

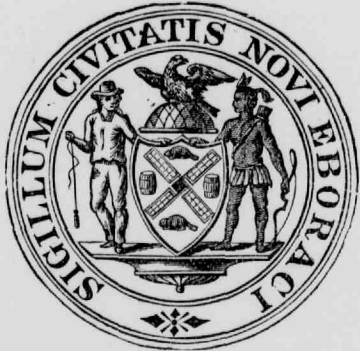

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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
WEDNESDAY, December 30, 1891, 11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Hugh J. Grant, the Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, the Comptroller; John H. V. Arnold, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Edward P. Barker, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held December 29, 1891, were read and approved.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1892.

Louis J. Heintz, Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, appeared, and asked for an increased appropriation for repairs to railroad bridges over the Harlem Railroad.

On motion, the wording of the appropriation made for the use of the Department of Public Works and contained in the Final Estimate, was amended so as to read "Flagging Sidewalks and Fencing Vacant Lots in front of City Property, including \$400 for fencing around the statue of Hon. Samuel S. Cox."

The estimates for the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Finance Department and Mayoralty were taken up for consideration.

The Mayor presented the following:

DEAR SIR—Referring to my conversation with you yesterday afternoon, I enclose herewith a memorandum of the item of contingent expenses, etc., in the appropriation for the Police Department, amended so as to include the expense of erecting reviewing stands and furnishing music for the annual parade of the Police force and adding the sum of \$1,000 for such purpose.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At the meeting of November 9, 1891, a requisition was made upon this Board for an appropriation of \$21,718.32 by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners in and for the City of New York, with two schedules annexed stating the various claims for compensation for services rendered and articles supplied to the said Board and an estimate of the expenditures necessary during the months of November and December, 1891, in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by the said Board at its meeting of November 5, 1891.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the meeting of November 9, 1891, appropriated the sum of \$10,000 as being sufficient at that time for the purposes of the Commission, and I now submit a resolution authorizing the appropriation of the balance of the requisition of \$11,718.32.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 10, chapter 4, Laws of 1891, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to issue Revenue Bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to the amount of eleven thousand seven hundred and eighteen dollars and thirty-two cents (\$11,718.32), redeemable on and after January 1, 1893, for the purpose of paying the expenses of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, appointed under the above act, which said amount of Revenue Bonds shall be repaid with interest by the bidder or bidders at the public sale of the rights, privileges and franchises, as provided in the act, whose bid shall be accepted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners; and the terms of such sale shall specify the time when such payment shall be made as well as the amount thereof.

GENTLEMEN—I beg to request a transfer of \$144 from the salary account of the Bureau of the Public Administrator to its contingency account.

The position of subpoena server became vacant on the 15th of January, 1891, and not having been filled extra help has since been hired. Provision for such help from July 1 to December 31, 1891, will require \$58.

The employee holding the position of stenographer and typewriter resigned April 10, 1891, and since that date work has been performed by a stenographer and typewriter who is regarded as on trial, for whom provision for compensation is requested from September 22 to December 31, 1891. For this purpose \$86 will be needed.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I present herewith a request from the Sheriff of the City and County of New York for a transfer of \$293.03, for the purpose of paying the salary of a Clerk on "Account Sales Book," who was appointed February 10, 1891, at a salary of \$360 per annum. The total appropriation for salaries for the Sheriff's Office for 1891 was \$96,880, and one of the subdivisions is more than sufficient by the amount asked to be transferred for the "Salaries of the Sheriff, Under Sheriff, Counsel, etc.," while the subdivision for "Salaries of Clerks" is insufficient to pay the salary of the Clerk appointed as above mentioned. The balance of \$293.03 results from the full salary not having been drawn by the Clerks whose appointments dated subsequent to January 1, 1891.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held December 30, 1891, the following preamble and resolution were adopted :
Whereas, Stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, amounting to the sum of four million ninety-six thousand two hundred and ninety-six dollars and thirty cents (\$4,096,296.30), forming a portion of the City Debt payable by laws authorizing their issue, from taxation, of which sum the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hold one hundred and sixty-two thousand one hundred and ninety-six dollars and thirty cents (\$162,196.30), become due and payable in the next following calendar year, 1892, as stated in the Comptroller's report, presented this day, of the condition of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt ; and

Whereas, It appears also by said report that the accumulations and the estimated revenues of the said Sinking Fund in the year 1892 are sufficient to pay and redeem that portion of the City Debt so payable from taxation, without in any way impairing the preferred claims on said fund, as prescribed by section 175 of the Consolidation Act of 1882 and other provisions of law; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deem it to be for the best interests of the City that that portion of the City Debt payable originally by law from taxation should be paid and redeemed by said Sinking Fund; therefore

Resolved, That, as provided by section 191 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that certain stocks of the City of New York, constituting a portion of the City Debt which, by the laws authorizing their issue, were made payable from taxation, and amounting to the sum of four million ninety-six thousand two hundred and ninety-six dollars and thirty cents (\$4,096,296.30), become due and payable in the next calendar year, to wit, in the year 1892; that the amount of stocks and bonds now outstanding which constitute a preferred charge against the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, as provided by section 175 of the Consolidation Act, is four million two hundred and sixty-seven thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,267,200), no portion of which becomes due in the said year 1892; that the amount of stocks and bonds and cash in said Sinking Fund on the 30th day of November, 1891, was fifty million five hundred and sixty-three thousand one hundred and fifty-six dollars and one cent (\$50,563,156.01); that the amount of the estimated revenues of said Sinking Fund for the next ensuing calendar year is six million six hundred thousand dollars (\$6,600,000), and that said portion of the City Debt payable from taxation and becoming due in said year 1892, can be paid and redeemed by said Sinking Fund without in any way impairing the preferred claims thereon, as prescribed by said section 175 of the Consolidation Act of 1882.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 28th day of October, 1891, adopted the Provisional Estimate for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two (1892), and have considered the objections to and rectifications of said estimate, made by the Board of Aldermen on November 19, 1891, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two (1892), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of section II of article 8 of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year 1892, as provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, which objections to and rectifications of said Provisional Estimate were transmitted by the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen on November 25, 1891, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 3, 1891; therefore
