#### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter Ending June 30, 1906.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and re-inspections made was 556,469, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection	381,850
By the Division of Contagious Diseases	151,721
By the Division of Communicable Diseases	22,096
By the Division of Laboratories	793

The number of complaints forwarded for Board's orders was 8,450, classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 13,683, all of which were referred to the Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,203 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper

vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 3,488 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

## Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents in the various boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of

personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alterations, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Certified copies of the records of Vital Statistics as may be found to be on file in the Bureau of Records are furnished to applicants authorized to receive same, namely, interested parties, next of kin, legal representatives, etc., upon payment of the fee in such cases prescribed by the Board of Health. Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health, and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

## • BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, October 26, 1906.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the office of the Mayor, in City Hall.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented printed copies of the minutes of meeting held October 8, 1906. Which were approved.

A communication was received from the Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date October 19, 1906, transmitting a certified copy of resolution adopted by that body on October 19, 1906, accepting the bid of John Wanamaker for Item No. 1, supplying furniture in Squadron "C" armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Ordered filed.

The Secretary reported the receipt of a lien, in the amount of \$1,955.50, filed by David A. Parshall, against James McFerran, contractor for the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

The Secretary reported a very unsatisfactory condition in relation to the completion of the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory; that while only a small amount of work remains to be completed, but little progress is being made, and the contractor cannot be found, and his representative at the armory gives but little satisfaction in answer to inquiries for him. The Secretary presents herewith also a communication from Lord &amp; Hewlett, the architects for the said building, complaining of such negligence on the part of the contractor.

Referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary presented applications for payments, properly certified, to John B. Malatesta, in full for his contract for furnishing and erecting an iron railing around the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory; and to Hunt &amp; Hunt, architects, account of professional services, Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory; and the Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to John B. Malatesta, No. 3170 Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx, the sum of one thousand four hundred

and ninety-five dollars (\$1,495), as per accompanying voucher in full for his contract for furnishing and erecting an iron railing around the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of Messrs. Hunt &amp; Hunt, architects, amounting to the sum of thirty-seven dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$37.38), in full as per accompanying voucher, for professional services rendered in preparing plans and specifications and the supervision of the erection of an iron railing around the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory (under the contract of John B. Malatesta); and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reported the meeting of the Committees on Armories, held October 13, 1906, at which the following matters were considered:

First—A communication from Pilcher &amp; Tachan, architects, in relation to violations in the construction of Squadron "C" Armory; also from John Kennedy &amp; Son, contractors, in relation to the same.

Which the Committee recommend shall be filed and taken up on the final certificate for the armory.

Second—A communication from Colonel Duffy, commanding the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., requesting permission to withdraw the estimate for furnishings of new armory for his organization.

Which the Committee recommend be allowed.

Third—Communication from Colonel John Foote, commanding the Fourteenth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., for a revision of the lighting system in the large drill hall and squad drill room; and some repairs and alterations to the administration part of the building.

On which the Committee beg to report progress.

Fourth—Communication from Lord &amp; Hewlett, architects, in relation to snow guards on the roof of the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory.

The Committee directed the Secretary to notify the architects to explain at the next meeting of the Armory Board why the provisions in the specifications were not sufficient in this case.

Fifth—Communication from Clinton & Russell, architects, in relation to an amendment to the contract of Louis Wechsler for lockers to be installed in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

The Committee recommend that this amendment be made without expense to the Armory Board.

Sixth—Communication from the Commanding Officer of the First Battalion Naval Militia, relative to a change in the situation of the proposed site for the location of its armory ship.

Which the Committee recommend, and present resolutions herewith rescinding the one already adopted by the Board, and providing for the new dock, as suggested.

Seventh—The Committee considered the matter of the bids for grills and tanbark for Squadron "C" Armory, and for furniture for the Seventeenth Separate Company, which were received at the meeting of the Armory Board on October 8, 1906, and recommend that the contract be let for the grills, and that the tanbark for Squadron "C" armory and the furniture for the Seventeenth Separate Company be readvertised.

