On motion, duly seconded, the report of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

The Secretary reported that the Committee on Transfers had reconsidered its action in disapproving the request of the Tenement House Department for authority to transfer Henry H. Ehrlich from the position of Clerk to that of Messenger, and had submitted the request to the Commission without recommendation. Mr. Ehrlich was formerly employed in the Department as a Messenger, but had been appointed to the position of Clerk from the eligible list for that position. The ground upon which the request had formerly been disapproved by the Committee was that there was a preferred list for the position of Messenger, formed pursuant to the provisions of section 1543 of the Charter. It appearing that there had not been a cessation of Mr. Ehrlich's services.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to issue the certificate of transfer.

The Committee on Transfers also presented, without recommendation, the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan for authority to transfer Eugene Nagy, Topographical Draughtsman, from the fourth to the fifth grade, his name appearing upon an eligible list after examination in which he qualified for appointment at any salary.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to issue the certificate of transfer.

On motion, duly seconded, the request of the Secretary for authority to purchase one eight-drawer cabinet file was granted.

The Secretary reported that Thomas J. Murphy, a temporary Clerk, had been absent without leave on Monday, April 6, and on every business day since that time.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to prepare charges against Mr. Murphy, to send him a copy of them, and to notify him that any statement he might care to make would be received by the Commission on Friday, May 8, 1903, at 3 p. m.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was authorized to receive applications for Patrolman from persons who are above the age of twenty years and who are qualified in other respects.

The Secretary stated that the Commissioner of Public Charities had called his attention to the fact that though the classification limited the salary to be paid Orderlies, in the non-competitive class, to \$240 per annum, there was no limitation upon the salaries which might be paid Hospital Helpers in the same class, and that an opportunity for evading the law and rules was thereby presented.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner of Public Charities that the Commission would be very glad to receive any suggestions, in writing, which he might care to make.

The Secretary reported that the name of Henry C. Hildebrandt, Chief Clerk, Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Queens, had been dropped from the payroll of that Bureau on September 19, 1902; that it had been restored December 19, 1902, and had since appeared thereon for two months, without time.

On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the President and Commissioner Perrine.

The Secretary presented the cases of William M. O'Connor and James Winn, Laborers, employed in the Department of Education. The Department desired the services of two Laborers who could read and write, and had appointed these persons from the eligible list, though they were not at that time within the number from which the appointing power could make selections. Since then, however, the persons whose names had preceded theirs on the list had been appointed in other departments.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to recognize the appointments and to pass the payrolls of the persons appointed.

The Secretary stated that the Treasury Department had authorized the custodian of the United States Courthouse and Postoffice building in Brooklyn to post the notices of the Commission's examinations on the bulletin boards in that building, and that he had also procured the consent of the postmasters in the city to post the notices in the buildings under their supervision and in the stations thereof. He also stated that arrangement had been made with the Board of City Record to advertise the examinations in two copies of each of the official papers of the City.

The President stated that Alfred Schaefer, candidate for Patrolman, had passed the medical examination for the position, but had not appeared in time to take the physical tests, and requested authority to notify Mr. Schaefer to take the physical examination at a subsequent date.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted.

Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, appeared before the Commission and stated that as there was a strike among the employees of the tugboat companies whose boats were used to tow the dumpers to sea, he had been unable to have that work performed. The men had, however, offered to do the work for the City directly, and the Commissioner requested authority to employ them while the strike was in progress.

On motion, duly seconded, the Commissioner was authorized to employ a sufficient number of persons to perform the work referred to, under the provisions of Rule 7, paragraph 2, for a period not to exceed one week.

The Secretary stated that Frederick J. Smith, candidate for Fireman, had met with an accident while undergoing physical examination, and that he was granted a re-examination, but was unable to appear for the latter, as he was still suffering from the injury which he had sustained.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was authorized to have Mr. Smith examined physically at any time prior to the date of the mental examination.

The application of John Stephen Morgan for the position of Axeman was accepted, it appearing that, though it was not filed during the time set for the receipt of such applications, it had been filed before the date upon which Mr. Morgan was informed the receipt of such applications would close.

The Secretary stated that Mary Hughes, candidate for the position of Attendance Officer, who had not appeared at the physical examination, had claimed that her failure to do so was due to the fact that she had not received a notice to appear. He stated further that, in pursuance of the instructions of the Commission, such

applications were still being received, and that another physical examination would be held.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to notify the applicant to appear at the next physical examination.

