AN ORDINANCE relating to bay-windows, oriel-windows, or other windows of dwellings, and to show-windows.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain, as follows:

Section 1. Bay-windows, oriel-windows, or other windows of any dwelling heretofore or hereafter constructed, may extend not more than one foot beyond the street or building line. Show or bow-windows may be placed in front of any store window opening; provided, however, that any such window shall not start from the ground or level of the platform, and is at least eighteen inches above the same to the sill, and is supported on suitable brackets, and shall not extend above the first story, nor more than twelve inches from the front wall of the building to which it is attached, nor more than twelve inches beyond the jambs or posts at the sides of the opening. Every window in this section mentioned shall in all respects conform to the laws regulating the erection of buildings in the City of New York. The penalty for violation of this ordinance shall be one hundred dollars.

That in consideration of this fact, your Committee would respectfully suggest that they be authorized to classify the sections of the submitted revision of the ordinances in such a way that each class may be arranged under headings corresponding in character to the titles and duties of the various Committees of this Board, and that such classification and the subjects thereunder be referred to the respective Committees of this Board, who shall consider the same, and report thereon at their earliest convenience, thereby acquainting each Committee with the ordinances relating to its particular Department, and also securing a more adequate and thorough consideration than could be given by your Committee on Law Department, for the reasons above mentioned.

SIR—I have received a letter inclosed to me by you at the direction of the Hon. Frederick A. Ware, Chairman of the Committee on Law Department of the Board of Aldermen, asking my opinion as to the powers of the Board to act upon the following ordinances, namely:

1. An ordinance granting the privilege to hucksters, licensed venders and push-cart peddlers to vend, sell and dispose of goods, wares or merchandise on Hester street, between Orchard and Clinton streets, and on Orchard, Ludlow and Essex streets, from Canal on the south to Grand on the north, and Market street and Suffolk street, from Division on the south to Grand on the north, under certain restrictions to the effect that the public thoroughfares should not be obstructed so as

to inconvenience public traffic; that sidewalks should be kept clear; that refuse should not be thrown or scattered upon the public streets and certain articles should not be sold except between certain hours, and that the dealers should provide, at their own expense, for laborers whose duty it should be to keep the streets clean, under the direction of the Street Cleaning Department.

2. A similar ordinance granting the privilege to hand-cart venders and peddlers to use Bayard street, from the easterly side of the Bowery to the easterly side of Forsyth street, and the northerly side of Division street and Eldridge and Allen streets, and the northerly side of Division and the south side of Grand street, and the westerly side of Orchard, from the north side of Division to the southerly side of Grand street, and Canal street, from the easterly side of the Bowery to the westerly side of Orchard, and Hester street, from the easterly side of the Bowery to the westerly side of Orchard street, on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week from six o'clock in the morning until ten o'clock in the morning; on Thursdays from six o'clock in the morning until ten o'clock at night; on Fridays from six o'clock in the morning until three o'clock in the afternoon, and on the two days before Hebrew holidays between the same hours as herein last mentioned. mentioned.

3. A similar ordinance granting to hand-cart venders and peddlers the privilege of selling similar materials on Division street, from the westerly side of Clinton street to the easterly side of Orchard street, and on the easterly side of Orchard street, from the northerly side of Division street to the southerly side of Grand, and on Ludlow, Norfolk and Suffolk streets, from the northerly side of Division street to the southerly side of Grand street, and on Hester street, from the easterly side of Orchard street to the westerly side of Clinton street, on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week, from six o'clock in the morning until ten o'clock in the morning, on Thursdays from six o'clock in the morning until ten o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon. the morning until three in the afternoon.

It has frequently been decided with reference to ordinances of the description of the three above recited, that such occupation of the public streets constitute obstructions which prevent the use and recited, that such occupation of the public streets constitute obstructions which prevent the use and enjoyment of the streets for the ordinary purposes for which they are maintained, and that it deprives not only residents upon them, but the public as well, of the free and unobstructed use to which they are entitled. In the case of The People ex rel. O'Reilly vs. The Mayor, a similar ordinance of the Common Council authorized licensed venders to sell and occupy Forty-second street west of Eighth avenue, on certain nights between certain hours, under restrictions similar to those contained in the first ordinance above recited. It was there held that such a use not only constituted an obstruction, but that it could not be authorized by the Common Council.

I am therefore of the opinion, and so advise the Law Committee of the Common Council, that the proposed ordinances are not within the power of the Board and will afford no protection to the venders who attempt to exercise such privileges thereunder.

4. An ordinance designating the portion of the sidewalk at the northwest corner of Sixth avenue and Forty-second street for the public sale of newspapers and periodicals. The portion of the sidewalk authorized for the purpose in question is under the stairway of the elevated railroad occupied by a covered booth or stand about ten feet long by three and a half wide and seven feet high, and the ordinance contemplates a grant to the owner of the stand, Samuel Weinberg by name.

The ordinance recites chapter 455 of the Laws of 1884 as legislative authority for the grant of the privilege. This act in terms amends subdivision 4 of section 86 of the Consolidation Act and if it were still in force would undoubtedly furnish authority to pass the ordinance in question. But subdivision 4 was again amended by chapter 37 of the Laws of 1888, in such a manner as to eliminate the authority granted by the act of 1884, to pass ordinances for the use of portions of streets and sidewalks for the sale of newspapers and periodicals, and by a still later act of the same year, chapter 115 of the Laws of 1888, the power of the Board as to this was conferred by an amendment of subdivision 3 of section 86 of the Consolidation Act.