The Committee presented the following resolutions for carrying out the recommendations:

Resolved, That the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Armory Board held July 2, 1906, namely:

"Resolved, That the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) be and is hereby appropriated for furnishing and installing in the new Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, at Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets and Lexington avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, the following items:

"Chair rails;

"Picture moulding through the building;

"Platforms and gallery chairs;

"Furniture;

"Kalamine doors and windows, as prescribed by the Building Department;

"Architects' fees and inspection;

"That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein, and to authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to provide funds therefor; that the Board of Aldermen be requested to empower the Armory Board to purchase these items without public letting,"

—be and is hereby rescinded.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the contract between The City of New York and Louis Wechsler for the erection and completion of the lockers in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, Park avenue and Thirty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be amended as follows:

First—That the color of the lockers as now installed in said armory be accepted in place of sample color in office of architects.

Second—That a metal angle to cover the space between the wall and locker at the top, securely fastened to wall, be installed above all lockers. Also where lockers stand back to back, a strip of metal shall be placed across the top of lockers and on open ends, if any, and butt pins securely riveted.

These changes to be made without additional cost to the Armory Board.


Which was adopted by the following vote:

Y., has made a requisition upon the Armory Board for suitable dock, mooring and berthing facilities for the use of the organization, on the Hudson river, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, and has presented a map of the proposed dock, 325 feet long by 50 feet in width, at that place, under the control of the Department of Docks and Ferries, by the provisions of chapter 152 of the Laws of 1894, and states that the same will be suitable and adequate for the purpose; and

Whereas, The Committees on Armories have presented the following map,



Whereas, The Committees on Armories have presented the following map,

At the recommendation of the President of the Board of Aldermen the bids received at the last meeting for grills and for tanbark in Squadron "C" Armory were laid over for the further consideration and report of the Committee on Armories.

Brigadier-General James McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the bids for furniture to be installed in the armory of the Seventeenth Separate Company in the Borough of Queens (Item No. 8) be rejected; that the deposits received from the bidders be forwarded to the Comptroller with the request that he return the amounts received from said bidders; and that the Secretary be directed to readvertise for bids or proposals for said furniture.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Isaac A. Hopper & Son (Inc.), contractors, the sum of three thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven dollars and seventy-five cents (\$3,837.75), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for alterations and repairs to the Fourteenth Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary stated that an application had been made for a final payment by John Kennedy & Son, contractors, for the erection of Squadron "C" Armory.

On motion of Brigadier-General McLeer it was laid over for the consideration and report of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

A communication was received from the Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date October 16, 1906, transmitting an extract from minutes of a meeting of that body, held October 10, in relation to furniture for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Walter E. Parfitt, architect, of date October 23, 1906, in relation to trusses in the extension to the Thirteenth Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary reports that the American Bonding Company has filed an application for payment in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for completing the contract of O. Charles Meyer, for an improvement to the armory of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

At the suggestion of the Secretary the matter was laid over, and the Secretary was directed to refer the same to the Corporation Counsel for advice before paying the bill.

A communication was received from Pilcher & Tachau, architects for Squadron "C" Armory, transmitting a communication from John Kennedy & Son, contractors, in relation to the sewer connections in that armory.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

On motion, the meeting adjourned, and the Board proceeded to examine the plans which were presented by the advisory architects for the proposed armory building for the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y.

The Board then reconvened, and the report of the advisory architects was read and referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A motion to adjourn was adopted.

## BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

### REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1906.

New York, April 1, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to present the following report for the past three months:

#### The Department as a Whole.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at their meeting of January 9, the Board of Trustees submitted a letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment suggesting the desirability of acquiring for The City of New York some of the sea beach within its limits or within a reasonable distance from it, upon which to establish and maintain a resort for convalescent patients from the City hospitals, fresh air homes for children, public parks, playgrounds and bathing facilities for the recreation of the people. There is, perhaps, no other city in the world that has so many miles of ocean shore, and yet New York has practically none that is available for public use. It is earnestly hoped that it may be possible to acquire a desirable stretch of shore for the purposes mentioned.

#### Supplies.

On account of the poor quality of the milk supplied to the hospitals the contractors were notified on February 27 that milk would be purchased in the open market and charged to their account, until such time as they could comply with the conditions of their contract. Since then a communication has been received from them asking that they be relieved of their contract, which has been referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to what action the Trustees should take. An expenditure not to exceed six dollars a month has been authorized to provide for the inspection of the dairies supplying milk to the hospitals, in order to determine whether they conform to the required conditions.

