### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

[The following Circular Letter has been addressed to the several Departments and Boards of the City Government, and to the Courts of the City and County of New York:]

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT—CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK, June 28, 1875.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 24th instant, the Comptroller was requested to notify you to prepare your estimates for the year 1876, and to transmit the same in duplicate to that Board and to the Board of Aldermen, before the 1st of September next, in compliance with the provisions of section 112, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, as amended by section 20, chapter 757 of that year.

I think it proper to remind you, in this connection, that the burden of taxation has now become so heavy as to make it, even more than ever before, incumbent upon us to conduct the government with the strictest economy.

Whilst there should be no illiberality in the amount or quality of the supplies and materials furnished to the several Departments, it may be practicable to effect large reductions as to them. And it should be remembered that the appropriations made last year, for salaries alone during the year 1875, amounted to \$9,564,931. Of that sum, salaries for \$5,171,845 were fixed by acts of the Legislature, and are beyond the control of the city authorities. But the balance of \$4,393,086 appears to be in excess of what should be allowed next year for salaries which can be regulated by the local authorities.

During the late session of the Legislature, it was attempted to reduce the amount of salaries fixed by law. Some of those efforts in the Legislature were successful—notably so those for cutting down salaries in the offices of the District Attorney, Recorder, and Surrogate, and the salaries of the Justices of the District Civil Courts, and of others—though a kindred bill did not pass which provided for ridding some of the courts of unnecessary officers and attendants bequeathed to us by the extravagant administrations of the last few years. The salaries of all of the officers just referred to will next year be at least twenty per cent. less than they have heretofore been, and the percentage of reduction of some of them is much larger. More would have been accomplished in the last Legislature in that direction but for the efforts of persons who avowed and were able to give effect to a determination to prevent legislation in amendment of the present ill-contrived City Charter. It is to be hoped that the next Legislature will grant us further relief.

In several Departments of the local government, there have been large reductions in the amounts paid heretofore for clerks and others; and all the rest are expected to follow the example.

It is desired to so shape the budget for next year in these respects as to cut down the tax levy to the lowest figures which may seem to promise an efficient government. And in preparing your estimates, you will greatly assist the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by careful specification in detail of the precise object of each of your estimated expenditures, and by such a statement of the salaries and functions of the several officers, clerks and employees to be mentioned upon your list, as will enable the several members to vote intelligently upon each item.

There should be no supernumeraries—no unnecessary officers, clerks, or other employees payable from the City Treasury—and no exorbitant salaries should be allowed to anybody.

### NOTICE IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS.

**APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE** heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
