M., for the purpose of considering the annual estimate for the Board of Excise and for the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the Board.

The minutes of the meetings held June 15 and 17, 1891, were read and approved.

The Board proceeded to the consideration of the annual estimate of the Board of Excise for the year ending April 30, 1892.

Whereupon the Comptroller presented the following report:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
June 5, 1891.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At a meeting of this Board, held May 21, 1891, there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Excise Board, signed by two of the Commissioners, requesting an appropriation of \$143,475, "to defray the expenses of the proper and efficient administration of their office for the year ending April 30, 1892." This is \$7,975 more than last year, the appropriation for 1890 having been \$135,500. The sum of \$1,500 is devoted to increasing the salaries of seven employees whose compensation is now much larger than that of persons occupying similar positions in other departments. For example, the cashier in the Department of Public Works, who collects between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000, is paid \$2,500 per annum; the cashier of the Finance Department, Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, where the collections are between \$4,000,000 and \$6,000,000 per year, is paid \$1,500 per year; the Cashier in the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes is paid \$2,200, and with the aid of two assistants collects \$35,000,000; while the Cashier of the Excise Board, whose collections are less than \$1,500,000 per annum, is now paid \$3,000, and the Board this year asks for an increase to \$3,200. Salaries equally liberal are provided for the Assistant Cashier, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Chief Inspector, Engrossing Clerk and Complaint Inspector, and I am consequently of the opinion that no increase in salaries should be made.

The estimate includes the salaries of 49 Inspectors, at \$1,200 each; 2 General Inspectors, at \$1,800 each, and 3 Special Aids, at \$1,200 each. The city is divided into 35 precincts, of which 3 are not covered by the Excise Board. Of the 32 remaining, one (the thirty-third) may require the constant services of 2 Inspectors. For each of the 31 remaining precincts, averaging about 200 saloon licenses each, one Inspector should, in my opinion, be quite sufficient for the whole year, excepting from April 15 to June 15, when most of them need two, owing to the fact that most licenses expire between those dates. Thus for ten months in the year not more than 33 Inspectors are needed. Added to this corps are 11 Special Inspectors, at \$1,500 each, some of whom, I am informed, act as Messengers and Clerks, take charge of newspaper clippings and assist the Chief Inspector. There is certainly room here for retrenchment, and it is recommended that the force be cut down to 33 District Inspectors and 5 Special Inspectors, with an allowance of \$8,000 for the salaries of extra Inspectors to be employed during the two months between April 15 and June 15.

Two General Inspectors, at \$1,800 each, are asked for, whereas, one would be adequate. Three Application Clerks are asked for, at \$1,200 each, while two would do the work, except between April 15 and June 15, for the reason stated above. Between those dates, temporary assistance should be easily obtained from the ample clerical force of the Board.

I have, therefore, to recommend that the salaries of the Excise Board and its employees be allowed and fixed for the year ending April 30, 1892, as follows:

I believe that this material reduction of \$24,700 can be accomplished without any necessary diminution in the effectiveness of the Excise Board. Excise moneys form a legitimate part of the city's yearly revenue; and the fact that they are raised by the issue of licenses, instead of by direct taxation, should be no warrant for their too liberal distribution and expenditure.

Whereas, By chapter 642 of the Laws of 1874, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is authorized and directed to annually fix such amount as may be necessary for hire of employees, rent, and other necessary expenses of the Board of Commissioners of Excise, which amount together with the salaries of the Commissioners, not exceeding five thousand dollars each, shall be paid out of the moneys received for licenses; and

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Excise have submitted an estimate of the sum of one hundred and forty-three thousand four hundred and seventy-five dollars as the amount necessary to defray the expense of a proper and efficient administration of their office for the year ending April 30, 1892;

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred and thirty-five thousand and two hundred dollars (\$135,200) be and is hereby allowed and appropriated to pay the salaries of the Commissioners of Excise and of the Counsel of the Board of Excise and of its employees, rent, legal and other necessary expenses of the Board, for and during the fiscal year of said Board, commencing on May 1, 1891, and ending on April 30, 1892, the amount of which sum so appropriated shall be divided and applied under the following classification of expenditures, viz.:

