(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.)

Minutes of meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, October 19, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

EXTENDING WEST TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SIXTH AND WEST TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVENTH STREETS, ETC., MANHATTAN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of a new street along the westerly side of the Harlem river, from Broadway to Muscoota street (Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street), and extending Two Hundred and Twenty-sixth street (Hyatt street) and Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street (Ashley street), from their present terminals to the proposed new street, in the Borough of Manhattan, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in favor of or in opposition to the proposed changes, the hearing was closed, and the following resolution was adopted:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—13.

Beginning at a point in the northerly curb line of Livingston street, as widened, distant 24 feet 4 inches easterly from the easterly side of Gallatin place, the elevation to be 44.57 feet as now paved;

Thence easterly 150 feet along the above northerly curb line of Livingston street to a point distant 200 feet westerly from the westerly side of Hoyt street, the elevation to be 44.98 feet as now paved.

Also, beginning at a point in the southerly curb line of Livingston street, as widened, distant 24 feet 4 inches easterly from the easterly side of Gallatin place, the elevation to be 44.17 feet as now paved;

Thence easterly 150 feet along the above southerly curb line of Livingston street to a point distant 200 feet westerly from the westerly side of Hoyt street, the elevation to be 44.77 feet as now paved.

All above elevations refer to the City Surveyor's datum of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Thence southwesterly along a level grade to the intersection of Fifty-eighth street, the elevation of which shall be 19.50 feet, as heretofore;

Thence southwesterly along a level grade to the intersection of Fifty-ninth street, the elevation of which shall be 19.50 feet, as heretofore;

Thence southwesterly along a uniformly ascending grade to the intersection of Sixtieth street, the elevation of which shall be 19.92 feet, as heretofore.

Note—All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Thence southeasterly to the intersection of Third avenue, the elevation to be 52.72 feet, as fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for Third avenue on a plan filed in the office of the Register of Kings County October 9, 1903;

Thence southeasterly to the intersection of Third avenue, the elevation to be 73 feet, as heretofore.

Note—All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Beginning at the intersection of Rockaway avenue and Vienna avenue, the elevation to be 13.07 feet, as heretofore;

Thence southerly to a summit distant 275 feet from the southerly line of Vienna avenue, the elevation to be 14.53 feet;

Thence southerly to the intersection of Stanley avenue, the elevation to be 13.32 feet, as heretofore.

Note—All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as determined by the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—13.

OPENING SCOTT AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed opening of Scott avenue, from Flushing avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavits of publication were presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in favor of, or in opposition to the proposed area of assessment, the hearing was closed, and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter,

as amended, deems it for the public interest that the title, for the uses and to the extent thereof as herein mentioned, to the lands and premises required for the opening and extending of Scott avenue, from Flushing avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York.

Resolved, That the title to be so acquired is hereby determined to be a title in fee in such premises.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and of one Commissioner of Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Scott avenue, from Flushing avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17, of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings and of the awards, if any, for damages caused by intended regulation and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of The City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 19th day of October, 1906; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board.

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

All the property lying in the district bounded by the line between the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, by a line parallel with the southwesterly side of St. Nicholas avenue and 100 feet distant southwesterly therefrom between the line separating the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens and the southeasterly side of Troutman street, by a line parallel with the westerly line of Scott avenue and 100 feet distant westerly therefrom between Troutman street and the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, and by the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, between the line last mentioned and the line separating the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—13.

SEWER EASEMENTS IN TAPSCOTT STREET, ETC., BROOKLYN.

In the matter of acquiring an easement for sewer purposes in Tapscott street, Vienna avenue, Malta street and Wortman avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavits of publication were presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in favor of or in opposition to the proposition, the hearing was closed.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 396 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby directs that The City of New York acquire an easement, for the use of the public for the purpose of constructing a sewer, in the following described property, to wit:

Tapscott Street.

Beginning at a point in the southern line of Blake avenue, distant 15 feet easterly from the intersection of the southern line of Blake avenue with the western line of Tapscott street, as the same are laid down on the map of the City:

1. Thence easterly along the southern line of Blake avenue 30 feet;
2. Thence 90 degrees to the right 873.3 feet to the southern line of East Ninety-eighth street;
3. Thence westerly along the southern line of East Ninety-eighth street 61.3 feet;
4. Thence northerly 824.8 feet to the point of beginning.

Note—These angles and dimensions are approximate.

Vienna Avenue.

Beginning at a point in the western line of Snediker avenue distant 20 feet northerly from the intersection of the western line of Snediker avenue with the southern line of Vienna avenue, as the same is laid down on the map of the City:

1. Thence northerly along the western line of Snediker avenue 30 feet;
2. Thence 90 degrees to the right 320 feet to the eastern line of Hinsdale street;

Wortman Avenue.

3. Thence southerly along the easterly line of New Jersey avenue 30 feet;

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to institute a proceeding to acquire an easement, for the use of the public, in the lands and premises above described.

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17, of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that due notice was given therein; that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment, as therein described, and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 19th day of October, 1906; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board.

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows, to wit: The district shown on Sewerage Map X., District 44, Borough of Brooklyn, which map was approved by the Board of Public Improvements on February 1, 1899, and filed in the offices of the Corporation Counsel and the President of the Board of Public Improvements on March 10, 1899, and in the office of the Register of Kings County on March 13, 1899.

CLOSING PARK BOUNDED BY VAN ALST AND EAST AVENUES, NINTH AND TWELFTH STREETS, QUEENS.

In the matter of the proposed closing and discontinuing of the park bounded by Van Alst avenue, East avenue, Ninth street and Twelfth street, in the Borough of Queens, affidavit of publication was presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The following petition was placed on file:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Chairman:

The undersigned property owners and residents of the First Ward of the Borough of Queens respectfully petition your Honorable Board as follows:

By resolution of your Board passed on the 29th day of May, 1903, certain lands included within the blocks between Ninth and Twelfth streets, East and Van Alst avenues, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, were laid out as and for a public park.

The Local Board of Newtown District of the Borough of Queens, after a public hearing and without opposition on the part of any citizen or taxpayer, by unanimous vote passed the original resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that these lands be so laid out as a park.

The petition originated with the property owners and residents of the districts surrounding the proposed park, and contained the names of more than two hundred taxpayers; the reasons for its establishment being amply set forth therein.

A hearing on the proposed lay out was had before your Honorable Board on the 29th day of May, 1903, and after being fully discussed and considered, was, by unanimous vote, adopted.

The matter was referred to the Park Department as to the advisability of selecting this site, and that Department not only favored the project, but the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens approved in person and advocated its establishment.

The property owners included within the lines of this park, we are informed, has been forced from the market, and deprived of that advantage of improvement for years on account of the action taken by your Honorable Board.

The owners of the surrounding property, following the action of your Honorable Board, have improved their lands as fronting on a park.

We respectfully call the attention of the Board to the fact that it is the unanimous desire of those interested in the development of the Borough of Queens that this park site be retained, and that it would be unfair, at this late day, for the Board of Estimate to take action for its discontinuance, in whole or in part, where no opposition on the part of the residents or taxpayers has been shown to exist.

It is also unfair, we submit, to compel the owners of land to regard their property as taken for a park.

Aside from this fact, such action as is proposed in this instance would establish a dangerous precedent for the Board to create a cloud on the title of lands by laying them out for a public park or improvement, and compel the owners to carry their lands unimproved for a period of three years, and to deprive them of all the benefits accruing from public improvements for which they paid, and then, at will, to rescind its action.

