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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

EXTRACT FROM

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
JANUARY 31, 1908.

The following matters not on the Calendar for this day were considered by unanimous consent:

SEABOARD REFRIGERATION COMPANY.

In the matter of the application of the Seaboard Refrigeration Company for an extension of time until December 1, 1908, in which to comply with the provisions of section 2, third, and section 2, twenty-second, of the contract dated June 22, 1906, granting a franchise to this company.

This petition was presented to the Board at its meeting of January 24, and was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Secretary presented the following:

NEW YORK, January 30, 1908.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 24 there was presented an application of the Seaboard Refrigeration Company for an extension of time to December 1, 1908, in which to comply with the provisions of its contract requiring cash payments to be made to the City within thirty days after the signing of the same. The application was referred to a committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Your Committee would report that the franchise referred to is a new franchise, which was granted for the purpose of modifying the terms and conditions of one which had been previously granted by the Board and accepted by the company. Under the former franchise several extensions of time had been granted, the last of which was to May 1, 1908. The new franchise requires cash payments aggregating \$2,500 to be made to the Comptroller before February 6, 1908, and unless these payments are made the franchise will be forfeited. The President of the company, Mr. Charles E. Booth, has shown that it would be very difficult for him to make the payments within the time last named, and inasmuch as under the former contract he had already been granted an extension to May 1, 1908, we respectfully recommend that an extension to the same time be granted under the new franchise.

The following was offered:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment did, on June 15, 1906, adopt a resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute, in the name and on behalf of the City, a contract between the Seaboard Refrigeration Company and The City of New York, granting to the company the right or franchise to construct, maintain and operate a conduit, with necessary branches and connections therefrom, for the sole purpose

of supplying refrigeration to consumers, under and along certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of July, 1906, the Acting Mayor did execute, in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, a contract granting to the company such right, which contract was dated the 22d day of June, 1906; and

Whereas, On the 13th day of December, 1907, this Board adopted a resolution consenting to certain changes and modifications in the aforesaid contract authorizing the Mayor to execute and deliver a modified contract in accordance therewith, in the name and on behalf of the City, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on the 18th day of December, 1907; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of January, 1908, the Mayor did execute, in the name and on behalf of the City, a modified contract, which contract was dated the 20th day of December, 1907; and

Whereas, The Seaboard Refrigeration Company, in a petition dated January 20, 1908, requested an extension of time until December 1, 1908, in which to make the payments provided by section 2, third, and section 2, twenty-second, of the contract dated June 22, 1907, which petition was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, The aforesaid Select Committee, in a report dated January 30, 1908, has recommended that an extension of time be granted to the company up to and including May 1, 1908, in which to make the aforesaid payments; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants, upon the conditions hereinafter set forth, an extension of time up to and including May 1, 1908, for the Seaboard Refrigeration Company to comply with the provisions of section 2, third, and section 2, twenty-second, of the contract dated June 22, 1906; and be it further

Resolved, That this extension of time shall not become operative until the said Seaboard Refrigeration Company shall duly execute an instrument in writing, to the satisfaction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and file the same in the office of the said Board within thirty (30) days from the date of approval of this resolution by the Mayor, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree that the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so given to the extension of time requested shall not in any wise change, alter or amend any of the terms, conditions and requirements in the contract fixed and contained, which said contract shall remain in full force and effect except as herein expressly stated and as heretofore modified by contract dated December 20, 1907.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Queens—16.

NEW YORK AND PORT CHESTER RAILROAD COMPANY.

At the meeting of January 24, 1908, the matter of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company was referred to a Select Committee, and the public hearing on the proposed form of contract consenting to certain modifications and alterations in the line of its route, which had been continued until that date, was continued until February 21, 1908.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the hearing be continued until March 6, 1908.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Queens—16.

CONSIDERATION OF TELEPHONE APPLICATIONS.

