



Abstract of proceedings for the week ending March 31, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, MARCH 28.

A communication was received from the Dorchester Union Free Stone Company, offering to present to the Department an accurate fac-simile of the old "Liberty Bell" in Philadelphia, cut out of the Dorchester Free Stone.

The offer was accepted, and the Treasurer authorized to issue orders for the cost of removal of said bell if necessary.

Thomas Meehan was promoted to the position of Skilled Laborer, and his pay fixed at \$2 per day.

The Civil and Topographical Engineer was authorized to employ Thomas Fox and Matthew Cox as Chainmen, at \$2.50 per day, whenever he shall require their services.

Jno. Brady, Laborer, was restored.

The President presented the assessment list for the work of flagging the sidewalk on the north side of the street known as One Hundred and Seventy-third street (formerly Eleventh street), in the Twenty-fourth Ward, from Third avenue to Railroad avenue, and laying crosswalks across each intersecting avenue; together with the statement of the amount and cost of the work, and moved that they be signed by the Commissioners and transmitted to the Board of Assessors. Adopted.

Proposals were received for the following works, and publicly opened and read, Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller, being present:

1. Encaustic tiling for the Museum of Natural History Building.

2. Construction, removal, and remodelling of cases for the Museum of Natural History Building.

The consideration of the subject of the map or plan for laying out the district of the Twenty-fourth Ward, between Riverdale road and Broadway, be taken up, and Messrs. Waldo Hutchings, N. P. Bailey, J. J. Crane, and other property-owners in the district were received and heard. Further consideration of the map was then laid over.
