## BOARD OF CITY MAGISTRATES.

### First Division.

Designation of districts for the City Magistrates' Courts, First Division, City of New York:

In accordance with the provisions of section 70 of chapter 659 of the Laws of 1910, we, the undersigned, fix and designate the following Police precincts, together with the boundaries of the same for each City Magistrates' Court District in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx:

### FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

Location, Criminal Courts Building, 123 Centre St.

Boundaries—Beginning at a point where Grand st. intersects the East River, running thence in a westerly direction along the center line of Grand st. to Division st.; thence in a southwesterly direction along the center line of Division st. to the Bowery; thence along the center line of the Bowery in a northerly direction to Hester st.; thence west along the center line of Hester st. to Centre st.; thence north along the center line of Centre st. to Howard st.; thence west along the center line of Howard st. to Broadway; thence south along the center line of Broadway to Canal st. and in a northwesterly direction along the center line of Canal st. to the Hudson River; thence southward along the Hudson River front to the Battery; thence around the front of the Battery to the East River and northward along the East River front to the foot of Grand st., the point or place of beginning.

Said district containing the 1st, 2d, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th Police precincts, the Central Office, Sanitary Squad, Harbor Precinct A, Traffic Precinct A, Public Office Squad and Bridge Precinct A for prisoners arrested in this precinct in the Borough of Manhattan.

### SECOND DISTRICT COURT.

Said district, containing the 12th, 13th, 15th, 17th and 21st Police precincts, and Bridge Precinct B, for prisoners arrested in this precinct in the Borough of Manhattan.

### FOURTH DISTRICT COURT.

Location, 151 E. 57th St., Manhattan.

The Night Court for Males is held in Court House in this district.

## DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, 13-21 Park Row, New York, April 12, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I request that your Board, pursuant to section 546 of the Charter, authorize the issue of corporate stock for improvements in this Department during the year 1912, as follows:

For a covered dump for the slip between Piers 42 and 43 on the East River, just north of Gouverneur street, Borough of Manhattan, \$75,000.

For a covered dump at 79th street and East River, \$18,000.

For alterations and additions to a storage building for the Property Clerk of this Department at the foot of Delancey street, between East and Tompkins streets, on City property, and for paving the yard and fencing in the property, \$43,500.

For the purchase of land and the building of a stable thereon, or the purchase of stable property, to take the place of the present leased Stable "F" at 67th street, near 18th avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, \$75,000.

For the purchase of land and the building of a stable thereon, or the purchase of

stable property in the neighborhood of 170th street and Southern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx, \$100,000.

For the purchase of the present Stable "F" at 525 East 80th street, Borough of Manhattan; also the several lots adjoining for the purpose of a storage yard for carts, etc., \$100,000.

As to the project of the East 80th street stable, it must be remembered that at present The City of New York owns six lots on the northwest corner of 80th street and Avenue B. This is a very valuable corner, and these lots, it seems to me, could be disposed of by the City by a sale to some private parties. For the reason that this property is too valuable for use as a stable or storage yard, we could secure a stable on much cheaper property in the middle of the block. Respectfully,

Approach from Central Bridge to Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

The viaduct to connect Central Bridge with the southerly end of the concourse is a part of the original concourse scheme. The concourse is one of the links between the park system of Manhattan and that of The Bronx. The most direct line of travel between the two park systems is from Central Park by way of 7th avenue to Central Bridge; then by way of Central Bridge and the viaduct to the concourse, to Mosholu parkway, to Van Cortlandt Park and Bronx Park, and to Pelham Bay Park by way of Pelham parkway. It is therefore seen that this forms part of the parkway scheme for the parks of Manhattan and The Bronx. The City has already acquired the land necessary for the construction of the viaduct with the appropriations which have already been made and which are recommended in the present Budget. This viaduct and the transverse road at Belmont street are the only portions of the concourse scheme that remain to be done. This viaduct is urgently needed to give proper access to the concourse, which is now practically completed in all other respects.

Rebuilding Bridges Over the New York and Harlem Railroad at 144th Street and Morris Avenue.

