

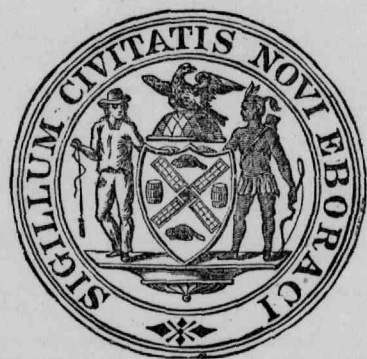

Delays in reaching fires in uncovered localities, owing to the great distance the nearest apparatus must travel, have already, in numerous instances, caused losses, which would have been saved if the response to alarms could have been quicker.

The Board of Fire Commissioners has received petitions numerously signed by property-owners in these localities asking for better protection against fire, and the public press has frequently called attention to this want.

The first three of these were asked for in the last estimate, but nothing was allowed for them.

All are needed because of the large growth of the city, and the great increase of fires in the sections covered by these locations.

Four of these companies are required for the better protection of property against fire in the Annexed District, as the present force is entirely inadequate for this purpose.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,
COMMISSIONERS' OFFICE, NOS. 49 AND 51 CHAMBERS STREET,
July 3, 1891.

Mr. S. McCORMICK, Secretary, Gas Commission:

DEAR SIR—This Department is desirous that two additional electric lights be placed at Castle Garden and one at Abingdon Square.

At the former place the lights should be placed along the old dock, as at present it is unsafe to walk there at night. One light should also be placed in Abingdon Square, as at night it is almost impossible for the officer to see what is going on in this park.

I send you herewith plans, showing in red the locations proposed for these lights, and will be obliged if you will place the matter before the Gas Commission at the earliest possible moment.

SIRS—In regard to the communication from the Department of Public Parks requesting that two additional electric lamps be placed on the Battery, at Castle Garden, and also one at Abingdon Square,

I have to report that I made a personal examination at night of the locations mentioned and find that additional lights are required on the Battery at the place where the fences were removed from the inclosure around Castle Garden; there are no lamps near these vacant spots and the place is dark and dangerous. I would recommend that two lamps be placed there.

I found also two other places on the Battery which are very dark, because the foliage of the trees cut off the light from the existing lamps.

In regard to Abingdon Square, I find no great necessity for a lamp there; the place is small and is surrounded by an iron railing, and I could see distinctly over the park, the electric lamp now on the corner throwing its light there.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or proposal, or if he or they accept, but do not execute the contract and provide such proper security, as has been heretofore stated to be requisite, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet as provided by law.

Bidders will write out the amount of their estimate in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Payment will be made by a requisition on the Comptroller, in accordance with the terms of the contract, or from time to time, as the Commissioners may determine.

The form of the contract, including specifications and showing the manner of payment, will be furnished at the

office of the Department; and bidders are cautioned to examine each and all of its provisions carefully, as the Board of Public Charities and Correction will insist upon its absolute enforcement in every particular.

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, No. 51 Chambers street, in said city, on or before the 8th day of October, 1891, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting within ten week days next after the said 8th day of October, 1891, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days at 2 o'clock P. M.