The Trustees advertised a second time for bids for the supply of coal to Bellevue and Harlem hospitals, and again only one bid was received and the price asked was excessive. The bid was, therefore, rejected.

#### Salaries of Pupil Nurses.

The Commissioner of Public Charities has called the Trustees' attention to the fact that since the separation of Bellevue and the Allied Hospitals from the Department of Charities the latter Department has inadvertently continued to pay the salaries of the Pupil Nurses supplied by it to the Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, without being reimbursed by the Board of Trustees as provided by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in 1901. The Department of Charities will be repaid for the services of these Nurses for the remainder of the current year from the funds of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, as soon as it is determined what is the proper method of making the payment.

#### New Medical Rule.

A new rule was put into effect at the beginning of the year requiring the presence of a member of the attending staff at every operation involving general anaesthesia, to supervise the details of the operation, including the administration of the anaesthetic. The rules of the hospitals already provided that no member of the house staff should perform a surgical operation without the permission of the member of the attending staff on duty, except in case of extreme emergency, but it was thought better to make, in addition, definite provision for the presence at all operations involving general anaesthesia of an older and more experienced surgeon than the doctors who have not completed their service on the house staff.

The question of the desirability of establishing dental clinics in the out-patient departments of the City hospitals having been suggested by the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor and the Children's Aid Society, a committee of the Trustees has been appointed to investigate the need for them and the possibility of carrying them on in conjunction with the other clinics of the out-patient departments.

At the request of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital it has been decided to give to each member of the house staff who has been appointed for the stated period of one year and has served the full term to the satisfaction of the Medical Board, a certificate stating these facts but differing in form from the diploma given to those that have served for the longer term of two years.

Dr. I. O. Woodruff, House Physician on the First Medical Division, was taken ill with diphtheria in the discharge of duty in the children's wards, on March 1, and was sent to the Minturn Hospital at the expense of this Department. He has recovered and returned to Bellevue Hospital, where he will be graduated from the House Staff on June 30 of this year. Dr. J. T. Pilcher, House Physician on the Fourth Medical Division, having developed appendicitis, was successfully operated upon on March 25. His condition is very good and there seems no doubt that he will make a speedy recovery.

The Corporation Counsel having referred to the Trustees a copy of a bill before the Legislature which would empower the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at its discretion, to authorize the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to acquire a site for and to erect an additional public hospital, it was resolved to inform him, without reference to the merits of this particular bill, that it was the opinion of the Trustees that such a hospital was greatly needed on the west side of the City.

The Superintendent has been instructed to take up the matter of the fire drills at the hospitals, with a view to increasing their efficiency, if possible.

#### BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

The four places of Admitting Physician at Bellevue Hospital have been vacant since their creation in 1904. They have been placed in the non-competitive class by the Municipal and State Civil Service Commissions in order to make it possible to fill them by the appointment of graduates of the Bellevue house staff whose training

and experience would make them best fitted for this admitting work, and who could be selected for their proved competency in the duties that they would be called upon to perform. But it has been impossible to find good men for the four vacancies at the salary of \$600 per annum, without maintenance, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have been requested, therefore, to increase the compensation to \$1,000 per annum, without maintenance.

#### Medical Appointments and Resignations.

On January 9 the Board of Trustees received a communication from Dr. Charles Phelps resigning his place as Attending Surgeon to the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital, to take effect on January 10, and the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Board of Trustees accepts with regret the resignation of Dr. Charles Phelps, who for fifty years past has been active in many capacities in the interests of the sick of this City;

"Resolved further, That Dr. Charles Phelps be and he hereby is appointed Consulting Surgeon to Bellevue Hospital."

On January 19 the following changes in the Attending Staff were approved by the Trustees: Dr. Charles Chetwood, transferred from the position of Attending Surgeon on the First Division to the similar position on the Fourth Division, left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Phelps; Dr. T. A. Smith, promoted from Assistant Attending Surgeon to Attending Surgeon on the Fourth Division, in place of Dr. Fluhrer, resigned; Dr. L. W. Hotchkiss, promoted from Assistant Attending Surgeon to Attending Surgeon, in place of Dr. Chetwood, transferred; Dr. J. C. Ayer, promoted from Adjunct Assistant Attending Surgeon to Assistant Attending Surgeon, in place of Dr. Hotchkiss, promoted; Dr. A. S. Vosburgh, appointed Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Attending Surgeon to the hospital, in place of Dr. Ayer, promoted.