We respectfully submit that the delay in acquiring title to the lands in question for a park has not been caused by any opposition or action on the part of the property owners, and that the responsibility for such delay rests wholly with The City of New York.

The northern line to be 50.0 feet from and parallel with the above described line.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on June 6, 1906, recommending the adoption of a change in the map of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing Dinsmore place, between Logan street and Chestnut street.

Dinsmore place is now laid out upon the map of the City to have a length of two short blocks and a width of 50 feet. It is proposed to discontinue the entire length of the street, for the reason that improvements proposed for the Ridgewood Pumping Station of the Department of Water Supply necessitate encroachment upon its lines. From the papers presented with the resolution it appears that all the land lying within the lines of the street was bought for use in connection with this pumping station, but that up to the present time the occupancy of this strip was not required. The land has been open to public use for a great many years, and I think there can be no question but that an easement has been given for street purposes. The street forms the southerly terminal of Richmond street and of Force Tube avenue. If it were to be removed and no other street provided in its place, I think that

the abutting property on the two streets named would be subjected to damage, and that the City would be liable for the same. This could probably be remedied, however, if a new street were to be laid out north of and immediately adjoining Dinsmore place, and I would recommend that the change proposed be made along these lines. A width of 50 feet would undoubtedly be sufficient, for the reason that it has only a short length and the southerly side would not require a sidewalk space. None of the buildings yet erected would encroach upon the land which would have to be acquired.

I would recommend that a public hearing be given in the matter of closing this street and of laying out a new street immediately adjoining.

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Humboldt street distant 10 feet southerly from the southeasterly corner of Humboldt street and Calyer street; running thence northeasterly to a point on the westerly side of Kingsland avenue distant 275 feet southerly from the southwesterly corner of Kingsland avenue and Greenpoint avenue; thence easterly at right angles with the westerly side of Kingsland avenue to the easterly side of Kingsland avenue; and it is hereby

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of a letter dated July 18, 1906, in which you state that there is now pending before your Board a resolution adopted by the Local Board of Williamsburg, Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the striking from the map of The City of New York, of Whale Creek canal, between Humboldt street and the easterly side of Kingsland avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

You state that in conversations which some of the property owners have had with the Chief Engineer of your Board, they have intimated that the mere placing upon the map of this canal has made the abutting property valuable as water front property, although no canal has been built, and that if the canal is stricken from the map they will be entitled to damages; and that the Board would like to be advised as to the liability of the City for damage through closing that part of the canal.

Inclosed therewith for my information was a copy of a communication from the Chief Engineer to you, dated July 14, 1906, which sets forth the facts in detail. After an examination of the facts so set forth in the communication referred to, from the Chief Engineer, Nelson P. Lewis, I beg to advise your honorable Board that the resolution adopted by the Local Board of Williamsburg, recommending the striking from the map of The City of New York, of Whale Creek canal, between Humboldt street and the easterly side of Kingsland avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, if

adopted by them, will not entitle any property owner to collect damages from the City because of the striking from the map of The City of New York of that part of Whale Creek canal.

This proposed change in the map is based upon petitions which have been presented to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and is intimately related to the plans of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the improvement of the waterfront in the vicinity of Whale creek.

Considerable interest has been manifested in this change by property owners in the neighborhood, and your Engineer has had a number of interviews with them. The original Whale creek canal was laid down on the Commissioners' map of the City of Brooklyn, and extended from the bulkhead line of Newtown creek to the northerly side of Meserole avenue. It lay between North Henry and Provost streets, and was approximately an extension and widening of Humboldt street. On November 11, 1895, acting in accordance with the authority given by chapter 513 of the Laws of 1894, the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn adopted a resolution changing the map of the city by discontinuing and closing so much of this canal as lay south of the northerly side of Greenpoint avenue, and by extending Humboldt street from Meserole avenue to Greenpoint avenue. They made a further change by laying out another canal, to be known also as Whale creek canal, extending from the westerly side of Newtown creek to the easterly side of Humboldt street, this canal lying for most of the distance between Greenpoint avenue and Calyer street, although at its westerly end it crossed the latter street. This new canal had no existence except upon the map of the city west of Kingsland avenue, although its extreme easterly end had been partly improved and used.

It is this Whale creek canal west of Kingsland avenue that it is proposed to strike from the map. Some of the property owners along the line of the canal which it is proposed to discontinue, contend that the placing upon the map of the city of this canal had made the abutting property valuable as water-front property, although no canal had been built, and that if the City now removed it from the map they would be entitled to damages. They stated, however, that if the City, without assessment upon these property owners, would grade, at public expense, the streets crossing the swamp through which this canal was laid out, these property owners would consider such action as compensation for any rights they might lose through the discontinuing and closing of the so-called canal.

It seems to your Engineer that the improvements now proposed by the Department of Docks and Ferries will be of great value to this territory. These improvements will be made without any local assessment whatever. The improvements of the Dock Department will have a most beneficial effect upon the owners of the property along the line of this paper canal and, in my judgment, a claim for damage for the removal of this canal from the map, or a demand that the City should, at its own expense, grade streets across it as compensation therefor, is preposterous and absurd.

Believing that the Board may wish to have the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as to the possible liability of the City for removing this canal from the map, the facts have, through the Secretary of the Board, been laid before the Corporation Counsel, with a request for advice, and his opinion, given under date of September 26, is that "The resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Williamsburg District recommending the striking from the map of The City of New York of Whale creek canal, between Humboldt street and the easterly side of Kingsland avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, if adopted, will not entitle any property owner to collect damages from the City because of the striking from the map of the City of that part of Whale creek canal."

In my judgment the proposed change in the map is a proper one. I find upon consulting the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries that it will in no way interfere with the improvements contemplated by him, and it is recommended that the plan be approved by the Board after a public hearing.

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Humboldt street distant 10 feet southerly from the southeasterly corner of Humboldt street and Calyer street; running thence northeasterly to a point on the westerly side of Kingsland avenue distant 275 feet southerly from the southwesterly corner of Kingsland avenue and Greenpoint avenue; thence easterly at right angles with the westerly side of Kingsland avenue to the easterly side of Kingsland avenue.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board, to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 16th day of November, 1906, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 16th day of November, 1906.

OPENING HENRY STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

SIR—The Corporation Counsel has returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a resolution adopted by it on May 18, 1906, authorizing the opening of Henry street, between Ocean parkway and East Eighth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the reason that the Commissioners were not appointed before the recent amendment to the Street Opening Law, and a reauthorization is therefore necessary.

As stated in the report already submitted, this street was placed upon the map of the City in 1904, and has a length of two short blocks and a width of 50 feet. For a portion of the distance there is an unshaped roadway, but there is no outlet at the present time to the Ocean parkway. The opening of this street is unquestionably desirable, and the benefit will not only extend to the property fronting on both sides of

the street, but also to that lying on the easterly side of East Eighth street, opposite the easterly end of Henry street, which property will be furnished with a more ready connection with Ocean parkway.

It is therefore recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be taken be a title in fee; that the area of assessment be fixed at one-half the block on each side of the street between the limits named, and also the area between the easterly side of East Eighth street and a line 100 feet distant eastwardly therefrom and parallel thereto, and extending from a line midway between the southerly side of Caton place and the northerly side of Henry street produced easterly to a line midway between the northerly side of Johnson street and the southerly side of Henry street produced eastwardly, upon the property within which district shall be assessed the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, and the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating. It is also recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing upon this proposed area of assessment.

