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### TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

#### REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1907.

Tenement House Department,  
No. 44 East Twenty-third Street,  
New York, March 31, 1908.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to forward you herewith the report of the Tenement House Department of The City of New York for the year 1907.

The work of the Department may properly be divided into three main heads, namely, the maintenance in proper condition of existing tenements, usually designated as "old buildings," in the parlance of the Department; the alteration of existing tenements to make them comply with the requirements of the Tenement House Act, and the erection of new tenements in accordance with the requirements of this act. Taking up each of these classes in order, I beg to report as follows:

#### Old Buildings.

Much of the work relating to existing tenements has its origin in complaints received from citizens with regard to unsanitary or other illegal conditions. During the year 1907, 39,223 such complaints were received by the Department, of which 29,337 referred to Manhattan, 1,506 to The Bronx and 8,380 to Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond.

Comparison with preceding years shows a material falling off in number, as 51,173 complaints were received in 1905 and 43,750 in 1906, a decrease for 1907 of over 10 per cent. from 1906 and of nearly 25 per cent. from 1905.

The nature of complaints made in successive years does not show any significant variation, although the proportions change somewhat from year to year, as shown by the table given later. By far the largest single item each year is made up of complaints with regard to lack of cleanliness, which range from about one-fourth to one-third of all items of complaint. Next in order are complaints with regard to the condition of water-closets, which range from fifteen to twenty per cent. of all. It will be seen that these two items cover about one-half of all complaints, the remainder referring to such matters as insufficient protection from fire, imperfect drainage, defective plumbing other than water closets, need of repairs and defective water supply.

The provisions of the law require that the Department shall investigate all complaints of citizens relating to matters under its jurisdiction, and shall issue orders for the correction of all violations of law discovered, whether serious or otherwise, in the course of such an investigation.

The Department is often criticised for issuing minor orders affecting violations of law which in themselves are of less serious character than others known to exist in the City, but which have not as yet been corrected. It is due, however, to the circumstance above explained that all complaints must be investigated and the required orders issued that this criticism can be made, as in nearly every case the origin of the "minor orders" criticised is found to be in a citizen's complaint.

A considerable proportion of the complaints each year are found upon investigation to be without basis, or already acted upon by the Department, or not within its jurisdiction. In 1907 over half were of this character—to be exact, fifty-seven per cent.—while as a result of investigation of the 16,856 complaints remaining, or forty-three per cent. of the whole, violations were issued. Comparison with preceding years shows a small but general reduction in the proportion of complaints on which it is found necessary to issue violations, which, with the reduction in number of complaints received, seems to show a general improvement in tenement conditions.

Of these violations issued in consequence of complaints nearly all (16,248) fall under the class of maintenance of old buildings. Only 43 of them referred to build-

ings in course of construction, and 382 to the alteration of old buildings, while 3 were complaints as to prostitution in tenements.

The total number of "old building" violations issued during 1907, as shown by the table of "violations filed, dismissed, cancelled and pending" was 50,815. The number issued as a result of complaints is there seen to be about one-third of all. The remaining two-thirds were issued on the initiative of the Department, as a result of systematic canvasses to discover imperfect sanitary conditions, insufficient egress in case of fire, or other violations of law.

The attention paid to the second and very important class of orders, those relating to protection from fire, is seen by the fact that while complaints as to danger from fire amounted to only seven per cent. of all items of complaint, nearly twenty per cent. of the orders issued were of this nature.

This does not mean that other items of complaints were neglected, but that in the violations issued upon the initiative of the Department, after all complaints had been properly attended to, the very important matter of protection from fire had received especial attention.

The total number of old building violations filed during the year was somewhat less for 1907 than for 1906, owing to the fact that a greater proportionate effort of the force available by the Department was expended in connection with the alteration of existing tenements, and in the supervision of new tenements under erection.

As shown by the summary table of nature of orders for 1905, 1906 and 1907, of the orders issued in 1907 more than the average number called for structural changes in existing tenements. For instance, in 1907 8,474 orders to cut windows in dark interior rooms were issued, as against 2,876 in 1906 and 720 in 1905; 6,350 orders to provide skylights, as compared with 3,902 in 1906 and 900 in 1905; and 2,160 orders to replace wooden panels with glass in hall doors, as compared with 1,546 in 1906 and 442 in 1905. The number of orders requiring the removal of school sinks shows a steady decline since 1905, as the greater proportion of the existing fixtures were covered by orders in earlier years, leaving fewer and fewer to be discovered and attended to year by year. Orders to provide new water-closets, however, show a considerable increase for 1907, as compared both with 1905 and 1906.