The present bridges over the railroad at 144th street and Morris avenue are old bridges which were constructed under the agreement between the Department of Parks and the New York and Harlem Railroad, dated January 11, 1888. They have served their purpose and are now in a dangerous condition. In accordance with the terms of the agreement, the City is obligated to rebuild these bridges, and the above appropriation is requested therefor.

Nereid Avenue Bridge Over the Railroad and the Bronx River.

The Nereid Avenue Bridge is proposed to connect McLean avenue and Webster avenue on the west with Nereid avenue on the east, spanning the Bronx River Valley, the New York and Harlem Railroad, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and the Bronx River.

Owing to the topography of the land it is impossible at present to cross from the Woodlawn Heights section to Wakefield without going by way of East 233d Street Bridge or by way of Becker Avenue Bridge. Both of these means of crossing are roundabout for the densely populated sections of Woodlawn Heights and Wakefield, and the proposed bridge at Nereid avenue will afford a convenient crossing to reach the proposed subway at White Plains road and also for school children going to the high school at Wakefield.

This bridge has been the subject of agitation for the past ten years, and each request has been denied as being premature. I am of the opinion that the time has now arrived when the construction of this bridge is imperative.

Washington Bridge Viaduct, Aqueduct Avenue to Concourse.

This viaduct is intended to form an additional link between the park system of the Borough of Manhattan and that of The Bronx. It will afford a direct connection from the Lafayette boulevard, which is an extension of Riverside drive, across Washington Bridge to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse and to Claremont Park. It will also form a part of a crosstown thoroughfare which is now under contemplation. The land has already been acquired for a broad boulevard between the concourse and Claremont Park. The appropriation is requested for the purpose of making studies and preparing plans.

Plans for Fireproof Borough Hall.

The present Municipal Building in the Borough of The Bronx is built entirely of inflammable material, except possibly the outer walls. The floors, ceilings and columns are built of yellow pine, as well as a large portion of the partitions. The building is provided with vaults—so to speak—in which are contained all of the valuable records. When these vaults were constructed they were considered fireproof, but when compared with the modern form of construction, and when consideration is also given to their inflammable surroundings, they can no longer be considered fireproof, although they may be slow burning. If a fire should start in the building all of these records would undoubtedly be lost, either through conflagration or destruction by water in consequence thereof. The enormous value of these records is surely sufficient to warrant a suitable and safe protection, and their replacement would, in a great measure, be impossible, let alone the cost of reproduction, if possible.

In addition to the records, it is also the duty of the City to provide safe and accessible housing for its employees. If a fire should start in the present building it would burn its way through so rapidly that there would be great danger of loss of life. With the growth of the Borough the duties of its government naturally increase, and it is only a matter of a short time when the present building, if all of its objections were removed, would be inadequate. Therefore I believe that plans for a new building should be in preparation.

Rebuilding Sewers in Westchester Avenue.

The rebuilding of the sewers in Westchester avenue is actually for the purpose of enlarging sewers which are inadequate for the needs of the territory for which they were constructed, and partly on account of the additional drainage area turned into the same during the construction of the subway. Under the present conditions the sewers are overloaded and flood adjacent cellars. Suits for damages have already been instituted against the City. It is seen, therefore, that this reconstruction is not wholly a reconstruction of sewers inadequately built but is due to the additional area which has been added, for which the people who paid the assessments are not responsible. It would seem unjust, therefore, to assess the adjoining property owners

a second time when the sewer for which they paid was adequate for their needs. It would seem, therefore, that my request is well founded.

Dredging at the Outlet of Jerome Avenue Sewer.

A short distance from the outlet of the Jerome avenue sewer there is a ledge of rock in the Harlem River which materially obstructs the free flow of the sewage from the Jerome avenue sewer. The appropriation is desired for the purpose of removing this ledge of rock.

Public Comfort Station.

The development in the vicinity of 149th street and 3d avenue, which followed the construction of the subway and the establishment of the transfer station between the elevated railway and the subway, and the recent opening of the 149th street cross-town surface line, has converted this section into one of the most congested areas. There are no public conveniences for the mass of people which daily passes this point and does business here. The appropriation is requested to build a public comfort station in the immediate vicinity of the intersection of 149th street and 3d avenue.

Bridges and Approaches Over the New York and Harlem Railroad and the Bronx River at Gun Hill Road.