The report of the Chief Examiner on uncompleted examinations was ordered filed.

The report of the Labor Clerk upon the examinations for Dock Builder held April 9, 14, 15 and 16 was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from Paul V. O'Neil, attorney for a number of persons employed as Trained Nurses in the various institutions controlled by the City, requesting that the hearing on the requests of the Commissioner of Public Charities and the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals that the position be included in the non-competitive class, be reopened, and that he be given an opportunity to make a statement in behalf of his clients before the request is acted on.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. O'Neil, the Commissioner of Public Charities and the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals that the hearing would be continued on Friday, May 8, at 3 p. m.

A letter was presented from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners stating that they had endeavored to secure an Inspector of Steel, for service in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, from the eligible list for that position, but had been unsuccessful, and requesting authority to appoint Frederick Newman, a resident of Pittsburgh, under the provisions of Rule 7, paragraph 8.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to hold a competitive examination for the position of Inspector of Steel for service outside the City of New York.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Brooklyn, requesting the Commission to recognize an increase in the salary of James Magrath, Assistant Engineer, from \$2,100 to \$2,400. It appearing that Mr. McGrath had never passed an examination, the request was, on motion, denied.

A letter was presented from the Aqueduct Commission, making requisition for persons eligible to fill vacancies in the positions of Rodman, Leveler and Transitman. The Secretary stated that there were persons in lower grades eligible for promotion to these positions after examination, and that examinations to qualify them had been arranged.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Aqueduct Commission that the examinations for promotion would be held without delay, and that after the promotions were made, certification would be made to fill the remaining vacancies.

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission notifying the Municipal Commission of the approval of the resolution including the position of Third Deputy Police Commissioner in the exempt class. The letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, requesting the Commission to examine Drs. Nicholas, Ball and Burkhalter, employed in the position of Physician, for promotion from the fourth to the eighth grade. It appearing that neither of these persons had served for a sufficient length of time to entitle him to such promotion, under the provisions of Rule 38, the request was

On motion, denied.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Police, requesting that an examination be held for promotion to the position of third grade Clerk, and that, among others, George Ormsby, Typewriting Copyist, first grade, appointed October 2, 1902, be permitted to take such examination.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to notify the Commissioner of Police that Mr. Ormsby could not be promoted from the list so formed until he had served the length of time requisite under the provisions of Rule 38.

A letter was presented from Examiner P. S. Hildreth, requesting that the Commission discontinue the holding of examinations for the position of Assistant Engineer in the Rapid Transit Commission at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, and suggesting that the Commission appoint one or more members to act with Mr. Collingwood and himself, with the view of making investigations of and recommendations regarding relations of the civil service work with the Engineer employees of the City. The suggestions of Mr. Hildreth were approved by the Chief Examiner. The Secretary stated that he had sent a copy of the letter to Mr. William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and presented a letter from the latter, requesting the Commission to continue to hold the examinations, and stating that the employees certified to them as the result of such examinations in the past had been very satisfactory.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examination, in compliance with the request of Mr. Parsons.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, requesting the Commission to take from the class of persons desiring employment in the positions in the non-competitive class who are required to file applications those who apply for positions paying \$180 per annum or less.

On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, requesting that Henry Zartman be examined for promotion from the position of Sounder to that of Engineman. On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the President.

Reports of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated April 1, 6, 24, 28 and 30, were approved and ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Civil Service Reform Association, stating that they had received a complaint to the effect that John F. Cronin, a Foreman in the labor class, was employed to perform the duties of Superintendent at the Sewage Disposal Works, Far Rockaway.

On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the Character Examiner.

The Secretary stated that Commissioner Mason had requested him to present to the Commission the case of Daniel A. Begley, candidate for Patrolman in the examination now being held. Mr. Begley was unable to appear for physical examination when notified to do so, as he was suffering from an injury which prevented his attendance. Commissioner Mason had agreed to bring the matter to the attention of the Commission, but had forgotten to do so at an earlier meeting. On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Begley to appear for physical examination upon some date prior to the holding of the mental examination.