This increase in structural orders indicates a greater activity on the part of the Department along the line of enforcing those provisions of the Tenement House Act which require structural changes in old buildings to secure better light and ventilation.

During the present year the Department has inaugurated the policy of requiring the alteration of old buildings to make them conform with the act in the following cases: First, where the condition of the building is so poor as to bring into consideration the enforcement of an order to vacate the buildings; again where a citizen's complaint is made affecting either directly or indirectly the matters of light, ventilation and egress, covered by the structural requirements of the Tenement House Act, and again in all cases where extensive alterations are proposed in the buildings on the initiative of the owner. This last practice is of especial advantage to owners, as it enables them to carry out the requirements of the act at less expense by doing so in connection with the alterations proposed by themselves. By this method all tearing up and repairing and repainting may be done at once, doing away with the expensive necessity for disturbing finished work to comply with future orders of the Department requiring structural changes.

Aside from the classes of orders above noted, this practice has materially increased the number of orders requiring the removal of woodwork from around sinks in halls and from water-closets, the enlargement of scuttles, the improvement of egress in case of fire by means of new fire-escapes, or the betterment of old ones, and those requiring the enforcement of the provisions of law relative to the occupation of basement apartments and the fireproofing of bakeries located in tenement houses.

In the matter of night lighting of halls, the force at the disposal of the Department has been insufficient to more than care for the complaints received from citizens in connection with this matter. This, however, is an improvement over the situation in preceding years, as heretofore it has been impossible even to follow up all such complaints. This requirement of law is extremely difficult to enforce, requiring as it does two inspections on each occasion and in each case, namely, one before 10 p. m. and one after that hour. The limited number of Inspectors makes it impossible to employ them for this purpose, and recourse must be had to our extremely small detail of Police officers.

#### Alteration of Existing Tenements.

The number of plans filed for the alteration of existing tenements corresponds in a large degree with the number of violations issued calling for such changes. In other words, few alterations during the last year have been undertaken solely on the initiative of the owner.

The number of buildings for which plans were filed is not materially less than the number for which similar plans were filed in 1906, but the character of the alterations proposed therein was somewhat more important. A large percentage were for the removal of school sinks and similar constructions and the replacement of the same with water-closets. It is encouraging to note that a very large percentage of these require the placing of the closets within the building, as opposed to the alternative construction permitted by law of placing them in the yards, under the condition that they shall be made frost-proof. It is evident that owners of tenement property are becoming alive to the fact that it is to their financial advantage, both in the matter of the rentable character of the building and economy in maintaining the water-closet compartments, that the latter should be placed within the building, and, if possible, be directly accessible from each apartment. A very considerable number of plans was filed for the removal from the yard of closets placed therein since the passage of the Tenement House Act, and their construction within the building. On the whole, very satisfactory progress has been made in the matter of the removal of school sinks and privy vaults, 1,241 of these having been taken out during the present year and 8,670 new water-closets provided, either to replace the school sinks removed or to afford needed additional accommodations. This represents actual work accomplished, as shown by violations dismissed during the year, irrespective of time of filing, and is not the same as the orders issued during the year, irrespective of compliance, which were above referred to.

It should be borne in mind that practically nothing in the line of removal of school sinks had been accomplished by the Department prior to 1906, all actions having been stopped pending the decision of the test case which was eventually carried to the Supreme Court of the United States, and in which the attitude of the Department was fully sustained by the court. The decision then rendered has already proved of very great advantage to the entire country, and the Department is in receipt of almost constant inquiry for particulars to be used in support of orders of municipalities for the betterment of similar unsanitary conditions.

The large number of orders issued, as earlier stated in this report, in conjunction with the fireproofing of bakeries has also produced a large number of plans incorporating the necessary changes. A slight change in the law, made during the last session of the Legislature, conceded the retention, under certain conditions, of a dumbwaiter shaft between the bakery shop and the store attached thereto. As this concession was one which had been much desired by the bakers there has been far less difficulty in the enforcing of the requirements of the law in connection with bakeries since the passage of this amendment. I cannot state too emphatically that it is my opinion, in which I am supported by the opinions of those who have studied the situation for many years, that any further concession in connection with this matter of the fireproofing of bakeries should not be permitted. I mention this here because I am aware of the fact that a strong effort will be made during the coming session of the Legislature to still further amend this portion of the Tenement House Act.