In the preparation of the plans for building bridges as provided under this appropriation, it has developed that the Bronx River, in its present location, renders useless for business purposes practically the entire block bounded by Gun Hill road, Bronx boulevard, East 211th street, Olinville avenue (nearly 28,000 square feet) and an area of about 28,000 square feet in the block bounded by Gun Hill road, Bronx Boulevard, East 210th street, Duncombe avenue and Olinville avenue.

Furthermore, the river, in its present condition, within the limits under consideration, is unsightly and generally objectionable. In order to reclaim these areas and eliminate the unsightly and objectionable portions of reference, it is proposed to divert the river by means of a masonry culvert built entirely under Bronx boulevard, no additional land being required. If the scheme is carried out without this diversion of the river, it will accomplish only a part of the improvement, as eventually bridges will be required across Bronx boulevard, north of Gun Hill road, across Gun Hill road west of Olinville avenue, and across the intersection of East 210th street with Bronx Boulevard. Estimates of both schemes have been prepared, and it appears that the cost of the proposed diversion of the river will be about \$5,400 more than the cost of the improvement, including the three bridges. This cost, however, relates to the physical improvement only, and would be more than counterbalanced by the value of the land reclaimed and the other resulting advantages.

I am of the opinion that the diversion of the river is the proper course and my request for the additional appropriation is in accordance therewith.

Public Baths Fund.

The population of the Borough of The Bronx, from the most recent figures, is approximately 500,000. For this enormous population only one public bath is provided. Therefore my request for an additional appropriation seems quite reasonable. Yours truly, CYRUS C. MILLER, President of the Borough of The Bronx.

This is the amount allowed under the salary schedule adopted in the Budget for 1912, the funds to be provided from corporate stock.
- For purchase of supplies and materials, Labor Construction Force, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx..... 110,000 00  
This covers the materials used by the Labor Construction Force, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in laying new mains, setting new hydrants, valves, etc.; \$103,000 worth of this material was used during 1911.
- For furnishing and setting 2,000 additional fire hydrants, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx..... 280,000 00  
There are in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx over 10,000 hydrants which are of an obsolete type and inadequate for present conditions. In addition, there are probably 2,000 or more new hydrants that should be set. It is proposed to complete the work of replacing these hydrants, and placing new hydrants, in about three years, the repair gangs placing about 1,000 hydrants per year, and 2,000 hydrants being placed under contract.
- For furnishing and laying small distribution mains, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx..... 50,000 00  
This appropriation is required for the extension of mains in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx during the spring of 1913. The amount for similar work done in the spring of 1911 was about \$50,000.
- For furnishing and laying distribution mains, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx..... 380,000 00  
This appropriation is divided into six items as follows:
  - Laying 20-inch high service main across Highbridge so as to properly cross connect The Bronx and the Manhattan tower services.
  - Replacing existing 6-inch mains with 12-inch mains, principally south of 149th street, Borough of The Bronx, where the fire protection is at present inadequate. These mains are to be placed in the following streets, between the limits shown: Westchester avenue, 149th street to Southern boulevard; Brook avenue, Westchester avenue to 138th street; Brown place, 138th street to Southern boulevard; Morris avenue, 149th to 138th street and 3d avenue; Alexander avenue, 3d avenue to Southern boulevard; 143d street, Southern boulevard to Willis avenue; 144th street, 3d avenue to Gerard avenue.
  - Laying 12-inch and 20-inch mains to replace existing 6-inch mains in the Harlem district, in the following streets: Manhattan avenue, 12-inch main from 110th to 125th street; Pleasant avenue, 12-inch main from 114th to 121st street; 135th street, 20-inch main, 8th avenue to Madison avenue; 116th street, 20-inch main, Park avenue to 8th avenue. On 135th street and 116th street the houses on the south side of the street are compelled to lay their services across under the railroad tracks, which, owing to the width of these streets, makes the cost unreasonably high and results in many burn-outs of the services. By laying new mains, adequate fire protection can be given, and at the same time the trouble complained of eliminated. In Pleasant avenue and Manhattan avenue the existing 6-inch mains are insufficient to furnish a satisfactory supply, and are therefore to be replaced.
  - 20-inch and 12-inch mains along Tremont avenue, from Westchester to Ludlow avenue, Borough of The Bronx. The Chief Engineer, Bureau of Sewers and Highways, Borough of The Bronx, has requested that these water mains be laid, as new pavement is to be placed in the streets. The mains are required for feed mains and should therefore be laid as soon as practicable.
  - 20-inch main from Shaft 25, 179th street pumping station, along the Speedway to the Dyckman tract. There is at present only one line feeding the low ground at the north end of Manhattan, this area including the large power station of the Third Avenue Railroad. It is proposed to lay this new main as an additional feed for this district.
  - This is for an additional high service 20-inch trunk main to feed the district south of 42d street and east of Madison avenue.
- For submerged 20-inch main, Mott Haven Canal, Borough of The Bronx .....- 10,000 00  
This main is required to properly feed the territory lying east of the Mott Haven Canal.
- For furnishing and laying water mains for additional water supply to North Brother Island, Borough of Manhattan..... 18,000 00  
This main is required to safeguard the continuity of the supply to North Brother Island, and to furnish sufficient fire protection. There are a number of institutions and hospitals on the



