The selected financial services vendor will be charged with distributing funds received from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery, received by The City, to eligible networks, tracking all funds distributed and reporting on all expenditures.

Partner Spotlight: PREPSI

People Resilient Educated & Prepared of Staten Island (PREPSI) were recently featured in the Staten Island Urban Center's Summer 2023 Reflection Report.



Staten Island Urban Center (SIUC) and partners are launching a new emergency preparedness coalition called People Resilient, Educated and Prepared of Staten Island (PREPSI).

PREPSI organizes grassroots, frontline groups serving youth and families among Staten Island's underserved North Shore neighborhoods beginning with Tompkinsville, Stapleton and St. George.

With the guidance of NYC Office of Emergency Management, PREPSI members will utilize a mapping process that prominently raises specific ways to reduce the loss and casualty of predictable crises both in better resident preparedness and in better government services, and provide public education on disaster preparedness.

The PREPSI coalition expands community preparedness by improving grassroots, frontline responses particularly for targeted low income communities of color. The PREPSI priority neighborhoods are distinctly high need communities. Centers for Disease Control reported that North Shore Staten Island neighborhoods are in the 25% least healthy census blocks in the nation because of the intersection of environmental, health and social hazards.

The PREPSI target areas represent the heart of diversity and social action on Staten Island. Our targeted approach relies on existing relationships, networks and trust among the community, and seeks to distribute important disaster response tools and information as needed.



The public health and healthcare workforce is shrinking. Nationally, an estimated 80,000 new hires are needed in order for state and local health departments to continue providing core public health services.

This webinar will examine the opportunities presented by the flow of migrants and asylum seekers to address workforce



shortages in the health system. Panelists will provide an overview of the migrant and asylum seeker experience, the challenges they face, and the government and civic response. BUREAU: Planning and Resilience Shelter Program Specialist, \$57,500-\$65,000 – Job ID# 598540


The Shelter Specialist reports to the Shelter Program Manager in the Human Services Unit, within the Planning and Resilience Bureau at NYCEM. The Specialist works with the Program Manager to write, maintain, amend, and operationalize emergency response plans and supporting materials in support of the Coastal Storm Plan's Citywide Sheltering Plan. The Specialist also acts as a liaison to and co-chair of the Citywide Shelter Planning Board, a committee made up of City agencies responsible for the staffing considerations of running the City's emergency coastal storm shelters.

The Multimedia Content Specialist role focuses on creating compelling multimedia content that conveys the vital work of NYCEM, fostering awareness, education, and engagement. NYC Street Harassment Prevention Survey







The NYC <u>Street Harassment Prevention Advisory Board</u> (SHPAB) requests your help in taking its street harassment survey and in spreading awareness about the "End Street Harassment: A NYC Resource Guide" which can both be found at <u>nyc.gov/endstreetharassment</u>.

Street harassment is a form of violence and a reality for far too many New Yorkers. Street harassment is unwanted and unwelcome threatening or offensive acts, statements, or behaviors directed at someone in public spaces such as sidewalks, streets, parks, and public transportation. We know this kind of harassment harms people of all ages, races, national origins, gender identities and expressions, sexual orientations, and people with disabilities. It can have both immediate and long-term effects on individuals and communities.

The public survey will enable us to gather vital information about the frequency and impacts of street harassment across communities in New York City, as well as what kind of resources people are looking for to help prevent and respond to street harassment.

- TAKE the survey and share it with your networks.