One-half the block on each side of Henry street, between Ocean parkway and East Eighth street, and also the area between the easterly side of East Eighth street and a line 100 feet distant eastwardly therefrom and parallel thereto and extending from a line midway between the southerly side of Caton place and the northerly side of Henry street produced eastwardly to a line midway between the northerly side of Johnson street and the southerly side of Henry street produced eastwardly.

OPENING VAN SICKLEN AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

SIR—On May 18, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the opening of Van Sicklen avenue, from New Lots road to Dumont avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Owing to the fact that Commissioners had not been appointed before the recent amendment of the street opening law, the resolution has been returned by the Corporation Counsel in order that the proceeding may be reauthorized.

The resolution affects two blocks of Van Sicklen avenue, which is laid out at a width of 60 feet. Part of the street north of Dumont avenue has been shown to be completely dedicated to public use, but on the blocks in question there is only a narrow wagon path and the abutting property is unimproved. In considering a proper district of assessment it was found that no other parallel streets in the immediate neighborhood have been opened except Schenck avenue, lying two blocks to the east, and in that proceeding the area of assessment has been fixed at one-half a block on each side of the street. I see no reason why the same policy should not be followed in this case, and it is therefore recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be taken be a title in fee; that the area of assessment be fixed at one-half the block on each side of the street between the limits named, upon the property within which district shall be assessed the entire expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating, and all other expenses. It is further recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing upon the proposed district of assessment.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On May 18, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the opening of Newell street, between Meserole and Greenpoint avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, but as the Commissioners were not appointed in this proceeding before the amendment of the Street Opening Law, the resolution has been returned to the Board in order that it may be reauthorized.

As stated in the report already submitted, the proceeding covers but two blocks, and the width of the street is 50 feet. Inasmuch as the remainder of the street has been improved, a widening is impracticable. Several buildings have already been erected along the street, and there is a partial dedication, so that the expense of the proceeding should be small, and it is believed that the area of assessment could be limited to one-half of the block on each side of the street, without imposing any unreasonable burden upon the property.

It is therefore recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be taken be a title in fee; that the area of assessment be fixed at one-half the block on each side of the street between the limits named in the resolution, upon the property within which shall be assessed the entire expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, and awards, if any, for damage by reason of intended regulating. It is further recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing upon this district of assessment.

WIDENING ROEBLING STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Comptroller was presented:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of this Board, held February 9, 1906, a resolution was presented providing for the acquisition of title to land necessary for the widening of Roebling street through the short block between Broadway and South Eighth street, which was referred to me for examination and report.

On March 3, 1905, proceedings were authorized for the widening of Roebling street, between South Eighth street and Lee avenue, which, when completed, would leave the short 20-foot strip on the west side of Roebling street, between South Eighth street and Broadway, projecting into the plaza, and it was thought advisable by this Board to take such proceedings as would correct the lines of the street so that the westerly line of Roebling street could be prolonged north to Broadway, and at a meeting held September 29, 1905, such a resolution was adopted, which resolution was approved by his Honor the Mayor on October 26, 1905. The maps in the proceedings were signed by the Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, on January 9, 1906, and were filed January 30, 1906, and in the proper county office in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The owner of the property, Mr. Thomas F. Magner, in a communication under date of January 20, 1906, addressed to each of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, states that at the time this matter was first brought up before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment he appeared in opposition to the proceedings, as he did not think it was necessary, and against his earnest protest the map was changed; that his lease expired in March and that he was unable to lease his property by reason of the complications, and although the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September last did change the map or plan, the Corporation Counsel at the time of this writing has not applied for Commissioners, and he asks, in the name of common justice, that the Board direct the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the measure by the appointment of Commissioners for the acquisition of the property.

Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in a communication under date of January 26, 1906, recommends the adoption of a resolution providing that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to apply for the appointment of a commission for the acquisition of title to the land needed for the widening of Roebling street on the westerly side, between South Eighth street and Broadway, the entire expense to be borne by The City of New York, and furthermore that the Corporation Counsel be requested to urge the Court to appoint the same Commission already appointed for widening that portion of Roebling street, between South Eighth street and Lee avenue, and I so recommend.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as above determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been

acquired, for the use of the public to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the widening of Roebling street, from Broadway to South Eighth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings be borne and paid by The City of New York.

Resolved, That nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above described property at private sale, subject to the approval of this Board.

OPENING ROCHAMBEAU AVENUE, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Corporation Counsel has returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a resolution adopted by it on March 23, 1906, for the opening of Rochambeau avenue, between East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and the property line between the land of William W. Niles and the land formerly of Michael Varian, about 265 feet south of Van Cortlandt avenue.

This resolution has been returned for the reason that Commissioners were not appointed in the proceeding before the amendment of the street opening law, so that a new authorization is necessary.

In the former report submitted to the Board it was shown that Rochambeau avenue had been laid out at a width of 60 feet; that the proceeding would extend for about four and a half blocks, leaving only one and a half blocks to be still opened, the lower portion having been excluded from the proceeding at the request of the owners of the abutting property. The Board determined that the entire expense should be assessed upon the property benefited, but it remains for the Board to determine the district of assessment.

It is found upon examination of the records of the Bureau of Street Openings that while the entire block on both sides of this street were included in the district of assessment for the opening of Woodlawn road and that at the northerly end of the street they were also included in the area of assessment for widening Jerome avenue, in some recent proceedings, such as the opening of Steuben avenue and Kossuth place, the two streets lying west of Rochambeau avenue, the districts were confined, in a general way, to one-half the block on each side of the street to be opened, and it is believed that such a course should be followed in this case, but that there should also be included the property on the northerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street opposite the northerly end of Rochambeau avenue, and that the district be extended southwardly to a line 100 feet south of East Two Hundred and Sixth street.

It is therefore recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be acquired be a title in fee; that the entire expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and the awards, if any, for damage through proposed regulating, and all other expense, be assessed upon the property to be benefited, and that the area of assessment be fixed at one-half the block on each side of the street between the southerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and a line 100 feet south of the southerly line of East Two Hundred and Sixth street and parallel therewith, together with the property lying on the northerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street, between Woodlawn road and DeKalb avenue, included between the northerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and a line 100 feet distant northerly therefrom and parallel therewith. It is further recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing for the consideration of this district of assessment.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby gives notice that the following is the proposed area of assessment for benefit in this proceeding, to wit: One half the block on each side of Rochambeau avenue, between the southerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and a line 100 feet south of the southerly line of East Two Hundred and Sixth street and parallel therewith, together with the property lying on the northerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street, between Woodlawn road and DeKalb avenue, included between the northerly side of East Two Hundred and Twelfth street and a line 100 feet distant northerly therefrom and parallel therewith.

OPENING EDEN AVENUE, THE BRONX.

The following report of the Chief Engineer was presented:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on May 4, 1906, proceedings were initiated for the opening of Eden avenue from East One Hundred and Seventy-second street to East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx.

Owing to the amendment of the street opening law before the appointment of Commissioners in this proceeding, the resolution has been returned to the Board by the Corporation Counsel with the recommendation that the proceeding be reauthorized under the amended law.

As stated in the previous report made to the Board, the proceedings are based upon a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, adopted December 28, 1905. They cover three blocks, or the entire length of Eden avenue, which is a street 60 feet in width. The Board determined that the entire cost of the proceeding should be assessed upon the property benefited, but it still remains to fix the district of assessment as provided in the amended law.

