

SIR—There were 746 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 7, 1883, which is an increase of 19, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 16 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1882. The actual mortality for the week ending March 31, 1883, was 727, which is 102.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.90 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,308,119.