1. For general administration of the Board of Excise, including the salaries of the three Commissioners and the Counsel, fixed at the sum of \$5,000 each per annum.....	\$37,500 00

DEAR SIR—As promised in my conversation with you to-day, I herewith give you some of the reasons which prompted us to ask for the transfers in our letter of June 9 to his Honor the Mayor:

The addition to Harlem Hospital, for which we ask \$3,000, is very much needed, and is intended to provide a wash-house, a padded cell, an isolating ward and a sleeping place for the workhouse help. The demands upon this hospital are increasing to such an extent that it is with the greatest difficulty that its work can be properly conducted, and in our estimates for the year we asked for \$6,500, but received nothing.

As to the transfer for Repairs to Steamboats: In our estimates we asked for \$15,000 and received \$5,000. Of this sum we have already expended nearly \$4,000 on the steamboats "Fidelity" and "Minnahanonck," with some slight repairs to the steam launches. The boilers of our largest steamboat are in a leaky condition, and the Engineer reports that he will be able to use them only a little longer without repairs. We have estimates from several boiler-makers stating that the cost will be between twelve and fifteen hundred dollars. This boat has not been painted for several years and is badly in need of it. Her hull also requires considerable repair.

The launch "Mermaid," running between Ward's Island and One Hundred and Fifteenth street is also in a bad condition, and we have received estimates on necessary repairs, fixing the amount at about \$900. If this transfer is not made I am very much afraid that the Department will be seriously embarrassed, if not entirely unable to carry the immense amount of freight and passengers that we are called upon to transport.

As to the transfer for Fordham Hospital, I would say that we found the building required much more extensive repairs than we had any reason to anticipate; but it is now almost ready for occupancy, and the amount asked for is intended to do some few additional repairs and to furnish the building.

The transfer for the Idiot Asylum, known as Pavilion D, Randall's Island. This is one of the oldest buildings in the Department, and from its isolated situation has been used for a class of boys (numbering over 100), who were not only demented and filthy, but who must be kept by themselves. A short time since the walls of this building showed evidences of settling, which progressed so rapidly, that, upon having it examined by the proper authorities, we were obliged to remove the children and to scatter them about among the already overcrowded pavilions. I cannot lay too much stress upon the importance of our being placed in a position to repair this building at once, and trust that this application, with the others, will meet with your approval.

SIR—The Department of Public Charities and Correction, by resolution of the 9th inst., requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer from the appropriation for "Additional Amount for Water Supply, Hart's Island," the sum of \$13,000, which is not required, to the following:

Addition to Harlem Hospital.....	\$3,000 00

I have made a personal and careful examination of the different points presented in the matter, and have the honor to report as follows:

1st. Addition to Harlem Hospital—What is asked for here is to enable the Department to erect a structure sufficient to provide a wash-house or laundry, a padded cell, an isolating ward and a sleeping place for the workhouse help.

The demands upon this hospital have increased enormously since it was first established, and the accommodations are evidently insufficient. I give the following figures to show the amount of work done, and in order to illustrate the necessity of additional accommodations:

Number of patients treated last year.....	2,500
Of which the number of cases of chronic alcoholism was.....	666
Number of cases of delirium tremens.....	27
Number of insane cases.....	41

Besides the above, there were occasional cases of scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria and erysipelas, for the accommodation of which, as they had to be isolated for fear of infection, there was no room whatever, and they had to be kept outside, sitting or lying around on the grounds until they could be sent to the proper hospitals.

The laundry, at present, is in the basement, which is both inconvenient and unhealthy, inasmuch as the fumes from the work penetrate to the room above, which is occupied as a sick ward.

The female help now occupy a shed outside of the building, which, besides being inadequate, is not even water-tight.

The insane, and, occasionally, the delirium tremens and alcoholic patients, are sometimes in need of a padded cell.

The building proposed, which is inexpensive, by giving a sleeping-room for female help, ample

room for a laundry, an isolating ward for infectious cases, and a padded cell for the insane or violently drunken patients, would relieve the hospital proper enormously, and, it appears to me, the expenditure would be in every way desirable and justifiable.