This last act is the only authority for the passage of such a resolution as that under discussion, and subdivision 3, as amended by it, reads as follows:

"To regulate the use of sidewalks and prevent the extension of building fronts and house fronts within the stoop-lines, to grant permits for the erection of booths and stands within the stoop-lines, the owner or owners of the said premises consenting thereto, for the sale of news-reparent, periodicals, fruits and soda-water only."

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the ordinances in question, purporting to grant the privilege of selling newspapers along the curb, is not within the power of the Common Council to pass, and I so advise the Law Committee. I am, yours, respectfully,

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of April 16, 1895, inclosing copy of a resolution passed by the Common Council, and referred to the Committee on Railroads, requesting me to furnish the Board with information regarding the term of years that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad were granted permission to run dummy engines and freight trains from their depot on Hudson street, etc., the year the law was enacted, and also to furnish a copy of the proceedings in connection with the granting and amending of said franchise.

This request is so fully covered by an opinion of my predecessor, the Hon. George P. Andrews, under date of March 2, 1883, to Walter H. Bunn, Esq., Clerk of the Assembly (Vol. 21 of Opinions, page 83), that it would be a work of supererogation to do more than quote from it.

Judge Andrews says:

"The Hudson River Railroad Company was incorporated under an act of the Legislature entitled 'An Act to authorize the construction of a railroad from New York to Albany,' chapter 216, Laws of 1846, as amended by chapter 31, Laws of 1847, and chapter 30 of the Laws of 1848.

"Section 3 of chapter 216 of said Act of 1846 contains, among other things, the following provision: 'The said directors may locate their railroad on any of the streets or avenues of the City of New York, westerly of and including the Eighth avenue, and on or westerly of Hudson street, provided the assent of the corporation of said city be first obtained for such location.'

"Under this section it was necessary that the municipal authorities should take action before the route of said railroad company could be extended through any street of the City of New York; and, accordingly, the Common Council did, by ordinance of May 6, 1847, grant permission to the said company to lay its tracks in certain city streets, West and Canal streets being among the number. Thereafter, by resolution of September 25, 1849, the Common Council permitted said railroad company to extend its route through Canal and Hudson streets to Chambers street.

"The right to operate steam dummies in the streets named in the foregoing resolution of the Assembly is claimed by virtue of a resolution of the Common Council, dated June 22, 1867, which is in part as follows:

Assembly is claimed by virtue of a resolution of the Common Council, dated June 22, 1867, which is in part as follows:

"'Resolved, That permission is hereby granted to the Hudson River Railroad Company, during the continuance of their charter, to use 'dummy engines' to draw their cars between their several passenger and freight stations in the City of New York, upon condition that they pay in each year a license tee of fifty dollars for each of said engines used by them during that year; and to lay down such switches and turnouts at their several passenger and freight depots as are necessary for the convenient transaction of their business."

the convenient transaction of their business.'

"I do not know what position is taken by the railroad company in regard to the effect of this resolution, but it may be claimed that said resolution constitutes an agreement which cannot be terminated by the City prior to the termination of the company's charter.

"I do not think this claim, if made, is well founded. A municipal corporation cannot, by such a contract, abridge its legislative power; nor could the Common Council in 1367 hamper the City by any arrangements or stipulations which would prevent a subsequent Common Council from enacting any law that might be deemed essential for the public good.

"Section 178, chapter 86, Laws of 1813, provides for the exercise of legislative control by the Corporation of the City of New York over its streets, constituting a trust the execution of which cannot be avoided by a contract of this nature. The corporation is also invested by the Charter, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, with a like power of legislation.

"Section 17 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, provides as follows:

"The Common Council shall have power to make, continue, modify and repeal such ordinances, regulations and resolutions as may be necessary to carry into effect any and all of the powers now vested in, or by this act conferred upon, the corporation, and shall have the power to enforce obedience to such ordinances and observance thereof, by ordaining penalties for each and every violation thereof, in such sums as it may deem expedient, not exceeding one hundred dollars; and shall have power to make such ordinances, not inconsistent with law and the constitution of this State, and with such penalties, in the matters and for the purposes following in addition to other powers elsewhere specially granted, namely:

Sec. 2. The said Hudson River Railroad Company shall grade, regulate, pave and keep in repair a space twenty-five feet in width in and about the tracks in all the avenues and streets through which the said track or tracks shall be laid whenever the Common Council shall deem the interest of the public to require such pavement to be done. The said company shall lay such rail track through the avenues and streets in conformity to such directions, as to line and grade, as shall be given by the Street Commissioner, and shall conform their said railroad to the grades of the avenues and streets through which it shall extend, or cross, as shall be from time to time established by the Common Council, if the latter so require; and shall lay their rails or tracks, in the streets or avenues, in such manner as to cause no unnecessary impediment to the common and ordinary use of the street for all other purposes and so as to leave all the water courses free and unobstructed. It shall be especially incumbent on the said Hudson River Railroad Company, at their own cost, to construct stone bridges across such of the streets intersected by the railroad as may, by the elevation of their grades above the surface of said road, require to be arched or bridged, whenever, in the opinion of the Common Council, the same shall be necessary for public convenience; and also to make such embankments or excavations as the Common Council may deem necessary to render the passage over the railroad and embankments at the cross streets easy and convenient for all the purposes for which streets and roads are usually put to; and the said company shall also make, at their own cost and charge, all such drains and sewers as their embankments or excavations may, in the opinion of the Common Council, render necessary; and the said company shall so make, at their own cost and charge, all such drains and sewers as their embankments

shall be received therefor.