After an examination of the records of the Street Opening Bureau in order to determine a reasonable area of assessment, it is found that the blocks on both sides of this street were wholly included in the district of assessment for the opening of Morris avenue, and the blocks between Belmont street and East One Hundred and Seventy-second street were also included in the district for the opening of College avenue.

In the opening of Eastburn avenue, lying two blocks to the east of Eden avenue, one block on each side of the street constituted the area of assessment. The disposition is to restrict these areas of assessment wherever possible, but, in the opinion of your Engineer, it would be wise to follow the practice which has prevailed on some of the other streets in this vicinity and include the entire block on each side of the street to be opened, extending the district one block northwardly and southwardly of the limits named in the proceeding.

OPENING BURNETT PLACE, THE BRONX.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On April 20, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing proceedings for opening Burnett place, from Garrison avenue to Tiffany street, Borough of The Bronx.

Before the Commissioners had been appointed in this proceeding the law was adopted amending the street opening procedure, and, consequently, the Corporation Counsel has returned the papers to the Board in order that the proceeding may be reauthorized under the amended law.

The original action of the Board was based upon a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, adopted November 16, 1905, and, as stated in the report already submitted, the street has a width of 60 feet, and for a portion of the distance had been sufficiently dedicated to permit the construction of a sewer. The Board decided that the entire expense should be assessed upon the property benefited, but it now remains for the Board to determine a proper district of assessment.

The proceeding extends for the entire length of the street, which is only two blocks, and from an examination of the records of the Bureau of Street Openings it is found that the entire blocks on both sides of this street have been wholly included in the areas of assessment for the opening of Lafayette avenue and of Tiffany street. Both of these were important streets, the opening of which made available large areas of property, while Burnett place is a local street only and the benefit will be, consequently, local.

On account of the irregularity of the blocks fronting on the street it is difficult to lay out an area of assessment by a subdivision of these blocks which would seem reasonable, and I would suggest that the district of assessment be fixed as the entire area bounded by Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Spofford avenue, Longwood avenue and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, together with property lying on the easterly side of Tiffany street opposite the southeasterly end of the street to be opened.

It is therefore recommended that the proceedings for opening Burnett place be authorized, that the title to be acquired be a title in fee, that the entire expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings and the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating, together with all other expense, be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited, and that the area of assessment be fixed as the territory bounded by Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Spofford avenue, Longwood avenue and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, together with the territory lying on the easterly side of Tiffany street, between the northerly side of Spofford avenue and a line at right angles to the easterly side of Tiffany street, opposite a point midway between the intersection of the westerly side of Tiffany street and the southeasterly side of Burnett place, and the intersection of the westerly side of Tiffany street with the southeasterly side of Barry street, and extending from the easterly side of Tiffany street to a line 100 feet east of the same and parallel therewith.

It is further recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing at which this area of assessment shall be considered.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Corporation Counsel has returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a resolution adopted on March 9, 1906, authorizing the opening of West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, between Bailey avenue and Kingsbridge road, in the Borough of The Bronx, for the reason that the Commissioners in this proceeding had not been appointed before the recent amendment of the Street Opening Law, and it is necessary to reauthorize the proceeding under the provisions of the new law.

As has already been reported to the Board, the street has been laid out upon the map of the City at a width of 60 feet, between Bailey avenue and Heath avenue, one of the blocks covered by the resolution, while through the remaining block it has a width of only 30 feet, for the reason that the grade on this block will be approximately about 20 per cent., and it will not be available for vehicular traffic, so that a greater width will not be needed. It remains, however, for the Board to fix the area of assessment.

While this street might appear to be designed for local use only, it will afford convenient connection between property lying east of Kingsbridge terrace and that portion of West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street west of Bailey avenue. In the case of the opening of Summit place, another narrow street two blocks to the north, the area of assessment was fixed at one-half the block on each side of the street, together with the frontage on the two blocks opposite the ends of the street, but in the case of West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street the connection is somewhat more important, and it is suggested that the area be made slightly greater.

It is recommended that the proceeding to acquire title to West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Bailey avenue to Kingsbridge road, be authorized, that the title to be acquired be a title in fee, that the entire cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating, and all other expenses be assessed upon the property benefited, and that the area of the district of assessment be the territory described as follows:

SIR—On March 9, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized proceedings for the opening of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Anderson avenue to Jerome avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx. Commissioners had not been appointed in this matter before the recent amendment of the Street Opening Law, and the resolution has been returned by the Corporation Counsel in order that the proceeding may be reauthorized.

As explained to the Board in the report previously submitted, the street to be opened has a length of one short block and a width of only 20 feet, as it was designed for the accommodation of foot traffic only, the rate of grade being approximately 25 per cent. In reauthorizing this resolution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is obliged to fix the area of assessment, and inasmuch as this street, although a narrow one, will afford the property fronting on West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street west of Anderson avenue and that on both sides of Jerome avenue a more ready outlet, and avoid a detour around the long block which it divides, the area of assessment should include not only the property which will front upon the new street, but that fronting on the open portion of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and Jerome avenue.

It is recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be acquired be a title in fee; that the entire cost of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, and the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating, with all other expenses be assessed upon the property benefited; and that the area of assessment be the territory bounded as follows:

On the west by a line midway between the easterly side of Ogden avenue and the westerly side of Nelson avenue, extending from a point midway between the southerly side of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and the northerly side of West One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to a point midway between the northerly side of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and the southerly side of West One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street.

OPENING EASTERN BOULEVARD, THE BRONX.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On April 6, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the acquisition of title to the Eastern Boulevard from the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Hunt's Point road, in the Borough of The Bronx. Before the appointment of a Commission to act in this matter the law governing street opening proceedings was amended, and the Corporation Counsel has returned the resolution in order that the proceeding may be reauthorized.

As pointed out in the report already submitted to the Board, the street is laid down at a width of 100 feet, and the proceeding will extend fourteen blocks, or about three-fourths of a mile. The only street which has yet been opened in this immediate neighborhood is Randall avenue, and in this case the area of assessment covered the entire block between Randall avenue and Eastern Boulevard, together with a strip about 100 feet in width on the southerly side of the latter street. By recent action of the Board, East Bay avenue, between Cabot and Tiffany streets, has been stricken from the map, so that the blocks on either side of the street to be opened are all long ones between the streets above named, and undivided parcels are especially large. In view of the fact that this street will be an important thoroughfare with a width of 100 feet, and there being only one intervening street between it and the East river, and in view also of the manner in which the assessment for opening Randall avenue was levied, it would seem wise in this case to follow the policy adopted in the case of Randall avenue and include the entire block on each side of the street to be opened, together with the frontage on the opposite side of the adjacent street, extending this territory to the second street east of Hunt's Point road, and including the frontage on the westerly side of Cabot street.

It is therefore recommended that the proceeding be authorized; that the title to be acquired be a title in fee; that 13½ per cent. of the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including the expenses of the Bureau of Street Openings, the awards, if any, for damage through intended regulating, and all other expenses, be borne by the City at large, in accordance with the established practice of the Board, and that the remaining cost and expense be assessed upon the property benefited; and that the area of assessment be the territory bounded as follows:

On the north by a line lying 100 feet north of the northerly line of Randall avenue, and the said line extended westwardly and parallel therewith from a point 100 feet east of the easterly side of Halleck street to a point 100 feet west of the westerly line of Cabot street.