On January 30 Dr. Edwin Beer and Dr. William S. Terberry were appointed Assistant Attending Surgeons, and Dr. William A. Downes was appointed Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Attending Surgeon to the hospital, on the Fourth Division.

#### Changes, Improvements, etc.

It has been the custom of the hospital to isolate the tuberculous patients, but on account of the small number that can be accommodated in the tent on the hospital grounds and the unusually large number of such patients under treatment, it has been difficult to follow this custom strictly. Accordingly, two of the general wards of the hospital have been set aside for tuberculous patients until their numbers shall be reduced.

The desk of the Policemen on duty in the men's prison ward has been transferred from in front of the sewing room to the prison ward. By this arrangement the officers are close at hand in case of an emergency in the prison ward, and space is provided at the entrance of the sewing room for bandage cutting and gauze picking machines.

The management of the Charity Hospital of New Orleans being desirous of establishing there a system of medical records similar to that of Bellevue Hospital, the Board of Trustees granted Miss L. Atlanta Ramsdell, who is in charge of the record room, under the Clinical Record Committee of the Medical Board, a leave of absence for one month from January 29, without pay, in order that she might superintend the installation of this system at the Charity Hospital.

#### Census for the Quarter.

With the continuation of the mild weather through the greater part of the winter the census of Bellevue Hospital has been lower than it was for the corresponding quarter of 1905. The average number of patients in the hospital daily has been 872, as compared with 926. The number of admissions has been 6,504, as against 7,144, and the total number of patients under treatment 7,382, as against 8,021.

The work of the Out Patient Department has shown an increase over that for the first quarter of last year, 21,385 visits having been made by patients during the quarter, as compared with 18,875 last year, and 557 more patients having been treated in the hospital dressing room than in the corresponding quarter of 1905.

#### The New Pavilions.

The brick buildings occupying the site of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital have been torn down, a fence has been erected separating the site from the Bellevue Hospital grounds, and the contractors are now carrying on the work of excavation, preparatory to driving the piles for the foundations. In order that there may be no delay by reason of any changes that may be necessary from time to time in the water and plumbing pipes on the grounds, the Superintendent has been authorized to issue orders for such changes, as the occasion may arise. Mr. Louis C. Frees, the General Inspector of Construction for the new Fordham Hospital, has been transferred to the same position for the new Bellevue Hospital.

Notice has been received from the Sinking Fund Commission of the assignment to this department of the newly made ground in the rear of the new bulkhead wall between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets, as an addition to the site of the hospital.

#### Training Schools.

The following resolution was adopted by the Trustees at the meeting of March 13: "Resolved, That the Board of Trustees has learned with great regret of the approaching withdrawal of Miss Delano from the position of Superintendent of Training Schools, and desires to express its hope that this withdrawal may not be permanent;

"Resolved further, That the Board recognizes the difficulties with which Miss Delano during her term of service has had to contend, and the marked ability and success with which she has performed the duties, both onerous and delicate, which have at times attached to her position. The Board is glad to place on record this testimony of esteem for her personally and satisfaction at the character of her work, together with an expression of its belief not only that this work has redounded to the credit and reputation of the hospital in the public eye, but also that it has been productive of real and lasting benefit to the service."

On January 19 Messrs. Parish & Schroeder were appointed architects for the building to be erected on East Twenty-sixth street, opposite Bellevue Hospital, for a nurses' home for the Bellevue Training School for Women Nurses. This appointment was made with the understanding that before it should go into effect Messrs. Parish & Schroeder should visit a number of training schools and submit a report for each one, upon a list of important subjects in connection with its construction and arrangement, that should be satisfactory to the Board of Trustees. This they have done very creditably, and there is, therefore, a large amount of valuable information now at hand for reference in planning the new building. An order has been given for the survey of the site and the preparation of a map for the use of the architects.

#### GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The progress made by the contractors on the new wing of the hospital has been slow, and the condition of the building is little advanced from that given in the last quarterly report. An extra order has been issued to the contractors for the work of widening the three windows in the new wing that have been cut down to the floor, in order that beds may be easily rolled out on the balconies for patients to enjoy the open air. The Trustees have approved of the estimates of the contractors for installing a watchman's time detector system, a fire alarm system and fire lines in accordance with the recommendations of Mr. Bonner, of the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association. They have also authorized the addition of 30 feet to the boiler stack, to improve the draught, and the cutting of a window in the dark room of the new out patient department. The architect has been requested to prepare plans and specifications for the furnishing and fittings of the dispensing room of the hospital.

