

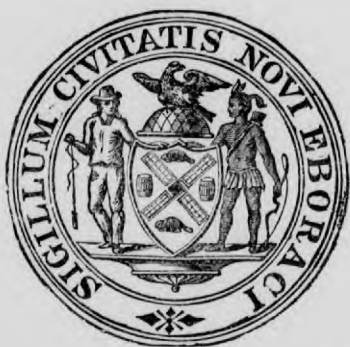

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor :

SIR—In compliance with the provisions of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards hereby submits the following statement of the transactions of this office during the three months ending March 31, 1892.

During the quarter there were sixty-three contracts of all kinds in force, thirty contracts completed and twenty-five new contracts made.

There were 4,591.82 linear feet of sewer built, 473 spurs laid, 4 receiving-basins and 41 man-holes built.

5,992 cubic yards of earth and 16,767 cubic yards of rock were excavated and 69,413 cubic yards of filling done.

CONSTRUCTION BUREAU.

There were sixty-three contracts of all kinds in force during the quarter. These contracts comprise the following works, viz. :

The total length of sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards at the end of the quarter is 216,340.33 linear feet, or 40.973 miles, of which amount 4,591.82 linear feet have been built during the quarter, being divided as follows :

1,726 linear feet of brick sewer and 2,865.82 linear feet of pipe sewer.

"C."—Preparation of Final Maps.

A preliminary plan combining the established and legally opened streets with a new system was prepared and submitted. This was prepared in two sheets. Sheet No. 1 comprises the area bounded by Third avenue, Westchester avenue, Brook avenue, New York and Harlem Railroad, Kingsbridge road and Harlem river, covering 3,100 4-10 acres, and laying out 118 6-10 miles of streets. Sheet No. 2 comprises the area bounded by Brook avenue, New York and Harlem Railroad, Pelham avenue, Bronx river, Westchester avenue, Home street, Prospect avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Robbins and Westchester avenues, covering 1,931 2-10 acres, and laying out 105 miles of streets.

These two sheets, with the plans previously submitted, will show the laying-out of the whole district south of the Kingsbridge road and Pelham avenue, and covers the whole of the Twenty-third Ward and 3,074 7-10 acres of the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Calculations for establishment of the streets and grades, studies and profiles of the sections on which hearing was given to the public on March 28, 1892, were progressed. These are the sections lying in the Twenty-third Ward and not embodied in the submitted plan mentioned above. These plans are drawn on a scale of 300 feet to one inch. The sections of the final maps drawn on a scale of 150 feet to one inch in various stages of completion were progressed. The special map or plan showing the change of Dawson street and the discontinuing of Hewitt place, which will be embodied in the final maps, defining 4,312 feet of streets or seven (7) blocks, was prepared during the quarter.

"D."—Monumenting.

Instructions were prepared for referencing the monuments on East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, from Weeks street to Railroad avenue, West; Burnside avenue, from Webster to Sedgwick avenue; East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Jerome avenue to Harlem Railroad.

"E."—Field Work.

13 monument points were reset on Webster avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth to East One Hundred and Seventy-third street.

Monument points referenced on—

East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, from Weeks street to Railroad avenue, West.

Burnside avenue, from Webster to Sedgwick avenue.

II.—TAX MAPS.

"A."—Office Work.

Final calculations, examinations, searches and comparisons of surveys were completed in Volume X of the Twenty-fourth Ward for 284 properties or parcels containing 3,477 city lots. The drafting on bond paper of the office copies for the 24 pages of this volume is almost completed. The drafting on mounted paper for the Department of Taxes and Assessments of 3 pages is finished, and the drafting of 6 pages is progressing favorably.

Auxiliary maps and blue prints relating to tax maps will be enumerated below under the head of drafting. The record books containing the real estate transfers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards were kept up to date.

"B."—Field Work.

Both field parties were engaged in making locations of buildings and fences for the preparation of tax maps during two months.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
