

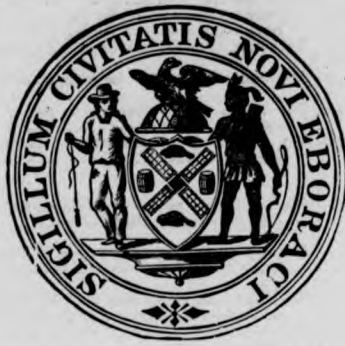

The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

269 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 46 cases; and for violation of the Code in 1 case.

Resolutions.

That a copy of the report of the Attorney and Counsel, in respect to certain claims for damages by occupants of stalls and stands covering the sidewalks, gutters, and parts of the public streets in the vicinity of Washington Market, be forwarded to the Comptroller.

That the application of Carl Kullman to correct a clerical error in record of death of his wife Carolina be granted.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to take proper measures to prevent the dumping of manure at foot of Ninety-sixth street, East river, and other places.

That the cellars occupied for human habitation, which have been vacated by order of the Board, and reoccupied without permit, be vacated by the Sanitary Superintendent; and he is hereby authorized to employ the necessary labor, and that the aid of the police be requested in the execution of said order.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause an inspection and report to be made on the condition of the stables of the Madison Avenue Stage Line and of the Fourth Avenue Railroad, with full description of the construction of said stables, and of the facilities for the removal of urine and manure.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 10, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,945, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 952 tenement houses, 92 private dwellings, 85 other dwellings, 27 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and ware-houses, 47 stables, 4 markets, 24 slaughter-houses, 11 fat-melting establishments, 9 dumping grounds, 1 coal yard, 1 roadway, 25 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public sewer and drain, 67 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 66 waste-pipes and drains, 152 privies and water-closets, 131 street gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 3 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 3 violations of code, 20 other nuisances, together with 95 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 761.

During the past week 68 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

55 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

218 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 114 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 92 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 1,347 privy sinks, 31 cellars, and 44 yards, and 153 1/2 miles of street gutters.

56 persons were removed to the hospital, and 5 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

10 tanks and 4,148 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending July 10, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending July 10, 1875: Calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 3 carcasses; beef, 558 pounds; cattle feet, 1,600 pounds; and fish, 100 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 10, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 743 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies *in transitu*, and 32 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 743 deaths, 198 marriages, 446 births, 32 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 84 returns from Coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to Coroners.
