

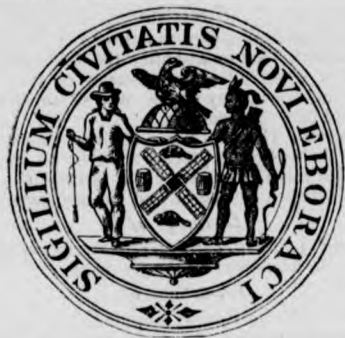

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of
Commissioners of the Department of Public
Parks for the week ending Saturday, January
17, 1874:

SPECIAL MEETING.

January 19, 1870—9:30 A. M.

A communication was received from the Coun-
cil to the Corporation, stating that the
Department is authorized by law to discontinue
the proceedings in the matter of acquiring title
to lands for a parade ground; whereupon a
resolution was adopted discontinuing the above-
mentioned proceedings.

Ten brick urinals were ordered to be replaced
by similar structures made of iron.

A rule was established, limiting the age of ap-
plicants for positions on the police force to be-
tween 25 and 40 years old.

The Board has under consideration the applica-
tion of the Fire Department to construct on
one of the city parks a depot for keeping explo-
sives.

A report was received from the civil and topo-
graphical engineer, on the bulkhead lines along
the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek.

Reports were received from the assistant civil
and topographical engineer and two division
engineers, on the status, &c., of works in the
recently annexed district.