A letter was presented from Mrs. Julia E. Tillman, employed since 1865 as Purveyor in the House of Detention, Manhattan, requesting the Commission to place her name upon the civil list as a Police Matron. On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the Law Committee.

The Commission then went into executive session.

At the conclusion of the executive session the regular meeting was resumed, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That James P. Conway be and he is hereby transferred from the position of Examiner at \$1,200 per annum to that of Examiner at \$2,400 per annum, such transfer taking effect May 1, 1903.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That Civil Service Rule 5 be amended by inserting after paragraph 3 thereof the following:

"The powers conferred upon the Board of Examiners by these rules are in all cases subject and subordinate to the power of the Municipal Civil Service Commission."

The President stated that he had discovered that the correct record of Jefferson Deevy, who was examined in November, 1899, for promotion to the grade of Captain of Police, had not been transmitted to the Commission at the time of said examination, and that if all of the fines and penalties to which he had been subjected had been before the Commission at that time, his name could not have been placed upon the eligible list, and he could not have been subsequently promoted. He called attention to the eleventh paragraph of Rule 29, providing that "If a person who is not entitled to certification is certified and appointed, his appointment shall be immediately revoked by the appointing officer upon notification by the Municipal Commission."

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the President be and he is hereby requested to inform Mr. Deevy that under the provisions of Rule 29 the Commission deems it their duty to revoke the certification of his name as eligible for appointment to the grade of Captain in the Police Department, but that before doing so they will hear whatever statements he may care to make in the matter on Friday, May 8, 1903, at 3 p. m.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Friday, May 8, 1903, at 3 p. m.

That all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor on the first floor, the ground space cleaned, disinfected, cemented, and so graded and drained that all surface water and liquid matter shall be discharged into the street sewer by and through a properly trapped, extra heavy drain; that the floor of the horse stalls on the first and second floors be provided with valley drains, properly trapped and connected with the sewer connected drain, and that said floors of horse stalls be provided with suitable movable slats; that all saturated woodwork around the horse stalls be removed and replaced by new woodwork; that the walls and ceilings of the first and second floors be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the stable on the first and second floors be properly ventilated to the external air; that the roadway leading to the second floor be cleaned and disinfected; that the manure pit in the yard be emptied, cleaned and disinfected, and its use as a receptacle for manure discontinued; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stable and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk; that the defective wooden floor (second floor) be removed and replaced by a new water-tight flooring.

### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, May 12, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and the Chief Engineer.

The minutes of May 5, 6 and 8 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimates contained in vouchers Nos. 15151 and 15152, amounting to \$36,095.57, and of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 15153 to 15166, inclusive, amounting to \$2,312.93.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Construction or Executive Committee reported to the Commissioners Report No. 527 of the Chief Engineer, dated March 25, 1903, relating to certain gate-houses required to be built at the Jerome Park Reservoir, with the recommendation that the same be filed.

The recommendation was approved, and it was so ordered.

The Chief Engineer presented progress report for the week ending May 8, 1903.

Whereupon, after discussion, the said report was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee, and the Chief Engineer was directed to inquire of the contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam as to why the force is less than that employed during the preceding week, and also to inquire of the contractors for the construction of the Muscote Dam as to why they have not increased their force.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

(Copy.)

May 6, 1903.

REPORT No. 570.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith a letter dated March 12, 1903, and a postal card dated March 26, 1903, both of which are addressed to President William H. Ten Eyck, from the President of the Borough of The Bronx. They were referred to me at your meetings of March 20 and 27, respectively, and I would report thereon as follows:

The subject referred to in these communications is the blow-off pipe line from Jerome Park Reservoir, from Gatehouse No. 2 to the Broadway sewer, the levels of which, as originally proposed would interfere with the grading of certain streets.

After due consideration, I have decided to modify the original plan by lowering the pipe line so as not to interfere with the street surface, and I have also designed a connection with the sewer in Broadway.

The new plan covers both these questions, and having been examined by Mr. Josiah A. Briggs, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, has received his informal approval.

I therefore transmit herewith two copies of the plan referred to, which I respectfully recommend be submitted to Mr. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, with the request that he return one of them to you with his approval.

The recommendation of the Chief Engineer was approved, and the President was requested to transmit a copy of said report to the President of the Borough

of The Bronx, together with the two copies of the plan therein referred to, for his approval, with the request that he return one of them to this office, as well as the original map previously transmitted.