On the east by a line 100 feet east of the easterly line of Halleck street and parallel therewith from a point 100 feet north of the northerly line of Randall avenue to a point 100 feet south of the southerly line of East Bay avenue.

On the south by a line 100 feet south of the southerly side of East Bay avenue and the extension thereof westwardly from a point 100 feet east of the easterly side of Halleck street to a point 100 feet west of the westerly line of Cabot street.

On the west by a line 100 feet west of the westerly side of Cabot street from a point 100 feet south of the southerly side of East Bay avenue produced to a point 100 feet north of the northerly side of Randall avenue produced.

SEWER EASEMENT IN LYMAN AVENUE, RICHMOND.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:

REPORT No. 4420.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,
October 8, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on February 9, 1906, a resolution was adopted authorizing the acquisition of an easement for the purpose of constructing a sewer in that portion of Lyman avenue between Tompkins avenue and Summer street, Borough of Richmond, at a width of 20 feet. The Commissioners in this proceeding not having been appointed before the recent amendment of the Street Opening Law, the Corporation Counsel has returned the resolution to the Board in order that it may be reauthorized.

In a report already submitted to the Board the reasons for acquiring this easement were stated, and a map showing the extent of the same has already been approved by the Board. The Corporation Counsel has informally advised me that the procedure in acquiring an easement of this kind should undoubtedly be the same as that in acquiring title to a street, including the fixing of a district of assessment by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment after a public hearing. Owing to the fact that the sewerage plans of the Borough of Richmond have been adopted in a somewhat fragmentary manner, it was found difficult in this office to determine from these plans to what extent the benefit of the sewer in Lyman avenue would reach, and the Borough authorities have been asked for advice in the matter. They have outlined a district bordering upon Lyman avenue, Tompkins avenue, Valley street, Sea avenue and Richmond avenue, and I believe it would be proper for the Board to adopt the area of assessment which has been thus suggested.

It is therefore recommended that the proceeding to acquire this easement be authorized; that the title to be acquired shall be a title to an easement for sewer purposes; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings and all other expense, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that the area of assessment be fixed as follows:

One hundred (100) feet in width on each side of Lyman avenue from the westerly side of Summer street to a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Tompkins avenue; a strip one hundred feet in width on each side of Tompkins avenue from a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Fingerboard road to a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Valley street, excluding the land lying within the United States Government Reservation; a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Valley street between the westerly side of Tompkins avenue and a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Sea avenue; a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Sea avenue between a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Valley street and a line 100 feet south of the southerly side of Richmond avenue, and a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Richmond avenue from a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Sea avenue to the westerly side of Tompkins avenue.

It is further recommended that a date be fixed for the consideration of this resolution and a hearing upon the proposed district of assessment.

One hundred (100) feet in width on each side of Lyman avenue from the westerly side of Summer street to a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Tompkins avenue; a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Tompkins avenue from a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Fingerboard road to a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Valley street, excluding the land lying within the United States Government Reservation; a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Valley street between the westerly side of Tompkins avenue and a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Sea avenue; a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Sea avenue between a line 100 feet north of the northerly side of Valley street, and a line 100 feet south of the southerly side of Richmond avenue, and a strip 100 feet in width on each side of Richmond avenue from a line 100 feet east of the easterly side of Sea avenue to the westerly side of Tompkins avenue.

REPORT No. 4476.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, through Mr. William Greenough, attorney, has forwarded with two communications, dated respectively September 27 and October 16, plans for twenty-three bridges to be built along the line of the Harlem River branch of the said railroad, in connection with the six-tracking improvement of that line, now in progress.

These plans are submitted in accordance with the provisions of the twelfth clause of the agreement of December 21, 1904, between The City of New York and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, which requires that the character, design and construction of these bridges shall be in accordance with the agreement and with plans approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Plans for a number of these bridges have already been submitted to the Board, some of them having been approved on May 18, 1906, and others on July 6, 1906. As explained in the report accompanying the former plans, the details of these bridges have been carefully worked out after frequent consultations with this office and with the Borough authorities, and they have been so designed as to provide spaces for such subsurface structures as are likely to be required. In case of the highway bridges, modern pavements are provided for the roadways, and exceptional precautions have been taken to prevent the deterioration of the metal work from fumes of locomotives,

the same being entirely encased in concrete. The roadways of the highway bridges are supported by concrete arches in the most substantial manner. The railroad bridges are designed with trough flooring so that there will be no dripping of water or grease upon the roadways and sidewalks beneath. Girder bridges have been designed wherever possible, but in some cases the spans are so long as to necessitate the use of trusses.

Of the plans herewith submitted, four are designed for four-track railroad bridges over streets, with provision made for the addition of two tracks if necessary. One other railroad bridge is designed for six tracks. There are fourteen highway bridges which, as above stated, have been designed for the accommodation of the necessary mains, pipes and ducts beneath the roadway or sidewalk, except in the case of the bridge on Westchester avenue, where there is not sufficient room to permit the placing of the 20-inch water main desired by the Department of Water Supply beneath the roadway or sidewalk, and it is expected that in this case the mains will be placed upon the sidewalk space. There are several other cases where, if the Department of Water Supply requires mains larger than 12 inches in diameter it will be necessary either to subdivide them or to place them upon the sidewalk spaces, as it is impossible to provide a place for larger mains beneath the roadways or sidewalks of the structures without further raising the grade. The four remaining structures are foot bridges, but the plans for their construction are of the same substantial character as in other cases, with concrete floors, including in several instances stairways from the street. These are in accordance with the general plan upon which the agreement of December 21, 1904, was based. The designs throughout are in accordance with the best modern practice, and it is recommended that the plans be approved, a resolution to that effect being herewith submitted.

VESTING TITLE TO FLATBUSH AVENUE EXTENSION, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Bureau of Real Estate, Department of Finance, was submitted by the Comptroller and was ordered printed in the minutes, and the matter was laid over:

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 10, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held February 23, 1906, adopted a resolution vesting title in The City of New York to all those parcels of land required for the opening and widening of Roebling street, from South Fourth street to Union avenue, to take effect the 1st day of March, 1906, and on April 10, 1906, the buildings and parts of buildings erected thereon were sold at public auction and all have since been removed, except a factory occupying a block front and ten houses.

On the same date the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution vesting the title in The City of New York to all those parcels of land required for the opening and extending of Grand street, from Hooper street to Hayemeyer and South Fourth streets, to take effect March 4, 1906, and on April 17, 1906, the buildings and parts of buildings erected thereon were sold at public auction, and all the buildings have been removed therefrom, with the exception of four.

On November 11, 1905, title vested to all the land necessary for the widening of Livingston street, between Court street and Flatbush avenue, and the buildings thereon were sold December 1, 1905, and have been removed.

On February 23, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution vesting title in The City of New York to all those lots and parts of lots required for the opening and extending of the approach to the Manhattan Bridge (Flatbush Avenue Extension), from Fulton street to Nassau street, as laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 29th day of May, 1903, to take effect the 1st day of December, 1906, and recently the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a subsequent meeting, adopted a resolution advancing to November 1, 1906, the time when such title shall vest in The City of New York in the Flatbush Avenue Extension for the approach to the Manhattan Bridge. The advancing of the vesting of title to Flatbush avenue was after a public hearing held May 18, 1906.

