ders or farcy, but shall at once report the fact to the Board
of Health of said city, and under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent shall remove such animal in the manner designated by such Sanitary Superintendent. No animal having glanders or farcy, or any contagious disease, or
that shall de thereof, shall be removed, disposed of, or exposed in any street or public place in said city, without a
written permit from said Board of Health, and then only
in accordance with the terms of such permit.

Resolved, That the following be and is hereby adopted
as an additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code, viz:

Sec. 185. That every veterinary surgeon who is called
to examine or professionally attend any animal within the