The Chief Engineer presented Report No. 571, dated May 11, 1903, calling attention to Report No. 490, dated January 26, 1903, in which he recommended that he be authorized to confer with the Chief Engineer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in relation to a plan for carrying the blow-off pipe from Gatehouse No. 2, Jerome Park Reservoir, under the tracks of the New York and Putnam Railroad, and recommending that the offer of said railroad company to do the work desired, at a cost of \$3,500, be accepted, and transmitting a blank form of agreement in connection therewith.

Which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Chief Engineer presented Report No. 572, dated May 11, 1903, in reference to a letter of the Municipal Civil Service Commission to the Secretary, dated May 6, 1903, and stating that in his opinion Abraham Clerke is competent to perform the duties of a Stoker.

The report was ordered filed, and the Secretary was directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and state that in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners said Clerke is competent to perform the duties of a Stoker.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 573, dated May 11, 1903, in regard to a communication of the Civil Service Commission, dated May 4, 1903, and recommending that James J. Ryan be appointed an Inspector of Masonry at a compensation of \$4.50 per day and referring to Reports Nos. 554 and 567, and requesting that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be asked to furnish a list as soon as possible from which two Inspectors can be selected at a compensation of \$4.50 per day.

Whereupon, after discussion, the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, James J. Ryan be and hereby is appointed an Inspector of Masonry at a compensation of \$4.50 per day, his salary to commence when he is assigned to duty by the Chief Engineer.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 574, dated May 12, 1903, returning communication of the Rapid Transit Commission dated April 27, 1903, and stating that in his opinion there would be no objection to the transfer of John McKeon, Axeman, to the said Commission.

The report was ordered filed and the President was authorized to consent to said transfer.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

May 12, 1903.

REPORT No. 575.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith the communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commissioners, dated May 5, 1903, certifying to a list of names from which Axemen can be appointed, which you referred to me at your meeting of May 6. I would report thereon as follows:

Joseph J. Tonyon and Michael J. McNulty would not accept an appointment.

I recommend that Ignatius C. Fox and Joseph J. Whitten be appointed Axemen at a salary of \$60 per month

Yours respectfully,

W. R. HILL, Chief Engineer.

Whereupon, after discussion, the following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer Ignatius C. Fox, No. 1047 Trinity avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and Joseph J. Whitten, No. 2468 Webster avenue, be and hereby are appointed as Axemen at a salary of \$60 per month, their salary to commence when they are assigned to duty by the Chief Engineer, and that said Report No. 575 be and hereby is returned to the Chief Engineer for the purpose of ascertaining whether he requires any more Axemen, and as to why Joseph H. Tonyon and Michael J. McNulty declined appointment.

The Chief Engineer presented printer's proof of "Form of proposal, bond, contract and specifications for 26 3-feet by 6-feet sluice gates, with the necessary lifting machinery required at the new gate house at the Old Croton Aqueduct."

The President was authorized to transmit the same to the Corporation Counsel for approval.

A communication was received from the Mayor, dated May 8, 1903, acknowledging receipt of report of work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending May 1, 1903.

The communication was ordered filed, and the Chief Engineer and Secretary directed to comply therewith.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 9, 1903, stating that the Transfer Committee of said Commission had approved the transfer of Robert J. Gudeon from the position of Superintendent of Dam Construction in the Aqueduct Commission to that of Keeper in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and that the certificate of transfer had been issued in accordance with provisions of Civil Service Rule No. 40.

Which was ordered filed.

A communication was received from Clarence McCord, Croton Lake, New York, dated May 9, 1903, in reference to an award made by the Commissioners of Appraisal for certain property taken by The City of New York.

### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Friday, May 15, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck, President; Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and the Chief Engineer.

The President presented the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work done on the new Croton Dam:

CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE—AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS,  
ROOM 213, NO. 280 BROADWAY,  
NEW YORK, May 12, 1903.

(Copy.)

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, May 8, 1903, I would report as follows:

The river flow was low during the week.

