

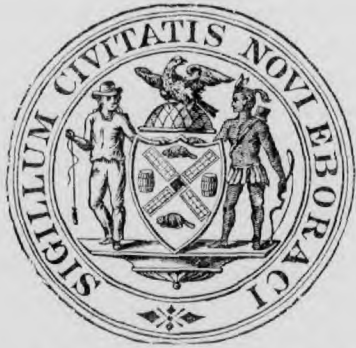

The Board met pursuant to notice.

Present—Commissioners Michael C. Murphy, President; John B. Cosby, M. D., the President of the Board of Police.

President Baldwin of the Long Island Railroad Company appeared before the Board and made a statement in respect to the burning of soft coal by the company. The subject was laid on the table for further consideration.

The report of the committee appointed July 6, 1898, to investigate the alleged nuisances at Barren Island, was received and unanimously approved, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Sanitary Utilization Company be required to forthwith make provision so that the scows or boats upon which the garbage is brought to Barren Island shall be floated under a shed or building so constructed that it may be closed air tight before the garbage is removed from the scows or boats to the buildings on the Island.

Resolved, That all openings and windows in or about the part of the plant in which the garbage is received shall be so closed as to prevent the entrance of air or the escape therefrom of any odor, and that the air required shall be driven into the rooms of said plant by suitable fans or blowers.

Resolved, That the air shall be drawn off in a similar way and discharged into scrubbers provided with large quantities of water, greatly in excess of the theoretical amount, such waters to be charged with hydrochloric acid, and the effluent to be discharged under the waters of the bay, at a point below low tide, by means of suitable pumps, and that all fans, blowers, pumps, scrubbers and apparatus necessary for the purpose mentioned be erected in duplicate so that the breaking down of one set will not cause a nuisance from the consequent lack of control, which would result if only one set were to be employed.

Resolved, That the alterations and improvements herewith recommended be and are hereby required to be made forthwith, and that the President of the Board of Health be authorized in the recess of the Board to revoke the permit of said company upon failure to comply at once with such recommendations.

Resolved, That Messrs. P. White's Sons be and are hereby required to replace the present scrubbers used in their plant on Barren Island with jet condensers of such capacity and constructed and placed in such manner as may be directed by the Sanitary Superintendent of this Department.

Resolved, That Messrs. P. White's Sons be and are hereby directed to thoroughly disinfect and deodorize all dead animals removed by them from The City of New York as soon as received, and to continue this treatment until the same have been placed in tanks at their disposal works on Barren Island.

Resolved, That the alterations and improvements herewith recommended be and are hereby required to be made forthwith, and that the President of the Board of Health be authorized in the recess of the Board to revoke the permit of the said P. White's Sons upon failure to comply at once with such recommendations.

Resolved, That E. J. McKeever be and is hereby required to make such alterations in his scrubbers or condensers as may be required by the Sanitary Superintendent of this Department.

Resolved, That E. J. McKeever be and is hereby directed to thoroughly disinfect and deodorize all dead animals removed by him from The City of New York as soon as received, and to continue this treatment until the same have been placed in tanks at his disposal works on Barren Island.

Resolved, That the alterations and improvements herewith recommended be and are hereby required to be made forthwith, and that the President of the Board of Health be authorized in the recess of the Board to revoke the permit of the said E. J. McKeever upon failure to comply at once with such recommendations.

Resolved, That the recommendations contained in the report of the Committee as to nuisances on Barren Island, this date presented to the Board, be and are hereby adopted, and the persons, firms and corporations in said report named are directed to forthwith make the alterations, changes and additions to their respective plants, boats and scows, as recommended by said report; and the Secretary is directed to notify the said persons, firms or corporations, and the Sanitary Superintendent is directed to take such steps as may be necessary to compel the said persons, firms or corporations to at once comply with said recommendations; it is further

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby directed to prepare and submit to this Board such changes in the Sanitary Code as are recommended by the report of the said Committee.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to require the contractors employed in the removal of dead animals from The City of New York to Barren Island, to thoroughly disinfect and deodorize said animals as soon as received, and continue this treatment until the same have been placed in tanks at their disposal works.

On motion, it was
Resolved, That Samuel G. Burns be and is hereby temporarily appointed a Bookkeeper in this Department, Borough of Manhattan, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, with salary at the rate of one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, from September 1, 1898.

Certificate in respect to the vacation of premises at No. 368 Sixth avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:
Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 368 Sixth avenue, Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants;

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 368 Sixth avenue, Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before September 9, 1898, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