Progress in alteration along other lines is shown by the fact that during 1907, as shown by violations dismissed during the year, 4,932 hall doors were provided with glass panels as compared with 3,244 in 1906 and 716 in 1905; 2,790 skylights were provided, as compared with 1,014 in 1906 and 732 in 1905; and 13,044 windows were

cut in dark interior bedrooms, as compared with 7,348 in 1906 and 1,837 in 1905, or a number greater by over a thousand than all cut since the organization of the Department to the beginning of that year.

#### Erection of New Tenements.

In the report for 1906 attention was called to a change in departmental methods of supervising the erection of new tenements, which was considered of special value and importance. This change consisted of the organization of a "Division of Final Inspection," composed of Inspectors selected for their honesty and conspicuous ability, whose duty it should be to examine carefully all new buildings declared as ready for the issuance of a certificate and to report on the conditions then found. The great advantage of this change was felt to lie in doing away with the possibilities of undesirable influence that might arise if the entire process of inspection was in the hands of one set of men, without a system of cross-checking by another set of men, with this as their sole responsibility.

This system during the present year has been extended to all the boroughs, it having been clearly proved by experience in the Borough of Manhattan that such change was highly advantageous to the interests of the people. The result of this administrative change will be indicated at once by a comparison of the tables for 1905, 1906 and 1907, covering the number of violations filed on tenements during erection. In 1905, which was before the change in the system, but 3,834 new building violations were filed in the entire city. In 1906, during which the system was inaugurated in Manhattan and was known to be impending in the other boroughs, 7,163 such violations were filed. In 1907, during which the system was inaugurated in all the boroughs, the number has risen to 8,545 such violations. This clearly indicates that the change in the system has had the result of causing a more effective supervision by the employees of the Department assigned to this branch of the work and enabled them to detect many violations which under the previous practice had been neglected. While at first this change in the system resulted in increased complaints from builders and others interested in the erection of new tenements, it is most gratifying to be able to report at the present time that even in the boroughs where this system has been most recently inaugurated many builders and others have taken the trouble to put themselves on record as highly appreciating the change, primarily as placing all builders upon an equal basis in competition throughout the entire city.

#### Improvements in the Character of New Buildings Erected.

In the last annual report was pointed out the unpractical character of a large class of persons who were directly interested in the construction of tenement houses, and suggestions were made as to methods whereby the character of the buildings erected could be greatly improved, primarily by the enforcement of a provision for the employment on every tenement house during erection of a competent architect or constructing builder. I note with pleasure that the report of the Commission on the proposed revision of the Building Code incorporates in it a plan for the construction of all buildings, tenements or otherwise, under such competent supervision, and I wish to herein set forth my hearty approval as Commissioner of the Tenement House Department of such proposed ordinance. Its passage would make unnecessary the filing of thousands of violations which are at present filed, owing to the lack of knowledge of construction and of the provisions of the Tenement House Act on the part of the builder. While it is true that in the last two years the close supervision of the Department has resulted in a very great improvement in this regard, there is still ample room for further improvement, especially along the line of better and more stable construction. It is a serious question whether many of the buildings erected in the past few years will not within the course of the next decade be found so deficient in strength and other essential attributes as to make radical reconstruction in many respects absolutely necessary, and while the Tenement House Department is in no way responsible for the strength of materials and character of erection, outside of the limited sphere covered by the Tenement House Act, it has a very material interest in the buildings after erection, in view of its duties in conjunction with the maintenance of such houses after occupation. Too much stress cannot be laid, therefore, upon the physical character of construction incorporated in tenement houses, and any ordinances or legislation which will lead to the betterment of present conditions are certainly to be welcomed.

