TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as 2 paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on
