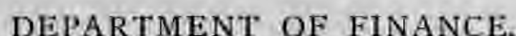

Westchester Avenue, Widening of Roadway, from Third to Brook Avenue.

RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,

The Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park:

MY DEAR SIR—I do not know whether this comes within your department or not, but I submit it to you, and if it should be referred to anybody else kindly inform me.

As you are aware, the Rapid Transit Subway stops at the east side of Third Avenue and Westchester Avenue, and from there there is an open cut and fill to Brook Avenue, where the elevated portion begins. The open cut will be surrounded by an iron railing and the fill enclosed between handsome retaining walls.

As the street is now constituted the distance between the curb and the side of the retaining wall or the railing will be but 16 feet on each side. The sidewalks are 20 feet. Cannot the sidewalks for the two blocks between Third Avenue and Brook Avenue be narrowed to say 10 feet or 11 feet, which would give a roadway, in the clear, from curb to wall, of 25 feet?

I send you a map showing the details of the work.

Resolved, That it is the sense of the North Side Board of Trade that the Rapid Transit Commissioners should initiate proceedings to acquire title to property to widen Westchester Avenue, from Third Avenue to Brook Avenue, 25 feet on each side, in order to accommodate conditions of travel, the cost to be borne by The City of New York and taken from the appropriations to the Rapid Transit Commission.

President Haffen said that some provision should be made for a roadway of proper width, but he was opposed to a reduction of the width of the sidewalks to 10 or 11 feet. As about 5 feet of the sidewalks would be taken up by cellar doors and in other ways, only 5 or 6 feet would be left for pedestrians. He favored increasing the width of the avenue, so that there would be ample room for trolley cars, for teams and for foot travel. He thought that 15 feet added to Westchester

avenue on both sides, from Third Avenue to Brook Avenue, might be sufficient, although 20 or 25 feet would be none too much. He was of the opinion that the cost of the improvement should be paid for out of the funds of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners.

Mr. George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, appeared and urged that some action be taken.

After further discussion, the matter was laid over for one week.

DEAR SIR—I am directed by Commissioner Keating to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 7, with a copy of a communication from George J. Grossman, regarding the bad condition of Newell Avenue.

You state that something of a temporary nature ought to be done to improve the roadway, as it would be premature to recommend the regulating and grading of the street, title not being vested in the City.



In reply the Commissioner requests me to say that the sewer in Newell avenue, between Elizabeth and Juliana streets, was covered with a protecting embankment about sixteen feet wide, the top of the embankment being in a straight gradient between said streets.

Owing to the irregularities in the original street surface, the top of the embankment is, as stated by Mr. Grossman, from four to six feet above the sidewalk. To put this street in satisfactory condition would involve the placing of several thousand yards of filling; also the erection of retaining-walls and the relaying of several hundred feet of flagging. All this is work which cannot be properly considered in any way as part of the duties of the Maintenance Bureau of this Department. If it is premature to recommend the regulating and grading of the street, as title thereto has not yet been vested in the City, it is suggested that the owners of property fronting on the street should apply for a permit to do the necessary temporary work at their own expense.