At the meeting of December 20, 1907, the applications of the Atlantic, the Independent and the Star Telephone companies for franchises and the offer of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company to compensate the City during such time as no other companies operate in The City of New York were referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the Corporation Counsel and the Chief Engineer, to report back to the Board at the meeting of January 24, 1908, and on that day an extension of time until February 21, 1908, was granted the Committee in which to make its report.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that further consideration of the matter be postponed until March 6, 1908.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Queens—16.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF VAN CORTLANDT, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen the members of the Local Board of Van Cortlandt, Twenty-fifth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on Thursday, January 16, 1908, in Borough Hall, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—Alderman Crowley, Alderman Hochdorffer, Alderman Handy and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Hearings Advertised for This Date.

No. 10. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in Eden avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-third street and Belmont street; and in East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, between Eden avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

Petition signed by J. Sangnanini, Wm. B. Ewing and Harold Swain, representing 750 feet frontage.

No. 10. appeared in opposition. Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 11. Constructing sewers and appurtenances in Mosholu avenue, between Broadway and Von Humboldt avenue at its intersection with West Two Hundred and Fifty-fourth street.

Petition signed by Max Wohlgemuth and six others.

The Engineer in Charge of Sewers, while present at the meeting, stated that this was quite a long stretch of sewer construction and he might probably have his report ready for the next meeting.

Laid over awaiting report.

No. 12. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging of sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying of crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Morris avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-third street to Fordham road.

No. 45. Regulating, grading, setting curbstones and flagging of sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Prospect place, between Clay avenue and Carter avenue; also building steps and necessary drains, etc.

On motion, duly seconded, the petition of Eva W. Bailey was denied.

No. 52. Commerce street, regulating, grading, etc., from Sedgwick avenue, south side of Washington Park, to bridge; also north side of Washington Park to West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street.

On motion this matter was denied.

No. 197. Exterior street, widening, between West One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and West One Hundred and Ninety-first street.

Original hearing April 12, 1906.

Kingsbridge Real Estate Company, by Richard M. Montgomery, in opposition.

On motion, duly seconded, the petition was denied.

No. 203. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Anderson avenue and Shakespeare avenue, and building steps with the necessary appurtenances.

Petition signed by George W. Collier and nine others.

On motion, duly seconded, the petition was denied.

No. 304. Regulating, grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Kingsbridge road, between Bailey avenue and Spuyten Duyvil Creek, as shown on "Map or plan showing the location and grades of avenues and streets connecting the Borough of Manhattan with the Borough of The Bronx at Farmer's Bridge," dated January 15, 1906, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 4, 1906, pursuant to section 442 of the Greater New York Charter.

Petition signed by Kingsbridge Real Estate Company, by Richard M. Montgomery, president, and John M. Deane, attorney for fifteen lots on Heath and Bailey avenues, Kingsbridge road and Kingsbridge terrace.

DEAR SIR—Herewith is a blue print of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company's plan, Subway Division No. 7645, showing the partition of certain property at the intersection of Hillside and St. Nicholas avenues, Fort George.

The whole property is now owned in fee by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company. It was purchased by them in lieu of condemnation proceedings in order to expedite obtaining control of it. This was the usual procedure under Contract No. 1. Subsequently such properties as were necessary to the City were so transferred. They propose to dispose of the various parcels as follows:

Parcel No. 1 to be transferred to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

Parcel No. 2 to be transferred to The City of New York.

Parcel No. 3 to be transferred to the Fort George Street Railway Company or to be held in trust by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for use of the Fort George Street Railway Company.

The disposition proposed for Parcels Nos. 1 and 2 is entirely satisfactory, but if Parcel No. 3 is transferred to the Fort George Street Railway Company, or the Interborough Company, it is more than likely that it may be used as a storage yard for junk, or may have small buildings of an objectionable character built upon it.

I think it would be desirable that the portion of Plot No. 3, north of the Fort George Street Railway Company's tracks, be transferred to the City to be parked and kept free from any objectionable encumbrances, and thereby insure a proper environment immediately adjacent to the Dyckman street station. The partition of Plot No. 3, south of the Fort George Street Railway Company's tracks, can be transferred to the Interborough Company or Fort George Street Railway Company as suggested by Mr. Pegram.

Will you please advise me what action the Commission desires taken in the matter?

