chester District, although there is but one map.

Section 426 of the Charter provides that "if any proposed local improvement specified in section 428 of this Act shall embrace the territory or affect the property of more than one district of local improvements, the members of the Local Boards of all the districts so affected shall, for all proceedings in the matter of such improvement, constitute the Local Board for the purposes thereof."

This provision seems to me to be mandatory, and to require a concurrent resolution of the two Local Boards acting as one board, instead of two separate resolutions.

This course was followed in the case of the change in the lines and grades of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Tremont avenue, at the crossing of the Bronx river, the Local Boards of these two districts having acted together and passed a joint resolution.

If it be deemed necessary to proceed in this way a joint resolution should be passed in place of the two now before the Board, but if otherwise I would recommend that a date be fixed for a public hearing, a resolution providing for such a hearing, with the necessary technical description, being hereto attached.

The northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river, to be on the prolongation westerly of the northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, east of the Bronx river, where said line agrees with the northerly line of the existing Nineteenth avenue.

The southern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river, to be southerly and distant 100 feet measured at right angles, and parallel to the above-described northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

B. Grades:

The grade at the intersection of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street and Webster avenue to be 91.5 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

The grade over the property of the New York and Harlem Railroad to be 93 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade for the bridge over the Bronx river to be 88 feet above mean high-water datum.

A. Change of lines:

The northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, easterly of the Bronx river, to coincide with the northern line of Nineteenth avenue and the southern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to be 100 feet southerly therefrom and parallel to the northerly line.

B. Grades:

The elevation of the floor of the bridge over the Bronx river to be 88 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade at the western side line of Bronx boulevard to be 90 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade at the eastern side line of Bronx boulevard to be 92 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade at the western side line of Second street to be 111 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade at the eastern side line of Second street to be 113 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grades at the western and eastern side lines of White Plains road to be 171 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade at the curb intersections at an unnamed street located about 190 feet easterly of White Plains road to be 181 feet above mean high-water datum, and at the intersection of the curb lines of Olinville avenue to be 190 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of lines and grades and the location of the immediate or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Fulton street, Chauncey street, Lewis avenue and Stuyvesant avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the public park in the aforesaid territory as follows:

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I return herewith a resolution of the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, adopted on July 29, 1902, which is designed to initiate proceedings to acquire for a park certain land in the former village of Totenville, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

The resolution is accompanied by a report of the Library Park Committee of Totenville, consisting of Mr. Charles A. Marshall and seven others, describing the property it is designed to acquire and giving an estimate, by the committee, of the value of the property, viz., \$13,012. A plan is also submitted in which the portion it is proposed to acquire is tinted in light red, the lots shown in dark red having been selected as a site for a Carnegie Library.

I think that the action of the Local Board is not the proper one, but that the first step should be to lay out a public park on the maps of The City of New York before providing for its purchase, and it seems to me that this is a necessary preliminary.

As to the extent of the proposed park as shown on the map, I beg to call your attention to the fact that the shape is very irregular, two plots of six lots each being located east of Prospect avenue, while ten lots in the block between Prospect avenue and Garretson avenue are omitted, while the inclusion of these lots would make the proposed park symmetrical and much more satisfactory. It would then extend from Amboy road, the main thoroughfare running the entire length of the island, southerly to the grounds of the public school.

As already stated, I am informed that the five lots designated by the numbers 465 to 468, inclusive, and 475, have already been agreed upon as a site for a Carnegie Library. The lots to the west of the proposed library site are occupied by a double

frame house worth about \$5,000, while three lots to the east of the site are occupied by a single frame house worth about \$3,000. While the purchase of the lots omitted in the plan between Prospect avenue and Garretson avenue would be more expensive than those colored red to the east of Prospect avenue, I believe that the value of the park would be sufficiently increased by including the entire block (omitting the library site, of course), and making the proposed park symmetrical, to warrant the greater expenditure, leaving out all the property east of Prospect avenue.

I beg, therefore, to recommend that the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough of Richmond in order that action may be taken to lay out on the maps of the City the proposed park, and that the wisdom of changing its outline as hereinbefore suggested be brought to the attention of the Local Board.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on September 18, 1902, provides for changing the grade of Shepherd avenue between Blake avenue and Belmont avenue.

An examination of the ground discloses the fact that the present improvements along the line of the street, of which there are quite a number between Blake and Sutter avenues, conform quite closely with the present surface, while the sewer manholes which have been built according to the present legal grade are 2½ feet or more above the present surface.

The old grade chart provided for a crown in the middle of this block, which, in the proposed new grade, is eliminated, the grade elevation at Sutter avenue being lowered 2.5 feet, from which point the new grade will rise to meet the present established grade in the middle of the block between Sutter and Belmont avenues.

The change will be very beneficial to the property, and will, so far as can be seen, cause embarrassment to none, while it would provide ample surface drainage. It is therefore recommended that the action of the Local Board be approved, and that a date be fixed for a public hearing. The plan, with technical description, and a resolution for such a hearing are herewith submitted.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, of October 2, 1902, initiating proceedings for locating and laying out Palisade place, from Popham avenue to Sedgwick avenue.

The proposed street comprises a length of one block, meeting Sedgwick avenue approximately at its northerly junction with Undercliff avenue. It will not be possible to open a driveway through this block in consequence of the very steep grade required, the elevation at Sedgwick avenue being 62.92 feet, while at Popham avenue it is 145 feet, the length of the block being only a little over 400 feet. It is proposed to extend the street northerly from Popham avenue a little over 300 feet with a width of 45 feet; from this point a flight of steps will connect with Sedgwick avenue, the property required for the latter purpose being but 8 feet in width.

This street is already shaped on the ground and gas lamps are maintained on the same; one house has been erected on its line and the steps have been constructed; the street is shown on the filed maps of real estate in this locality and property has been sold abutting upon it. The proposed layout I believe to be necessary in order to cut the block in which it is located so as to give property a suitable frontage, and favorable action upon this improvement is recommended. A map and technical description are herewith presented, together with a resolution fixing the date for a public hearing.

C. Buckhout, Civil Engineer, dated July 12, 1857, filed in the office of the Register of Westchester County \* \* \*

As the streets are now laid out, owing to slight differences between the established lines and those formerly adopted, the City owns strips of land ranging in width from 0.52 feet to 3.30 feet, separating adjacent property from an actual frontage upon the street. While the change proposed will result in giving the streets irregular and peculiar widths, there seems to be no other remedy which may be applied to correct conditions which should not be allowed to exist, and I therefore recommend favorable action upon the resolution.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