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	island, and only one main from the mainland. This main was frozen up during the past winter, leaving the island without any supply for about four weeks.

Dear Sir—Yours of the 18th inst., enclosing a copy of the resolutions of your honorable Board regarding the prospective requirements and needs of the above Commission for the authorization and issue of corporate stock, etc., was duly received and contents carefully noted.

In answer thereto I beg leave to say that it is not possible at this time for us to say just exactly how long it will be before the Commissioners finish the performance of the duties imposed upon them by the statute. There would appear to be about 150 cases still on the calendar undisposed of. There are quite a number of cases going to the Appellate Division on certiorari. The result of these appeals will determine in a large measure the disposition of the remaining cases on the calendar. Until these appeals are disposed of finally and the cases which depend upon them also disposed of in accordance with the disposition made of the cases on appeal the Commission cannot wind up and finish its business. Nevertheless, I send you herewith a statement showing estimated expenses of the Commission for the year commencing July 1, 1912, and ending July 1, 1913. If your honorable Board authorizes the issue of corporate stock for this purpose and the Commission finishes up at a prior time the business thereof, why of course the amount appropriated or authorized will not be used and can be transferred to some other fund pursuant to the provisions of the statutes under which the Commission exists. ## BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

## Synopsis of Proceedings.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, March 19, 1912.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond, Farley and Sachs. The minutes of the meeting of January 16, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$32,409.01, were approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

In order to provide for the introduction of either post-graduates or affiliating pupil nurses at Gouverneur Hospital, a transfer of \$1,000 is requested from the appropriation for Trained Nurses to that for Pupil Nurses.

The General Superintendent of Training Schools requests permission to allow Miss Miller, now Head Nurse in Ward A-5, to spend a few days at the Sloane Maternity and the Lying-In Hospitals in order to observe their methods, preparatory to appointing her as Head Nurse in Wards A-6 and B-6, to succeed Miss Ennis, who has resigned.

It is reported that the following persons have satisfactorily completed their course in the Training School for Midwives, and authority to grant them diplomas is requested: Carmelo I. Salerno, Ada Brown, Ida Termignoni, Ida J. Wierk, Margaret Creagh, Rose E. Greenberg, Frances A. Michiner, and Wilhelmine Hoppe.

In accordance with the request of the Board, it is recommended that formal notification be sent to the friends or relatives of each and every patient admitted to the hospitals of this Department. It is also suggested that two visiting cards, each containing the name of the patient and the number of the ward to which he has been assigned, together with information regarding the visiting days and hours and the rules governing the same, be enclosed with this notification. These cards of admission would give the hospitals better control of visitors, and would materially aid in enforcing the rule already in existence, allowing two visitors to each patient at one time. These cards would be transferable, so that the actual number of relatives or friends permitted to visit the individual patients would not be restricted.