Commissioner Bassett presented the following report on complaints of the Twenty-eighth Ward Board of Trade, Brooklyn, regarding the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad system:

This complaint, dated September 13, 1907, was made up of about thirty different items. Upon its receipt it was referred to me for analysis. I reported that some of the items should be held in abeyance and for further investigation; that others should be forwarded to Mr. Ivins, and that the remainder should be forwarded as complaints to the operating company; this was done and the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company duly answered, forwarding a copy of its answer to the complainant. The complainant replied; the answer and reply were referred to me.

The answers of the operating company express compliance with six of the items, viz.:

Opening the side doors at all times on the bridge cars.

Operation of more cars on Broadway elevated line.

More trains on Sundays and holidays.

Extension of platforms.

Operating Gates avenue short line cars to Manhattan Junction on the Lexington avenue line.

Six car trains instead of five car trains on the Lexington avenue line.

It seems desirable that a hearing should be had on some of the items of complaint with which the operating company does not express compliance; these items are the following:

That at least 150 additional elevated station signs be prepared and placed by said company, properly distributing them among their various elevated, surface and depressed road stations.

To provide more or wider stairways at the Gates avenue and Halsey street stations of the Lexington avenue line.

In case there is further work of reinforcing the elevated structure on Broadway, not to decrease the present headroom.

To remove the Tillary street station and platform.

To repair and keep in first class order the Lafayette avenue station of the Fulton street elevated road, even if the same shall not be put into present use.

To operate midnight trains on all elevated lines with not over fifteen minutes headway at least until 1 o'clock a.m.

I have asked the Counsel to prepare an order for a hearing on the last mentioned items, and submit the proposed order for hearing herewith.

There are various other items with which the operating company does not express compliance, and which are not included in the order for hearing. The reason for this is that they are the same as or are included in investigations and hearings now under way, which have been initiated from other sources.

RULE XXV.

The form and contents of complaints made as provided in section 71, regarding the price of gas and electricity, shall be as follows:

(1) The said complaint shall be directed to the Public Service Commission for the First District. It shall state the names of the corporations supplying gas or electricity, as the case may be, either within The City of New York or within such subdivision thereof, either Borough or County, as the complainants may desire to include within the complaint.

(2) It shall state that each of such companies is a corporation, if such be the fact, and that such corporations are authorized to sell, manufacture and supply gas or electricity, as the case may be, for heat, light or power within the said territory, and that they are actually engaged in manufacturing, selling and supplying either gas or electricity for the purposes aforesaid.

(3) If the complaint is against gas companies, it shall state whether it is directed to the illuminating power or purity or the pressure or the price of gas. If against electrical companies, whether directed to the initial efficiency of the electric incandescent lamp supply or the regulation of the voltage of the supply system used for incandescent lighting or the price, and it shall specify the respects wherein the service is otherwise inadequate or the methods unreasonable, and if it is claimed that the price is excessive and unreasonable, the price actually charged by such companies should be set forth, and the respects wherein or the reasons why it is unreasonable specified.

(4) The complaint shall state that each of the complainants is a customer or purchaser of either gas or electricity, as the case may be, from one or more of the said companies against whom the complaint is made.

(5) If the complaint is that the price of either gas or electricity is excessive, it should state that the price is excessive, unfair and unreasonable and is disproportionate to the proper cost of manufacturing and delivering either gas or electricity in the locality mentioned.

(6) The complaint may also contain any other specification of any illegal act on the part of said companies, or any violation of the charter or franchises of said companies or any of them, in respect of the manufacture, sale or supply of gas or electricity, or in its methods of conducting its business, and should demand the relief which the complainant desires.

(7) The complaint must be signed by not less than one hundred customers or purchasers of gas or electricity in The City of New York, or in such lesser territory as is included in the complaint, and the address of each signer shall be stated.

(8) A single complaint shall not include both gas and electricity.

(9) Upon such complaint being filed an order for a hearing shall be made returnable at such time as the Commission may direct. Such order may also include such other matters as the Commission may desire to be included in the investigation or hearing. A certified copy of the order with a copy of the complaint shall be served on each corporation affected thereby, and the hearing shall proceed at the time and place designated or at such other time to which the Commission or the Commissioner presiding may adjourn the same.