At the dam, rock excavation work on the lower spillway slope progressed and the step in the rock above the masonry of the north abutment is about completed. Rock excavation also continued in the bottom for the dam extension along most of its

length on the lower side of the dam line. Here a considerable amount of blasting first cut has been done between Station 3+00 and the end of the masonry dam, the rock being shelly and seamy. To the south of Station 3+00 to Station 1+70± the rock continues to show in hard heavy layers and heads, and progress towards a final bottom has been made, especially between Stations 2+80± and 2+00±, with a depth of cut in the rock of from 4 to 8 feet. From Station 1+70± to Station 1+15±, between which limits the granular dikes so far as developed show, excavation has continued above elevation 80± in widening the cut and lengthening it to the south towards Gatehouse No. 1. The limits of the granular dikes to the south at this elevation, 80±, are not yet reached, but harder strata shows between Station 1+15 and the Gatehouse, with indications from their pitch and dip, as shown on the face of the cut on the left, of faults and open vertical seams near the surface.

The earth excavation has progressed in uncovering rock bottom near the end of the masonry dam, in enlarging the pit being sunk at the junction of the dam and core-wall on the up-stream side, and in working on the slopes above elevation 80 on both sides of the cut.

Masonry work continued with three gangs:

One gang on buttress and Gatehouse No. 2.

One gang on main dam, Station 8+90—Station 9+35.

One gang on main dam, Station 8+70—Station 10+12.

Pointing work on the facing stone joints was in progress on the down-stream face of the main dam and on the up-stream face at a low elevation.

The amount of work done was approximately as follows:

A communication was received from H. T. Dykman, White Plains, N. Y., dated May 14, 1903, referring to certain consents authorizing the Aqueduct Commissioners to take possession of the land necessary to construct the new highway system, with the exception of Parcel No. 43½, and referring to various changes in the Town of Lewisboro and the Town of Cortlandt; also asking to be advised as to whether it is the intention of the Aqueduct Commissioners to connect Road No. 6 with Road No. 8.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated May 12, 1903, in reply to a communication of this Commission of April 22, 1903, stating that in his opinion there was no legal objection to the proposed payment of the sum of \$200,000 to Messrs. McDonald & Onderdonk of the money retained upon their contract for the construction of the Jerome Park Reservoir.

The communication was ordered filed, and in connection therewith the following preambles and resolution were presented:

Whereas, Messrs. McDonald & Onderdonk, contractors for constructing the Jerome Park Reservoir, in a letter dated July 22, 1902, applied to the Aqueduct Commissioners for the release and payment to them of \$350,000, part of the percentage of 10 per cent. retained from the monthly estimates under said contract, stating certain reasons therefor; and

Whereas, It appears from the reports of the Chief Engineer No. 393, dated July 29, 1902, and No. 517, dated March 16, 1903, that the total value of the work of construction of the reservoir, based upon modified prices and quantities, is \$6,534,957.01, of which work amounting to \$3,759,093.35 has been done, \$375,909.33 of which has been retained, and that the contractors are under a bond of \$400,000 in addition thereto for the completion of the work, and that the interests of The City of New York will be adequately protected if \$200,000 of the amount so retained should be paid and released to the contractors; and

Whereas, The Aqueduct Commissioners have made a careful investigation and are of the opinion that it is for the interest of The City of New York to make the payment of said \$200,000 to the contractors, and it will be adequately protected by the bond and the amount still retained after said payment; and

Whereas, The Comptroller of The City of New York has made a report to the Aqueduct Commissioners that he would approve the payment of \$200,000 on a proper voucher; therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners cause a proper voucher to be prepared and forwarded to the Comptroller authorizing the payment by him to McDonald & Onderdonk, contractors for constructing the Jerome Park Reservoir, of the sum of \$200,000 of the ten per cent. retained for work done under said contract, provided said contractors shall consent that said payment be considered as being made under said contract, and provided that the sureties of said contractors consent to such payment.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the foregoing resolution to Messrs. McDonald & Onderdonk, contractors for the Jerome Park Reservoir, and request that they comply with the conditions therein stated and furnish the necessary papers to the Commissioners.

A communication was also received from the Corporation Counsel, dated May 15, 1903, in reply to letters of May 7 and 11, and returning printer's proof of form of proposal, contract, specification and bond for constructing a highway or road near the Titicus Reservoir, in the town of North Salem, Westchester County, N. Y., for printing, and original draft of form of proposal, contract, bond and specifications for stop-cock valves, special castings and ladders for the Jerome Park Reservoir for composition.