In reference to the matter of establishing a relief station in the Riverdale section, an investigation of the hospital facilities and conditions in the district covered by Fordham Hospital shows the population to have increased during the past ten years about 100 per cent., and with the completion of the subways and other transit facilities now under way, there is every reason to believe this rate of increase will continue. Within this district are located Van Cortlandt, Bronx and Pelham Bay Parks, each increasing in popularity and in their demands upon the hospital for relief. For several months the wards at Fordham Hospital have been crowded, some of the wards at times having an excess of ten patients. It is therefore apparent that Fordham Hospital must be enlarged in the near future to meet the increasing demands that will be made upon it by reason of the rapidly increasing population. The complaints of delays in responding to ambulance calls, made by citizens of certain sections of this hospital's district, are undoubtedly well founded, but it is impossible to prevent this, as some of the calls come from points four and six miles from the hospital. Unless some relief is afforded by the erection of new hospitals or small relief stations, these complaints will become more frequent. Although the necessity for relief in other sections is equally great, a formal request has only been received from the Kingsbridge-Riverdale district. The writer visited this section with Mr. Delafeld and found three frame houses on the Spuyten Duyvil parkway which could be made available in the near future, if it is considered more desirable to use them than to erect a new building. The first of these buildings is a double house containing twelve rooms, which, with certain alterations, would lend itself very well to hospital needs. The second, a small shingle house containing four rooms, could be converted into an ambulance station, and the third, containing six rooms, could be used as a home for the Doctor and Nurses. The Delafeld estate would lease these houses to the Department for a period of three years, at an annual rental of \$1,250. If they make the necessary improvements, the rental would be \$1,750 a year. To furnish and maintain such a relief station would cost approximately \$12,000 for the first year. This would provide for a staff of one Doctor (serving without pay), one Head Nurse, two Nurses, Cook, Waitress, Chambermaid, two Orderlies, and a Chauffeur, a motor ambulance, ward and operating room equipment, etc. Food supplies, laundry, etc., could be provided from Fordham Hospital.

The Auxiliary Committee of Harlem Hospital requests permission to pay for one additional Social Service Nurse for one year, to be assigned to the children's clinic and follow-up work.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Bellevue Tuberculosis Clinic also asks the privilege of appointing and paying Frida Sternberg as Garden Teacher for the coming year.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to modify the salary schedules to provide for the appointment of Post-Graduate or Affiliating Pupil Nurses at Gouverneur Hospital.

The request of the General Superintendent of Training Schools in regard to Miss Miller was approved.

Diplomas were authorized to be awarded to the eight Midwives named by the General Medical Superintendent.

The recommendation in regard to the notification of relatives and the regulation of visitors was approved, with the provision that only two visitors be allowed to see a patient in one day.

The report in regard to the proposed relief station in Riverdale was referred to Mr. Robbins, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Farley for consideration and report.

The appointment by the Auxiliary Committee of an additional Social Service Nurse at Harlem Hospital was approved, as was also the appointment by the Auxiliary Committee to the Tuberculosis Clinic at Bellevue Hospital of Frida Sternberg as Garden Teacher for one year.

## Reports of Committees.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital, Dr. Harold C. Bailey was promoted to the place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician; Dr. Albertus A. Moore was reappointed for the year 1912 to the place of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Obstetrician, and the following appointments were made to that Division: Dr. Bernard Magoon and Dr. Louis Korowitz, Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeons to Out-Patients; and Dr. Gustav F. Boehme, Jr., Assistant Physician to Out-Patients. The Conference Committee also presented a communication from Dr. W. G. Thompson, stating that Dr. Henry Krauskoff, who had been nominated as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, had withdrawn.

The Conference Committee at Gouverneur Hospital reported, as directed at last meeting, on the number of eye cases treated in that hospital and the extent of the services required to be given by the Consulting Ophthalmologist. The Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Sachs of the facts given in this report.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee, Dr. Edwin G. Zabriskie was appointed Consulting Neurologist to Gouverneur Hospital.

Upon the recommendation of the Harlem Hospital Conference Committee, Dr. R. H. Macdonald, Dr. Edwin G. Langrock, and Dr. David Eisenberg were appointed Assistant Surgeons to Out-Patients at that hospital.

Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, the place of Consulting Laryngologist and Rhinologist was created, and Dr. James S. Ennis was appointed to fill the vacancy, and Dr. Stanley H. Steiner was appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients. Upon the further recommendation of that Committee, the place of Clinical Microscopist and Bacteriologist to Fordham Hospital was created. A communication from the Secretary of the Medical Board, stating that the recommendation that this place be created had been unintentionally omitted from the minutes of the January meeting of the Medical Board, was read.