2. Repairs to Steamboats—In this connection I examined, first, the steamboat "Thomas Brennan"; and, second, the launch "Mermaid."

The boilers of the "Brennan" are in such a leaky condition that the boat can no longer be used, and it is now lying at the Pier foot of Twenty-sixth street, East river, awaiting the order for repairs.

This boat is in a very bad condition. Besides the boilers, the whole machinery wants lining up and a thorough overhauling. The work required on the boilers is the most expensive part of the repairs required, but the machinery will require considerable care.

Besides the boilers and machinery, considerable repairs are required to the boat itself. The floor, or sheathing, on the main deck is in very bad condition, and ought to be renewed and properly caulked. The rudders are out of order, and will probably have to be renewed. The steering gear is in bad order and requires considerable repair, and, probably renewing—the guards are out of order, the smoke-stack worn out, the wheels in broken condition, stairways out of order, weak, and require renewing. Much of the woodwork is rotten in important places, and ought to be renewed. Besides these, there are many small repairs which ought to be made, in view of putting the boat in effective condition to do the work required of it. There is also considerable painting that ought to be done.

With regard to the launch "Mermaid" I have to report that there are a few repairs necessary to the engine, amounting perhaps to \$150; as to the other parts of the boat, the stern is rotten and ought to be renewed, the floor of the main deck is badly worn and ought to be renewed. A new oak guard is required, and new and stronger stanchions to be put in, and the plank shear is too light and ought to be replaced by heavier material. The boat leaks somewhat and ought to be recaulked. There is also some painting required.

The necessary repairs on these two boats will cost at least the \$5,000 asked for.

3d. The Fordham Hospital—This hospital is an old building, which has been fitted up for the purpose at considerable expense (about \$8,000). The specifications for the work, however, left out a very important item, viz.: the placing of proper water-tight flooring. The floors of the old building are of wide boards, and somewhat loosely put together, and as the floors are cleaned by scrubbing entirely, the water used in the work makes its way through, defacing the ceiling below. It is in order to make these new floors and to provide the necessary furniture of all kinds to put the hospital in a proper state to receive and take care of the patients expected that the sum of \$1,500 is asked for. This amount will not be more than will be required for the purpose.

4th. Idiot Asylum (Pavilion D), R. I.—There are over one hundred idiots to be provided for. These creatures being entirely helpless and extremely filthy, they have heretofore been kept in a building set apart entirely for their accommodation. That building has become unsafe to such an extent that no authority would, or could, properly take the responsibility of putting human beings in it to live. The idiots have been removed, and distributed to other buildings, already well filled, to the great annoyance and discomfort of every one coming in contact with them.

It is for the purpose of repairing this old building that the sum of \$4,000 is asked for, and that amount will have to be used very closely to accomplish the end in view.

CHAPTER 154.

AN ACT to amend section three hundred and twenty-eight of the Code of Civil Procedure, in relation to clerk, deputy clerk and assistants.

BECAME a law without the approval of the Governor, in accordance with the provisions of article four, section nine of the Constitution, April 9, 1891. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section three hundred and twenty-eight of the Code of Civil Procedure is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 328. The court has a clerk, who is appointed and may be removed at pleasure, by the justices thereof, or a majority of them. He must, by a written instrument under his hand, filed in his office, appoint, and may at pleasure remove, three deputy clerks and not more than eleven assistants. The clerk is responsible for the faithful discharge of his duty by each deputy clerk and each assistant. The clerk, each deputy clerk, and each assistant is entitled to a salary, fixed and to be paid as prescribed by law.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Tenth avenue, distant twenty feet southerly from the southerly side of One Hundred and Tenth street, and running thence westerly on a line drawn parallel with the southerly side of One Hundred and Tenth street, distant twenty feet southerly therefrom to the easterly side of the road or drive, otherwise known as the "Boulevard"; thence northerly along the easterly side of said road or public drive twenty feet to One Hundred and Tenth street; and thence easterly along the southerly side of One Hundred and Tenth street to Tenth avenue, and thence southerly along the westerly side of Tenth avenue twenty feet to the point of beginning.