The communication was ordered filed and the Secretary was directed to return the proof for printing and the manuscript for composition.

The following communication was received from the Pneumatic Engineering Company:

GENTLEMEN—Owing to the changes made in the plans for the pumping plant for

Shaft 25, we have been obliged to pay for considerable material, such as the 21-inch O. D. column pipe and steel castings, which became of no use on account of the conditions which were found to exist, and we were obliged to replace with other material in accordance with the new plans as approved by your Board January 20, 1903.

REPORT No. 571.

May 11, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In Report No. 490, dated January 26, 1903, I recommended to you that I be authorized to confer with the Chief Engineer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in relation to a plan to arrange for carrying the blow-off pipe from Gate House No. 2, Jerome Park Reservoir, under the tracks of the New York and Putnam Railroad.

At your meeting of January 27 you adopted a resolution giving me the authority requested. In accordance therewith I conferred with Mr. H. Fernstrom, Chief Engineer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and I transmit herewith a copy of the company's proposal and estimate for the work, dated April 20, 1903.

On May 1 Mr. Fernstrom submitted plans, which I have on file in my office, for building an open culvert, with abutments, and floor of rails to support the railroad tracks, the span to be 14 feet in the clear, providing for a space under the tracks to lay two 48-inch pipes, and after examination I found these plans to be satisfactory.

The company, in their proposal, offer to do the work either for \$3,500 or at actual cost plus 10 per cent. After a careful consideration of the subject, I would state that in my opinion the offer to do the work for \$3,500 is a reasonable one, and that it would be to the interest of the City to accept it rather than the alternative of the cost plus 10 per cent. In my opinion it is much more advisable to have the railroad company do the work rather than letting it to an outside contractor, on account of the possible interference with trains.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the offer of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to do the work referred to at a cost of \$3,500 be accepted. In regard thereto I also transmit herewith blank form of regular crossing agreement, as referred to in the accompanying proposal, which it is usual to execute in such cases.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, it is advisable to contract with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessor of the New York and Putnam Railroad, on the terms mentioned in Report No. 571, for the sum of \$3,500, and that the Chief Engineer be requested to obtain the form of contract proposed by said railroad company therefor.

The recommendation of the Committee was approved and the resolution adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Chief Engineer presented Report No. 576, dated May 14, 1903, in regard to the Eighth Supplemental Petition, Cornell Dam, and the letter of H. T. Dykman, dated May 6, 1903, concerning proposed amendments to the same.

Whereupon, after discussion, the President was requested to transmit a copy of said report to Special Counsel Dykman with request that he take up the matter of the form of petition with the counsel for the railroad company, with the view to coming to an agreement on the lines set forth in said report, and to report to the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The Chief Engineer verbally reported that he had been in conference with the Chief Engineer and Fifth Vice-President of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and they had informed him that proposals for doing the work necessary to remove the tracks and change the grade of the railroads within the boundary lines of the new Croton Reservoir had been advertised for and were expected to be received on May 20, 1903.

A form of letter to the President of the Municipal Civil Service Commission in reference to the classification of the position of "Consulting Engineer" was presented, and the President was authorized to transmit the same. (See President's letter, press copy book, volume 3, page 120.)

The Commissioners then adjourned.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Mr. J. G. Phelps Stokes addressed the Board, and inquired if the matter of the widening of Allen street was on the calendar. The President announced that the matter was not regularly before the Board, but if there were any parties present who desired to speak on the subject, either for or against the project, the Board would hear them.

Mr. Stokes spoke in favor of such widening.

Mr. Julius Blumberg, representing the East Side Civic Club, was also in favor of the proposition, but preferred the north side.

Professor E. R. A. Seligman, of the Council of the University Settlement Society, was in favor of the widening.

Miss Lillia D. Wald also spoke in the affirmative.

Dr. Casbe favored the proposition.

Charles B. Stover, of the Outdoor Recreation League, said that he preferred to wait until the matter was regularly before the Board.

Dr. Wohlbarst spoke in the affirmative.

Dr. Cherurg was in favor of the plan.

Mr. Jacob Katz, property owner, appeared in opposition to the widening of Allen street.

The President announced that this matter was not advertised as required, and there was no petition on file. If suitable request was made upon him within the course of a few days the subject could be taken up May 5.



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City or New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
