#### SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 20,249; the number of causes of complaint was 6,439, as follows :

During the three months ending March 31, 1882, ten thousand two hundred and seventy-seven (10,277) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and twenty-one (221) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; six hundred and seventeen (617) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and twenty-five (925) Coroner's certificates were received and recorded; one thousand and ninety-nine (1,099) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and six hundred and forty (640) transcripts of the records of deaths, seventy-three (73) of marriages, and seventy-eight (78) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand three hundred and eighty-two (5,382) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand eight hundred and seventy-six (6,876) children were born during the same period.



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#### OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1882, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,020. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents as to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

#### FINANCE DEPARTMENT-COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, ( July 13, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN-At the last meeting a resolution to authorize the leasing of the ferries between Twenty-third street and Tenth street, East river, and Greenpoint, Long Island, was laid over.

These ferries are now leased to the Greenpoint Ferry Company ; the leases expire on August 1st, 1882

I submit separate resolutions to authorize the leasing of these ferries, for the term of eight years and ten months, from August 1st, 1882, when the existing leases expire, in order that the period of the new leases may correspond with the term of an existing lease executed by the Department of Docks of a part of the wharf property required for ferry purposes at the landing near the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, for the term of ten years from the 1st day of June, 1881.

When the leases expire, June 1, 1891, the whole of the wharf property required for ferry purposes will come under the control of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and may then be leased along with the franchise, as provided by chapter 498, Laws of 1880.

The wharf property at the foot of Tenth street cannot now be leased with the ferry franchise, because it is in possession of private parties, whose rights of ownership are doubtful and will be the subject of legal determination.

The rates of ferriage at these ferries have been established by law and ordinance of the Common Council, schedules of which are attached to the present leases, and they are considered reasonable and satisfactory.

The rate for foot-passengers is three cents at both ferries, and no complaint has been made of any of the rates of ferriage.

GENTLEMEN-The Comptroller, to whom was referred, at the last meeting, a communication from James McWilliams, relative to the leasing of the second story of the Centre Market building, respectfully

#### **REPORTS**:

That he has investigated the matter, and herewith submits the reports of an examination of the premises made at his request, by Mr. Douglas Smyth, Architect, and Thomas McAvoy, Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, Department of Public Works, of the condition of the building and the effect upon it of the heavy steam-power presses employed by Mr. McWilliams, in his printing establishment, occupying one portion of the second story.

I also submit affidavits of the effect of the steam-power machinery on the building when occupied by the Eleventh Regiment, made by F. Unbekant, Colonel Commanding, and Henry Besier, Armorer of the Regiment.

These reports and affidavits show positively, that the operation of the heavy steam-power machinery employed by Mr. McWilliams has jarred and injured the walls of the building to such an extent as to be considered dangerous, and that the constant vibration of the machinery, if continued, will eventually disintegrate the bearing-walls of the market building.

Under these circumstances, I respectfully submit that the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, making it a condition of a lease of the second story of the Centre Market building, that "no machinery requiring steam power shall be permitted to be used on the said "market premises," should be confirmed, and such occupation and use be prohibited in said building.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

#### Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held July 14, 1882.

Present-William R. Grace, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain; and John McClave, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller reported that the balance June 30, 1882, to the credit of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," was \$653,808.01; and that the amount of interest payable from said fund August 1, 1882, was \$66,897.06, leaving a surplus of \$586,910.95; and recommended that the sum of \$500,000 of said balance be transferred to "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by law; and submitted the following resolution for that purpose, viz. :-

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain on account of the "Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," for the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (500,000), transferring that amount to the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

III.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT-COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, July 5, 1882.

#### To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom was referred, March 13, 1882, a petition from Robert Irwin, to be reinvested with the title to the premises, on the corner of Seventy-ninth street and Fourth avenue (now under foreclosure and sale for satisfaction of a mortgage to the city), respectfully

#### **REPORTS**:

That a petition of the same nature was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by Mr. Irwin, and referred to the Comptroller upon the 29th of last October, on which the Counsel to the Corporation gave an opinion adverse to the power of the Board to comply with the petition to remit the interest, taxes and costs due on the premises under foreclosure and sale, on payment of the mentered the principal.

On January 13, 1882, the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on said petition, was sub-mitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, when, on motion of the Recorder, a resolution was adopted, authorizing the Comptroller to execute a deed to the petitioner, reinvesting him with the title to the property referred to in said petition, upon his complying, within sixty days from the date thereof, with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in respect to the payment of the mortgage debt and costs of foreclosure and sale.

This resolution was not complied with by the petitioner, but on March 13, 1882, Mr. Irwin pre-sented another petition, alleging that the Counsel to the Corporation had, with respect to the first petition, "reported upon a mistake of fact adversely to said petition."

#### THE CITY RECORD.

# This second petition was also sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for his reconsideration, and his opinion thereon, dated June 5, 1882, is herewith submitted, in which he states that, after consul-tation with Mr. Knox, counsel of the petitioner, and careful consideration, he "is still of the opinion "that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have no power to relieve Mr. Irwin from the payment "of the mterest on the mortgage, it being pledged to the payment of the interest of the city debt as "the principal of the mortgage is pledged to the payment of the principal of such debt ;" and fur-ther also, he states, that " neither do 1 find any power in the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to "relieve Mr. Irwin from the payment of any taxes that may have been levied or assessed upon the "said lot under foreclosure sale."

In regard to the expenses incurred by the city, the Counsel to the Corporation further says : "So far as the costs are concerned, I think Mr. Irwin should pay at least what disbursements the city has made in the matter for searcher's fees in the suit, and of the referee, to compute and sell, and also the sum which the city was compelled to pay the purchaser at the sale (on his motion to be relieved from his purchase) for his expenses in searching the title."

Upon a review of the whole matter I fully concur in the conclusions of the Counsel to the Corporation, and now submit a resolution denying the prayer of the petitioner and directing the sale at public auction of the property in question, as provided by law, for a sum of not less than the amount of the mortgage debt and all costs and expenses attending the suit and previous sale of the premises under foreclosure of the mortgage thereon, as advised by the Counsel to the Corporation.

"The said Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of Croton water, which rents shall be collected in the man-ner now provided by law."—Chap. 574, Sec. 5, Session Laws of 1871.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Depart-ment of Public Works shall be as tollows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 10 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates, as established by Ordinance of the Common Council, March, 1851.

shall be charged an extra rate of either ten to twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works. LAGER BEER SALOONS, with no water fixtures in the saloon, five dollars per annum. PRINTING OFFICES AND REFECTORIES shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES shall be charged at the rate of five cents for every bullock slaughtered.

five cents for every bullock slaughtered. STEAM ENGINES shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows : for each horse-power up to and not ex-ceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; or each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, and about stables, is prohibited, because it is absolutely necessary to save water for more necessary purposes Where premises are pro-vided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the Police or Inspectors may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. All closets or urinals in which the Croton water from any service pipe or hydrant connecting with a privy vault or man-hole shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

WATER-CLOSET RATES-For hoppers, of any form when water is supplied direct from the Croton sup-ply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each per year twenty dollars. For any pan-closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is detective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars. For any of mo for poper or water-closet, supplied from any oi the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like asafe waste, as provided by the Board of Health Regulations, per year, two dollars.

It is provided by section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and set-ting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
