Drainage Plans.

During the second quarter of 1913 there were six drainage plans approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, covering about 550 acres. Six other drainage plans, covering approximately 630 acres, were submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and are awaiting adoption.

The following list, by wards, distinguishes between the adopted areas and those pending:

First Ward.

Adopted—Amended No. 7, covering about 22 acres. This plan was rendered necessary by the replacing of two old streets, Sound st. and Amagansett st., upon the City map. Amended No. 4C, a small plan affecting only one block.

Not Adopted—Amended No. 3H, covering about 440 acres in the Sunnyside section of Long Island City. Amended No. 1, covering about 50 acres in Long Island City draining in Nott ave., extending from Jackson ave. to the East River. Amended No. 64, providing for a small change.

Second Ward.

Adopted—Amended drainage plans No. 20 and 21, affecting about 100 acres. This map was prepared as a result of grade changes along Doubleday and Traffic sts. in the Glendale section.

Not Adopted—Amended No. 24, a plan diverting the route of the Lurting st. trunk sewer through Corona ave. owing to a change in the street layout and the restoration of Vine st. to the official map.

Third Ward.

Adopted—Amended No. 30B, covering about 185 acres tributary to the Myrtle ave. trunk sewer, extending from Whitestone ave. to Murray lane.

Fourth Ward.

Adopted—Amended No. 40A, covering the section known as Kew Gardens, containing about 150 acres.

Not Adopted—Amended No. 40A, covering about 30 acres in the section bounded by Greenwood ave., Jamaica ave., Stoothoff ave. and Atlantic ave., grade changes and the restoration of Fulton st. making the plan necessary.

Fifth Ward.

Adopted—Area No. 58A, a plan of sanitary trunk sewers draining about 90 acres in Far Rockaway.

Not Adopted—Area No. 58, a storm water system covering about 90 acres in Far Rockaway. The boundaries of 58 and 58A practically coincide.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Dear Sir—I herewith transmit quarterly report of the transactions of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Queens, for the quarter ended June 30, 1913. Yours respectfully,

FRANCIS X. DUER, Superintendent.

The principal work done under the supervision of this bureau during the quarter ended June 30, 1913, was as follows:

Queens County Court House, Long Island City.

All plumbing in this building has been thoroughly gone over, and repairs made where necessary. Bubbling drinking fountains have been installed in corridor, second floor; door checks placed on doors leading to court rooms; roofs, gutters and leaders repaired and all jobbing attended to. Desks, chairs and other furniture have been repaired and refinished. The pumps in the Engineers' Department have been overhauled, parts renewed and placed in good condition.

The electrical equipment has been kept in good condition, and the elevators regularly inspected.

The fountain in the plaza in front of the building has been painted and the grass and flower beds have been cared for.

Borough Hall, Long Island City.

The offices occupied by the Bureau of Highways in this building have been renovated, the ceilings and side walls cleaned, cracks cut out and refilled, sized and painted, woodwork grained and varnished. All necessary repairs have been made to woodwork, door checks put on, locks repaired, etc. Old electrical fittings were removed and new installed to meet changed conditions. Electric fans have been cleaned and placed in position and all electric lamps have been changed from carbon to tungsten. A call bell system has been installed in the office of the Bureau of Sewers, and portable lamp guards placed in vaults used by the President of the Borough, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers. Awnings have been repaired and placed in position on the building. The putty in many of the sash had dried out and fallen from them, which allowed the glass to become loose and occasion considerable breakage. The loose putty has been removed, the sash painted and repainted. The plumbing has been regularly inspected and kept in good serviceable condition.

St. Mary's Lyceum Building, Long Island City—Magistrates' and Municipal Courts.

Changes have been made in the position of railings, new locks placed on desks, new seats put on settees in court rooms, desks, chairs, etc., repaired and refinished; shelves built for filing documents; carpets taken up and cleaned and the rooms put in good order.

Floating Bath, Astoria, Long Island City.

This bath was put in commission for the season on June 16, 1913. It has been thoroughly overhauled and now presents an attractive appearance. The pontoons under the bath have been recaulked where necessary, new planking placed in bottom of swimming pool and gangways, all woodwork repaired, and new gauge wire placed around the exterior of bath below the water mark to prevent refuse matter from entering the bath.

The roofs were repaired with asphaltum. Rubber treads have been placed on steps leading to swimming pool. The interior and exterior of the building has received two coats of paint, sixty doors to lockers renumbered, the floors and inside of swimming pool painted to water mark with metallic paint. Notice signs have been repainted and lettered.

The United States Volunteer Life Saving Corps will furnish male and female instructors without cost to the City. This service should be greatly appreciated, as it provides a means for the boys and girls to become proficient in swimming. This bath is well attended, being filled to its capacity daily.

Interior Bath, 8th St., Long Island City.

All water and steam pipes, also the plumbing, has been maintained in good order. All small repairs have been made to the interior and exterior of the building as occasion required.

This bath is extensively used by males and females and is greatly appreciated.

Town Hall, Newtown.