Hon. WILLIAM R. WILLCOX, President, Public Service Commission, Tribune Building:

DEAR SIR—On September 13 I wrote to the Manhattan Railway Company, stating that the Engineer of the First Division of the Public Service Commission had advised the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways that column No. 218 of the elevated railway on the Bowery will stand some seven or eight feet in the roadway of what will be the northwest corner of the Delancey street extension and the Bowery. I also stated that it was not only important but necessary that this column should be moved back on the new curb line, and that the Public Service Commission desires to know positively whether this column will be moved or not before making their plans for the underground structure. I therefore requested the company to examine the matter and inform me as to the advisability of moving the column.

I have received a reply from the Chief Engineer of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to the effect that, according to their measurements, the proposed change would necessitate the removal of the column nine feet north, thus lengthening the span over Delancey street by that amount, and shortening the span to the north, which will require the replacement of these two spans. The communication further states that of course this change would be of no benefit to the elevated railway—in fact, slightly the reverse—but it would seem a very necessary step to remove this obstruction from the new street. The company was, therefore, willing that the City should make the change at its own expense, under the company's supervision, and to its satisfaction.

I concur in the view of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways, that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company should make the change itself at its own expense.

The Secretary presented the following communication from Chief Engineer George S. Rice, which, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Eustis:

NEW YORK, November 15, 1907.

Mr. TRAVIS H. WHITNEY, Secretary:

DEAR SIR—Pursuant to the request of the Commission, dated October 30, 1907, transmitting a communication from the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, dated October 26, 1907, relative to the elevators at the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth and One Hundred and Eighty-first street stations, I desire to report as follows:

Contract No. 1, under which the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth and One Hundred and Eighty-first street stations were constructed, provides that, if required by the Board, the contractors shall establish an approved plant of elevators not exceeding four (4) in number, each elevator being of sufficient size to carry at least twenty-five (25) persons. The total capacity required under the contract, therefore, is 100 persons per single trip of all elevators.

The interior floor space of the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth and One Hundred and Eighty-first street elevators is about 9 feet 8 inches by 11 feet 8 inches. The specifications under which they are constructed require that they should be able to lift a live load of 8,000 pounds at a speed of 250 feet per minute. This is equivalent to a carrying capacity of fifty-three persons averaging 150 pounds each. The capacity of the two elevators at each station is therefore in excess of the maximum contract requirement.

The size of the cars is such that sometimes as many as seventy persons have crowded into them, making a live load of approximately 11,000 pounds, nearly 40 per cent in excess of the contract load. This has resulted in stalling the elevators. To overcome the difficulty, obstructions have been built into the cars at One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street to reduce the capacity to within the specified load.

I have had an actual count made of the passenger traffic on the elevators at both of the above stations during the morning and evening rush hours.

At One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street the maximum load observed on an elevator was thirty-seven persons, while even with the present restricted floor space the capacity is fifty persons. At One Hundred and Eighty-first street fifty-three persons were loaded in one elevator, and on several occasions as many as fifty persons were observed. In one or two instances, when a Kingsbridge express immediately followed the regular train, passengers were compelled to wait several minutes before they could be transported to the street.

From these facts, in my opinion, the present elevator service at the two stations is reasonably sufficient under normal traffic conditions, and will be so for some time to come. I do not feel that the abnormal conditions due to the baseball crowds, which only prevail during a very small portion of the year, is a proper or fair basis upon which to determine the adequacy of the elevated facilities at One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street station. This location for the baseball field may be abandoned at any time.

The elevators and their landing at the above stations have been designed to permit passengers to unload from and load into the elevators from separate openings. In order to do this, however, two men must be employed in each car. For safety, the car would only be operated by one of the men, the gates being so connected up with safety devices that the car cannot be started until both gates are closed, and if during the travel of the car either gate is open, the car will stop automatically. By operating the elevators in this manner, a small increase in service is possible.