The matter of the vesting of title to Flatbush avenue has been before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on various occasions; once during the incumbency of Hon. Edward M. Grout as Comptroller, and Hon. Martin W. Littleton as President, of the Borough of Brooklyn, at which time a full report was made thereon by this office, and it was then the unanimous opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the City should take title only to that part of Flatbush avenue from Fulton street to DeKalb avenue; for the reason that the values were enhancing at this point, and by the vesting of title the City would be enabled to obtain the property at the value on the date of vesting of title.

At the meeting held February 23, 1903, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (see Report 3048) stated that the question of taking the title to Flatbush avenue was brought up in March, 1905; that it was referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and that on April 28, 1905, the Acting Borough President urged that title be vested in the City at once. The matter was referred to the Comptroller, and on June 9, 1905, a report was submitted from the Real Estate Bureau recommending, as I stated before, that only that part be taken between Fulton street and DeKalb avenue, that the object of the Borough President in wishing to take title at once was in order that the existing buildings could be removed and the street be immediately improved. The Engineer at that time stated in his report that the Rapid Transit Commissioners had laid out the route for a subway connecting the Manhattan Bridge with Fulton street, and that the present plans contemplate a two-track subway between the bridge and Willoughby street, and a four-track subway between Willoughby and Fulton streets. To pave this street from curb to curb at once and to give the public and the abutting property owners an opportunity to adjust themselves to the new conditions, and then open the street for the purpose of building a subway, practically puts it out of use, would result in most unfortunate conditions and would increase enormously the expense of constructing such a subway.

The Engineer stated further that it would be possible, however, to improve the street as to permit a subsequent construction of a subway with a minimum of inconvenience and expense; that the street was 120 feet in width, that if no encroachments or obstructions of any kind were permitted, sidewalks of 18 feet in width would probably be sufficient. This would leave the roadway 84 feet wide between curbs. If 25 feet of this roadway adjacent to this curb were to be paved and the remainder of the street, being a width of 34 feet in its centre, were left unimproved, a double-track subway, with the necessary retaining walls could be constructed without destroying the pavement and without very serious interruption of traffic and business, and further, that he could see no reason why the Board should not provide for the vesting of title in the immediate future, and such course is recommended as one which will save expense to the City; that the work of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal had not yet sufficiently advanced to permit an accurate statement as to the cost of proceedings, but it is estimated that the awards will aggregate not less than \$3,000,000, including those which have already been acquired at private sale; that the Commissioners have filed their oaths of office on July 12, 1904, and that the Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the proceedings is doubtful if the proceedings can be completed in less than eighteen months.

At the meeting of the Board (February 23, 1906, see minutes, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Public Improvement matter, page 343), this office presented a report adverse to the proposition of vesting title at this time, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution that the title should vest on December 1, 1906.

In preparing this communication I started with the matter of the widening of Roebling street, and desire to say that although the title was vested on March 1, 1906, and under section 1553 of the Amended Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund immediately disposed of the buildings. No contract has been let for the improvement of the street, and it remains in practically the same condition as of May 20, 1906.

Title to Grand street was vested on March 1, 1906, and by a similar resolution the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund ordered the buildings removed on April 17. No contract has been let for the improvement of Grand street, and it remains in practically the same condition as when the house wreckers left it on May 17, 1906.

The title to Livingston street was vested in the City on November 11, 1905, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund directed the sale of the buildings thereon on December 1, 1905. A contract for the regulating, grading and paving of Livingston

street was passed July 10, 1906, but as far as the improvement of Livingston street is concerned, nothing has been done, and nearly eleven months have elapsed since the vesting of title.

There is a good reason for the vesting of title in the City to Roebing street and Grand street, as the Williamsburg Bridge is completed, but such is not the condition of the Manhattan Bridge for the Manhattan Bridge approach. In the first place, the Commissioners are not in any way near the completion of their work, and it will probably be one year before they have completed their work. The houses erected within the lines of the extension of Flatbush avenue may have to be viewed by the Commissioners as to their condition, and if the houses are removed from the property, which is the object of the vesting of title on November 1, and if excessive awards are made, the Corporation Counsel would be unable to make application to have the awards set aside and a new Commission appointed.

If the Manhattan Bridge were completed within the next year, I would make no protest against the vesting of this title, but as it will be probably from three to five years, I consider the vesting of title a waste of public money for the following reasons:

(a) The City will be paying 6 per cent interest on the amount hereafter to be awarded by the Commissioners, to date from the vesting of title.

(b) The City will be unable to collect any adequate return for the interest in the way of rents.

(c) There is no intention on the part of the City to immediately improve the street when the buildings have been removed therefrom, citing the case of Livingston street, which is now nearly a year behind the time of vesting title.

(d) Should the City immediately improve the street, the contractors for the subway would immediately tear it up and the Flatbush avenue extension would be in a chaotic condition from the date the buildings were removed until all the work is completed, such as the new sewers, laying of water pipes, gas pipes, conduits, etc., and the work, as the Engineer of the Board stated, would have to be done over.

In my report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 23, 1906, I stated that when title vested, The City of New York would have to collect rents from fifty-eight complete parcels of land, and as to all the rest of the property included within the lines, part rental only; that about 70 per cent. of the parcels of land included within the area of the street had already changed hands within the last two years. Whatever additional increase in value might occur between the time when the City would vest title resolution and the time when the Commissioners would make their awards, would only arise from the general increase in real estate values in Brooklyn. This has already taken place. It will require on the part of the Finance Department (if it is the intention after vesting title to allow the houses to remain standing), at least ten additional men for the purpose of collecting the rents and looking after the property on this street, and if the object in vesting the title was the immediate removal of the buildings, we would turn out in the middle of the winter over 250 families, who would be compelled to obtain quarters in other locations, and at that time of the year it is almost physically impossible to do so. If they were torn down in December, the City would have a mud hole from Nassau street to DeKalb avenue all winter long, and could not possibly use the street or put it in condition, owing to the frost and the inability to work before next summer. There are enough mud holes in Brooklyn at the present time without the City being a particeps criminis to an additional mud hole.

Inasmuch as nothing has been done with Roebing street, Grand street and Livingston street from eight months to a year, it is fair to assume that nothing will be done with Flatbush avenue for the same length of time; and

Inasmuch as it is impossible for the City to obtain an adequate return in the way of rents for the excessive interest charges on the vesting of title, which will amount to at least \$15,000 a month; and

Inasmuch as a new sewerage system, new water main system, gas and electric conduits have to be put in Flatbush avenue; and

Inasmuch as the Rapid Transit Board is to let a contract from the Manhattan Bridge through the new extension of Flatbush avenue to Fulton street; and

Inasmuch as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has yet to take action looking to the laying out of a plaza at the end of the Manhattan Bridge in Brooklyn; and

Inasmuch as it would not be fair to turn poor families out of the houses included within the area of this street in the middle of the winter (merely for the purpose of removing the buildings without improvement of the street), sending them to some other houses for which they could not afford to pay the rental asked, I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reconsider its action taken at the meeting held May 18, 1906, which vested the title in The City of New York on November 1, 1906, to the "lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending the approach to the Manhattan Bridge (Flatbush avenue extension) from Fulton street to Nassau street, as laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 29th day of May, 1903, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York," and that the resolution then adopted be rescinded and that a new resolution be adopted, vesting the title to said lands and premises above described in The City of New York on May 1, 1907.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON TREMONT AVENUE, THE BRONX.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx presented the following communication, which was referred to the Comptroller:

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Chairman:

GENTLEMEN—The Unionport Taxpayers' Association of the Borough of The Bronx, in regular meeting assembled the 2d day of October, 1906, representing many property owners who will be affected by the assessment for opening Tremont avenue, from the Bronx river to Eastern Boulevard, respectfully request your Honorable Board to take into consideration a portion of the said assessment that should be charged against The City of New York. As you are aware, in a locality such as that part of The Bronx Borough east of the Bronx river, assessments fall heaviest on those who are the first to locate their homes near some line or avenue of improvement. All street opening assessments, and all other street improvements and permanent sewer construction have to be met by many whose homes are acquired and maintained exclusively by their own industry and thrift, and in a case such as the opening of Tremont avenue, the subject of this petition, they look to the City for reasonable consideration in the adjustment of the assessment.