A communication dated March 7 was received from Mr. Samuel Sachs, stating that he had interviewed Dr. Goldwater in regard to his communication presented at last meeting, but with no decisive result. Mr. Paulding was appointed a Committee of One to confer with Dr. Goldwater and endeavor to have him retain his connection with the Department.

The President submitted a list of bids received on March 19 for the supply of coal on the basis of the quantities required for a period of three months and for a period of nine months. In view of the market conditions and the high prices quoted, it was resolved to refer these bids to the Comptroller for recommendation.

The President submitted a list of fourteen bids received on March 19 for the laying of new floors on the balconies of Harlem Hospital, ranging from \$1,119 to \$1,899. The lowest bid being that of J. M. Kopp, was accepted.

Three communications dated March 4 were received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by that Board on March 4, amending the standard specifications for sugar and for flour and cereals, and eliminating the paragraph providing for the retention of ten per cent. from the amount of the contract. The resolutions were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for adoption.

A communication dated March 6 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of resolutions adopted by that Board on February 29, transferring funds from the appropriations of the Department of Health and Department of Parks, of Brooklyn, in the amounts of \$15,000 and \$14,000 respectively, to the appropriations of this Department in order to meet a deficit, and amending salary schedules 219 for the year 1911 and 198 for the year 1912.

A communication dated March 13 was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copy of a resolution assigning to the Commissioner of Parks of the Borough of Queens four automobile tires turned over by this Department.

A communication dated March 11 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on March 7 modifying the salary schedules for the year 1912, as referred to in the minutes of February 20, by classifying all positions under \$360 as "Hospital Helpers." The Secretary submitted a copy of a request for a further modification of the salary schedules which he had made on March 15, together with the schedules referred to therein.

A communication dated March 7 was received from Dr. S. S. Goldwater, stating the alterations which he had suggested in the plans for the roof ward at Fordham Hospital. It was reported that a copy of these had been referred to the architect.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of Special Nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from March 6 to 19, at Harlem Hospital from March 10 to 16, and at Fordham Hospital from February 23 to March 4.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School held on February 23 were received.

An application for a leave of absence from March 26 to April 11 was received from Dr. Edwin Beer, Assistant Visiting Surgeon to the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital. The request was granted.

Two resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 27, authorizing



the issue of revenue bonds (1) to the amount of \$450 to pay the salary of a Hebrew Chaplain, for assignment to Gouverneur Hospital; and (2) to the amount of \$3,800 to pay the salaries of an additional Resident Physician, Stenographer, etc., to the alcoholic wards of Bellevue Hospital, were received.

A communication dated March 9 was received from Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, Visiting Physician to the Third Division of Bellevue Hospital, explaining absences during the month of February.

A communication dated March 5 was received from the State Charities Aid Association, recommending that a separate building be provided for the Out-Patient Department at Harlem Hospital. After a discussion of the additional facilities to be provided for the dispensary in consequence of the extension of Harlem Hospital, it was decided that it would be inadvisable to construct a separate building until it is seen what improvement this increase will afford, and the communication was referred to the President for reply.

#### Unfinished Business.

It was resolved to request Dr. Goldwater to assist in the preparation of a statement to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the status of the plans of the new Bellevue Hospital.

Dr. Arthur Reeves was appointed Interne to Gouverneur Hospital for a period of eighteen months, beginning on January 1, 1912, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the minutes of the Medical Board of January 3, 1912.

Reference was again made to the incomplete condition of the workshop at Fordham Hospital, and the Secretary was directed to inform the contractor that unless the workshop is fully completed and the building available for use within fourteen days the contract will be declared abandoned.

#### New Business.

The President submitted a report of several recent visits he had made to the Out-Patient Department of Harlem Hospital, and referred to the waste of gauze which he had seen, and to the fact that the Surgeons to Out-Patients at that hospital do not treat the patients, but simply supervise the various clinics. It was resolved to bring these statements to the attention of each member of the assistant surgical staff, and to renew the order directing the abolition of the title "Chief of Clinics" in all of the hospitals of the Department.

The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