#### Changes in Personnel of the Department.

During the year just terminated the number of changes in the personnel of the Department due to disciplinary action has been very much less than the similar changes made necessary during the year 1906. The following tabular statement of transfers, resignations and dismissals during the year shows that the majority of changes made were due to the resignations of employees desiring to enter other lines of business, or were in the form of transfers from the Tenement House Department to similar positions in other branches of the City government:

It is unfortunately the case that the majority of the transfers are due to the fact that the Department has been unable to show appreciation of services well rendered by adequate increases in the compensation of employees performing such services, owing to the lack of appropriation; and a comparison of the salaries paid in this and other Departments shows at how great a disadvantage this Department is in endeavoring to retain the services of capable men.

And yet such men are especially needed in the work of this Department. In the inspectorial field particularly the capable Inspector is called upon to be not only well informed as to structural matters, but to be both a practical and theoretical sanitarian, possessed of good judgment, common sense and integrity. Added to this the work of the Inspector is physically very trying, and he is kept at a high tension throughout the entire period of the day. Besides, it is necessary for him to spend considerable of the time which otherwise would be at his own disposal in writing up his reports and otherwise carrying on the clerical part of his labors. It is hardly to be wondered at, therefore, that the Inspectors, and, indeed, the office employees, should be looking for opportunities to better their condition, either by obtaining increases in salary or reduction of the mental and physical strain of their present work. Unless the Tenement House Department is placed in a position where it can meet the advantages offered by other City Departments, at least as regards the matter of salary, we may expect to be continually called upon to consent to transfers to other Departments of our employees, often those best fitted for our work.

It is a significant fact that fifty per cent. of the employees of the Department have been transferred, have resigned or have been dismissed during the past two years. This in itself has been undoubtedly a great handicap to the work on account of the necessity of breaking in or otherwise educating new employees. The evil has reached such a point at the present time that I am unable to consent to further transfers, as if any more were permitted under present circumstances the work of the Department would be seriously hampered. The argument has been advanced several times during the past year that on account of the decreased amount of new building the work of the Department has been very greatly decreased also. This is based upon a mistaken assumption that the work of the Department in connection with buildings under erection takes up the greater portion of its time and effort. As a

matter of fact, the supervision of tenements under erection employs but a small percentage of the force of the Department. At no time has this work occupied more than twenty per cent. of the inspection force, the remaining eighty being fully employed with attending to the maintenance of old buildings and alterations. It should also be pointed out that at periods when the depression in building circles is such as to seriously affect the construction of new tenements, the demand for the improvement of existing tenements is increased and the amount of work in conjunction with that line of effort is increased to a notable degree.

#### Offices.

In my report of 1906 I called attention to the fact that additional office space was absolutely necessary in order that the work might be properly handled. In the Manhattan office I have been enabled to obtain the necessary room and this division of the Department is now, for the first time since its inauguration, equipped with the proper amount of office room for the handling of the business as at present conducted. In the Brooklyn office the actual area of office space and its arrangement are insufficient and unsatisfactory. If there is no immediate prospect of the provision of adequate office space for the Department in the Municipal Building it is certain that steps must be taken at once to provide at least fifty per cent. more room in Brooklyn, so arranged that the efficiency of the Department will not suffer as it does at the present time. The same is true in The Bronx office, in connection with which it should be borne in mind that the work in this Borough, as well as in the Boroughs under the charge of the Brooklyn office, is increasing with extreme rapidity. The very large number of tenements yearly created in the outlying Boroughs will undoubtedly increase as the years go on, particularly in view of the proposed improvements in the matter of transit facilities. The Department urgently needs permanent homes in all three Boroughs, but more especially in Brooklyn and The Bronx, where the facilities for acquiring a sufficient office area in a central location, and such area properly arranged for economic administration, are much less than they are in the Borough of Manhattan. It is also to be hoped that the administration will be able to secure the erection of a municipal storehouse, or similar building, wherein records of Departments similar to the Tenement House Department, which though not in constant demand it is impossible to destroy, may be stored in safety and in such a manner as to make the same accessible at need. Old records of the Department are often cited in court cases, and under our present necessities as to storage of dismissed cases in high priced offices the storage of such papers from the dismissed files is a matter of considerable expense to the City.