Each new house builder, it must be remembered, adds by his investment and development to the taxable value of his locality, and this very improvement while benefiting adjacent property will add at the same time to the taxable value of the property deemed to be benefited, thus providing increased revenue for the City. That is one element of consideration, we respectfully urge, that should be applied in reaching a determination to place a substantial portion of the assessment for the opening of Tremont avenue on the City at large. A potent and perhaps controlling reason why the whole cost of the opening of Tremont avenue should not be placed on the property deemed to be benefited is the fact that Tremont avenue as thus opened will be more than an ordinary thoroughfare. It will be a public highway in the fullest sense of the word. It will be in reality a boulevard connecting the extreme west side of The Bronx with the eastern section; and, further than that, it will be a connecting link that of necessity must be largely used between The Bronx and Pelham parks, and be a tributary of connection at the same time between the various parks comprising the park system of The Bronx, and to this extent will be subject to use more or less by inhabitants of the entire City. It is to be 100 feet in width, or practically twice the width of many ordinary streets, which is perhaps sufficient reason in itself why your Honorable Board should decide to have The City of New York pay an equitable portion of the assessment. We understand it to be the policy of the Board of Estimate, if not its rule, to have the City and the property owners within a given area of assessment share as nearly equal as possible the cost of acquiring the land to be taken in such a case as this.

We therefore submit this petition with much confidence, and ask that your Honorable Board adopt a resolution placing one-half the cost of the opening of Tremont avenue upon the City and the other half upon the property owners deemed to be benefited.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated July 25, 1906, requesting the approval of modifications in the drainage map of the City, the same comprising sewers and basins, as follows:

District 4-DP—Sewer in Scammel street, between Madison street and Henry street.

District 8-BY—Receiving basins on the north and south sides of East Seventy-second street, on the west line of Exterior street.

District 10-FD—Sewer in East Ninety-sixth street, between Second and Third avenues.

District 17-AN—Sewer in West One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

District 29-E—Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-first street, between Fort Washington avenue and Haven avenue.

District 4-DP—Receiving basin on the north side of Fourth street, at the centre line of Mangin street.

The construction of all of the sewers and basins in the above list has been authorized, with the sole exception of the basins on East Seventy-second street. The authorizations in each case were conditioned upon the presentation of the plan providing for incorporating the sewers upon the drainage map of the City, and it is in compliance with this understanding that the map is now presented.

The basins at Exterior street and East Seventy-second street will be required for the removal of drainage from East Seventy-second street.

The changes proposed seem to be proper ones, and the approval of the map is recommended.

The contract liability against the Street Improvement Fund, as appears by the books of the Finance Department, is \$6,222,396.90.

On September 1, 1906, in addition to the \$5,251,000 of unissued assessment bonds there was in the fund \$494,665.47 in cash, making the total amount presently available \$5,745,665.47. While the contract liability exceeds the available assets by \$476,731.43 the fund is being continually replenished by the payment into it of assessments and the interest thereupon.

Of the amount of \$20,374,363 of assessments authorized since 1903, assessment bonds have been authorized therefor, aggregating \$14,083,129.49, no bonds having been authorized for the balance of said authorized assessments aggregating \$6,291,233.51.

Adding this \$6,291,233.51, excess of authorized assessments over authorized bonds, since January 1, 1903, to the above recited amount of \$5,745,665.47 already in the fund, there was available on September 1, 1906, for assessment local improvements, \$12,036,898.98.

The attached table shows by boroughs the assessment improvements authorized, levied assessments collected, and warrants drawn from January 1, 1903, to September 1, 1906.

In view of the close relation of these improvements to the public needs, it would seem to me that the element of necessity for the improvement as against the possible objection to granting the request on financial grounds should be controlling.

As showing the condition which existed with regard to the advancement of these moneys and their non-return because of the failure of the Borough Presidents to see that the matter is reported for levy to the proper authorities, I submit a report made by the Chief Bookkeeper of the Finance Department, under date of August 22, relative to improvements made for which assessments have been levied in the Borough of Queens. The situation as reflected in this report is a striking one. I am informed that the same conditions exist, but perhaps to a lesser extent, in the other boroughs of the City, with the possible exception of Manhattan.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, August 22, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

DEAR SIR—In a communication dated April 19, 1906, to the Hon. Joseph Bermel, President of the Borough of Queens, you called his attention to the large number of works completed for local improvements in that Borough, for which no Assessment Lists have been received and for which the City has advanced the sum of \$1,603,052.19.

It appearing that no reply has been received to this communication, I have again caused to be prepared a statement showing the amounts advanced out of the Street Improvement Fund in the years 1899, 1901, 1902, 1903, 1904 and 1905, also the amounts credited to said fund for works assessed and the number of works assessed in the above mentioned years, marked "Schedule A."

Also a statement of the assessment lists returned to the Board of Assessors with the Comptroller's certificate of interest, showing the location of each work, the amount advanced thereon and the date of return of the lists to the Board of Assessors, marked "Schedule B."

Also a statement of works completed prior to January 1, 1906, for which no assessment lists have been received, showing location of work, amounts advanced for engineering, inspection, etc., amounts advanced on contract, total amounts advanced on each work and time of completion, marked "Schedule C."

The moneys advanced out of the "Street Improvement Fund" are returned by way of assessment, and not until the lists are prepared and transmitted is the City in a position to lay the assessment against the property benefited.

On account of the delay in transmitting the lists, the interest on advances will accumulate, enable the property owners to object against the assessment and prompt the Board of Assessors to sustain the objection, thereby causing a loss to the City. In the meantime the City is paying interest on the moneys advanced for these improvements.

There was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment local improvements in the Borough of Queens during the year 1905 at an estimated cost of \$972,750, and from January 1, 1906, to June 27, 1906, local improvements at an estimated cost of \$634,200.

It will be seen by the amount of the works authorized that the President of the Borough of Queens will continue to draw on the funds of the City to make these improvements, but is making no effort to replenish the "Street Improvement Fund" by preparing and transmitting the assessment lists for the works long past completed.

I therefore recommend that an immediate investigation of these matters take place, with a view to having the City properly reimbursed for moneys outlayed for such a long period.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.)

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 26, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor; Hon. Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Hon. Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen; Hon. John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Hon. Bird S. Coler, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx; Hon. Joseph Bermel, President, Borough of Queens, and Hon. George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After considering Franchise and Financial Matters, the Board took up the consideration of Public Improvement matters.