#### Census for the Quarter.

On account of the disorder and confusion resulting from the building work on the new wing it has been impossible to accommodate as many patients as in previous years and the census, therefore, has continued to be lighter. The average number of patients in the hospital daily has been 76, as compared with 100 for the corresponding quarter of 1905. The number of admissions has been 686, as compared with 1,069, and the total number under treatment 764, as against 1,165.

## Medical Appointments and Changes.

The only medical appointment that has been made for Gouverneur Hospital during the quarter has been that of Dr. S. C. Mason as interne to the hospital from January 15, to take the place of Dr. C. H. Van Norman, who failed to report for duty. The Trustees have approved of the action of the Gouverneur Medical Board in allowing the members of the House Staff to continue to serve on the surgical side of the out patient department until additional appointments to this side of the out patient staff can properly be made. It has been decided that the examinations for internes at Gouverneur Hospital shall be open on equal terms to men and women.

The House Staff have requested that the new rule dividing the service, so that one side of the staff shall have six months of medical and eighteen months of surgical service and the other side six months of surgical and eighteen months of medical service, shall not affect the members of the staff who were appointed prior to its enactment. This request has been granted.

## HARLEM HOSPITAL.

Notice was received from the Sinking Fund Commission under date of January 26, of the renewal of the lease of the Harlem Hospital building for an indefinite period, subject to sixty days' notice by either party before its termination. The Commission has been requested also to renew the lease of the Annex Building at the present rental of \$85 per month, with the privilege of termination by either party after thirty days' notice.

## Census for the Quarter.

While the average daily census of patients in Harlem Hospital has been slightly lower than for the corresponding quarter of 1905, being 54, as compared with 56, the number of admissions has continued to be considerably higher, being 784, as compared with 604, and the total number of patients under treatment has been 858, as against 680. The demands upon the hospital have continued to increase with the growth of the section of the city in which it is located, and it has been very difficult to carry on the work in the old and inadequate buildings in use at present.

## Medical Appointments and Changes.

The following changes in the medical staffs of Harlem Hospital have been approved by the Trustees during the past quarter: Dr. Joseph E. Lumbard, appointed Anæsthetist to the hospital, January 9; Dr. Augustus F. Dempewolf, resigned from the position of Surgeon to Out Patients, January 30; Dr. Walter S. Reynolds, appointed Physician to Out Patients, January 30; Dr. Ida Oshlag, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients in the eye clinic, January 30; Dr. Clarence M. Graham, appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients in the children's clinic, March 7; Dr. D. D. Campbell, appointed House Surgeon, January 2; Dr. J. L. Felder and Dr. Charles Ginsberg, appointed Internes to the hospital, January 19.

Upon the recommendation of the Medical Board, the house staff has been divided into a medical and a surgical side. This change is desirable on account of the growth of the service, and a great advantage of making it at the present time is that the service will be running smoothly under the new order of things when the hospital is moved to the new building, where such a division of the staff will be a necessity. Acting upon the request of the Trustees, the Executive Committee has drawn up an excellent set of rules for the administration of anæsthetics. A letter having been received from the Sisters of St. Francis Hospital, asking the privilege of calling on Harlem Hospital occasionally for an ambulance, the Superintendent has been instructed to grant their request if it can be done without detriment to the Harlem Hospital service.

## The New Harlem Hospital.

The contractors for the new Harlem Hospital have continued their dilatory methods and it has been necessary to inform them that if they do not place a larger force of men on the work they will be dismissed and other contractors employed to finish the building. This has resulted in some improvement. The contract for the erection of iron balconies to the hospital was finally awarded on January 30, four months' time being allowed for its completion, in order that this work might not interfere with that of the general contractors. It having been found that, in accordance with the architects' plans, the contractor had provided a plaster cornice and an ornamental iron grille at the base of the skylight in the operating theatre, and a bead molding above the wainscot, instructions have been given for their removal and for refinishing the walls, in order that the operating room may have as few surfaces as possible to catch the dust.

The erection of the ambulance station and power house has progressed very satisfactorily, and it is probable that these buildings will be completed soon after the main building.

## FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The amount of work done by Fordham Hospital has been steadily increasing. Although the unusually mild weather continued through the greater part of the winter, the number of patients treated in the hospital was very large, the average daily census being 51, as compared with 45 for the corresponding quarter of 1905. The number of admissions has been 306, as compared with 268, and the total number under treatment 360, as against 313.

The resignation of Dr. Thomas Darlington from the position of Attending Physician to Fordham Hospital on account of the pressure of his duties as head of the Health Department, was accepted with regret by the Trustees at their meeting of February 27, and he was appointed Consulting Physician to the hospital. On January 2 Dr. Louis H. Taft was appointed Junior Assistant, and Dr. William H. Mitchell Second Junior Assistant, to the House Staff.

## The New Fordham Hospital.

A communication under date of February 6 was received from the contractors for the new Fordham Hospital requesting that an extension of time be granted them for the completion of their contract, on account of unforeseen difficulties and changes in their work. The Board requested them to use all possible means to finish the building at the specified time in July, informing them, however, that if it should become necessary a proper extension of time would be granted them.

Plans and specifications are about ready for advertisement for bids for installing a vacuum cleaning system in the new building as soon as it is completed. As at Gouverneur Hospital, provision has been made for changing two windows to doors, from the wards to the balconies, in order to allow patients to be rolled out in their beds or wheeled chairs to enjoy the open air.

The planning of the grounds of the new hospital has been awarded to Mr. R. F. Almirall, the architect for the building, and Mr. Almirall has already submitted preliminary sketches for the consideration of the Board of Trustees.

## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.)

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,  
HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, TUESDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor; Hon. Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Hon. Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen; Hon. John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Hon. Bird S. Coler, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx; Hon. Joseph Bermel, President, Borough of Queens, and Hon. George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After considering the Budget for the year 1907, the Board took up the consideration of Public Improvement matters.

### VESTING TITLE TO FLATBUSH AVENUE EXTENSION, BROOKLYN.

The Comptroller, as Chairman of the Committee to which this matter was referred on October 26, presented the following report, signed by two of the Committee.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on October 26, 1906, there was referred to a sub-committee of this Board, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, a report presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter of the vesting of title to Flatbush avenue extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on May 18, 1906, adopted a resolution rescinding a resolution of February 23, 1906, vesting title to Flatbush avenue on December 1, 1906, and adopted a new resolution advancing the date of the vesting of title to November 1, 1906.

This Committee has examined into the matter of the vesting of this title and finds the following state of facts:

1. The President of the Borough of Brooklyn has no money at the present time for the improvement of this street.

2. Should the original resolution be allowed to stand, vesting title on November 1 and the houses removed, the new street will be in an impassable condition from the time the houses are removed until the spring.

3. If it is not the intention of the Borough President to improve the street, there will be no necessity for removing the houses, and therefore there will be no necessity for vesting title. The City will thus save \$15,000 monthly.

4. We believe that better results can be obtained by the rescinding of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by the adoption of a resolution which will set the time for the vesting of title as March 1, 1907. In that event the houses can be advertised to be sold and removed, and the property turned over to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn on May 1, 1907. It will work no hardship upon the City nor upon the property owners, nor upon the tenants who by removing from the houses during the winter months would have hard work to obtain locations elsewhere.

There was also a protest, dated October 23, 1906, presented to your Committee against the vesting of title to Livingston street on November 1, 1906, and requesting that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "take no steps to vest title until the City is in a position to proceed with the actual construction of a new thoroughfare." The petition was signed by Abraham & Straus, Fred. Loeser & Co., B. G. Lattimer, Brooklyn Bank, Wm. Berri's Sons, Smith, Gray & Co., Sterling Piano Company and nineteen others, representing the best business interests of the City.

We therefore are of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should rescind the resolution adopted vesting title on November 1, 1906, and adopt a new resolution, which is hereto annexed, vesting title on March 1, 1907.