It is the present practice to start the elevators on the lower level at the mezzanine platform only. At this point passengers using the west platforms of the station are directly accommodated since they have to ascend to the mezzanine level to cross over the tracks. Those from the east platforms must ascend a short flight of stairs to the mezzanine level to reach the elevators, though it is practicable for the elevators to be loaded and unloaded from the platform level itself. It is not desirable, however, to operate the elevators to this lower level; by doing so would simply require additional time, which would be consumed by the short movement under slow headway between the mezzanine and lower platform levels and another stop.

To meet the numerous complaints which had been made against elevator service, particularly at the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street station, due to the baseball traffic, plans were prepared early in the year which indicated how an additional pair of elevators might be constructed on the west side of the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street station. A similar plan is practicable at the One Hundred and Eighty-first street station. While the plan has not been worked out in all structural details, an approximate estimate showed that the work would probably cost about \$125,000.

The Interborough Company early in June of this year informed us that they did not feel justified in spending this amount of money for additional facilities, in view of the temporary character of the traffic occasioned by the location of the baseball park. If the Commission desires any such additional facilities provided the work will have to be ordered as an extra under the contract, as the contract requirements have now been entirely fulfilled. It is practicable, however, to request the Interborough Company to increase the elevator power of the motors for the elevators, thereby permitting a full load of 11,000 pounds, which will provide for seventy passengers in a car instead of fifty, as at present.

Herewith is a copy of report made to Mr. D. L. Turner, General Inspector of Stations, relative to the elevator traffic at the two stations, together with blue prints of the details mentioned therein. Also herewith is one print of plan T-328, showing the two proposed elevators to be constructed on the west side of the One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street station.

GENTLEMEN—On December 27, 1906, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners prepared and submitted to you a requisition under the provisions of section 10, chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, known as the Rapid Transit Act, for the sum of \$826,500, the amount requisite and necessary to enable the said Board properly to do and perform, or cause to be done and performed, the duties prescribed by the said statute.

There was transmitted therewith an itemized statement showing the probable amount of the expenditures of the Board during the year ending December 31, 1907, which for reference is here included and is as follows:

In pursuance with the above, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on January 25, 1907, appropriated the sum of \$742,500, which was \$84,000 less than the sum estimated and petitioned for, this being done, as the Auditor of the late Board states, upon the recommendation of the City Comptroller, who said that the amount so deducted would be appropriated at a later date if found to be needed.

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners was abolished and went out of office under the provisions of chapter 429 of the Laws of 1907, and the Public Service Commission for the First District, appointed under the provisions of the said Act, has been vested thereby with all the powers and duties of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners and with other powers as specified in that Act.

The expenditures during the portion of the year so far prove that the appropriation of \$742,500 is inadequate, and that the sum of \$84,000 so deducted from the original requisition made by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners under date of December 27, 1906, will be required.

The Public Service Commission for the First District, for the necessary additional bureaus and the necessary additional offices, service and supplies, and for necessary investigations of various railroads, requires at this time a further sum of \$25,000.

At a term of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court on the 8th day of November, 1907, upon application of the members of the late Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for an order fixing their compensation for duties performed by them under the Rapid Transit Act between January 1, 1907, to and including June 30, 1907, an order was made and on November 14, 1907, duly filed, fixing their compensation at sums which in the aggregate amounted to \$12,241.64 for the period aforesaid.

The Public Service Commission for the First District therefore respectfully transmits herewith a requisition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the sum of \$121,000 to cover said requirements for the rest of the year ending December 31, 1907.

And it being made to appear that the service of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company in the transportation of persons in the First District, on its Jamaica avenue line, is unreasonable, improper and inadequate, in that the said Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company does not run cars enough on its Jamaica avenue line, between Cypress Hills station and Jamaica, reasonably to accommodate traffic offered for transportation to it, and that it is reasonably necessary for the transportation of passengers offering themselves for transportation, and is and will be just, reasonable and proper that the said service of the said Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company on Jamaica avenue should be supplemented and changed in the particulars hereinafter set forth, at the points and at the times so hereinafter set forth;

Therefore, On motion of Abel E. Blackmar, Esq., Counsel to the Commission, it is Ordered, That the service of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company, on its lines on Lexington avenue, Broadway, Fulton street and Crescent street, be supplemented and changed as follows:

(1) That the said Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company operate the short-line trains of its Lexington avenue line, which have heretofore terminated their eastward run at Gates avenue, through to Manhattan Junction, during the evening rush hours, and that the said company make each of such trains during said rush hours a train of at least six (6) cars.