OPENING EXTENSION OF CROTONA PARK, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Comptroller was presented, and the matter was laid over pending a report from the Chief Engineer of the Board:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 20, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on June 1, 1906, adopted a resolution proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out an extension of Crotona Park, bounded on the north and west by Crotona Park, on the south by Crotona Park East and on the west by the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, and appointed a hearing at the meeting of the Board to be held on June 29, 1906, at 10.30 a. m., at which meeting such proposed change was considered and a resolution was adopted, pursuant to the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out the extension of Crotona Park in question, did favor the same in accordance with the map or plan submitted by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Under date of September 25, 1906, a communication was addressed by this office to Honorable Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in relation to this matter, and the following extract, which appeared in the minutes of June 29, 1906, was called to his attention:

"The President of the Borough of The Bronx stated that there was an alternate plan pending before the Local Board, and that he voted with the understanding that when the other proposition comes up before the Board a like hearing be had, and stated he was in favor of the other proposition."

The communication concludes:

"In view of the fact that an offer has been made to sell a portion of the property included within the area of the property laid out on the map of June 29, 1906, if you are of the opinion that the property laid out as an extension of Crotona Park should be acquired, a report will be made at the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommending the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition thereof."

—and under date of September 29, 1906, the President of the Borough of The Bronx transmits a copy of a report made to him by Chief Engineer Briggs on the subject, in which he states:

"It appears to me that it would be advisable to initiate proceedings for the improvement, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at their meeting held June 29, 1906, and then if the other extension should be taken up later I see no reason why it could not be added to the present proceeding or acquired independently."

The former Commissioner of Parks, in a communication to his Honor the Mayor, under date of May 7, 1906, stated that his Department had completed Crotona Parkway from Bronx Park along the Southern Boulevard to a point where the parkway crosses Southern Boulevard at One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, but that he is unable to go further until such time as additional lands shall have been acquired between Southern Boulevard and Crotona Park.

The Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of May 26, 1906, stated that what is known as Crotona Parkway consists of a strip 100 feet in width lying immediately east of the Southern Boulevard, and extending from a point 100 feet south of East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, northwardly to Bronx Park. It has within the last two years been improved by the Park Department, so that in conjunction with the Southern Boulevard we have a street 200 feet in width, the easterly half of which is under the control of the Department of Parks, and forms a park driveway, while the westerly side is a traffic street. The driveway was designed to connect Crotona Park and Bronx Park. The connection between the two, however, consists of a strip 100 feet in width lying immediately south of East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, between Southern Boulevard and Crotona Park, its length being but little over 200 feet, while the difference in elevation between Crotona Park at the westerly end of this strip and the Southern Boulevard is between thirty and forty feet, and it is manifestly impossible to pass from the park to the parkway at any grade which would be at all permissible in a park roadway.

The Department of Parks has had for some years a plan for establishing this connection, but to carry it out will necessitate the acquisition of the block between Southern Boulevard, Crotona Park East, Crotona Park and East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street. This would make it possible to more than double the distance and permit the construction of a serpentine road with a grade but little over 5 per cent., which in his judgment is as steep a grade as should be used on a road of this character.

It appears that the Local Board of the district adopted a resolution on September 29, 1906, recommending that proceedings be initiated for the acquisition of the property.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 990 of the Revised Charter, adopt a resolution authorizing the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property to be acquired for the extension of Crotona Park, bounded on the north and west by Crotona Park, on the south by Crotona Park East, and on the east by the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, so as to lay out the aforesaid extension in accordance with the map or plan submitted by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and further, that the entire expense of said proceeding shall be borne and paid for by The City of New York, and that the resolution shall contain a clause that nothing in the resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the property at private sale, with the further approval of the Board.

BRIDGES OVER RAILROAD TRACKS, THE BRONX.

The matter of the approval of plans for bridges over the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, which was laid over on October 19, was taken up.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx stated that the maps were satisfactory, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company has, in accordance with the provisions of article 12 of the agreement dated December 21, 1904, providing for the six-tracking of the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval plans for abutments, piers and superstructures of twenty-three bridges at different streets crossed by the said Harlem River and Portchester Railroad, and the plans for these structures being in accordance with the provisions of the said contract and conforming with the best modern practice; therefore be it

Resolved, That the plans submitted by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, in accordance with communications dated September 27, 1906, and October 16, 1906, for the following structures, namely:

Plate girder railroad bridges crossing Willow avenue and East One Hundred and Thirty-first street, East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, East One Hundred and Thirty-third street, East One Hundred and Fortieth street and Eastchester road;

Highway bridges crossing the railroad tracks of the said company at Bungay or East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Longwood avenue, Hunt's Point road, Faile street, Bryant street, Longfellow street, Westchester avenue, East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, Tremont avenue, White Plains road and Unionport road.

Also foot bridges across the tracks of the said company at Van Buren street, Hancock street, Taylor street and Garfield street, —be and the same hereby are approved.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

VESTING TITLE TO FLATBUSH AVENUE EXTENSION, BROOKLYN.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter of extending the time for vesting title to the Flatbush Avenue Extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn, from November 1, 1906, to May 1, 1907, which was laid over on October 19, was taken up.

The matter was referred to a committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, with instructions to report to the Board at the meeting to be held on October 30.

REPORT ON ASSESSABLE IMPROVEMENTS.

The following report was presented:

NEW YORK, October 25, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on October 19, 1906, the Presidents of the several boroughs were requested to have their Engineers confer with the Engineers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Department of Finance, with respect to the assessable improvements, the authorization of which is most necessary during the remainder of the present year. In accordance with this action, the Engineers of the boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx have submitted to us statements of the most important sewer and street improvements affecting their boroughs, resolutions for which are now pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and we have discussed with them the possibility of placing these various improvements under contract before January 1, 1907.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan has stated that he did not care to present special claims in favor of any particular improvement, but regarding them all as of equal importance, he would be satisfied to accept what the Board believed to be his proper share of the authorizations, to be taken up in the order in which they were approved by the Local Boards.

No representative of the Borough of Queens has conferred with us, but the President of the borough has repeatedly brought to the attention of the Board the pressing necessity of the sewer in St. Nicholas avenue, Myrtle avenue, etc., which would relieve what is known as the Ridgewood Section.

The Consulting Engineer of the Borough of Richmond has advised us that \$100,000 would cover any improvements in that borough which would be placed under contract during the remainder of this year.

Without reviewing the statements of the Borough Presidents already submitted to the Board of all the important improvements affecting their boroughs, it appears that the estimated cost of those most urgently needed is as follows:

There are many other improvements for which there is an urgent local demand, which would increase this total to at least \$4,500,000. For many of these, however, it will be impossible to make contracts before the close of the current year. Such contracts we believe could be made to the amount of possibly \$2,500,000, and we would suggest that assessable improvements to this amount be authorized with as little delay as possible. This would make the total authorization for the year 1906 \$8,387,650. The totals of such authorizations since the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has had jurisdiction over public improvements have been as follows:

1903	6,989,142 00
1904	4,156,490 00
1905	5,858,230 00

It will be seen that if the authorizations for 1906 are increased as suggested, the amount will considerably exceed that of any previous year.

In view of the large number of resolutions now pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for improvements, which, though now authorized, could not be contracted for during the present year, we would suggest that it might be wise to authorize between the present time and December 31, 1906, improvements to the total estimated value of \$4,500,000, with the distinct understanding, however, that any such authorizations in excess of \$2,500,000 be charged to the authorizations of assessable improvements to be made during the year 1907, this suggestion being made under the assumption that the Board, following its recent practice, will impose upon itself some limitation to the total authorizations for the year 1907.



GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, for the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