#### Proposed Amendments to the Law.

In the last annual report reference was made to the necessity for revision of the Tenement House Act. Following out the lines therein indicated the officers of the Department spent a great deal of time and effort in the preparation of a general bill, which was duly presented to the Legislature. While the general purpose of such proposed amendments was to unify and correlate the present unrelated portion of the Tenement House Act, and in some degree to satisfy certain of the objections raised by tenement owners and builders, I regret to say that the efforts of the Department were not seconded in the manner anticipated and desired. In addition to the general revisionary bill proposed by the Department numerous other bills affecting the Tenement House Act were presented, the majority of which were extremely dangerous in character. Through the efforts of the Department and those friendly to tenement house reform all of the undesirable bills in question were prevented from passing, but I regret to say that the bill presented by the Department also failed of passage. With the exception of an amendment to the provisions relative to bakery fireproofing, previously alluded to, and some changes in those portions of the law affecting prostitution in tenement houses, no amendments to the law were made by the Legislature of 1907.

There can be no question in the minds of those interested in the betterment of housing conditions in this City that a revision of at least some of the sections of the law is not only desirable but clearly necessary. The present law has been enforced as it stands for four years, and the greater portion of the law for six years. The most casual consideration of the situation would lead anyone to believe that in the period of time which has elapsed since the passage of the act changing conditions and the test of experience show the necessity for changes in the law as it now stands. In certain matters the law undoubtedly requires strengthening, but in other matters it is evident that some concessions from the law as originally framed can safely be made. It is not my plan to present to the present Legislature any bills in amendment of the Tenement House Act, but I have every reason to believe that the act and the Department will undoubtedly be attacked in more ways than one, and that some at least of the dangerous and defective bills presented last year will be reintroduced at this session of the Legislature. It is therefore incumbent upon me to urge upon your Honor that the influence and power of the City be exerted to its fullest extent in opposition to all bills offered which have not the full approval of the Department, and that the representatives of the City government at Albany be instructed to oppose in every way the passage of any such unapproved acts. It is needless to say that bills incorporating proper changes in the Tenement House Act will gladly receive my fullest consideration and support. It was proposed last year that certain minor changes be made in the chapter of the Charter under which the Department derives its authority. The bill presented for such changes also failed of passage, although it was at that time clearly pointed out that the proposed changes would be of extreme advantage to the Department in that they would permit a greater flexibility of action. At the request of the Charter Revision Committee the changes proposed last winter were resuggested to them in the hope that they would incorporate the same in their report.

We are looking forward to the reappointment of the Charter Revision Committee, by whose aid we hope to secure the necessary changes in the Charter, especially the extension of the powers of the Department in respect to requirements as to filing of plans, etc., in connection with the erection of new tenements, the legalization of the proposed consolidation of the Old and New Building Inspection Bureaus, whereby every Inspector of the Department will be required to be responsible for the construction, alteration and maintenance of all tenements in the district assigned to his care, whether in process of erection or existing, and the readjustment of that section of the Charter covering the assignment of Police to the Tenement House Department. All of these matters, which will materially increase the efficiency of the Department, reduce the liability of departure from the law in the erection of new tenements and increase the economy of administration of the Department in connection with the field work.

#### Suggestions for Betterment.

To recapitulate, it is suggested that the interests of the City demand:

First—A careful and logical revision of the Tenement House Act.

Second—A minor but essential amendment of the provisions of the Charter affecting the Tenement House Department.

Third—Necessary legislation, or the passage of ordinances, which will result in the improvement of the physical construction of tenement houses.

Fourth—A readjustment, on an equitable basis, of the salaries paid to the officers and employees of the Department.

Fifth—A more liberal policy in the matter of appropriations for the use of the Department, sufficient at least to provide an adequate force for the carrying out of the mandatory provisions of the law, and commensurate with the growth of the problem presented to the Department.

Sixth—Material and, if possible, permanent increase in the amount of office space assigned to the Brooklyn and Bronx offices of the Department, and the provision of adequate storage for valuable records which it is not desirable to destroy.



The object of such application is to obtain an order of the Court appointing three disinterested and competent freeholders, one of whom shall reside in the County of New York, and at least one of whom shall reside in the county where the real estate hereinafter described is situated, to act as Commissioners of Appraisal under said act, and discharge all the duties conferred by the said law and the acts amendatory thereof, upon such Commissioners of Appraisal, for the purpose of providing an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York.

Further application will be made, as required by said act, to have the highway system, as shown on the maps of Sections 3, 4 and 7, approved by the Court.

The real estate sought to be taken or affected, in so far as Section No. 7 is concerned, is situated in the Town of North Castle, County of Westchester and State of New York.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matter set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