GENTLEMEN—Individually and as Secretary of this Association, I am interested in the, to my mind, most important improvement that the Borough of Brooklyn has before it, the extension of Flatbush avenue. Before the election last year our Association addressed the different candidates in regard to this matter, and since that time have held a mass meeting, which was enthusiastic for the immediate opening. Later on, your Board informed us officially that the time for the opening had been set for December 1, and on account of that promise no further public demonstrations were made. I am now informed that your Board since that time has formally set the time for November 1, but that on Tuesday next expect to take up the matter of putting it over for a further delay. The records in your office show that the people of Brooklyn are anxious to have this improvement begun at once, for many reasons, the most important of which are:

1. Additional street room will help the solution of the transportation problem.
2. The proposed widenings of streets will be unnecessary.
3. The avenue should be finished, irrespective of the completion of the Manhattan Bridge, and should be commenced now so that there will be no doubt that when the bridge is completed the avenue will be not only ready for traffic, as the gores, etc., which it is necessary for the various property owners to buy and sell will have been in a measure adjusted and the avenue be more presentable than it otherwise would be.

To Board of Estimate, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned taxpayers and merchants doing business in the Borough of Brooklyn on Fulton street, between Flushing avenue and the City Hall, respectfully petition your Honorable Body not to inflict further injury upon our business, needlessly, by vesting title and tearing down buildings for the Flatbush avenue extension this winter.

For several months past Fulton street has necessarily been torn up by the construction of the subway. To proceed to demolish a number of buildings fronting on one of the busiest sections of this thoroughfare would, at this time, further increase the difficulties under which business on this street is being done. This work should not be undertaken until the actual improvement of the new street can be carried on to completion, without delay.

Existing conditions on Livingston street are an indication of what might be expected on Fulton street if such work is prematurely undertaken.

We therefore respectfully petition your Honorable Body to take no steps to vest title until the City is in a position to proceed with the actual construction of the new thoroughfare.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 11th day of December, 1903, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending the approach to the Manhattan Bridge (Flatbush avenue extension) from Fulton street to Nassau street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York; and

Whereas, Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court, in proceedings to acquire title to said bridge approach, and the oaths of said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly filed as required by law on the 12th day of July, 1904; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that upon the 1st day of March, 1907, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said approach to the Manhattan Bridge (Flatbush avenue extension) not heretofore vested in The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Buildings, taken in accordance with recommendations of the City Superintendent of Schools, Associate City Superintendent Davis and District Superintendent Shiels, in discontinuing the further use for school purposes of the Recreation Pier at the foot of Third street, East river, Borough of Manhattan.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Buildings in accepting the proposition of Otto Metz to omit from his contract the work of erecting partitions on the recreation pier and allow a deduction of \$2,665 from his contract in lieu of the work thus omitted.

Extending the thanks and appreciation of the Department of Education to the Department of Docks and Ferries for the spirit of prompt and courteous co-operation which it has uniformly manifested in granting the use for school purposes of the said recreation pier at a period when the congested conditions prevailing in Districts Nos. 4 and 5 rendered occupancy of the same a positive desideratum.

Requesting Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of the basement floor of the premises No. 417 East Eighty-fifth street, Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 77, for a period of one year from October 7, 1906, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$600, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owner, Mrs. Frances Gold, No. 417 East Eighty-fifth street, City.

Requesting the President of the Borough of The Bronx to take up the matter at once of paving, with some suitable material, East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, between Boston road and Jackson avenue, in front of the Morris High School, and if possible to have said work done before the commencement of winter weather.

Appropriating the sum of eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied in payment of the following bills:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted on May 25, 1906, and September 14, 1906, authorized the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of certain lands and premises on South Third and Keap streets, adjoining Public School 19, Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for school purposes; and

Whereas, Said lands and premises are urgently required for school purposes, and title thereto should be acquired by the City at as early a date as possible; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution, in accordance with the provisions of section 1439 of the revised Charter, as amended, directing that title to said lands and premises, and all interests therein, vest in The City of New York ten days after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal to be appointed in the condemnation proceedings above mentioned.

Mr. Greene presented a departmental estimate for the year 1907 amounting to \$26,795,398.13, with the following resolution:

The motion was seconded and lost.

Mr. A. Stern called attention to the fact that the position of Private Secretary had been eliminated from the list of Clerks, etc., for the City Superintendent's Bureau, and moved that the departmental estimate be amended so as to restore said position and provide a salary of \$2,500 per annum therefor.

The motion was seconded and lost.

The President put the question whether the Board would approve the departmental estimate as submitted by the Committee on Finance and adopt the resolution attached thereto, and it was decided in the affirmative by a unanimous vote.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