A new lavatory has been installed in this building for the use of women, which improves the toilet facilities to a great extent.

In order to make this installation it was necessary to change a stairway leading to the basement of the building, necessitating cutting through partition walls, rearranging steam pipes, radiators, etc. New tin roofs have been placed on porches covering main entrances, and repairs made to roof of building, gutters and leaders. New sash cord was placed on window sash, and new wire on window screens and the frames painted. Painting of the exterior of this building is contemplated in the early fall; when this is completed the entire building will be in very good condition.

Town Hall, Flushing.

The steam boilers in this building have been taken apart and overhauled, new parts put in where required. Leaks in tin roof have been repaired and painted. The plumbing in the ladies' toilet has been renewed, and other plumbing repaired. All cracked and broken window glass has been removed and replaced with new. Signs designating the various offices and court rooms have been placed in the main hallway, and the hallway painted, grained and varnished.

In this building a workshop is maintained where office furniture is repaired and refinished. Desks, filing cabinets, chairs, etc., which were supposed to have outlived their usefulness have been repaired and refinished and made equal to new. They are now in use in various offices in the borough.

The electrical equipment has been regularly inspected by the Electrician of this Bureau and maintained in first-class condition.

The grounds adjoining the building have been beautified with flower beds, the grass kept well trimmed and shrubbery pruned.

County Building, Jamaica.

Minor repairs have been made in this building when required. Owing to the bursting of a water pipe connecting the toilet on the second floor, slight damage was done to the ceiling in the main record room in the County Clerk's office, and a few covers on record books were slightly wet but not sufficiently to damage the records. Repairs were made immediately upon this office being notified and the same is now in good order.

Town Hall, Jamaica.

Considerable work necessary to be done in this building has not been done, owing to lack of funds. A request for funds was made early in this quarter with which to erect metal ceilings in the court rooms and hallways. The present ceilings are in a very bad and dangerous condition and the plaster has fallen in numerous places. The delay in acquiring funds for this purpose has also delayed the installation of an electric lighting system for which funds are available, as the electrical work and restoration of the ceilings should be done at the same time.

A new toilet has been added on the third floor, connecting with room used by the local camp of Spanish-American War veterans. All plumbing in this building under the supervision of this bureau, also plumbing in comfort station adjoining, has been kept in repair.

Small repairs have been made from time to time by carpenters, painters and tinsmith, and with the exception of the ceilings before mentioned the building is in good condition.

The grounds adjoining this building has been regularly cared for by the gardener. Magistrate's Court Building, Far Rockaway.

After making repairs to woodwork, roofs, gutters, leaders, etc., the exterior of this building was painted two coats of paint. Owing to the removal of a portion of this building to make room for the erection of the new fire station, it was necessary to remove the old toilets, make new connections with sewer and water mains and install new toilets. Walls and ceilings in the rooms occupied by the Court Clerks have been repaired and painted, and signs over doorway have been repainted and lettered.

All the buildings and offices have been regularly cleaned, office supplies and necessities and Janitor's cleaning supplies have been furnished. Upon the report of an Inspector of this bureau that repairs were required at any building under my supervision, steps were immediately taken to remedy the matter complained of and keep the buildings in the best possible condition. All of which is respectfully submitted.

DIVISION OF SUBSTRUCTURES.

Hon. JOSEPH FLANAGAN, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with your instruction I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the work done by the Division of Substructures of the Topographical Bureau for the months of April, May and June, 1913.

Before proceeding to a detailed description of the work done by this Division, a few words regarding its duties and organization may facilitate a better understanding of the details that follow.

The purpose of this Division is to accurately locate and map all substructures in the streets of the Borough. These consist of electric and telephone conduits, gas and water pipes, sewers, vaults, tunnels, cesspools, etc.

The Borough has been subdivided into sections and sections Nos. 1 and 2, which include all of Long Island City, have been plotted upon layout maps, which show the complete street and monument systems of the section, are indices of the final record maps, they show the exact boundaries of each sheet and provide a system of numbers by which to designate the sheets.

A system for obtaining notice of every permit granted in the Borough has been established and the Division is at present receiving daily memoranda of permits granted in the First Ward, which permits are being investigated and the installations located.

The Division has made the surveys and locations and is at present making the record maps showing the subsurface installations in Broadway and Main st., Flushing, preparatory to these streets being repaved.

The forces of this Division fall naturally into two parts: The field force, engaged in making surveys and locations; the office force, engaged in indexing, mapping and filing.

In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the work done by the Topographical Bureau for the months of April, May and June, 1913:

Before proceeding to a detailed description of the work done by this office, a few words regarding its duties and organization may facilitate a better understanding of the details that follow.

The work of this Bureau falls naturally into two divisions: First, to quote from the Greater New York Charter, "To prepare a map of that part of the territory embraced within the Borough, of which a map or plan has not heretofore been finally established and adopted;" and, second, make the surveys and maps required by Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

For the better prosecution of this work, the force of this office is similarly divided into two divisions—one division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough; the other division charged with all work incidental to Street-Opening Proceedings.

