Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses were approved by the Board upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted.

Plan No. 818 for one four-story tenement-house, 25 feet by 61 feet, with an extension 9 feet deep by 12 feet wide, on a lot 25 feet by 140 feet, on the north side of Seventy-sixth street, 175 feet west of Avenue A, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 819 for three five-story tenement-houses, each 25 feet by 65 feet, with an extension 17 feet wide by 20 feet deep, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the east side of Ninth avenue, beginning 25 feet 5 inches north of Fifty-first street, each house to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 820 for one five-story tenement-house 25 feet by 68 feet, on a lot 25 feet by a mean depth of 82 feet, at No. 92 East Broadway, to be occupied by sixteen families.

Plan No. 822 for one four-story tenement-house 19 feet by 55 feet, with an extension 20 feet deep, on a lot 19 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 381 feet 3 inches west of Sixth avenue, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 823 for two tenement-houses, each 25 feet by 66 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Seventieth street, beginning 100 feet east of each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plan Disapproved.

Plan No. 821 for light and ventilation of eight tenement-houses proposed to be built on the north-side of Fifty-third street, beginning 175 feet west of Sixth avenue, was disapproved by the Board. Plan No. 824 was laid on the table for further consideration.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 29, 1881. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,490, as follows, viz.:

4 public buildings, 572 tenement-houses, 93 private dwellings, 121 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 25 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 3 gas-mains, 2 uninhabitable dwellings, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 69 yards, courts, and areas, 97 cellars and basements, 200 waste pipes and drains, 225 privies and water-closets, 8 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 6 other nuisances, together with 2 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 667.

During the past week 155 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 39 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

76 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 151 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and funigated 136 houses, 136 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.
Cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 579 births, 47 still-births, 170 marriages, and 707 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 29, 1881; this shows an increase of 58 births, 10 marriages, and 40 deaths, and a decrease of 1 still-birth, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a increase of 71 births, 8 still-births, 13 marriages, and 218 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; whooping-cough, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; heart diseases, 3; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; and drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles, increased 1; scarlatina, 8; diphtheria 2; croup, 10; cerebro-spinal fever, 10; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; and premature and preternatural births, 2. The number of deaths from erysipelas, typhoid fever, convulsions, gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, cyanosis and atelectasis, and drowning was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 380 in tenement-houses, 188 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 17 were on the basement floor, 120 on the first, 204 on the second, 128 on the third, 77 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 702 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents. 74 were stated to be single, 179 married, 78 widowed, and the condition of 276 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 707; still-births, 47; bodies in transitu, 26. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 579 births, 170 marriages, 47 still-births, 707 deaths, 26 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 74 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 51 of death were issued during the week. marriage, and 51 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 29, 1881, was 20 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.071, the mean humidity was 89, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,807, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central

The disposition of 660 deaths and still-births, or 87.53 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 21; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 278; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 71; Greenwood (undenominational), 48; Lutheran, (undenominational), 97; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 38; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 19; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 9; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 22, 1881, was 693; this is 174 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 168.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,206,577.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending January 29, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending January 22, 1881.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 707 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 29, 1881, which is an increase of 40, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 166 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending January 22, 1881, was 693, which is 168.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

An ACT m relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred are receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed full paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, tor such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