(2) That the said company operate all trains on its Broadway line, which have heretofore terminated their eastward run at Van Siclen avenue, through to Cypress Hills station at all times, and that during the rush hours, both morning and evening, the said company make each of said trains a train of at least five (5) cars.

(3) That the said company operate its Lexington avenue trains to and from Cypress Hills station with a headway of not more than seven and one-half (7½) minutes between said trains, during the period between the morning and the evening rush hours, and during the period after the evening rush hours until twelve o'clock midnight, and that during those periods the said company make each of said trains a train of not less than four (4) cars; and it is further

Ordered, That the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company supplement and change its service on its Jamaica avenue line between the Cypress Hills station and Jamaica, as follows:

(1) That the said company increase its service on its Jamaica avenue line so that at least twenty per cent. (20%) more cars shall operate between Cypress Hills station and Jamaica than were provided in the schedule in effect on said line on the 11th day of October, 1907.

(2) That in addition to the said increase the said company run an additional car out from Jamaica to Cypress Hills at 4:45 a. m. so that cars shall leave Jamaica with a headway of not more than fifteen (15) minutes between cars during the period between 4:30 a. m. and 5:00 a. m., inclusive.

And it is further Ordered, That this order shall take effect on the 27th day of November, 1907.

And it is further Ordered, That this order shall continue in force for a period of one year from and after the date when the same takes effect, but without prejudice to an order for further or additional hearings and action thereon by the Commission in respect of anything herein prescribed, prior to the expiration of said period of one year.

And it is further Ordered, That before the 25th day of November, 1907, the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company and the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company each notify the Public Service Commission for the First District whether the terms of this order are accepted and will be obeyed.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, December 20, 1907, amending the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission:

Resolved, That section 24, chapter 2, Part VI, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 24. Liquids for cleaning purposes, composed of solvents which are products of coal tar or petroleum, and which emit an inflammable vapor at a temperature below 100 degrees Fahrenheit when tested in the open air or the closed pyrometer of Giuseppe Tagliabue, shall not be dispensed or sold in retail drug stores, except under the following conditions:

(a) In bottles not exceeding four ounces in capacity.
(b) In metal cans not exceeding sixteen ounces in capacity, said cans to be fitted with screw tops.

(c) That the bottles or cans containing such volatile liquids shall not be filled on the premises of retail drug stores.

(d) That the total amount of such volatile liquids thus kept on hand shall not exceed five gallons.

(e) That each bottle and each can shall bear a label printed with red ink in legible characters, reading as follows: "Dangerous—Beware of an inflammable vapor. Do not open this bottle or can in any room with fire, gas or open light."



"Resolve, That the being or running loose and at large of stray dogs in the streets or other public places in The City of New York is a public nuisance, dangerous to life and detrimental to health, and the said Board hereby

enters in its records the same as a nuisance, and hereby orders the abatement thereof; and all persons are hereby forbidden to allow stray dogs, owned, harbored, possessed or controlled by them, to be or run loose and at large in the streets or other public places in The City of New York. The term 'stray dogs,' as herein used, shall be taken to mean and include any dog without a collar about its neck bearing the name and address of the owner thereon, or any dog with such collar about its neck bearing the name and address of the owner thereon, which is unaccompanied by its owner or the person harboring, possessing or controlling, or claiming to harbor, possess or control such dog; or a dog without an adequate muzzle to protect persons against being bitten; or not held by a leash or chain not more than four feet in length; or a dog that is ferocious, vicious or rabid; further be it

"Resolved, That all such dogs be and the same are hereby ordered removed to the shelter maintained by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, or other shelter or place selected or designated by the said Board of Health or its Sanitary Superintendent, in the Borough where any such dog may be found by the officers and agents employed for such purpose, and destroyed, unless redeemed within forty-eight hours after public notice to redeem said animals, printed in the CITY RECORD, and upon payment of the sum of three dollars for each dog so redeemed; further be it

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