The division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough is divided into three corps:

Monumenting Corps—Charged with all the surveys and field work incidental to the preparation of the Final Map and the Monumenting of the Borough.

Computing Corps—Charged with all the computations incidental to the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough.

Draughting Corps—Charged with all Draughting work required to prepare the Final Maps.

The division charged with the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment is subdivided into two corps:

Surveying Corps—Charged with all the field work necessary to the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

Office Corps—Charged with all the computations and draughting necessary for the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

In addition to the several corps mentioned above, we have a small corps engaged in gathering data, and making reports, concerning the legal status of the various streets in the Borough.

The following detailed description of the work done by this Bureau is arranged according to the work performed by these several corps, and in the order in which they are mentioned above.

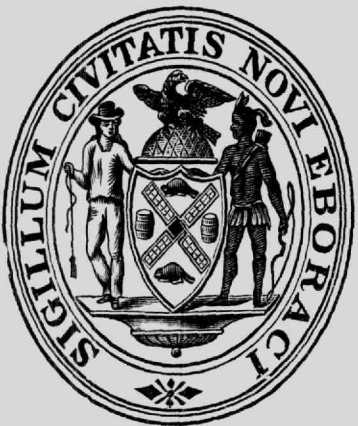

Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following rules and regulations for the sale of dipped milk and cream in stores in The City of New York were adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

1. Milk and cream shall not be stored, handled or sold in any stable, or in any room used for cooking or domestic purposes, or in any room which communicates directly with any such stable or room, or in any room in which there is a water-closet apartment or with which a water-closet apartment communicates, unless such apartment be enclosed by a vestibule, and both apartment and vestibule be properly ventilated to the exterior air.

2. The term "domestic purposes" shall be held to apply to rooms used for sleeping purposes or for cooking purposes other than the preparation of the midday meal.

3. Milk or cream shall not be handled or sold in any room which is unduly crowded.

4. Milk or cream shall not be dipped from cans stored in a room in which butter or cheese is manufactured.

5. Milk or cream may be stored in a cooling or refrigerating room, or ice chest, the construction of which has been approved by the Department.

6. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in a milk booth.

7. Milk shall be kept at a temperature of 50 degrees F., or below, at all times.

Equipment.
1. Rooms in which milk or cream is handled or sold shall be well lighted.

2. The floors, walls and ceilings shall be smooth, and must be kept clean and sanitary.

3. All windows and doors shall be properly screened.

4. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided for the washing of utensils.

5. A sufficient number of properly constructed ice tubs, or other adequate refrigerating facilities, for cans of milk or cream shall be provided.

6. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be of the seamless sanitary type, heavily tinned.

Methods.
1. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in any room in which rubbish or dirty material is allowed to accumulate, or in which there are offensive odors.

2. All cans or other receptacles used for milk or cream shall be cleaned thoroughly upon emptying.

3. The cans from which milk or cream is dipped shall be packed in ice, and shall be kept covered at all times, except when the milk or cream is being actually dipped therefrom.

4. After each day's use all utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soda, and then with boiling water.

5. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be kept clean.

6. The ice tubs in which milk or cream is stored shall be painted inside and outside, and shall be kept clean at all times.

7. A separate dipper shall be provided for each can from which the supply is being served, and such dipper shall remain in the can between dippings until all the milk in the can has been disposed of.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either in unbroken packages, or must be so placed, protected and handled that no dust or odors therefrom can injuriously affect the milk.

9. Dry sweeping and dusting in rooms in which milk or cream is dispensed is prohibited.

10. The tags on cans of milk or cream must be kept on file in the store for at least two months, for inspection by the Department of Health.

11. The attendants shall wear clean, washable outer clothing.

12. Only such persons shall be employed as are free from infectious disease which may be transmitted in the handling of milk.

Failure to comply with any of the above rules and regulations will be cause for prosecution.

Definition.
Milk not conforming to the requirements of any of the subdivisions of Grade A or Grade B and which has been heated according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Health.

Requirements, Rules and Regulations.
Rules and regulations for the heating of Grade C milk:

No less than 160 degrees F. for at least 2 minutes; no less than 158 degrees F. for at least 3 minutes; no less than 155 degrees F. for at least 5 minutes; no less than 152 degrees F. for at least 10 minutes; no less than 148 degrees F. for at least 15 minutes; no less than 145 degrees F. for at least 18 minutes; no less than 140 degrees F. for at least 20 minutes.

1. The caps of all bottles containing milk of Grade C shall be white, and shall contain in red the words "Grade C" in large type and "for cooking" in plainly visible type.

2. Cans containing milk of Grade C shall be painted red on necks or shall have properly sealed metal collar, painted red, on necks, and shall have affixed to them white tags with the words "Grade C, for cooking," printed thereon in red letters in large type.

All creameries handling milk of different grades will be required to demonstrate to the Department of Health that they are capable of keeping the grades separate, and must keep records satisfactory to the Department of Health concerning the amount of milk of each grade handled each day.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
